Re: Reproductive Health Care Facilities Access Act (Westchester Cnty., N.Y., Charter & Admin. Code ch. 425 (2023)

Dear Chairman Gashi and members of the Westchester County Board of Legislators,

By way of introduction, the National Institute for Reproductive Health and its Action Fund, is a national advocacy organization dedicated to advancing just and equitable access to reproductive health care, including abortion, across the country. Our particular focus is advancing policies at the state and local level that improve the availability and accessibility of care and safeguard the health, rights, and safety of those seeking and providing reproductive health care services. In this capacity, we have worked with local elected officials in scores of cities and counties in their efforts to adopt new ordinances and strengthen existing laws to address those critical issues. This work has encompassed providing insight to local elected officials around measures designed to prohibit interference with accessing reproductive health care facilities and obtaining reproductive health care services, including measures seeking to achieve similar public safety goals as the Reproductive Health Care Facilities Access Act (Westchester Cnty., N.Y., Charter & Admin. Code ch. 425 (2023)

In light of this experience, I am writing to provide perspective from our vantage point in support of the Westchester County Board of Legislators timely consideration of ways to further clarify and strengthen the Reproductive Health Care Facilities Access Act. As you know, this is an urgent matter, given that the health and safety of patients and health care providers in your community is at stake.
