MINUTES APPROVAL

I. ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION

ACT-2023-236 ACT - Lawsuit Settlement of H.H. v. County of Westchester and Westchester Adult Protective Services

Guests: Law Dept.: County Attorney John Nonna, Assistant Chief Deputy County Attorney Fred Sullivan, and Susan Kettner

Mr. Nonna and Ms. Kettner discussed the item. Ms. Kettner explained that this case involved a Westchester County Adult Protective Services (APS) caseworker who stole approximately \$881,062 between 2017 and 2022 from H.H., a 96-year-old woman with dementia. The caseworker entirely depleted H.H.'s bank and retirement accounts, leaving her destitute and unable to pay for her care. This was done through a series of withdrawals, transfers, credit card transactions and other deceptions that went undetected by APS. In March 2023, the caseworker was arrested and charged with three felonies and a misdemeanor in connection with the alleged theft.

Ms. Kettner said that the Settlement Agreement requires that the funds be set aside for the

lifetime benefit of H.H. and designated to provide for H.H. 's care at The Atria, an assisted living facility. Upon H.H.'s death, any unused funds will revert back to the County, in order to cut off any claims of remote heirs.

Ms. Kettner said that although the County's liability as to negligent hiring and retention would be difficult to prove, the issue of negligent supervision could pose serious liability issues, given some of the practices employed by the APS' case workers.

With a motion by Legislator Imamura seconded by Chair Maher, the committee went into executive session at 10:55 a.m. to discuss settlement negotiations and future litigation strategy. With a motion by Legislator Imamura seconded by Legislator Barr, the committee came out of executive session at 11:21 a.m..

On motion of Legislator Barr, seconded by Committee Vice-Chair Imamura, the above item was signed by committee and referred to Board of Legislators. The motion carried by the following vote:
