Honorable Members of the Board of Legislators:

Transmitted herewith for your consideration and approval is an Act which, if adopted, would authorize the County of Westchester, acting by and through its Office for Women (the "County"), to enter into an agreement with the Westchester County Health Care Corporation ("WCHCC") pursuant to which WCHCC would provide free culturally-competent bilingual services for victims of sexual assault residing in Westchester County through its Sexual Assault, Abuse and Victim's Empowerment ("SAAVE") Program for the term commencing retroactively on January 1, 2025 and continuing through December 31, 2027 for a total amount not-to-exceed Six Hundred Thousand (\$600,000.00) Dollars, payable in accordance with an approved budget (the "Agreement"). The funding amount per year will not exceed Two Hundred Thousand (\$200,000) Dollars.

According to the 2010 census, the foreign born population of Westchester County accounts for almost 24% of the population, evenly split between naturalized US citizens and non-citizens with Hispanics accounting for more than 20%. It is generally accepted that the number of Spanish-speaking mono and bi-lingual residents has been growing and is actually much greater than the numbers stated. The needs of this community for services for victims of sexual assault have increased commensurate with the increase in population. It is estimated that only 16% of sex crimes are actually reported statewide, making it difficult to accurately estimate the number in Westchester County. The trauma associated with sexual violence creates a significant health burden for survivors of sexual assault. These health problems can lead to hospitalization, interruptions in ability to work, disability and death.

The services to be provided by the WCHCC through its SAAVE Program pursuant to the proposed Agreement will include access to a bilingual 24/7 hotline; crisis counseling and advocacy; accompaniment to appropriate resources including sexual assault exams, police, hospitals and other providers; comprehensive outreach; education; follow-up; and other related culturally-competent services.

As you know, Section 3307(4) of the New York Public Authorities Law requires the approval of your Honorable Board and the Board of Acquisition and Contract for this Agreement.

I believe that entering into the agreement with WCHCC, on the terms set forth above, is in the best interests of the County. Therefore, I recommend your favorable action on the annexed proposed Act.

The Planning Department has advised that based on its review, the proposed agreement described above does not meet the definition of an "action" under the State Environmental Quality Review Act, 6 NYCRR part 617. As such, no environmental review is required. Please refer to the memorandum from the Department of Planning dated January 14, 2025, which is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Legislators.

Your Committee has been advised that Section 3307(4) of the New York Public Authorities Law requires the approval of your Honorable Board and the Board of Acquisition and Contract for this Agreement. Pursuant to that section, said approval of the Board of Legislators must be by an affirmative vote of not less than a majority of the voting strength of the Board.

Your Committee has carefully considered and recommends approval of the proposed Act.

BE IT ENACTED by the County Board of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. The County of Westchester (the "County") is hereby authorized to enter into an agreement with the Westchester County Health Care Corporation ("WCHCC") to provide free culturally-competent bilingual services for victims of sexual assault residing in Westchester County through its Sexual Assault, Abuse and Victim's Empowerment ("SAAVE") Program, including but not limited to: access to a bilingual 24/7 hotline; crisis counseling and advocacy; accompaniment to appropriate resources including sexual assault exams, police, hospitals and other providers; comprehensive outreach; education; follow-up; and other related services for the term commencing retroactively on January 1, 2025 and terminating on December 31, 2027 for a total amount not to exceed Six Hundred Thousand (\$600,000.00) Dollars, payable to WCHCC pursuant to an approved budget. The funding amount per year will not exceed Two Hundred Thousand (\$200,000.00) Dollars.

- §2. The County Executive or his authorized designee is hereby authorized and empowered to execute all instruments and to take all action necessary and appropriate to effectuate the purposes hereof.
 - §3. This Act shall take effect immediately.

HONORABLE BOARD OF LEGISLATORS THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK

Your Committee is in receipt of a communication from the County Executive requesting that this Honorable Board authorize the County of Westchester, acting by and through its Office for Women, ("County") to enter into an agreement with the Westchester County Health Care Corporation ("WCHCC"), pursuant to which WCHCC would provide free culturally-competent bilingual services for victims of sexual assault residing in the County through its Sexual Assault, Abuse and Victim's Empowerment ("SAAVE") Program, for the term commencing retroactively on January 1, 2025 and continuing through December 31, 2027, for a total amount not to exceed Eight Hundred Seventy Thousand (\$870,000.00) Dollars, payable in accordance with an approved budget ("Agreement"). The funding amount for calendar year 2025 will not exceed Two Hundred Thousand (\$200,000.00) Dollars. The funding amount for calendar years 2026 and 2027 will not exceed Three Hundred Thirty-Five Thousand (\$335,000.00) Dollars per year.

Your Committee is advised that according to the 2010 census, the foreign born population of the County accounts for almost 24% of the population, evenly split between naturalized US citizens and non-citizens with Hispanics accounting for more than 20%. It is generally accepted that the number of Spanish-speaking mono and bilingual residents has been growing and is actually much greater than the numbers stated. The needs of this community for services for victims of sexual assault have increased with the increase in population. It is estimated that only 16% of sex crimes are actually reported statewide, making it difficult to accurately estimate the number in the County. The trauma associated with sexual violence creates a significant health burden for survivors of sexual assault. These health problems can lead to hospitalization, interruptions in ability to work, disability, and death.

Your Committee is advised that the services to be provided by the WCHCC through its SAAVE Program pursuant to the proposed Agreement will include access to a bilingual, 24/7 County-wide hotline for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault; crisis counseling and advocacy; accompaniment to appropriate resources including sexual assault exams, police, hospitals, and other providers; comprehensive outreach; education; follow-up; and other related culturally-competent services.

The Planning Department has advised that based on its review, the proposed Agreement does not meet the definition of an "action" under New York State Environmental Quality Review Act and its implementing regulations 6 NYCRR part 617. Please refer to the memorandum from the Department of Planning dated January 14, 2025, which is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Legislators.

Your Committee has been advised that Section 3307(4) of the New York Public Authorities Law requires the approval of your Honorable Board and the Board of Acquisition and Contract for this Agreement. Pursuant to that section, said approval of the Board of Legislators must be by an affirmative vote of not less than a majority of the voting strength of the County Board of Legislators.

HONORABLE BOARD OF LEGISLATORS THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER

Your Committee is in receipt of a communication from the Chair of the Board of Legislators recommending the adoption of an Act which, if approved by your Honorable Board, would authorize the County of Westchester (the "County") to enter into an inter-municipal agreement ("IMA") with the Village of Mount Kisco ("Mount Kisco"), pursuant to which Mount Kisco will provide various educational and cultural events in support of Mount Kisco's Sesquicentennial Anniversary Celebration, for the period from January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025. The County will pay Mount Kisco an amount not to exceed Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, payable in full upon execution of the IMA, in accordance with an approved budget.

Pursuant to the IMA, Mount Kisco will provide various celebratory educational and cultural events, including a presentation "Celebration of Mount Kisco Faith Communities" (January 19, 2025), Celebration of African American Heritage in Mount Kisco" (February 16, 2025), and a presentation of "Notable Women in Mount Kisco History" (March 23, 2025), a "32-page sesquicentennial "Then and Now" book in the fall 2025, purchase colonial costumes, flags and banners, as well as Trolly Tours of 23 historic sites of Mount Kisco as well as a docent tour of the Old Mount Kisco Post Office on East Main Street (c1935) and the preparation of a 116-page Sesquicentennial Journal with 13 chapters of Mount Kisco History.

Your Committee has determined that there is a clear and overwhelming educational and cultural need for the Program. Accordingly, Your Committee recommends authorizing the County to enter into the proposed IMA.

The Department of Planning has advised that the proposed IMA does not meet the

definition of an "action" under the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA"), and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR, Part 617. Please refer to the Memorandum from the Department of Planning dated January 14, 2025, which is on file with the clerk of your Honorable Board. Therefore, no environmental review is required. Your Committee concurs with this recommendation.

Your Committee has been advised that passage of the attached Act requires an affirmative vote of a majority of the members of your Honorable Board. Your Committee has carefully considered this proposed legislation authorizing the above-mentioned IMA and recommends its approval.

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THIS AGREEMENT made the day of

, 2024 by and between

THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, a municipal corporation of the State of New York, having an office and place of business in the Michaelian Office Building, 148 Martine Avenue, White Plains, New York 10601, (hereafter the "County"),

and

THE VILLAGE OF MOUNT KISCO, a New York municipal corporation of the State of New York, having an office and principal place of business at 104 Main Street, Mount Kisco, NY 10549 (hereafter the "Municipality").

<u>FIRST</u>: The Municipality, acting by and through its Recreation Department, shall provide various educational and cultural events in support of Mount Kisco's Sesquicentennial Anniversary Celebration, as more particularly described in Schedule "A" attached hereto and made a part hereof (the "Work").

SECOND: The term of this Agreement shall commence retroactively on January 1, 2025, and shall terminate on December 31, 2025 unless terminated earlier pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement.

THIRD: For the Work to be performed pursuant to Paragraph "FIRST," the County will pay the Municipality a total amount not to exceed Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, in accordance with an approved budget which is attached hereto and made a part hereof as Schedule "B". Payment shall be made in full within thirty (30) days after submission by the Municipality of an invoice. Municipality agrees that, if requested to do so by the Chair, it shall promptly submit supporting documentation to substantiate the basis for payment. The Chair will submit any requests for supporting documentation within two (2) weeks of receiving an invoice. The County shall pay said invoice within thirty (30) days of receipt of the invoice, or if supporting documentation is requested then within thirty (30) days of submission of supporting documentation. No additional payment shall be made by the County to the Municipality for out-of-pocket expenses or disbursements made in connection with the Work rendered under this Agreement, as all costs and expenses for said services are deemed to be included in the fee set forth above.

The Municipality shall, at no additional charge, furnish all labor, services, materials, tools, equipment and other appliances necessary to complete the services contracted for under this Agreement. It is recognized and understood that in no event shall total payment to the Municipality exceed the not-to-exceed amount set forth above.

FOURTH: The Municipality shall report to the County on its progress toward completing the Work, as the Chair of the Westchester County Board of Legislators or his duly authorized designee (the "Chair") may request, and shall immediately inform the Chair in writing of any cause for delay in the performance of its obligations under this Agreement.

No later than thirty (30) days after the end of the term of the Agreement, the Municipality shall submit to the Chair, a written performance measurement report which shall provide details about each program, including the number of participants that participated in each program.

In addition to any general audit rights to which the County may be entitled hereunder, the County also reserves the right to audit the Municipality's performance under this Agreement. Such audit may include requests for documentation, reports or other information which the Chair may, in the Chair's discretion, deem necessary and appropriate. The County may also make site visits to the location/s where the services to be provided under this Agreement are performed in order to review Municipality's records, observe the performance of services and/or to conduct interviews of staff and patrons, where appropriate and not otherwise prohibited by law.

FIFTH: The Parties recognize and acknowledge that the obligations of the County under this Agreement are subject to annual appropriations by its Board of Legislators pursuant to the Laws of Westchester County. Therefore, this Agreement shall be deemed executory only to the extent of the monies appropriated and available. The County shall have no liability under this Agreement beyond funds appropriated and available for payment pursuant to this Agreement. The parties understand and intend that the obligation of the County hereunder shall constitute a current expense of the County and shall not in any way be construed to be a debt of the County in contravention of any applicable constitutional or statutory limitations or requirements concerning the creation of indebtedness by the County, nor shall anything contained in this Agreement constitute a pledge of the general tax revenues, funds or moneys of the County. The County shall pay amounts due under this Agreement exclusively from legally available funds appropriated for this purpose. The County shall retain the right, upon the occurrence of the adoption of any County Budget by its Board of

Legislators during the term of this Agreement or any amendments thereto, and for a reasonable period of time after such adoption(s), to conduct an analysis of the impacts of any such County Budget on County finances. After such analysis, the County shall retain the right to either terminate this Agreement or to renegotiate the amounts and rates set forth herein. If the County subsequently offers to pay a reduced amount to the Municipality, then the Municipality shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon reasonable prior written notice.

This Agreement is also subject to further financial analysis of the impact of any New York State Budget (the "State Budget") proposed and adopted during the term of this Agreement. The County shall retain the right, upon the occurrence of any release by the Governor of a proposed State Budget and/or the adoption of a State Budget or any amendments thereto, and for a reasonable period of time after such release(s) or adoption(s), to conduct an analysis of the impacts of any such State Budget on County finances. After such analysis, the County shall retain the right to either terminate this Agreement or to renegotiate the amounts and rates approved herein. If the County subsequently offers to pay a reduced amount to the Municipality, then the Municipality shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon reasonable prior written notice.

SIXTH: (a) The County, upon ten (10) days' notice to the Municipality, may terminate this Agreement in whole or in part when the County deems it to be in its best interest. In such event, the Municipality shall be compensated and the County shall be liable only for payment for services already rendered under this Agreement prior to the effective date of termination, and Municipality shall reimburse to the County the amount of the lump-sum payment, pro-rated to the time remaining in the term of this Agreement. Upon receipt of notice that the County is terminating this Agreement in its best interests, the Municipality shall stop Work immediately and incur no further costs in furtherance of this Agreement without the express approval of the Chair, and the Municipality shall direct any approved subcontractors to do the same.

In the event of a dispute as to the value of the Work rendered by the Municipality prior to the date of termination, it is understood and agreed that the Chair shall determine the value of such Work rendered by the Municipality. The Municipality shall accept such reasonable and good faith determination as final.

(b) In the event the County determines that there has been a material breach by the Municipality of any of the terms of the Agreement and such breach remains uncured for forty-eight (48) hours after service on the Municipality of written notice thereof, the County, in addition to any other right or remedy it might have, may terminate this Agreement and the County shall have the

right, power and authority to complete the Work provided for in this Agreement, or contract for its completion, and any additional expense or cost of such completion shall be charged to and paid by the Municipality. Without limiting the foregoing, upon written notice to the Municipality, repeated breaches by the Municipality of duties or obligations under this Agreement shall be deemed a material breach of this Agreement justifying termination for cause hereunder without requirement for further opportunity to cure.

SEVENTH: The Municipality shall provide proof of insurance as set forth in the insurance requirements of Schedule "C" of this Agreement. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if the Municipality is self-insured for all or a portion of the insurance required by Schedule "C" it may provide proof of such self-insurance in a form acceptable to the County's Director of Risk Management. However, to the extent the Municipality is self-insured and carries excess liability, the County shall be named as an additional insured to that policy.

In addition to, and not in limitation of the insurance requirements set forth in this Agreement, the Municipality agrees to procure and maintain insurance naming the County as additional insured, as provided and described in Schedule "C" entitled "Standard Insurance Provisions", which is attached hereto and made a part hereof. In addition to, and not in limitation of the insurance provisions contained in Schedule "C" the Municipality agrees:

- (a) that except for the amount, if any, of damage contributed to, caused by, or resulting from the sole negligence of the County, the Municipality shall indemnify and hold harmless the County, its officers, employees, agents, and elected officials from and against any and all liability, damage, claims, demands, costs, judgments, fees, attorney's fees or loss arising directly or indirectly out of the performance or failure to perform hereunder by the Municipality or third parties under the direction or control of the Municipality; and
- (b) to provide defense for and defend, at its sole expense, any and all claims, demands or causes of action directly or indirectly arising out of this Agreement and to bear all other costs and expenses related thereto; and
- (c) in the event the Municipality does not provide the above defense and indemnification to the County, and such refusal or denial to provide the above defense and indemnification is found to be in breach of this provision, then the Municipality shall reimburse the County's reasonable attorney's fees incurred in connection with the defense of any action, and in connection with enforcing this provision of the Agreement.

EIGHTH: The Municipality expressly agrees that neither it nor any contractor, subcontractor, employee, or any other person acting on its behalf shall discriminate against or intimidate any employee or other individual on the basis of race, creed, religion, color, gender, age, national origin, ethnicity, alienage or citizenship status, disability, marital status, sexual orientation, familial status, genetic predisposition or carrier status during the term of or in connection with this Agreement, as those terms may be defined in Chapter 700 of the Laws of Westchester County. The Municipality acknowledges and understands that the County maintains a zero tolerance policy prohibiting all forms of harassment or discrimination against its employees by co-workers, supervisors, vendors, contractors, or others.

<u>NINTH</u>: The Municipality shall comply, at its own expense, with the provisions of all applicable local, state and federal laws, rules and regulations, including, but not limited to, those applicable to the Municipality as an employer of labor. The Municipality shall further comply, at its own expense, with all applicable rules, regulations and licensing requirements pertaining to its professional status and that of its employees, partners, associates, subcontractors and others employed to render the Work hereunder.

TENTH: The Municipality shall not delegate any duties or assign any of its rights under this Agreement without the prior express written consent of the County. The Municipality shall not subcontract any part of the Work without the written consent of the County, subject to any necessary legal approvals. Any purported delegation of duties, assignment of rights or subcontracting of Work under this Agreement without the prior express written consent of the County is void. All subcontracts that have received such prior written consent shall provide that subcontractors are subject to all terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. It is recognized and understood by the Municipality that for the purposes of this Agreement, all Work performed by a County-approved subcontractor shall be deemed Work performed by the Municipality and the Municipality shall insure that such subcontracted work is subject to the material terms and conditions of this Agreement. All subcontracts for the Work shall expressly reference the subcontractor's duty to comply with the material terms and conditions of this Agreement and shall attach a copy of the County's contract with the Municipality. The Municipality shall obtain a written acknowledgement from the owner and/or chief executive of subcontractor or his/her duly authorized representative that the subcontractor has received a copy of the County's contract, read it and is familiar with the material terms and conditions thereof. The Municipality shall include provisions in its subcontracts designed to ensure

that the Municipality and/or its auditor has the right to examine all relevant books, records, documents or electronic data of the subcontractor necessary to review the subcontractor's compliance with the material terms and conditions of this Agreement. For each and every year for which this Agreement continues, the Municipality shall submit to the Chairman a letter signed by the mayor of the Municipality or his/her duly authorized representative certifying that each and every approved subcontractor is in compliance with the material terms and conditions of the Agreement.

The Parties further agree that prior to the commencement of the Work, the Municipality shall confirm and provide written notice to the County, indicating which subcontractor will provide the bus transportation services. Prior to providing the services, said subcontractor shall provide evidence of insurance to the County as set forth in the insurance requirements of Schedule "C" of this Agreement, either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County.

ELEVENTH: The Municipality and the County agree that the Municipality and its officers, employees, agents, contractors and/or subcontractors are independent contractors and not employees of the County or any department, agency or unit thereof. In accordance with their status as independent contractors, the Municipality covenants and agrees that neither the Municipality nor any of its officers, employees, agents, contractors and/or subcontractors will hold themselves out as, or claim to be, officers or employees of the County or any department, agency or unit thereof.

TWELFTH: Failure of the County to insist, in any one or more instances, upon strict performance of any term or condition herein contained shall not be deemed a waiver or relinquishment of such term or condition, but the same shall remain in full force and effect.

Acceptance by the County of any Work or the payment of any fee or reimbursement due hereunder with knowledge of a breach of any term or condition hereof, shall not be deemed a waiver of any such breach and no waiver by the County of any provision hereof shall be implied.

THIRTEENTH: All notices of any nature referred to in this Agreement shall be in writing and either sent by registered or certified mail postage pre-paid, or delivered by hand or overnight courier, (with acknowledgment received and a copy of the notice sent by registered or certified mail postage pre-paid), as set forth below or to such other addresses as the respective parties hereto may

designate in writing. Notice shall be effective on the date of receipt. Notices shall be sent to the following:

FOURTEENTH: This Agreement and its attachments constitute the entire Agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede all previous negotiations, commitments and writings. It shall not be released, discharged, changed or modified except by an instrument in writing signed by a duly authorized representative of each of the parties.

In the event of any conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the terms of any schedule or attachment hereto, it is understood that the terms of this Agreement shall be controlling with respect to any interpretation of the meaning and intent of the parties.

<u>FIFTEENTH</u>: Nothing herein is intended or shall be construed to confer upon or give to any third party or its successors and assigns any rights, remedies or basis for reliance upon, under or by reason of this Agreement, except in the event that specific third party rights are expressly granted herein.

<u>SIXTEENTH</u>: The Municipality recognizes that this Agreement does not grant the Municipality the exclusive right to perform the Work for the County and that the County may enter into similar agreements with other Municipalities on an "as needed" basis.

SEVENTEENTH: The Municipality shall use all reasonable means to avoid any conflict of interest with the County and shall immediately notify the County in the event of a conflict of interest. The Municipality shall also use all reasonable means to avoid any appearance of impropriety.

EIGHTEENTH: This Agreement may be executed simultaneously in several counterparts, each of which shall be an original and all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument. This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of New York. In addition, the parties hereby agree that for any cause of action arising out of this Agreement shall be brought in the County of Westchester.

If any term or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or void or unenforceable, the remainder of the terms and provisions of this Agreement shall in no way be affected, impaired, or invalidated, and to the extent permitted by applicable law, any such term, or provision shall be restricted in applicability or reformed to the minimum extent required for such to be enforceable. This provision shall be interpreted and enforced to give effect to the original written intent of the parties prior to the determination of such invalidity or unenforceability.

<u>NINTEENTH</u>: All payments made by the County to the Municipality will be made by electronic funds transfer pursuant to the County's Vendor Direct program. The Municipality acknowledges that it is already enrolled in the County's Vendor Direct Program and agrees that if there are changes to the information contained in the authorization forms it will notify the Westchester County Finance Department directly.

<u>TWENTIETH</u>: This Agreement shall not be enforceable until signed by both parties and approved by the Office of the County Attorney.

SCOPE OF WORK



The Mount Kisco Historical Society received funding from Westchester County in the amount of \$5,000 to support Mount Kisco's Sesquicentennial Anniversary Celebration. These events and activities included a speaker/presentation series.

Including, a presentation "Celebration of Mount Kisco Faith Communities" (January 19, 2025), Celebration of African American Heritage in Mount Kisco" (February 16, 2025, and a presentation of "Notable Women in Mount Kisco History" (March 23, 2025). A "32-page sesquicentennial "Then and Now" book will be presented to the community in the fall 2025

The Purchase of colonial costumes, flags and banners for the Sesquicentennial Parade and events for the weekend celebrations. The Historical Society marched in colonial costumes in the parade and throughout the Sesquicentennial weekend celebration. Handheld mini 150th anniversary flags were handed out to children along the parade route.

During the Sesquicentennial weekend celebrations (May 31- June 1) the Mt. Kisco Historic Society offered docent led Trolly Tours of 23 historic sites of Mount Kisco as well as a docent tour of the Old Mount Kisco Post Office on East Main Street (c1935). The Historical Society setup up a Trolley Tour Ticket / Welcome Tent for the Trolly Tours. Trolley Tour tickets were free and available online through the Village of Mt Kisco / Mt. BOARD OF LEGISLATORS

STANDARD INSURANCE PROVISIONS (Contractor)

1. Prior to commencing work, and throughout the term of the Agreement, the Contractor shall furnish, deliver and maintain at its own cost and expense the required insurance as delineated below from insurance companies licensed in the State of New York, carrying a Best's financial rating of A or better. The Contractor shall provide evidence of such insurance to the County, either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County ("Director"). The policies or certificates thereof shall provide that ten (10) days prior to cancellation or material change in the policy, notices of same shall be given to the Director either by overnight mail or personal delivery for all of the following stated insurance policies. All notices shall name the Contractor and identify the Agreement.

If at any time any of the policies required herein shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing any such policy shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, the Contractor shall upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and submit the policy or the certificate as requested by the Director for approval by the Director. Upon failure of the Contractor to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance, the Agreement, at the election of the County, may be declared suspended, discontinued or terminated.

Failure of the Contractor to take out, maintain, or the taking out or maintenance of any required insurance, shall not relieve the Contractor from any liability under the Agreement, nor shall the insurance requirements be construed to conflict with or otherwise limit the contractual obligations of the Contractor concerning indemnification.

All property losses shall be made payable to the "County of Westchester" and adjusted with the appropriate County personnel.

In the event that claims, for which the County may be liable, in excess of the insured amounts provided herein are filed by reason of Contractor's negligent acts or omissions under the Agreement or by virtue of the provisions of the labor law or other statute or any other reason, the amount of excess of such claims or any portion thereof, may be withheld from payment due or to become due the Contractor until such time as the Contractor shall furnish such additional security covering such claims in form satisfactory to the Director.

In the event of any loss, if the Contractor maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums identified herein, the County shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Contractor. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

2. The Contractor shall provide evidence of the insurance for each coverage checked off below (if additional coverage is required for a specific agreement, those requirements will be described in the Agreement):

Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability: Certificate form C-105.2 or State Fund Insurance Company form U-26.3 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Workers' Compensation Law. State Workers' Compensation Board form DB-120.1 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Disability Benefits Law. Location of operation shall be "All locations in Westchester County, New York."

Where an applicant claims to not be required to carry either a Workers' Compensation Policy or Disability Benefits Policy, or both, the employer must complete NYS form CE-200, available to download at: http://www.wcb.ny.gov.

If the employer is self-insured for Workers' Compensation, he/she should present a certificate from the New York State Worker's Compensation Board evidencing that fact (Either SI-12, Certificate of Workers' Compensation Self-Insurance, or GSI-105.2, Certificate of Participation in Workers' Compensation Group Self-Insurance).

⊠ Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 (c.s.l.) per occurrence and a \$2,000,000 aggregate limit naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis. This insurance shall include the following coverages:

- i. Premises Operations.
- ii. Broad Form Contractual.
- iii. Independent Contractor and Sub-Contractor.
- iv. Products and Completed Operations.

NOTES: (a) Additional insured status shall be provided by standard or other endorsement that extends coverage to the County of Westchester for both ongoing and completed operations.

- (b) Action Over exclusions, Labor Law exclusions, "Exclusions of Injury to Employees, Contractor and Subcontractor Employees", or any exclusions that exclude from coverage lawsuits or claims against the County for employee bodily injury shall not apply to the County.
- (c) All Contracts involving the use of explosives, demolition and/or underground work shall provide proof that XCU is covered.

Commercial Umbrella/Excess Insurance: \$2,000,000 each occurrence and aggregate naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured, written on a "follow the form" basis.

Notes (a) through (c) above under the Commercial General Liability Insurance shall also apply to Commercial Umbrella/Excess Insurance.

Automobile Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$1,000,000 for bodily injury and a minimum limit of \$100,000 per occurrence for property damage or a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 unless otherwise indicated in the contract specifications. This insurance shall include for bodily injury and property damage the following coverages and name the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured:
(i) Owned automobiles.(ii) Hired automobiles.(iii) Non-owned automobiles.
⊠Professional Liability Insurance with a limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence/\$3,000,000 aggregate.
Abuse and Molestation Liability, either by separate policy of insurance or through endorsement to the General Liability Policy or Professional Liability Policy in the following limit:

This insurance shall include coverage for the following, including coverage for client on client, counselor client, and third parties:

Special Event Insurance with a limit of \$1,000,000 per occurrence.
Other:The above coverage is required. A Special Events policy can be used in lieu of the stated stand-alone policies provided it provides coverage for all of the above-selected exposures/coverage
3. All policies of the Contractor shall be endorsed to contain the following clauses:

HONORABLE BOARD OF LEGISLATORS THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER

Your Committee is in receipt of a communication from the Chair of the Board of Legislators recommending the adoption of an Act which, if approved by your Honorable Board, would authorize the County of Westchester (the "County") to enter into an inter-municipal agreement ("IMA") with the Village of Hastings ("Village"), pursuant to which the Village will provide various youth programming, for the period from January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025. The County will pay The Village an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, payable in full upon execution of the IMA, in accordance with an approved budget.

Pursuant to the IMA, The Village will provide various youth recreational programs, as follows:

1) A Spring Program consisting of a weekly Skate Program for up to 25 youth participants for 10 weeks as an introduction to beginner skateboarding skills.

2) A Fall Program consisting of a weekly Skate Program for up to 25 youth participants for 10 weeks as an introduction to beginner skateboarding skills.

Your Committee has determined that there is a clear and overwhelming need for the Program.

Accordingly, Your Committee recommends authorizing the County to enter into the proposed IMA.

The Department of Planning has advised that the proposed IMA does not meet the definition of an "action" under the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA"), and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR, Part 617. Please refer to the Memorandum from the Department of Planning dated January 14, 2025, which is on file with the clerk of your Honorable Board. Therefore, no environmental review is required. Your Committee concurs with this recommendation.

Your Committee has been advised that passage of the attached Act requires an affirmative vote of a majority of the members of your Honorable Board. Your Committee has carefully considered this proposed legislation authorizing the above-mentioned IMA and recommends its approval.

AN ACT authorizing the County of Westchester to enter into an inter-municipal agreement with the Village of Hastings ("Village") pursuant to which the Village will provide various youth services, for the period from January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025 for a total amount not to exceed \$10,000.00.

BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Legislators of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. The County of Westchester (the "County"), is hereby authorized to enter into an inter-municipal agreement (the "IMA") with the Village of Hastings ("Village"), pursuant to which the Village will provide various youth services, for the period from January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025, for a total amount not to exceed Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, payable in full upon execution of the IMA, in accordance with an approved budget.

- §2. The Village shall provide youth programming as follows, pursuant to the IMA: 1) A Spring Program consisting of a weekly Skate Program for up to 25 youth participants for 10 weeks as an introduction to beginner skateboarding skills.
- 2) A Fall Program consisting of a weekly Skate Program for up to 25 youth participants for 10 weeks as an introduction to beginner skateboarding skills.
- §3. The Chair of the Board of Legislators or the Chair's designee (the "Chair") is hereby authorized to execute and deliver all documents and take such actions as the Chair deems necessary or desirable to accomplish the purposes hereof.
 - §4. This Act shall take effect immediately.

THIS AGREEMENT made	by and between

THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, a municipal corporation of the State of New York, having an office and place of business in the Michaelian Office Building, 148 Martine Avenue, White Plains, New York 10601, (hereafter the "County"),

and

THE VILLAGE OF HASTINGS, a New York municipal corporation of the State of New York, having an office and principal place of business at 7 Maple Avenue, Hastings-on-Hudson, New York 10706 (hereafter the "Municipality").

<u>FIRST</u>: The Municipality shall provide various youth programming, as more particularly described in Schedule "A" attached hereto and made a part hereof (the "Work").

SECOND: The term of this Agreement shall commence retroactively on January 1, 2025, and shall terminate on December 31, 2025 unless terminated earlier pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement.

THIRD: For the Work to be performed pursuant to Paragraph "FIRST," the County will pay the Municipality a total amount not to exceed Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, in accordance with an approved budget which is attached hereto and made a part hereof as Schedule "B". Payment shall be made in full within thirty (30) days after submission by the Municipality of an invoice. Municipality agrees that, if requested to do so by the Chair, it shall promptly submit supporting documentation to substantiate the basis for payment. The Chair will submit any requests for supporting documentation within two (2) weeks of receiving an invoice. The County shall pay said invoice within thirty (30) days of receipt of the invoice, or if supporting documentation is requested then within thirty (30) days of submission of supporting documentation. No additional payment shall be made by the County to the Municipality for out-of-pocket expenses or disbursements made in connection with the Work rendered under this Agreement, as all costs and expenses for said services are deemed to be included in the fee set forth above.

The Municipality shall, at no additional charge, furnish all labor, services, materials, tools, equipment and other appliances necessary to complete the services contracted for under this Agreement. It is recognized and understood that in no event shall total payment to the Municipality exceed the not-to-exceed amount set forth above.

<u>FOURTH</u>: The Municipality shall report to the County on its progress toward completing the Work, as the Chair of the Westchester County Board of Legislators or his duly authorized designee (the "Chair") may request, and shall immediately inform the Chair in writing of any cause for delay in the performance of its obligations under this Agreement.

No later than thirty (30) days after the end of the term of the Agreement, the Municipality shall submit to the Chair, a written performance measurement report which shall provide details about each program, including the number of participants that participated in each program.

In addition to any general audit rights to which the County may be entitled hereunder, the County also reserves the right to audit the Municipality's performance under this Agreement. Such audit may include requests for documentation, reports or other information which the Chair may, in the Chair's discretion, deem necessary and appropriate. The County may also make site visits to the location/s where the services to be provided under this Agreement are performed in order to review Municipality's records, observe the performance of services and/or to conduct interviews of staff and patrons, where appropriate and not otherwise prohibited by law.

FIFTH: The Parties recognize and acknowledge that the obligations of the County under this Agreement are subject to annual appropriations by its Board of Legislators pursuant to the Laws of Westchester County. Therefore, this Agreement shall be deemed executory only to the extent of the monies appropriated and available. The County shall have no liability under this Agreement beyond funds appropriated and available for payment pursuant to this Agreement. The parties understand and intend that the obligation of the County hereunder shall constitute a current expense of the County and shall not in any way be construed to be a debt of the County in contravention of any applicable constitutional or statutory limitations or requirements concerning the creation of indebtedness by the County, nor shall anything contained in this Agreement constitute a pledge of the general tax revenues, funds or moneys of the County. The County shall pay amounts due under this Agreement exclusively from legally available funds appropriated for this purpose. The County shall retain the right, upon the occurrence of the adoption of any County Budget by its Board of Legislators during the term of this Agreement or any amendments thereto, and for a reasonable period of time after such adoption(s), to conduct an analysis of the impacts of any such County Budget on County finances. After such analysis, the County shall retain the right to either terminate this Agreement or to renegotiate the amounts and rates set forth herein. If the County subsequently

offers to pay a reduced amount to the Municipality, then the Municipality shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon reasonable prior written notice.

This Agreement is also subject to further financial analysis of the impact of any New York State Budget (the "State Budget") proposed and adopted during the term of this Agreement. The County shall retain the right, upon the occurrence of any release by the Governor of a proposed State Budget and/or the adoption of a State Budget or any amendments thereto, and for a reasonable period of time after such release(s) or adoption(s), to conduct an analysis of the impacts of any such State Budget on County finances. After such analysis, the County shall retain the right to either terminate this Agreement or to renegotiate the amounts and rates approved herein. If the County subsequently offers to pay a reduced amount to the Municipality, then the Municipality shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon reasonable prior written notice.

SIXTH: (a) The County, upon ten (10) days' notice to the Municipality, may terminate this Agreement in whole or in part when the County deems it to be in its best interest. In such event, the Municipality shall be compensated and the County shall be liable only for payment for services already rendered under this Agreement prior to the effective date of termination, and Municipality shall reimburse to the County the amount of the lump-sum payment, pro-rated to the time remaining in the term of this Agreement. Upon receipt of notice that the County is terminating this Agreement in its best interests, the Municipality shall stop Work immediately and incur no further costs in furtherance of this Agreement without the express approval of the Chair, and the Municipality shall direct any approved subcontractors to do the same.

In the event of a dispute as to the value of the Work rendered by the Municipality prior to the date of termination, it is understood and agreed that the Chair shall determine the value of such Work rendered by the Municipality. The Municipality shall accept such reasonable and good faith determination as final.

(b) In the event the County determines that there has been a material breach by the Municipality of any of the terms of the Agreement and such breach remains uncured for forty-eight (48) hours after service on the Municipality of written notice thereof, the County, in addition to any other right or remedy it might have, may terminate this Agreement and the County shall have the right, power and authority to complete the Work provided for in this Agreement, or contract for its completion, and any additional expense or cost of such completion shall be charged to and paid by the Municipality. Without limiting the foregoing, upon written notice to the Municipality, repeated breaches by the Municipality of duties or obligations under this Agreement shall be deemed a

material breach of this Agreement justifying termination for cause hereunder without requirement for further opportunity to cure.

SEVENTH: The Municipality shall provide proof of insurance as set forth in the insurance requirements of Schedule "C" of this Agreement. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if the Municipality is self-insured for all or a portion of the insurance required by Schedule "C" it may provide proof of such self-insurance in a form acceptable to the County's Director of Risk Management. However, to the extent the Municipality is self-insured and carries excess liability, the County shall be named as an additional insured to that policy.

In addition to, and not in limitation of the insurance requirements set forth in this Agreement, the Municipality agrees to procure and maintain insurance naming the County as additional insured, as provided and described in Schedule "C" entitled "Standard Insurance Provisions", which is attached hereto and made a part hereof. In addition to, and not in limitation of the insurance provisions contained in Schedule "C" the Municipality agrees:

- (a) that except for the amount, if any, of damage contributed to, caused by, or resulting from the sole negligence of the County, the Municipality shall indemnify and hold harmless the County, its officers, employees, agents, and elected officials from and against any and all liability, damage, claims, demands, costs, judgments, fees, attorney's fees or loss arising directly or indirectly out of the performance or failure to perform hereunder by the Municipality or third parties under the direction or control of the Municipality; and
- (b) to provide defense for and defend, at its sole expense, any and all claims, demands or causes of action directly or indirectly arising out of this Agreement and to bear all other costs and expenses related thereto; and
- (c) in the event the Municipality does not provide the above defense and indemnification to the County, and such refusal or denial to provide the above defense and indemnification is found to be in breach of this provision, then the Municipality shall reimburse the County's reasonable attorney's fees incurred in connection with the defense of any action, and in connection with enforcing this provision of the Agreement.

EIGHTH: The Municipality expressly agrees that neither it nor any contractor, subcontractor, employee, or any other person acting on its behalf shall discriminate against or intimidate any employee or other individual on the basis of race, creed, religion, color, gender, age,

national origin, ethnicity, alienage or citizenship status, disability, marital status, sexual orientation, familial status, genetic predisposition or carrier status during the term of or in connection with this Agreement, as those terms may be defined in Chapter 700 of the Laws of Westchester County. The Municipality acknowledges and understands that the County maintains a zero tolerance policy prohibiting all forms of harassment or discrimination against its employees by co-workers, supervisors, vendors, contractors, or others.

<u>NINTH</u>: The Municipality shall comply, at its own expense, with the provisions of all applicable local, state and federal laws, rules and regulations, including, but not limited to, those applicable to the Municipality as an employer of labor. The Municipality shall further comply, at its own expense, with all applicable rules, regulations and licensing requirements pertaining to its professional status and that of its employees, partners, associates, subcontractors and others employed to render the Work hereunder.

TENTH: The Municipality shall not delegate any duties or assign any of its rights under this Agreement without the prior express written consent of the County. The Municipality shall not subcontract any part of the Work without the written consent of the County, subject to any necessary legal approvals. Any purported delegation of duties, assignment of rights or subcontracting of Work under this Agreement without the prior express written consent of the County is void. All subcontracts that have received such prior written consent shall provide that subcontractors are subject to all terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. It is recognized and understood by the Municipality that for the purposes of this Agreement, all Work performed by a County-approved subcontractor shall be deemed Work performed by the Municipality and the Municipality shall insure that such subcontracted work is subject to the material terms and conditions of this Agreement. All subcontracts for the Work shall expressly reference the subcontractor's duty to comply with the material terms and conditions of this Agreement and shall attach a copy of the County's contract with the Municipality. The Municipality shall obtain a written acknowledgement from the owner and/or chief executive of subcontractor or his/her duly authorized representative that the subcontractor has received a copy of the County's contract, read it and is familiar with the material terms and conditions thereof. The Municipality shall include provisions in its subcontracts designed to ensure that the Municipality and/or its auditor has the right to examine all relevant books, records, documents or electronic data of the subcontractor necessary to review the subcontractor's compliance with the material terms and conditions of this Agreement. For each and every year for which this

Agreement continues, the Municipality shall submit to the Chairman a letter signed by the mayor of the Municipality or his/her duly authorized representative certifying that each and every approved subcontractor is in compliance with the material terms and conditions of the Agreement.

The Parties further agree that prior to the commencement of the Work, the Municipality shall confirm and provide written notice to the County, indicating which subcontractor will provide the bus transportation services. Prior to providing the services, said subcontractor shall provide evidence of insurance to the County as set forth in the insurance requirements of Schedule "C" of this Agreement, either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County.

ELEVENTH: The Municipality and the County agree that the Municipality and its officers, employees, agents, contractors and/or subcontractors are independent contractors and not employees of the County or any department, agency or unit thereof. In accordance with their status as independent contractors, the Municipality covenants and agrees that neither the Municipality nor any of its officers, employees, agents, contractors and/or subcontractors will hold themselves out as, or claim to be, officers or employees of the County or any department, agency or unit thereof.

TWELFTH: Failure of the County to insist, in any one or more instances, upon strict performance of any term or condition herein contained shall not be deemed a waiver or relinquishment of such term or condition, but the same shall remain in full force and effect.

Acceptance by the County of any Work or the payment of any fee or reimbursement due hereunder with knowledge of a breach of any term or condition hereof, shall not be deemed a waiver of any such breach and no waiver by the County of any provision hereof shall be implied.

THIRTEENTH: All notices of any nature referred to in this Agreement shall be in writing and either sent by registered or certified mail postage pre-paid, or delivered by hand or overnight courier, (with acknowledgment received and a copy of the notice sent by registered or certified mail postage pre-paid), as set forth below or to such other addresses as the respective parties hereto may designate in writing. Notice shall be effective on the date of receipt. Notices shall be sent to the following:

FOURTEENTH: This Agreement and its attachments constitute the entire Agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede all previous negotiations, commitments and writings. It shall not be released, discharged, changed or modified except by an instrument in writing signed by a duly authorized representative of each of the parties.

In the event of any conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the terms of any schedule or attachment hereto, it is understood that the terms of this Agreement shall be controlling with respect to any interpretation of the meaning and intent of the parties.

FIFTEENTH: Nothing herein is intended or shall be construed to confer upon or give to any third party or its successors and assigns any rights, remedies or basis for reliance upon, under or by reason of this Agreement, except in the event that specific third party rights are expressly granted herein.

<u>SIXTEENTH</u>: The Municipality recognizes that this Agreement does not grant the Municipality the exclusive right to perform the Work for the County and that the County may enter into similar agreements with other Municipalities on an "as needed" basis.

<u>SEVENTEENTH:</u> The Municipality shall use all reasonable means to avoid any conflict of interest with the County and shall immediately notify the County in the event of a conflict of interest. The Municipality shall also use all reasonable means to avoid any appearance of impropriety.

EIGHTEENTH: This Agreement may be executed simultaneously in several counterparts, each of which shall be an original and all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument. This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of New

York. In addition, the parties hereby agree that for any cause of action arising out of this Agreement shall be brought in the County of Westchester.

If any term or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or void or unenforceable, the remainder of the terms and provisions of this Agreement shall in no way be affected, impaired, or invalidated, and to the extent permitted by applicable law, any such term, or provision shall be restricted in applicability or reformed to the minimum extent required for such to be enforceable. This provision shall be interpreted and enforced to give effect to the original written intent of the parties prior to the determination of such invalidity or unenforceability.

<u>NINTEENTH</u>: All payments made by the County to the Municipality will be made by electronic funds transfer pursuant to the County's Vendor Direct program. The Municipality acknowledges that it is already enrolled in the County's Vendor Direct Program and agrees that if there are changes to the information contained in the authorization forms it will notify the Westchester County Finance Department directly.

<u>TWENTIETH</u>: This Agreement shall not be enforceable until signed by both parties and approved by the Office of the County Attorney.

SCHEDULE "C"

BOARD OF LEGISLATORS STANDARD INSURANCE PROVISIONS (Contractor)

1. Prior to commencing work, and throughout the term of the Agreement, the Contractor shall furnish, deliver and maintain at its own cost and expense the required insurance as delineated below from insurance companies licensed in the State of New York, carrying a Best's financial rating of A or better. The Contractor shall provide evidence of such insurance to the County, either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County ("Director"). The policies or certificates thereof shall provide that ten (10) days prior to cancellation or material change in the policy, notices of same shall be given to the Director either by overnight mail or personal delivery for all of the following stated insurance policies. All notices shall name the Contractor and identify the Agreement.

If at any time any of the policies required herein shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing any such policy shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, the Contractor shall upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and submit the policy or the certificate as requested by the Director for approval by the Director. Upon failure of the Contractor to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance, the Agreement, at the election of the County, may be declared suspended, discontinued or terminated.

Failure of the Contractor to take out, maintain, or the taking out or maintenance of any required insurance, shall not relieve the Contractor from any liability under the Agreement, nor shall the insurance requirements be construed to conflict with or otherwise limit the contractual obligations of the Contractor concerning indemnification.

All property losses shall be made payable to the "County of Westchester" and adjusted with the appropriate County personnel.

In the event that claims, for which the County may be liable, in excess of the insured amounts provided herein are filed by reason of Contractor's negligent acts or omissions under the Agreement or by virtue of the provisions of the labor law or other statute or any other reason, the amount of excess of such claims or any portion thereof, may be withheld from payment due or to become due the Contractor until such time as the Contractor shall furnish such additional security covering such claims in form satisfactory to the Director.

In the event of any loss, if the Contractor maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums identified herein, the County shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Contractor. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

2. The Contractor shall provide evidence of the insurance for each coverage checked off below (if additional coverage is required for a specific agreement, those requirements will be described in the Agreement):

Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability: Certificate form C-105.2 or State Fund Insurance Company form U-26.3 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Workers' Compensation Law. State Workers' Compensation Board form DB-120.1 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Disability Benefits Law. Location of operation shall be "All locations in Westchester County, New York."

Where an applicant claims to not be required to carry either a Workers' Compensation Policy or Disability Benefits Policy, or both, the employer must complete NYS form CE-200, available to download at: http://www.wcb.ny.gov.

If the employer is self-insured for Workers' Compensation, he/she should present a certificate from the New York State Worker's Compensation Board evidencing that fact (Either SI-12, Certificate of Workers' Compensation Self-Insurance, or GSI-105.2, Certificate of Participation in Workers' Compensation Group Self-Insurance).

Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 (c.s.l.) per occurrence and a \$2,000,000 aggregate limit naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis. This insurance shall include the following coverages:

- i. Premises Operations.
- ii. Broad Form Contractual.
- iii. Independent Contractor and Sub-Contractor.
- iv. Products and Completed Operations.
- NOTES: (a) Additional insured status shall be provided by standard or other endorsement that extends coverage to the County of Westchester for both ongoing and completed operations.
 - (b) Action Over exclusions, Labor Law exclusions, "Exclusions of Injury to Employees, Contractor and Subcontractor Employees", or any exclusions that exclude from coverage lawsuits or claims against the County for employee bodily injury shall not apply to the County.
 - (c) All Contracts involving the use of explosives, demolition and/or underground work shall provide proof that XCU is covered.

Commercial Umbrella/Excess Insurance: \$2,000,000 each occurrence and aggregate naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured, written on a "follow the form" basis.

Notes (a) through (c) above under the Commercial General Liability Insurance shall also apply to Commercial Umbrella/Excess Insurance.

Automobile Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$1,000,000 for bodily injury and a minimum limit of \$100,000 per occurrence for property damage or a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 unless otherwise indicated in the contract specifications. This insurance shall include for bodily injury and property damage the following coverages and name the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured:
(i) Owned automobiles.(ii) Hired automobiles.(iii) Non-owned automobiles.
⊠Professional Liability Insurance with a limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence/\$3,000,000 aggregate.
Abuse and Molestation Liability, either by separate policy of insurance or through endorsement to the General Liability Policy or Professional Liability Policy in the following limit:
Limit of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 in the aggregate, or
∐Limit of \$3,000,000 per occurrence
This insurance shall include coverage for the following, including coverage for client on client, counselor client, and third parties:
i. Misconductii. Abuse (including both physical and sexual)iii. Molestation
Special Event Insurance with a limit of \$1,000,000 per occurrence.
Other:The above coverage is required. A Special Events policy can be used in lieu of the stated stand-alone policies provided it provides coverage for all of the above-selected exposures/coverage.
3. All policies of the Contractor shall be endorsed to contain the following clauses:
(a) Insurers shall have no right to recovery or subrogation against the County (including its employees and other agents and agencies), it being the intention of the parties that the insurance policies so effected shall protect both parties and be primary coverage for any and all losses covered by the above-described insurance.
(b) The clause "other insurance provisions" in a policy in which the County is named as an insured, shall not apply to the County.

- (c) The insurance companies issuing the policy or policies shall have no recourse against the County (including its agents and agencies as aforesaid) for payment of any premiums or for assessments under any form of policy.
- (d) Any and all deductibles in the above described insurance policies shall be assumed by and be for the account of, and at the sole risk of, the Contractor.
- (e) Notice of Cancellation Endorsement providing for 10 days' written notice of cancellation of the insurer's intent to cancel the policies to the following Designated Entity:

 - §3. This Act shall take effect immediately.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the County acting by and through its Department of Senior Programs and Services (the "Department") has been awarded a grant from the New York State Office for the Aging ("NYSOFA") for use in the Community Services for the Elderly Act ("CSE") Program (the "Program"); and

WHEREAS, the County desires to use a portion of said grant funds to provide Information and Assistance Services to seniors; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality desires to provide Information and Assistance Services to seniors upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms, conditions, covenants, and agreements contained herein the Parties agree as follows:

1. The Municipality shall provide Information and Assistance Services to seniors in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in "Schedule "C" which is attached hereto and made a part hereof (the "Services"). The Municipality agrees that it and its subcontractors that are approved by the County, if any, will perform the Services in accordance with the terms of the Standard Assurances in the approved Four Year Plan and/or Annual Update to the 2024-28 Four Year Plan (collectively the "Plan") attached hereto and made a part hereof in the form of Schedule "F". The Municipality shall also comply with the terms and conditions set forth in Schedules "A", "B', "D", "E" and "F", which are attached hereto and made a part hereof. It is expressly understood and agreed by the Parties hereto that all schedules to this Agreement pertaining to NYSOFA and all schedules pertaining to the County are subject to the approval of and modification by each as NYSOFA and the County, as necessary.

2. The term of this Agreement shall commence retroactive to April 1, 2025 and terminate on March 31, 2026.

3. In consideration for the Services to be provided pursuant to paragraph "	I," the County
shall pay the Municipality an amount not-to-exceed	DOLLARS
(\$00) for actual Services provided and data entered in NYSOFA's Per	erPlace System in

The Parties recognize and acknowledge that the obligations of the County under this Agreement are subject to the County's receipt of funds from the NYSOFA to operate the Program.

If, for any reason, the full amount of said funds is not paid over or made available to the County by the NYSOFA, the County may terminate this Agreement immediately or reduce the amount payable to the Municipality, in the sole discretion of the County. The County shall give prompt notice of any such termination or reduction to the Municipality. If the County subsequently offers to pay a reduced amount to the Municipality, then the Municipality shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon reasonable prior written notice.

In addition, the Parties recognize and acknowledge that the obligations of the County under this Agreement are subject to annual appropriations by its Board of Legislators pursuant to the Laws of Westchester County. Therefore, this Agreement shall be deemed executory only to the extent of the monies appropriated and available. The County shall have no liability under this Agreement beyond funds appropriated and available for payment pursuant to this Agreement. The Parties understand and intend that the obligation of the County hereunder shall constitute a current expense of the County and shall not in any way be construed to be a debt of the County in contravention of any applicable constitutional or statutory limitations or requirements concerning the creation of indebtedness by the

County, nor shall anything contained in this Agreement constitute a pledge of the general tax revenues, funds or moneys of the County. The County shall pay amounts due under this Agreement exclusively from legally available funds appropriated for this purpose. The County shall retain the right, upon the occurrence of the adoption of any County Budget by its Board of Legislators during the term of this Agreement or any amendments thereto, and for a reasonable period of time after such adoption(s), to conduct an analysis of the impacts of any such County Budget on County finances. After such analysis, the County shall retain the right to either terminate this Agreement or to renegotiate the amounts and rates set forth herein. If the County subsequently offers to pay a reduced amount to the Municipality, then the Municipality shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon reasonable prior written notice.

This Agreement is also subject to further financial analysis of the impact of any New York State Budget (the "State Budget") proposed and adopted during the term of this Agreement. The County shall retain the right, upon the occurrence of any release by the Governor of a proposed State Budget and/or the adoption of a State Budget or any amendments thereto, and for a reasonable period of time after such release(s) or adoption(s), to conduct an analysis of the impacts of any such State Budget on County finances. After such analysis, the County shall retain the right to either terminate this Agreement or to renegotiate the amounts and rates approved herein. If the County subsequently offers to pay a reduced amount to the Municipality, then the Municipality shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon reasonable prior written notice.

4. The Municipality shall be reimbursed by the County only for actual Services rendered by the Municipality after the County has received approval from the NYSOFA. Payment shall be made on a monthly basis, upon submission by the Municipality of claims or vouchers and such supporting documentation as the County may require, and approval of the same by the Commissioner of the Department or her authorized designee (the "Commissioner").

The Municipality will be solely responsible for any over-expenditure or improper expenditure relating to the Program and the County will not be responsible for any over-expenditure or improper expenditure. Any funds not expended by or committed to be spent by the Municipality shall, at the expiration of the Agreement, be returned to the County.

The County may, in its discretion, and if it deems that payment is required in the furtherance of the Program, pay the Municipality prior to receipt of payment or approval thereof by the NYSOFA, provided that in the event the NYSOFA subsequently fails or refuses to pay the County, or if such expense is not a proper expenditure under the Program hereunder, the Municipality shall immediately

reimburse the County for such payment made to the Municipality. The County, in its discretion, may deduct such amount from future payments due and owing the Municipality hereunder.

5. In addition, the Municipality shall comply, at its own expense, with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, and with Federal and State, regulations, and Program standards and Program Instructions of NYSOFA as specified in the Plan, and any amendments thereto, applicable to the Program and the Municipality's performance hereunder,

In addition, the Municipality shall cause to be prominently posted, on the site where Services hereunder is to be provided, a statement regarding nondiscrimination, which statement shall be similar in form to the following:

"In compliance with 29 U.S.C. § 794 (Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended) and 42 U.S.C. § 2000d et. seq. (Title VI of the 1964 Civil Rights Act) and New York State Executive Law and orders, no persons will be denied service or access to service based upon race, creed, color, national origin, religion, marital status, sexual orientation, genetic predisposition, carrier status, or handicapping condition."

- 6. No Services rendered pursuant to or in connection with this Agreement may be refused to any person because of such person's race, color, creed, marital status, country of origin, disability, sex, genetic predisposition or carrier status, sexual orientation or religion. The Municipality shall also (a) serve any senior citizen and ensure equal access for participation, Services, activities, and informational sessions without regard to race, color, religion, sex, national origin or partisan affiliation; (b) ensure that any Services to be provided under this Agreement shall be secular in nature and scope and in no event shall there be any sectarian, partisan, or religious services, counseling, proselytizing, instruction or other sectarian, partisan, or religious influence undertaken in connection with the provision of such Services; refrain from using funds to advance any sectarian effort; (c) refrain from using funds to advance any partisan candidate or effort; however, the Municipality shall ensure that candidates have equal access to information and activities regardless of policy views or party affiliation; (d) prevent the use of official authority, influence or coercion to interfere with or affect elections or nominations for political office; and (e) ensure no coercion nor advice to other persons to contribute anything of value to any party, committee, organization, agency or person for political purposes, nor engage in any other partisan activities under its auspices.
 - 7. The Municipality hereby expressly agrees that neither it nor any contractor,

subcontractor, employee, or any other person acting on its behalf shall discriminate against or intimidate any employee or other individual on the basis of race, creed, religion, color, gender, age, national origin, ethnicity, alienage or citizenship status, disability, marital status, sexual orientation, familial status, genetic predisposition or carrier status during the term of or in connection with this Agreement, as those terms may be defined in Chapter 700 of the Laws of Westchester County. The Municipality acknowledges and understands that the County maintains a zero tolerance policy prohibiting all forms of harassment or discrimination against its employees by co-workers, supervisors, vendors, contractors, or others.

- 8. The Municipality must attempt to provide Services to low-income minority older individuals in at least the same proportion as the population of low-income minority older individuals bears to the population of older individuals of the area served by such Municipality. As a material element of this Agreement, Municipality agrees to fully comply with the provisions required by the NYSOFA concerning equal access to services and targeting, as more fully set forth in the Plan.
- 9. The Municipality shall provide the County with timely information needed to satisfy reporting requirements as specified by NYSOFA. Without limiting the right of the County to require additional reports regarding the Program hereunder, the Municipality shall provide the Department with the following:
 - (a) Evaluation method of the Program in accordance with the requirements as specified by NYSOFA including but not limited to: audit requests for documentation or other information deemed necessary and appropriate to verify the information provided by the Municipality, make site visits to the location(s) where the Services to be provided under this Agreement are performed in order to review Municipality's records, observe the performance of Services and/or to conduct interviews of staff; and
 - (b) The Programmatic monthly reporting system for Service Delivery Information and Service Recipient Information must be submitted electronically in PeerPlace or other NYSOFA approved electronic system as required. Until further notice, the Municipality is required to mail in the PeerPlace ELECTRONIC PAPER REPORT and/or other approved reporting measure, signed by the staff member responsible for the report. The reports should be received by the County no later than the tenth (10th) day of the following month and/or entered on the website at the same time. The Municipality understands and agrees that submission of the monthly report by the deadline set forth above constitutes a material

element of this Agreement. The County reserves the right to withhold payment to Municipality for its failure to submit the monthly report by the deadline, until such time as the monthly report is received by the County. Repeated failures by Municipality to submit the monthly report by the stated deadline will constitute a material breach of this Agreement justifying termination for cause as provided in Paragraph "11" hereof.

(c) Financial monthly reporting system: Monthly vouchering will fulfill requirement. Vouchers should be received by the County no later than the tenth (10th) day of the following month.

Additional documentation of reports, expenses, statistical information and supporting documentation concerning the Program shall be provided to the County by the Municipality at the request of the County and may include, without limiting the County's right to require additional documentation, invoices for all purchases, payroll time records, payroll records for local support contribution, municipal payment vouchers for government agencies and canceled checks for private agencies.

- 10. The Municipality shall furnish the County with copies of all insurance certificates as indicated in Schedule "A".
- 11. (a) The County, upon ten (10) days' notice to the Municipality, may terminate this Agreement in whole or in part when the County deems it to be in its best interest. In such event, the Municipality shall be compensated and the County shall be liable only for payment for Services already rendered under this Agreement prior to the effective date of termination at the rates set forth in Schedule "B". Upon receipt of notice that the County is terminating this Agreement in its best interests, the Municipality shall stop Services immediately and incur no further costs in furtherance of this Agreement without the express approval of the Commissioner, and the Municipality shall direct any approved subcontractors to do the same.

In the event of a dispute as to the value of the Services rendered by the Municipality prior to the date of termination, it is understood and agreed that the Commissioner shall determine the value of such Services rendered by the Municipality. Such reasonable and good faith determination shall be accepted by the Municipality as final.

(b) In the event the County determines that there has been a material breach by the Municipality of any of the terms of the Agreement and such breach remains uncured for forty-eight

(48) hours after service on the Municipality of written notice thereof, the County, in addition to any other right or remedy it might have, may terminate this Agreement and the County shall have the right, power and authority to complete the services provided for in this Agreement, or contract for their completion, and any additional expense or cost of such completion shall be charged to and paid by the Municipality. Notice shall be effective on the date of receipt. Without limiting the foregoing, upon written notice to the Municipality, repeated breaches by Municipality of any particular duty or obligation under this Agreement shall be deemed a material breach of this Agreement justifying termination for cause hereunder without requirement for further opportunity to cure. Notice shall be effective on the date of receipt.

12. The Municipality shall not assign, transfer, subcontract, or otherwise dispose of this Agreement or any right, duty or interest herein, without the prior express written consent of the County. The Municipality shall not subcontract any part of the Services without the written consent of the County, subject to any necessary legal approvals. Any purported assignment, transfer, subcontract or other disposal of any right, duty or interest under this Agreement without the prior express written consent of the County is void. All subcontracts that have received such prior written consent shall provide that subcontractors are subject to all terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. It is recognized and understood by the Municipality that for the purposes of this Agreement, all Services performed by a County-approved subcontractor shall be deemed Services performed by the Municipality and the Municipality shall insure that such subcontracted Services are subject to the material terms and conditions of this Agreement. All subcontracts for the Services shall expressly reference the subcontractor's duty to comply with the material terms and conditions of this Agreement and shall attach a copy of the County's Agreement with the Municipality. The Municipality shall obtain a written acknowledgement from the owner and/or chief executive of subcontractor or his/her duly authorized representative that the subcontractor has received a copy of the County's contract, read it and is familiar with the material terms and conditions thereof. The Municipality shall include provisions in its subcontracts designed to ensure that the Municipality and/or its auditor has the right to examine all relevant books, records, documents or electronic data of the subcontractor necessary to review the subcontractor's compliance with the material terms and conditions of this Agreement. The Municipality shall submit to the Commissioner a letter signed by the owner and/or chief executive officer of the Municipality or his/her duly authorized representative certifying that each and every County-approved subcontractor is in compliance with the material terms and conditions of the Agreement.

- 13. In addition to, and not in limitation of, the insurance provisions of this Agreement contained in Schedule "A", the Municipality agrees:
- (a) that except for the amount, if any, of damage contributed to, caused by or resulting from the sole negligence of the County, the Municipality shall indemnify and hold harmless the County, its officers, employees and agents from and against any and all liability, damage, claims, demands, costs, judgments, fees, attorneys' fees or loss arising directly or indirectly out of the performance or failure to perform hereunder by the Municipality or third parties under the direction or control of the Municipality; and
- (b) to provide defense for and defend, at its sole expense, any and all claims, demands or causes of action directly or indirectly arising out of this Agreement and to bear all other costs and expenses related thereto.
- (c) in the event the Municipality does not provide the above defense and indemnification to the County, and such refusal or denial to provide the above defense and indemnification is found to be in breach of this provision, then the Municipality shall reimburse the County's reasonable attorney's fees incurred in connection with the defense of any action, and in connection with enforcing this provision of the Agreement.
 - (d) the Municipality may provide proof of self-insurance in lieu of insurance policies.
- 14. The Municipality shall provide adequate, qualified and trained personnel for supervision and fiscal management of the Program conducted by the Municipality hereunder.
- 15. The Municipality hereby agrees that no information about an elderly person, or obtained from an elderly person, shall be disclosed by the Municipality in a form that identifies such person without the informed consent of the person or his or her representatives, unless the disclosure is required by court order, program monitoring by authorized Federal, State, or local monitoring agencies, or by actual and immediate danger to the health or welfare of the individual.
- 16. The Municipality agrees that any public information materials or other printed or published materials on the Services of the Program which is supported with funds hereunder will give due recognition to the NYSOFA and the Department and as appropriate the Administration on Aging/Administration for Community Living (AoA/ACL) of the United States Department of Health and Human Services ("HHS").

17. The Municipality shall ensure that where the State or local public jurisdiction requires licensure or certification for the provision of social services, the Municipality and its County-approved subcontractors providing such services under the approved Plan shall be so licensed or certified. Workers delivering services must be appropriately qualified, selected, trained and supervised.

18 The Municipality shall comply with the audit provisions, as applicable, in Schedule "C".

19. All notices of any nature referred to in this Agreement shall be in writing and either sent by registered or certified mail postage pre-paid, or delivered by hand or overnight courier, or sent by facsimile (with acknowledgment received and a copy of the notices sent by registered or certified mail postage pre-paid), to the addresses as set forth below or to such other addresses as the respective Parties hereto may designate in writing. Notices shall be effective on the date of receipt. Notices shall be sent to the following:

- 20. The failure of the County to insist, in any one or more instances, upon the strict performance of any of the terms, covenants, agreements and conditions of this Agreement, shall not be considered a waiver or relinquishment for the future of such covenant but the same shall continue and remain in full force and effect.
- 21. If equipment costing One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) or more is purchased with any Federal or State funds provided under this Agreement, at the end of this Agreement, the County

reserves the right to require that the Municipality turn the equipment over to the County. The Municipality understands, acknowledges, and agrees that it shall have no ownership interest in such equipment.

22. Attached hereto and forming part hereof is the schedule listed below. Simultaneous with its execution of this Agreement, the Municipality shall provide the County with a completed copy of the schedule. The Municipality agrees that the terms of the schedule has been accepted and agreed-to by the Municipality by virtue of its execution of this Agreement, and the Municipality represents and warrants that it has completed the schedule accurately and completely.

Schedule "D" — "Vendor Direct Program - Electronic Funds Transfer."

All payments made by the County to the Municipality will be made by electronic funds transfer ("EFT") pursuant to the County's Vendor Direct Program. If the Municipality is not already enrolled in the Vendor Direct Program, the Municipality shall fill out and submit an EFT Authorization Form as part of this Agreement. (In rare cases, a hardship waiver may be granted. For a Hardship Waiver Request Form, the Municipality understands that it must contact the County's Finance Department.) If the Municipality is already enrolled in the Vendor Direct Program, the Municipality hereby agrees to immediately notify the County's Finance Department in writing if the EFT Authorization Form on file must be changed, and provide an updated version of the document.

- 23. Pursuant to Federal Executive Order 12549, and as prescribed by federal regulations, including 48 C.F.R. Subpart 9.4, the Municipality hereby agrees to complete the Debarment and Suspension Certificate attached hereto as Schedule "E" and which is made a part hereof.
- 24. This Agreement and its attachments constitute the entire Agreement between the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede all previous negotiations, commitments and writings. It shall not be released, discharged, changed or modified except by an instrument in writing, signed by a duly authorized representative of each of the Parties.
 - 25. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of New York.
- 26. This Agreement shall not be enforceable until it is signed by both Parties and approved by the Office of the County Attorney.

SCHEDULE "A"

STANDARD INSURANCE PROVISIONS (Municipality)

1. Prior to commencing work, and throughout the term of the Agreement, the Municipality shall obtain at its own cost and expense the required insurance as delineated below from insurance companies licensed in the State of New York, carrying a Best's financial rating of A or better. Municipality shall provide evidence of such insurance to the County of Westchester ("County"), either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County ("Director"). The policies or certificates thereof shall provide that ten (10) days prior to cancellation or material change in the policy, notices of same shall be given to the Director either by overnight mail or personal delivery for all of the following stated insurance policies. All notices shall name the Municipality and Identify the Agreement.

If at any time any of the policies required herein shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing any such policy shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, the Municipality shall upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and submit the policy or the certificate as requested by the Director to the Office of Risk Management of the County for approval by the Director. Upon failure of the Municipality to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance, the Agreement, at the election of the County, may be declared suspended, discontinued or terminated.

Failure of the Municipality to take out, maintain, or the taking out or maintenance of any required insurance, shall not relieve the Municipality from any liability under the Agreement, nor shall the insurance requirements be construed to conflict with or otherwise limit the contractual obligations of the Municipality concerning indemnification.

All property losses shall be made payable to the "County of Westchester" and adjusted with the appropriate County personnel.

In the event that claims, for which the County may be liable, in excess of the insured amounts provided herein are filed by reason of Municipality's negligent acts or omissions under the Agreement or by virtue of the provisions of the labor law or other statute or any other reason, the amount of excess of such claims or any portion thereof, may be withheld from payment due or to become due the Municipality until such time as the Municipality shall furnish such additional security covering such claims in form satisfactory to the Director.

In the event of any loss, if the Municipality maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums identified herein, the County shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Municipality. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

- The Municipality shall provide proof of the following coverage (if additional coverage is required for a specific agreement, those requirements will be described in the Agreement):
 - a) Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability. Certificate form C-105.2 or State Fund Insurance Company form U-26.3 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Workers' Compensation Law. State Workers' Compensation Board form DB-120.1 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Disability Benefits Law. Location of operation shall be "All locations in Westchester County, New York."

Where an applicant claims to not be required to carry either a Workers' Compensation Policy or Disability Benefits Policy, or both, the employer must complete NYS form CE-200, available to download at: http://www.wcb.ny.gov.

If the employer is self-insured for Workers' Compensation, he/she should present a certificate from the New York State Worker's Compensation Board evidencing that fact (Either SI-12, Certificate of Workers' Compensation Self-Insurance, or GSI-105.2, Certificate of Participation in Workers' Compensation Group Self-Insurance).

- b) Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 (c.s.1) per occurrence and a \$2,000,000 aggregate limit naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis. This insurance shall include the following coverages:
 - i.Premises Operations.
 - ii.Broad Form Contractual.
 - iii.Independent Contractor and Sub-Contractor.
 - iv. Products and Completed Operations.
- c) Commercial Umbrella/Excess Insurance: \$2,000,000 each Occurrence and Aggregate naming the "County of Westchester" as additional insured, written on a "follow the form" basis.

NOTE: Additional insured status shall be provided by standard or other endorsement that extends coverage to the County of Westchester for both on-going and completed operations.

All Contracts involving the use of explosives, demolition and/or underground work shall provide proof that XCU is covered.

- d) Automobile Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$1,000,000 for bodily injury and a minimum limit of \$100,000 per occurrence for property damage or a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 unless otherwise indicated in the contract specifications. This insurance shall include for bodily injury and property damage the following coverages and name the "County of Westchester" as additional insured:
 - (i) Owned automobiles.
 - (ii) Hired automobiles.
 - (iii) Non-owned automobiles.
 - 3. All policies of the Municipality shall be endorsed to contain the following clauses:
- (a) Insurers shall have no right to recovery or subrogation against the County (including its employees and other agents and agencies), it being the intention of the parties that the insurance policies so effected shall protect both parties and be primary coverage for any and all losses covered by the above-described insurance.
- (b) The clause "other insurance provisions" in a policy in which the County is named as an insured, shall not apply to the County.
- (c) The insurance companies issuing the policy or policies shall have no recourse against the County (including its agents and agencies as aforesaid) for payment of any premiums or for assessments under any form of policy.
- (d) Any and all deductibles in the above described insurance policies shall be assumed by and be for the account of, and at the sole risk of, the Municipality.

Westchester County Vendor Direct Program Frequently Asked Questions

1. WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF THE ELECTRONIC FUNDS TRANSFER (EFT) ASSOCIATED WITH THE VENDOR DIRECT PROGRAM?

There are several advantages to having your payments automatically deposited into your designated bank account via EFT:

Payments are secure – Paper checks can be lost in the mail or stolen, but money deposited directly into your bank account is more secure.

You save time – Money deposited into your bank account is automatic. You save the time of preparing and delivering the deposit to the bank. Additionally, the funds are immediately available to you.

- 2. ARE MY PAYMENTS GOING TO BE PROCESSED ON THE SAME SCHEDULE AS THEY WERE BEFORE VENDOR DIRECT?
 Yes.
- 3. HOW QUICKLY WILL A PAYMENT BE DEPOSITED INTO MY ACCOUNT? Payments are deposited two business days after the voucher/invoice is processed. Saturdays, Sundays, and legal holidays are not considered business days.

4. HOW WILL I KNOW WHEN THE PAYMENT IS IN MY BANK ACCOUNT AND WHAT IT IS FOR?

- 5. WHAT IF THERE IS A DISCREPANCY IN THE AMOUNT RECEIVED?
- Please contact your Westchester County representative as you would have in the past if there were a discrepancy on a check received.
- 6. WHAT IF I DO NOT RECEIVE THE MONEY IN MY DESIGNATED BANK ACCOUNT ON THE DATE INDICATED IN THE E-MAIL?

7. WHAT MUST I DO IF I CHANGE MY BANK OR MY ACCOUNT NUMBER?

Whenever you change any information or close your account a new Vendor Direct Payment Authorization Form must be submitted. Please contact the Westchester County Accounts Payable Department at 914-995-4708 and we will e-mail you a new form.

Transmitted herewith for your consideration is legislation which, if approved, would establish a revised Policy for Investing and Protecting Public Funds for the County of Westchester (the "County"), pursuant to New York State General Municipal Law Section 39 (the "Investment Policy"). The annexed Act would authorize the adoption of a revised Investment Policy.

In order to comply with the provisions of General Municipal Law Section 39, your Honorable Board has from time to time established a comprehensive Investment Policy which details County government operative policy and instructions to officers and staff regarding the investment, monitoring and reporting of County government funds. In order to comply with the provision above, the Investment Policy is reviewed annually by the Department of Finance (the "Department") and submitted to your Honorable Board for its approval. The Investment Policy currently in effect addresses several topics, including but not limited to the following: (1) a list of permitted types of investments of the County; (2) procedures and policies to secure in a satisfactory manner the County's financial interest in investments; (3) standards for written agreements pursuant to which investments are made; (4) procedures for monitoring, control, deposit and retention of investments and collateral; (5) standards for security and custodial agreements with banks or trust companies authorized to do business in the State of New York, pursuant to which obligations and collateral are held by such banks and trust companies for the County; (6) standards for the diversification of investments and firms with whom the County transacts business; and (7) standards for the qualification of investment agents which transact business with the County, such as criteria covering credit worthiness, experience, capitalization, size and other factors that make a firm capable and qualified to do business with the County.

As your Honorable Board is aware, the Investment Policy was last amended by Act No. 230-2024.

I have been advised that the Department has reviewed the current Investment Policy and recommends the following amendments:

Amend the dollar limits and banking institutions listed in Section VII. <u>Designation of Depositories</u> in order to take advantage of competitive opportunities at depositories as follows:

- increase the total dollar limit at Customers Bank from \$100 million to \$150 million;
- increase the total dollar limit at Metropolitan Commercial Bank from \$25 million to \$75 million;

- increase the total dollar limit at Valley National Bank from \$50 million to \$100 million;
- increase the total dollar limit at Orange Bank and Trust Company from \$25 million to \$50 million;
- increase the total dollar limit at Flagstar Bank from \$200 million to \$300 million;
- add Israel Discount Bank with a total dollar limit of \$25 million; and
- reduce the total dollar limit at M&T Bank from \$300 million to \$150 million.

ACT NO. - 2025

AN ACT amending the Investment Policy for the County of Westchester, pursuant to New York State General Municipal Law Section 39.

BE IT ENACTED by the County Board of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to New York State General Municipal Law Section 39, the annexed Investment Policy for the County of Westchester (the "County"), which details the County's operative policy and instructions to officers and staff regarding the investment, monitoring and reporting of funds of the County, is hereby amended. The annexed Investment Policy shall supersede all prior versions of said policy.

- **§2.** This Investment Policy shall be reviewed on an annual basis by the County.
 - §3. This Act shall take effect immediately.

POLICY FOR INVESTING AND PROTECTING PUBLIC FUNDS

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I. Scope

The County of Westchester (the "County") policy for investing and protecting public funds (the "Investment Policy") applies to all monies and/or other financial resources available for investment on its own behalf or on behalf of any other entity or individual. This Investment Policy is adopted pursuant to Section 39 of the New York State General Municipal Law and has used the model investment policy for local governments which the New York State Legislature required the New York State Comptroller to provide pursuant to Laws of 1992, Chapter 708, Section 44 for guidance. This Investment Policy shall be implemented in accordance with all applicable laws, rules and regulations ("Applicable Law") including but not limited to, Sections 10 and 11 of the New York State General Municipal Law.

II. Objectives

The primary objectives of the County's investment activities are, in priority order:

- To conform with all applicable Federal, State and other legal requirements.
- To positively safeguard principal.
- To provide sufficient liquidity to meet all operating requirements.
- To obtain a reasonable rate of return, consistent with safety, liquidity and prevailing financial market conditions.

III. Delegation of Authority

The County Board of Legislators' responsibility for administration of the County's investment program is delegated to the Commissioner of Finance who shall establish written procedures for the operation of the investment program consistent with this investment Policy. Such procedures shall include internal controls to provide a satisfactory level of accountability based upon records incorporating the description and amounts of investments, the fund(s) for which they are held, the place(s) where kept, and other relevant information, including dates of sale or other dispositions and amounts realized. In addition, the internal control procedures shall describe the responsibilities and levels of authority for key individuals involved in the investment program.

Such procedures shall follow guidelines established by the New York State Comptroller, be consistent with conservative investment principles and with the applicable provisions of the County Charter and Administrative Code with respect to control of funds and investments. These procedures shall also include an internal control and operating policy designed to provide security, a high level of accountability, a database of records and other relevant information relating to funds control and investment activity by delegated employees.

The Commissioner of Finance is designated as the County's chief fiscal officer, as such term is used in Applicable Law, including but not limited to New York State General Municipal Law Sections 10 and 11.

IV. Prudence

All participants in the investment process shall seek to act responsibly as custodians of the public trust and shall avoid any transaction that might impair public confidence in the County to govern effectively.

Investments shall be made with prudence, diligence, skill, judgment and care, under circumstances then prevailing, which knowledgeable and prudent persons acting in like capacity would use, not for speculation, but for investment, considering the safety of principal as well as the probable income to be derived.

All participants involved in the investment process shall refrain from personal business activity that could conflict with proper execution of the investment program or which could impair their ability to make impartial investment decisions. Accordingly, all participants involved in the investment process are required:

- To disclose any personal business activity or relationship which could conflict or create the appearance of conflict with either the spirit or execution of the Investment Policy or investment programs of the County.
- To abstain from any beneficial personal financial activity which is in actual
 or apparent conflict with the Investment Policy or investment programs of the
 County.
- To abstain from any personal or financial activity which would impair the participant's ability to make impartial and ethical investment decisions for the County.

V. <u>Diversification</u>

It is the policy of the County to diversify its deposits and investments by financial institution, by investment instrument, and by maturity scheduling, consistent with the operation of the County's cash and investment management policies. Additionally, this diversification policy shall be executed so as not to exceed the limits authorized by the County Board of Legislators for each depository set forth in Section VII of this Investment Policy.

VI. Internal Controls

The Commissioner of Finance is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control procedures to provide reasonable, but not absolute assurance that deposits and investments are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization, properly recorded, and managed in compliance with Applicable Law. These internal controls will also include provisions for monitoring collateral pledged by institutions as required from time to time.

A) Funds Controls

It is the policy of the County to monitor all receivables due the County and to require the deposit of all monies collected by any officer or employee of County government to depositories designated by the Commissioner of Finance as soon as possible. Should Applicable Law indicate a specific time frame, that period will apply. The Commissioner of Finance or those appropriately designated by the Commissioner are responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure in their designated department or area to provide assurance of the following:

- That deposits, investments and financial computer systems or other assets are safeguarded against monetary and/or data loss from unauthorized or improper use or disposition.
- That transactions are completed in accordance with management's direction within a framework of safe execution, and effective safekeeping.
- That transactions are recorded promptly in order to receive full investment value in accordance with Applicable Law and County operating policies.

B) <u>Transfer Controls</u>

In implementing investment and funds transfer instructions, all Authorized Financial Institutions and Dealers as defined in Section XI below shall receive from the County, with an acknowledgment request, a list indicating all individuals authorized to give verbal, written or electronic instructions regarding investments and/or funds transfers for the County.

Third party transfer instructions are not authorized unless subsequently authenticated by the Authorized Financial Institution or Dealer with one or more of the authorized individuals listed.

The County shall covenant with its Authorized Financial Institution or Dealer to have unlimited unrestricted access to any recordings or records made of such transactions or authentications by its Authorized Financial Institutions or Dealers.

VII. Designation of Depositories

Certification to the designated depository list requires that a depository must be ranked within acceptable federal regulatory risk-based capital parameters and be designated as an institution acceptable to the Commissioner of Finance after an appropriate departmental due diligence review.

The Commissioner of Finance shall evaluate the Community Reinvestment Act rating of a financial institution before depositing County Funds.

In the event that any of the above-named authorized depositories' name should change due to a merger, acquisition or other reason, the Commissioner of Finance may continue to use such new named depository until a new Investment Policy is adopted by the County Board of Legislators after the required annual review of said Policy, provided that the Commissioner conducts due diligence after being formally notified of such name change, before continuing to do business with such depository.

VIII. Collateralization of Deposits

In accordance with the provisions of General Municipal Law Section 10, all deposits of the County, including certificates of deposit and special time deposits in excess of the amount insured under the provision of the Federal Deposit Insurance Act, shall be secured by either:

1. A pledge of "Eligible Securities" (see Appendix A) with an aggregate "Market Value", as defined by General Municipal Law Section 10 for the various defined categories of eligible securities at least equal to the aggregate amount of deposits.

or:

2. An "irrevocable letter of credit" issued in favor of **Westchester County** by a federal home loan bank whose commercial paper and other unsecured short-term debt obligations are rated in the highest rating category by at least one nationally recognized statistical rating organization, as security for the payment of 100 percent of the aggregate amount of deposits and the agreed-upon interest, if any.

IX. Safekeeping and Collateralization

Eligible securities used for collateralizing deposits shall be held by a custodian (third party depository, bank or trust company), except as provided below.

Eligible securities used for collateralizing deposits for institutions with an approved limit of at least \$500 million may be held at the same bank or trust company that is holding the deposit, provided that before doing so the Commissioner of Finance shall evaluate the financial strength of said same bank or trust company in accordance with the provisions of Section XI below. Depository collateralization shall be subject to appropriate security and custodial agreements.

The security agreement shall provide that eligible securities as agreed upon by the County and its Authorized Financial Institutions or Dealers, are pledged to secure County deposits together with agreed upon interest, if any, and any costs or expenses arising out of the collection of such deposits, upon default. It shall also provide the conditions under which the securities may be sold, presented for payment, transferred or released, and the events which will enable the County to exercise its rights against said pledged securities. In the event that these securities are not registered or inscribed in the name of the County, such securities shall be delivered in a form suitable for transfer or with an assignment in blank to the County or its custodial bank or trust company. Whenever eligible securities delivered to the custodial bank or trust company are transferred by entries on the books of a federal reserve bank or other book-entry system operated by a federally regulated entity without physical delivery of the evidence of the obligations, then the records of the custodial bank or trust company shall be required to show, at all times, the interest of the County in the securities as set forth in the security agreement.

The custodial agreement shall be consistent with General Municipal Law Section 10(3(a). It shall provide that pledged securities will be held by the custodial bank or trust company as agent of, and custodian for, the County, will be kept separate and apart

from the general assets of the custodial bank or trust company and will not be commingled with or become part of the backing of any other deposit or other bank liability. The custodial agreement should also describe how the custodian shall confirm in writing the receipt, substitution or release of securities. The custodial agreement shall also provide for the frequency of re-evaluation of collateral by the custodial bank or trust company and for the substitution of collateral when a change in the rating of a security causes ineligibility. The security and custodial agreements shall also include all other provisions necessary to provide the County with a perfected security interest in the eligible securities and to otherwise secure the County's interest in the collateral.

The custodial agreement shall also provide for increases or decreases in securities held when a change in the value of a security may occur. The agreement shall stipulate that only Eligible Securities set forth in Appendix A may be used as collateral in accordance with Section VIII of this policy. Such agreement shall include all provisions necessary and sufficient to secure in a manner satisfactory to the Commissioner of Finance, the County's interest in the securities.

Such security and custodial agreements shall include any other provisions and executions necessary and sufficient to secure, in a manner satisfactory to the Commissioner of Finance, the County's interest in the securities.

X. Permitted Investments

As authorized by General Municipal Law Section 11, the County Board of Legislators authorizes the Commissioner of Finance, at her/his discretion, to invest monies not required for immediate expenditure, for terms not to exceed the County's projected cash flow needs in any of the following types of investments which are specifically selected by the Commissioner of Finance and stipulated in the documentation executed with its trading partners and/or depositories.

- Special time deposit accounts in, or certificates of deposit issued by, a bank or trust company located and authorized to do business in the State of New York.
- Through a Deposit Placement Program, certificates of deposit in one or more "banking institutions", as defined in Banking Law Section 9-r;
- Direct obligations of the United States of America.
- Obligations guaranteed by agencies of the United States of America where the payment of principal and interest are guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the United States of America.
- Obligations of New York State.
- Obligations issued pursuant to New York State Local Finance Law Sections 24 or 25 (with approval of the State Comptroller) by any school district, district corporation or municipality, other than the County itself.
- Obligations of public authorities, public housing authorities,

Urban renewal agencies and industrial development agencies where the general state statute governing such entities, or whose specific enabling legislation authorizes such investment.

• Obligations of the County, but only with any monies in a reserve fund established pursuant to General Municipal Law Sections 6-c, 6-d, 6-e, 6-f, 6-g, 6-h, 6-j, 6-k, 6-l, 6-m or 6-n.

All of the above shall be defined as Permitted County Investments.

In addition to the above, Cooperative Investment pool s as defined in Article 5-G of the General Municipal Law and in accordance with Article 3-A of the General Municipal Law shall also be considered to be a Permitted County Investment with the following conditions:

- Investments held by any pools are acceptable to and meet the due diligence standards of the Commissioner of Finance.
- Additionally, County investment in any such pools must be periodically evaluated by the Commissioner of Finance against County investment return and/or other industry performance results.

All investment obligations shall be payable or redeemable at the option of the County, within such times as the proceeds are required to meet expenditures for purposes for which the monies were obtained. Time deposits and certificates of deposit shall be payable within such times as the proceeds will be needed to meet expenditures for which the moneys were obtained, and shall be secured as set forth in Sections VIII, IX and X of this Investment Policy.

Except as may otherwise be provided in a contract with bondholders or noteholders, any moneys of the County authorized to be invested may be commingled for investment purposes, provided that any investment of commingled moneys shall be payable or redeemable at the option of the County within such time as the proceeds shall be needed to meet expenditures for which such moneys were obtained, or as otherwise specifically provided in General Municipal Law Section 11. The separate identity of the sources of these funds shall be maintained at all times and income received shall be credited on a pro rata basis to the fund or account from which the moneys were invested.

Any obligation that provides for the adjustment of its interest rate on set dates is deemed to be payable or redeemable on the date on which the principal amount can be recovered through demand by the holder.

XI. <u>Authorized Financial Institutions and Dealers</u>

The Commissioner of Finance shall develop and maintain a list of depository financial institutions (from the County Board of Legislators' approved depository list as specified in Section VII) and primary security dealers (from the list of primary government security dealers published by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, a copy of such list as of the date specified is attached hereto as Appendix B, such list may be updated by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York from time to time).

All financial institutions and dealers with which the County transacts business must be creditworthy, and have an appropriate level of experience, capitalization, size and other factors that make the financial institution or the dealer capable and qualified to transact business with the County. The Commissioner of Finance shall conduct reasonable due diligence to evaluate the financial position of depositories, trading partners and custodians. Recent reports of condition and income (call reports) shall be obtained for proposed banks to be added to the list of approved depositories.

Upon request, County depositories shall provide their most recent consolidated report of condition and income (call report) to the Commissioner of Finance.

Upon request, County non-bank trading partners shall provide to the Commissioner of Finance their most recent annual financial statements as reported to the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission (the "S.E.C."), and at the request of the County, make available their monthly "focus" report to the S.E.C.

The Commissioner of Finance is responsible for evaluating the financial position of proposed and present depositories, trading partners and custodians. Such evaluations shall be conducted on a continuing basis.

XII. Purchase of Investments

The Commissioner of Finance is authorized to contract for the purchase of investments:

- Directly, including through a repurchase agreement or an authorized trading partner.
- By participation in a cooperative investment program with another authorized governmental entity pursuant to Article 5G of the General Municipal Law and in accordance with Article 3A of the General Municipal Law.
- All purchased obligations, unless registered or inscribed in the name of the County, shall be purchased through, delivered to and held in the custody of a bank or trust company. Such obligations shall be purchased, sold or presented for redemption or payment by such bank or trust company only in accordance with prior written authorization from the officer or employee designated and authorized to make such investment. All such transactions shall be confirmed in writing to the County by the bank or trust company.
- Any obligation held in the custody of a bank or trust company shall be held pursuant to a written agreements set forth in Section IX above of this policy.
- The Commissioner of Finance is authorized to direct the bank or trust company to register and hold the evidences of investments in the name of its nominee, or arrange for the deposit of any such evidences of investments with a federal reserve bank or other book-entry transfer system operated by a federally registered entity. The records of the bank or trust company shall show, at all times, the ownership of such evidences of investments, and they shall be, when held in the possession of the bank or trust company, at all times, kept separate from the assets of the bank or trust company. All evidences of investments delivered to a bank or trust company shall be held by the bank or trust company pursuant to a written custodial agreement as set forth in Section IX above of this policy. When any such evidences of investments are so registered in the name of

a nominee, the bank or trust company shall be absolutely liable for any loss occasioned by the acts of such nominee with respect to such evidences of investments.

XIII. Repurchase Agreements

Repurchase agreements are authorized subject to the following restrictions:

- All such agreements must be entered into subject to a
 Master Repurchase Agreement, outlining basic responsibilities and
 liabilities of the buyer and seller and a written agreement with the
 custodial bank or trust company, outlining the basic responsibilities and
 liabilities of the buyer, seller and custodian.
- Trading partners shall be limited to creditworthy banks or trust companies authorized to do business in New York State and/or registered primary government securities dealers as determined by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York.
- Unless the obligations that are purchased pursuant to the repurchase
 agreement are registered and inscribed in the name of the County,
 obligations must be purchased through, delivered to and held in the
 custody of a bank or trust company located and authorized to do business
 in New York State. The custodial bank or trust company should not be the
 seller of the obligations that are the subject of the repurchase agreement.
- The custodial agreement shall provide that the custodian takes
 possession and maintains custody of the obligations exclusively for the
 County, that the obligations are free of any claims against the trading
 partner, and that any claims by the custodian are subordinate to the
 County's claims or rights to those obligations.
- The obligations must be credited to the County on the records of the custodial bank or trust company, and the transactions must be confirmed in writing to the County by the custodial bank or trust company.
- The obligations purchased by the County may only be sold or presented for redemption or payment by the County's custodian upon written instructions from the Commissioner of Finance.
- The County must obtain a perfected security interest in the obligation.
- Agreements should be for short periods of time of no more than thirty (30) days.
- The Commissioner of Finance, with the assistance of a qualified financial advisor, shall determine whether to include margin requirements.
- No substitution of obligations is permitted.

- Payment for the purchased obligations should not be made by the custodial bank or trust company until the obligations are actually received, which is usually done simultaneously.
- Obligations shall be limited to obligations of the United States of America and obligations of United States Government as set forth in Appendix A.
- All repurchase agreements are purchases and sales and shall be so identified to all trading partners.
- The custodian shall be a party or entity other than the trading partner.
- When possession of securities shall be domiciled with a third party custodian, County interests shall be secured in a manner satisfactory to the Commissioner of Finance.
- All repurchase partners shall receive and acknowledge a copy of the Investment Policy.

Obligations that are purchased pursuant to a repurchase agreement are deemed to be payable or redeemable, for purpose of the General Municipal Law, on the date on which the purchased obligations are scheduled to be repurchased by the seller.

XIV. Courier Service

The Commissioner of Finance may, subject to the approval of a resolution by the County Board of Acquisition and Contract, enter into a contract with a courier service for the purpose of causing the deposit of public funds with a bank or trust company. The courier service shall be required to obtain a surety bond for the full amount entrusted to the courier, payable to the County and executed by an insurance company authorized to do business in the State of New York, with a claims-paying ability that is rated in the highest rating category by at least two nationally recognized statistical rating organizations, to insure against any loss of public deposits entrusted to the courier service for deposit or the failure to deposit the full amount entrusted to the courier service.

The County may agree with the depository bank or trust company that the bank or trust company will reimburse all or part of, but not more than, the actual cost incurred by the County in transporting items for deposit through a courier service. Any such reimbursement agreement shall apply only to a specified deposit transaction, and may be subject to such terms, conditions and limitations as the bank or trust company deems necessary to ensure sound banking practices, including, but not limited to, any terms, conditions or limitations that may be required by the New York State Department of Financial Services or other Federal or State authority.

XV. Annual Review and Amendments

The County Board of Legislators shall review this policy for investing and protecting public funds annually, and shall have the power to amend it at any time.

XVI. Definitions

The terms "public funds," "public deposits," "bank," "trust company," "eligible securities," and "eligible letter of credit" shall have the same meanings as set forth in General Municipal Law Section 10.

Appendix A

Schedule of Eligible Securities

In connection with its stated policy for investing and protecting public funds, the Department of Finance has elected to use only those financial instruments which, in its opinion, provide optimum safety and liquidity for collateral and/or investment purposes.

These instruments are as follows:

- Obligations issued or fully insured or guaranteed as to the payment of principal and interest by the United States of America, an agency thereof or a United States government sponsored corporation.
- Zero coupon obligations of the United States government marketed as "Treasury Strips".

Therefore, the removal of the Parcel will not cause significant changes in the tax rate of the District.

According to the Department, the proposal to remove the Parcel from the District is feasible because: 1) the proposed change was requested by the Town; 2) the subject change requires no engineering modifications to the District facilities and there is no impact on the County facilitates because the Parcel was never connected to the sewerage system; 3) the subject change removes from ad valorem taxation a property that has not benefited and foreseeably will not benefit from connection to District facilities based on information received from the Town; 4) the subject change frees reserve capacity at the District treatment plant for future enlargement of the District from surrounding areas without the capital costs of expanding treatment facilitates; 5) the subject Parcel, once removed from the District will be required to petition the County to re-enter the District and the County is not obligated to reserve any capacity for the Parcel once it has been removed; and 6) the subject Parcel was reviewed by the Westchester County Health Department.

Based upon the foregoing, I respectfully recommend that your Board adopt a Resolution which will authorize Legal Notice for the public hearing as required by the Laws of Westchester County in such matters, and, after such hearing, urges your Honorable Board to adopt the annexed Act which accomplishes the removal of the Parcel from the District.

regulations, to identify the relevant areas of environmental concern. For the reasons set forth in

the attached EAF, your Committee believes that the proposed action will not have any significant

adverse impact on the environment and urges your Honorable Board to adopt the annexed

resolution by which this Board would issue a Negative Declaration for this proposed action.

Based on the above facts, the Feasibility Report prepared by the Department, and the

review by the Planning Department, your Committee concurs with the recommendation of the



AN ACT to Modify the Saw Mill Valley Sanitary Sewer District by the Removal of one (1) Parcel of Property Located in the Town of Mount Pleasant.

BE IT ENACTED by the County Board of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. The following property known and designated as 485 Chappaqua Road, Sec. 98.8, Block 1, Lot 2 (the "Parcel") on the assessment maps of the Town of Mount Pleasant (the "Town") is hereby removed from the Saw Mill Valley Sanitary Sewer District (the "District").

- § 2. The Parcel is to be forgiven its obligation for future debt service requirement and is to relinquish its equity in existing sewage facilities in the District, and in return the District is relieved of its responsibility to provide sanitary sewer service and sewerage facilities to the Parcel.
- § 3. This Act and the District and assessment areas as so altered, changed, modified, reduced and/or enlarged hereby, shall become effective immediately and the assessment rolls filed after the next taxable status date shall show County sewer district assessments and taxes on the basis of such revised District, and taxes levied on such rolls shall be based thereon, but any sewer district tax or assessment levied on any valid assessment rolls in effect prior to the next taxable status date, on any parcel affected by the revisions made by this Act, shall continue valid as such or as a tax lien, until paid and the amount paid shall be credited to the sewer district in which such parcel was assessed on the role on which said tax is levied.
- § 4. The County Executive or his authorized designee be and hereby is authorized and empowered to execute any and all instruments and to take all action necessary and appropriate to accomplish the purposes hereof.
 - § 5. This Act shall take effect immediately.

Type II actions are those actions determined not to have a significant effect on the environment and therefore do not require further environmental review. Your Committee concurs with this recommendation.

Your Committee has been advised that the IMAs are exempt from the Westchester

County Procurement Policy and Procedures pursuant to Section 3(a)iii thereof, which exempts

transactions or contracts with the United States of America, any State and any political
subdivision, agency or instrumentality thereof.

Pursuant to the Laws of Westchester County, the proposed Act must be approved by an affirmative vote of not less than a majority the voting strength of the Board of Legislators.

THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, a municipal corporation of the State of New York, having an office and place of business in the Michaelian Office Building, 148 148 Martine Avenue, White Plains, New York 10601, (hereinafter referred to as the "County");

and

[INSERT MUNICIPALITY NAME AND ADDRESS], (hereinafter referred to as the "Municipality").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the County desires to obtain services for the removal of snow and ice from designated County roads within the Municipality to provide for reasonable passage and movement of vehicles over such roads; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality is willing to furnish such services and the County desires to purchase same subject to the terms of the Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms, conditions and covenants hereinafter set forth, the parties agree as follows:

<u>FIRST</u>: This Agreement shall commence on October 1, 2025 and shall expire on September 30, 2030 unless sooner terminated as herein provided.

SECOND: The Municipality agrees to furnish all necessary personnel, machinery, tools, supplies and equipment to provide snow removal and ice control services upon County roads within the boundaries of the Municipality as identified in the list attached hereto and made a part hereof as Schedule "D". Said services shall be provided upon the paved portions of County roads as well as County road bridges and bridge sidewalks and shall include the plowing or removal of snow and ice, all necessary sanding, and appropriate measures to keep catch basins and drains clear of ice and debris, until the end of the snow removal season.

The Municipality shall not be required to provide the following services: filling pot holes, removal of trash, removal of dead animals, grass and weed cutting, maintenance and repair of guide rails, or graffiti removal upon County roads as identified in Schedule "D", unless damage to County property is caused by the Municipality, its employees, agents or contractors.

All work shall be performed in the manner prescribed by the Westchester County Commissioner of Public Works and Transportation ("Commissioner") or his authorized representative and shall be completed to his satisfaction.

<u>THIRD</u>: For the services performed pursuant to Paragraph <u>SECOND</u> above, the County shall pay the Municipality as follows:

- (i) At such time as the Municipality's salt storage and application rates shall be in compliance with the recommendations of the 208 Water Quality Program, as described in the "Best Management Practices Manual" published as part of that Program as amended or supplemented, then payment shall be provided in accordance with the rates set forth in Schedule "B" for those seasons the municipality is in compliance.
- (ii) In the event the Municipality shall not be in compliance with the 208 Water Quality Program "Best Management Practices Manual" as amended or supplemented or, if in compliance, shall fail to so comply during the term of this Agreement, then the Municipality shall be entitled to payment only for the actual amounts expended to provide snow and ice removal services up to the maximum rates set forth in Schedule "A".
- (iii) Schedule "D" will be modified to add and/or delete roads, or sections of roads, as they may be added to and/or deleted from the County road system. Such addition and/or deletion may only take place upon the completion of action by the Westchester County Board of Legislators.

Payments will be prorated to pay as follows:

FOURTH: Any and all requests for payment to be made shall be submitted within thirty (30) days after notice by the Department of Public Works and Transportation, on a properly executed claim form together with an itemized schedule of amounts expended to furnish such services. Payment shall be made only after approval by the Commissioner.

This Agreement shall be deemed executory only to the extent of money appropriated and allocated by the County for the performance of the terms hereof and no liability under this Agreement shall be incurred by the County beyond moneys available for the purposes thereof.

<u>FIFTH</u>: The Municipality shall keep accurate records of its business operations hereunder in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

The Commissioner, or his duly authorized representative, shall have the right to inspect and audit such records and statements at all reasonable times to insure that the Municipality is complying with the terms of this Agreement. To the extent practicable such inspections shall take place at the offices of the Municipality. The Municipality agrees that all equipment charges shall be in accordance with rates established by the New York State Department of Transportation and all labor charges shall be in accordance with the prevailing rates within the Municipality for similar highway work.

SIXTH: The parties recognize and acknowledge that the obligations of the County under this Agreement are subject to annual appropriations by its Board of Legislators pursuant to the Laws of Westchester County. Therefore, this Agreement shall be deemed executory only to the extent of the moneys appropriated and available. The County shall have no liability under this Agreement beyond funds appropriated and available for payment pursuant to this Agreement. The parties understand and intend that the obligation of the County hereunder shall constitute a current expense of the County and shall not in any way be construed to be a debt of the County in contravention of any applicable constitutional or statutory limitations or requirements concerning the creation of indebtedness by the County, nor shall anything contained in this Agreement

constitute a pledge of the general tax revenues, funds or moneys of the County. The County shall pay amounts due under this Agreement exclusively from legally available funds appropriated for this purpose. The County shall retain the right, upon the occurrence of the adoption of any County Budget by its Board of Legislators during the term of this Agreement or any amendments thereto, and for a reasonable period of time after such adoption(s), to conduct an analysis of the impacts of any such County Budget on County finances. After such analysis, the County shall retain the right to either terminate this Agreement or to renegotiate the amounts and rates set forth herein. If the County subsequently offers to pay a reduced amount to the Municipality, then the Municipality shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon reasonable prior written notice.

This Agreement is also subject to further financial analysis of the impact of any New York State Budget (the "State Budget") proposed and adopted during the term of this Agreement. The County shall retain the right, upon the occurrence of any release by the Governor of a proposed State Budget and/or the adoption of a State Budget or any amendments thereto, and for a reasonable period of time after such release(s) or adoption(s), to conduct an analysis of the impacts of any such State Budget on County finances. After such analysis, the County shall retain the right to either terminate this Agreement or to renegotiate the amounts and rates approved herein. If the County subsequently offers to pay a reduced amount to the Municipality, then the Municipality shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon reasonable prior written notice.

SEVENTH: Either party, upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other, may terminate this Agreement in whole or in part when deemed to be in its best interest. Subject to the availability of funds, the Municipality shall be compensated for services rendered under this Agreement prior to the effective date of such termination.

In the event the Commissioner determines that there has been a material breach by the Municipality of any of the terms of the Agreement and such breach either, (i) remains uncured for forty-eight (48) hours after service on the Municipality of written notice thereof, or (ii) is not capable of being cured, the County, in addition to any other right or remedy it might have, may terminate this Agreement and the County shall have the right, power and authority to complete the services provided for in this Agreement, or contract for their completion, and any additional expense or cost of such completion shall be charged to and paid by the Municipality. Notice shall

be effective on the date of receipt. Without limiting the foregoing, upon written notice to the Municipality, repeated breaches by Municipality of any particular duty or obligation under this Agreement shall be deemed a material breach of the Agreement justifying termination for cause hereunder without requirement for further opportunity to cure. Notice shall be effective on the date of receipt.

EIGHTH: Except in an emergency, the Municipality shall not assign, sublet, subcontract or otherwise dispose of this Agreement, or any right, duty or interest herein, without previous written consent of the County. No assignment, subcontracting, subletting or other such disposition of this Agreement, either with or without such consent of the County, shall serve to relieve the Municipality of its obligations hereunder.

All subcontracts entered into by the Municipality shall provide that subcontractors are subject to and must comply with all terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. All work performed by the subcontractor shall be deemed work performed by the Municipality.

<u>NINTH</u>: The Municipality shall comply, at its own expense, with the provisions of all applicable federal, state and local laws, rules, regulations, orders or ordinances and requirements of every kind and nature, which now exist or are hereinafter be enacted or promulgated ("Laws") including, but not limited to, all applicable provisions of the Labor Law, Workers' Compensation Law, State Unemployment Insurance Law, Federal Social Security Law and any and all rules and regulations promulgated by the United States Department of Labor and/or the Industrial Commissioner of the State of New York and all amendments and additions thereto.

It is the intent and understanding of the County and Municipality that each and every provision required by law, contract, or other proper authority to be included in this Agreement shall, for all intents and purposes, be considered and deemed included herein. The Municipality understands and acknowledges that for each and every such provision that has, through mistake or otherwise, either not been inserted in writing or been inserted in writing in an incorrect form, the Municipality hereby consents to amending this Agreement in writing, upon receipt of notice from the County, for the purpose of inserting or correcting the provision in question.

TENTH: The Municipality hereby acknowledges and agrees:

- (a) that in the hiring of employees for the performance of work under this Agreement or any subcontract hereunder, no Municipality, subcontractor, nor any person acting on behalf of such Municipality or subcontractor, shall by reason of race, creed, color, religion, gender, age, ethnicity, disability, sex, alienage or citizenship status, national origin, marital status, sexual orientation, familial status, genetic pre-disposition or carrier status, discriminate against any citizen of the State of New York who is qualified and available to perform the work to which the employment relates;
- (b) that no Municipality, subcontractor, nor any person on his behalf shall, in any manner, discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this Agreement on account of race, creed, color, religion, gender, age, ethnicity, disability, sex, alienage or citizenship status, national origin, marital status, sexual orientation, familial status, genetic pre-disposition or carrier status;
- (c) that there may be deducted from the amount payable to the Municipality by the County under this Agreement a penalty of FIFTY (\$50.00) DOLLARS for each person for each calendar day during which such person was discriminated against or intimidated in violation of the provisions of this Agreement;
- (d) that this Agreement may be cancelled or terminated by the County, and all moneys due or to become due hereunder may be forfeited, for a second or any subsequent violation of the terms and conditions of this section of the Agreement; and
- (e) the aforesaid provisions of this section covering every agreement for or on behalf of the County for the manufacture, sale or distribution of materials, equipment or supplies shall be limited to operations performed within the territorial limits of the State of New York.
- (f) The Municipality acknowledges and understands that the County maintains a zero tolerance policy prohibiting all forms of harassment or discrimination against its employees by coworkers, supervisors, vendors, contractors, or others.

ELEVENTH: The Municipality, in its own name and naming the County as an additional named insured, shall, at the commencement of the term hereof, obtain and maintain in continuous effect for the term of this Agreement, policies of insurance providing for coverage in the limits and subject to the conditions set forth in Schedule "C", attached hereto and made a part hereof.

The Municipality agrees to indemnify, defend and hold the County of Westchester and its officers, employees and agents harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, damage or expense the County may suffer as a result of any and all claims, demands, causes of action or judgments arising out of this Agreement due to the negligent acts or omissions of the Municipality.

The Municipality shall, within ten (10) days of the occurrence thereof, notify the Commissioner of any action, proceeding, claim or demand arising hereunder.

Notwithstanding the requirements set forth in the above and as set forth in Schedule "C", the Municipality may act as a self-insurer for the general liability insurance in lieu of procuring from an insurance company the insurance required by the terms of this Agreement and heretofore described. The Municipality hereby agrees that it will provide the exact same insurance coverage and protection for the benefit of the County and any other covered entity herein, in the same amount and under the same terms set forth in the paragraph above and as set forth in Schedule "C", as it would provide County if the Municipality were to purchase commercial insurance. The Municipality further agrees that its decision to self-insure shall in no way limit the defenses or indemnification available to the County.

TWELFTH: All notices of any nature referred to in this Agreement shall be in writing and either sent by registered or certified mail postage pre-paid, or sent by hand or overnight courier, to the respective addresses as set forth below or to such other addresses as the respective parties hereto may designate in writing. Notice shall be effective on the date of receipt.

THIRTEENTH: VENDOR DIRECT PAYMENT: All payments made by the County to the Municipality will be made by electronic funds transfer ("EFT") pursuant to the County's Vendor Direct program. Municipalities doing business with Westchester County, who are not already enrolled in the Vendor Direct Program, will be required to fill out and submit an EFT Authorization Form prior to receiving an award or purchase order. The EFT Authorization Form, Instructions and related information are annexed hereto as Schedule "E." Payments will be automatically credited to the Municipality's designated bank account at the Municipality's financial institution. Payments are anticipated to be deposited two business days after the voucher/invoice is processed for payment. Saturdays, Sundays, and legal holidays are not considered business days. Under the Vendor Direct program you will receive an e-mail notification two days prior to the day the payment will be credited to your designated account. The e-mail notification will come in the form of a remittance advice with the same information that currently appears on County check stubs and will contain the date that the funds will be credited to your account. All information received will be treated and handled as strictly confidential. The completed Authorization Form must be returned by the Municipality to the County prior to award of the contract. In rare cases, a hardship waiver may be granted. For a Hardship Waiver Request Form, please contact the Finance Department. Any Municipality that fails to return the completed authorization form(s) prior to award of the contract may be considered non-responsive and the proposal may be rejected.

FOURTEENTH: The failure of either party to insist, in any one or more instances, upon strict performance of any term or condition herein contained shall not be deemed a waiver or relinquishment for the future of such term or condition, but the same shall remain in full force and effect. No waiver by either party or any provision hereof shall be implied.

<u>FIFTEENTH</u>: This Agreement shall bind the successors, assigns and representatives of the parties hereto.

<u>SIXTEENTH</u>: This Agreement and its attachments constitute the entire Agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede all previous negotiations, commitments and writings. No change, modification or cancellation of this Agreement shall be effective except by an instrument in writing signed by a duly authorized representative of each of the parties.

In the event of any conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the terms of any schedule or attachment hereto, it is understood that the terms of this Agreement shall be controlling with respect to any interpretation of the meaning and intent of the parties.

SEVENTEENTH: This Agreement may be executed simultaneously in several counterparts, each of which shall be an original and all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument. This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of New York. In addition, the parties hereby agree that any cause of action arising out of this Agreement shall be brought in the County of Westchester.

If any term or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or void or unenforceable, the remainder of the terms and provisions of this Agreement shall in no way be affected, impaired, or invalidated, and to the extent permitted by applicable law, any such term, or provision shall be restricted in applicability or reformed to the minimum extent required for such to be enforceable. This provision shall be interpreted and enforced to give effect to the original written intent of the parties prior to the determination of such invalidity or unenforceability.

EIGHTEENTH: This Agreement shall not be enforceable until signed by all parties and approved by the Office of the County Attorney.

SCHEDULE " C"

STANDARD INSURANCE PROVISIONS (Municipality)

1. Prior to commencing work, and throughout the term of the Agreement, the Municipality shall obtain at its own cost and expense the required insurance as delineated below from insurance companies licensed in the State of New York, carrying a Best's financial rating of A or better. Municipality shall provide evidence of such insurance to the County of Westchester ("County"), either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County ("Director"). The policies or certificates thereof shall provide that ten (10) days prior to cancellation or material change in the policy, notices of same shall be given to the Director either by overnight mail or personal delivery for all of the following stated insurance policies. All notices shall name the Municipality and identify the Agreement.

If at any time any of the policies required herein shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing any such policy shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, the Municipality shall upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and submit the policy or the certificate as requested by the Director to the Office of Risk Management of the County for approval by the Director. Upon failure of the Municipality to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance, the Agreement, at the election of the County, may be declared suspended, discontinued or terminated.

Failure of the Municipality to take out, maintain, or the taking out or maintenance of any required insurance, shall not relieve the Municipality from any liability under the Agreement, nor shall the insurance requirements be construed to conflict with or otherwise limit the contractual obligations of the Municipality concerning indemnification.

All property losses shall be made payable to the "County of Westchester" and adjusted with the appropriate County personnel.

In the event that claims, for which the County may be liable, in excess of the insured amounts provided herein are filed by reason of Municipality's negligent acts or omissions under the Agreement or by virtue of the provisions of the labor law or other statute or any other reason, the amount of excess of such claims or any portion thereof, may be withheld from payment due or to become due the Municipality until such time as the Municipality shall furnish such additional security covering such claims in form satisfactory to the Director.

In the event of any loss, if the Municipality maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums identified herein, the County shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Municipality. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

The Municipality shall provide proof of the following coverage (if additional coverage is required for a specific agreement, those requirements will be described in the Agreement):

a) Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability. Certificate form C-105.2 or State Fund Insurance Company form U-26.3 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Workers' Compensation Law. State Workers' Compensation Board form DB-120.1 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Disability Benefits Law. Location of operation shall be "All locations in Westchester County, New York."

Where an applicant claims to not be required to carry either a Workers' Compensation Policy or Disability Benefits Policy, or both, the employer must complete NYS form CE-200, available to download at: http://www.wcb.ny.gov.

If the employer is self-insured for Workers' Compensation, he/she should present a certificate from the New York State Worker's Compensation Board evidencing that fact (Either SI-12, Certificate of Workers' Compensation Self-Insurance, or GSI-105.2, Certificate of Participation in Workers' Compensation Group Self-Insurance).

- b) Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 (c.s.1) per occurrence and a \$2,000,000 aggregate limit naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis. This insurance shall include the following coverages:
 - i.Premises Operations.
 - ii.Broad Form Contractual.
 - iii.Independent Contractor and Sub-Contractor.
 - iv. Products and Completed Operations.
- c) Commercial Umbrella/Excess Insurance: \$2,000,000 each Occurrence and Aggregate naming the "County of Westchester" as additional insured, written on a "follow the form" basis.
 - NOTE: Additional insured status shall be provided by standard or other endorsement that extends coverage to the County of Westchester for both on-going and completed operations.
- d) Automobile Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$1,000,000 for bodily injury and a minimum limit of \$100,000 per occurrence for property damage or a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 unless otherwise indicated in the contract specifications. This insurance shall include for bodily injury and property damage the following coverages and name the "County of Westchester" as additional insured:
 - (i) Owned automobiles.
 - (ii) Hired automobiles.
 - (iii) Non-owned automobiles.
 - 3. All policies of the Municipality shall be endorsed to contain the following clauses:
- (a) Insurers shall have no right to recovery or subrogation against the County (including its employees and other agents and agencies), it being the intention of the parties that the insurance policies so effected shall protect both parties and be primary coverage for any and all losses covered by the above-described insurance.
- (b) The clause "other insurance provisions" in a policy in which the County is named as an insured, shall not apply to the County.

- (c) The insurance companies issuing the policy or policies shall have no recourse against the County (including its agents and agencies as aforesaid) for payment of any premiums or for assessments under any form of policy.
- (d) Any and all deductibles in the above described insurance policies shall be assumed by and be for the account of, and at the sole risk of, the Municipality.

Transmitted herewith for your review and approval is a bond act ("Bond Act") which, if adopted, would authorize the County of Westchester ("County") to issue bonds in the amount of Five Million Four Hundred Fifty-Seven Thousand (\$5,457,000.00) Dollars to finance the following capital project:

RB03F – Ardsley Road Over Bronx River And Bronx River Parkway, Scarsdale and Greenburgh ("RB03F").

The Bond Act, in the amount of Five Million Four Hundred Fifty-Seven Thousand (\$5,457,000.00) Dollars, would finance the cost of the rehabilitation of two existing bridges on Ardsley Road over the Bronx River and the Bronx River Parkway in Scarsdale and Greenburgh, including the complete removal and replacement of the roadway pavement, fill, sidewalks, and waterproofing membrane; the replacement of deteriorated concrete on both structures; reconstruction and repointing of stone parapets and stone facing; the relocation of utilities; the installation of underwater concrete, rip-rap and bioremediation along the banks; and the reconstruction of concrete steps.

The Department of Public Works and Transportation ("Department") has advised that the bridge over the Bronx River, which was built in 1924, and the bridge over the Bronx River Parkway, which was built in 1925, have an annual daily traffic count of 15,775 and are in need of rehabilitation to maintain safe roadways for the traveling public. In 2023, the New York State Department of Transportation ("NYSDOT") gave the bridge over the Bronx River Parkway a condition rating of 4.06. In 2025, NYSDOT gave the bridge over the Bronx River a condition rating of 3.78. Both bridges have continued to deteriorate. The condition rating system, using a scale of 1 ("hazardous") through 7 ("new"), is a weighted average of the condition of an evaluated bridge. A rating below 5 indicates that a bridge requires work and delay of this work could result in the continued deterioration of the bridge.

Design for RB03F is currently being undertaken by a consultant and is expected to be completed by the fourth quarter of 2025. It is anticipated that construction will take approximately twenty-four months and will begin after award and execution of the construction contracts.

Based on the importance of this project to the County, favorable action on the proposed Bond Act is respectfully requested.

Your Committee is in receipt of a transmittal from the Westchester County Executive recommending approval by the County of Westchester ("County") of a bond act ("Bond Act") in the amount of \$5,457,000.00 to finance capital project RB03F – Ardsley Road Over Bronx River And Bronx River Parkway, Scarsdale and Greenburgh ("RB03F"). The Bond Act, which was prepared by the law firm Hawkins, Delafield & Wood LLP, will finance the cost of the rehabilitation of two existing bridges on Ardsley Road over the Bronx River and the Bronx River Parkway in Scarsdale and Greenburgh, including the complete removal and replacement of the roadway pavement, fill, sidewalks, and waterproofing membrane; the replacement of deteriorated concrete on both structures; reconstruction and repointing of stone parapets and stone facing; the relocation of utilities; the installation of underwater concrete, rip-rap and bioremediation along the banks; and the reconstruction of concrete steps.

The Department of Public Works and Transportation ("Department") has advised your Committee that the bridge over the Bronx River, which was built in 1924, and the bridge over the Bronx River Parkway, which was built in 1925, have an annual daily traffic count ("AADT") of 15,775 and are in need of rehabilitation to maintain safe roadways for the traveling public. In 2023, the New York State Department of Transportation ("NYSDOT") gave the bridge over the Bronx River Parkway a condition rating of 4.06. In 2025, NYSDOT gave the bridge over the Bronx River a condition rating of 3.78. Both bridges have continued to deteriorate. The condition rating system, using a scale of 1 ("hazardous") through 7 ("new"), is a weighted average of the condition of an evaluated bridge. A rating below 5 indicates that a bridge requires work and delay of this work could result in the continued deterioration of the bridge.

Your Committee is further advised that design for RB03F is currently being undertaken by a consultant and is expected to be completed by the fourth quarter of 2025. It is anticipated that construction will take approximately twenty-four months and will begin after award and execution of the construction contracts.

The Department of Planning has advised your Committee that based on its review, RB03F may be classified as a Type "II" action pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617 ("SEQR"). Therefore, no environmental

review is required. Your Committee has reviewed the annexed SEQR documentation and concurs

with this recommendation.

It should be noted that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of your Honorable

Board is required in order to adopt the Bond Act. Your Committee recommends the adoption of

the proposed Bond Act.

ACT NO. -20

BOND ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$5,457,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, OR SO MUCH THEREOF AS MAY BE NECESSARY, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE REHABILITATION OF TWO EXISTING BRIDGES ON ARDSLEY ROAD OVER THE BRONX RIVER AND THE BRONX RIVER PARKWAY IN SCARSDALE AND GREENBURGH, STATING THE ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST THEREOF IS \$5,457,000; STATING THE PLAN OF FINANCING SAID COST INCLUDES THE ISSUANCE OF \$5,457,000 BONDS HEREIN AUTHORIZED; AND PROVIDING FOR A TAX TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS (Adopted , 20____)

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (the "Law"), the Westchester County Administrative Code, being Chapter 852 of the Laws of 1948, as amended, and the provisions of other laws applicable thereto, \$5,457,000 bonds of the County, or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby authorized to be issued to finance the cost of the rehabilitation of two existing bridges on Ardsley Road over the Bronx River and the Bronx River Parkway in Scarsdale and Greenburgh, including the complete removal and replacement of the roadway pavement, fill, sidewalks and waterproofing membrane; the replacement of deteriorated concrete on both structures; reconstruction and repointing of stone parapets and stone facing; the

relocation of utilities; the installation of underwater concrete, rip-rap and bioremediation along the banks; and the reconstruction of concrete steps, all as set forth in the County's Current Year Capital Budget, as amended. To the extent that the details set forth in this act are inconsistent with any details set forth in the Current Year Capital Budget of the County, such Budget shall be deemed and is hereby amended. The estimated maximum cost of the County's share of said specific object or purpose, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof is \$5,457,000. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$5,457,000 bonds herein authorized, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds, and the levy of a tax to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds and notes.

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness of said specific object or purpose, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 10 of the Law, is forty (40) years;

Section 3. Current funds are not required to be provided as a down payment pursuant to Section 107.00 d. 9. of the Law prior to issuance of the bonds authorized herein, or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds. The County intends to finance, on an interim basis, the costs or a portion of the costs of said improvements for which bonds are herein authorized, which costs are reasonably expected to be reimbursed with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County, pursuant to this Act, in the maximum amount of \$5,457,000. This Act is a declaration of official intent adopted pursuant to the requirements of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2.

Section 4. The estimate of \$5,457,000 as the estimated maximum cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is hereby approved.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of this Act and of the Law, and pursuant to the provisions of §30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes

or the renewals thereof, and of §§50.00, 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of said Law, the powers and duties of the County Board of Legislators relative to authorizing the issuance of any notes in anticipation of the sale of the bonds herein authorized, or the renewals thereof, relative to providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, relative to prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the respective amounts of bonds herein authorized, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and relative to executing agreements for credit enhancement, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance of the County, as the chief fiscal officer of the County.

Section 6. Each of the bonds authorized by this Act and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale thereof shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by §52.00 of said Local Finance Law and said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the County of Westchester, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the County. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and provision shall be made annually in the budgets of the County by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the notes and bonds to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 7. The validity of the bonds authorized by this Act and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

(a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or

(b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this Act or a summary hereof, are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

(c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 8. This Act shall take effect in accordance with Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter.

Transmitted herewith for your review and approval is an amended bond act ("Amended Bond Act"), which, if adopted by your Honorable Board, would authorize the County of Westchester ("County") to issue additional bonds to finance the following capital project:

BCR63 (3044) Post 2 Entrance Gate Booths ("BCR63").

The Amended Bond Act, in the total amount of \$1,050,000.00, which includes \$125,000.00 in previously authorized bonds of the County, would finance the construction of the replacement of the existing Post 2 entrance booth for the Department of Corrections ("Department"), including the preparation of preliminary plans and specifications and associated work such as plumbing, electrical, and exterior improvements.

The Department has advised that the existing booth must be replaced because it has been active for more than a decade and has developed a significant amount of rust in the floor framing and the steel floor plate. The plate floor has numerous patches spanning the rusted sections and these are unstable and failing. The rusting floor is also compromising the wall anchorage and the operation of the sliding doors.

The Department has further advised that plumbing, electrical pipes, and conduit(s) require upgrades to ensure continued compliance with health, safety, and electrical codes. The new booth will be enlarged from 12'-0" to 13'-6", to allow room for computers, screens, and the new data/fiber racks for communications.

In addition to the structural concerns and technology upgrades, BCR63 upgrades and improves the safety of the entire booth structure by upgrading it to a 'Ballistic Level 3' protection capability. This protection level will allow the entire new booth to resist hand pistols of 9 mm and 0.357 caliber projectiles, and some 9 mm rifles. Currently, 'Ballistic Level 3' protection is limited only to the existing booth's windows.

BCR63 also includes replacement of the existing booth's two outdated and malfunctioning 'traffic control' gates with related 'induction loops' in the roadway to provide reliable gate operation and updated control systems for the new booth's automatic gates.

The design phase for the project is currently being undertaken by in-house Department staff and is expected to be completed by the fourth quarter of 2025. Subsequently, the Department estimates

that the construction phase will take six months to complete and will begin after award and execution of the construction contracts.

It should be noted that your Honorable Board has authorized the County to issue bonds for BCR63 as follows: Bond Act No. 222 - 2024 in the amount of \$125,000.00 to finance the cost of design for the replacement of the existing Post 2 entrance booth for the Department. These bonds have not been sold. Accordingly, it is now requested that Bond Act No. 222 - 2024 be amended to increase the amount authorized by \$925,000.00, for a total authorized amount, as amended, of \$1,050,000.00, to revise the scope of Bond Act No. 222-2024 to include work associated with the construction phase of the project, and to increase the period of probable usefulness of said bonds.

Based on the importance of this project to the County, favorable action on the proposed Amended Bond Act is respectfully requested.

Your Committee is in receipt of a transmission from the County Executive recommending approval by the County of Westchester ("County") of an amended bond act ("Amended Bond Act") which, if adopted, will authorize the County to issue up to \$925,000.00 in additional bonds of the County to finance capital project BCR63 (3044) - Post 2 Entrance Gate Booths ("BCR63").

The Amended Bond Act in the total amount of \$1,050,000.00 was prepared by the law firm Hawkins, Delafield & Wood LLP and includes \$125,000.00 in previously authorized bonds of the County. The Bond Act would finance the construction of the replacement of the existing Post 2 entrance booth for the Department of Corrections ("Department"), including the preparation of preliminary plans and specifications and associated work such as plumbing, electrical, and exterior improvements.

Your Committee is advised that the existing booth must be replaced because it has been active for more than a decade and has developed a significant amount of rust in the floor framing and the steel floor plate. The plate floor has numerous patches spanning the rusted sections and these are unstable and failing. The rusting floor is also compromising the wall anchorage and the operation of the sliding doors.

Your Committee is further advised that plumbing, electrical pipes, and conduit(s) require upgrades to ensure continued compliance with health, safety, and electrical codes. The new booth will be enlarged from 12'-0" to 13'-6", to allow room for computers, screens, and the new data/fiber racks for communications.

Subsequently, the Department estimates that the construction phase will take six months to complete and will begin after award and execution of the construction contracts.

It should be noted that your Honorable Board has authorized the County to issue bonds for prior components of this capital project as follows: Bond Act No. 222 - 2024 in the amount of \$125,000.00, which financed the cost of design for the replacement of the existing Post 2 entrance booth for the Department. These bonds have not been sold. Accordingly, it is now requested that Bond Act No. 222 - 2024 be amended to increase the initial amount authorized by \$925,000.00, for a total authorized amount, as amended, of \$1,050,000.00, to revise the scope of Bond Act No. 222-2024 to include work associated with the construction phase of the project, and to increase the period of probable usefulness of said bonds.

The Planning Department has advised your Committee that based on its review, BCR63 may be classified as a Type "II" action pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQR") and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617. Therefore, no environmental

review is required. Your Committee has reviewed the annexed SEQR documentation and concurs

with this recommendation.

Your Committee has carefully considered the Amended Bond Act, and recommends

approval of the Amended Bond Act. It should be noted that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of

the members of your Honorable Board is required in order to adopt the Amended Bond Act.

WHEREAS, this Board has heretofore duly authorized the issuance of \$125,000 bonds to finance the cost of preparation of surveys, preliminary and detailed plans, specifications and estimates necessary for planning the replacement of the existing Post 2 entrance booth for the Department of Corrections, pursuant to Act No. 222-2024 duly adopted on October 21, 2024; and

WHEREAS, it is now appropriate to authorize such improvements, and it is necessary to increase the amount of bonds to be issued and the appropriation for such project for the estimated cost of such improvement;

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATOR'S OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), AS FOLLOWS:

Section (A). The bond act duly adopted by this Board on October 21, 2024, entitled:

BOND ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$125,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, OR SO MUCH THEREOF AS MAY BE NECESSARY, TO FINANCE THE COST OF PREPARATION OF SURVEYS, PRELIMINARY AND DETAILED PLANS, SPECIFICATIONS AND ESTIMATES NECESSARY FOR PLANNING THE REPLACEMENT OF THE EXISTING POST 2 ENTRANCE BOOTH FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS, STATING THE ESTIMATED TOTAL COST THEREOF IS \$125,000; STATING THE PLAN OF FINANCING SAID COST INCLUDES THE ISSUANCE OF \$125,000 BONDS HEREIN AUTHORIZED; AND PROVIDING FOR A TAX TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS."

is hereby amended to read as follows:

BOND ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,050,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, OR SO MUCH THEREOF AS MAY BE NECESSARY, TO FINANCE THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE REPLACEMENT OF THE EXISTING POST 2 ENTRANCE BOOTH FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS, INCLUDING THE PREPARATION OF PRELIMINARY PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS, STATING THE ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST THEREOF IS \$1,050,000; STATING THE PLAN OF FINANCING SAID COST INCLUDES THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,050,000 BONDS HEREIN AUTHORIZED; AND PROVIDING FOR A TAX TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS. (Adopted , 20____)

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (the "Law"), the Westchester County Administrative Code, being Chapter 852 of the Laws of 1948, as amended, and to the provisions of other laws applicable thereto; \$1,050,000 bonds of the County, or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby authorized to be issued to finance the construction of the replacement of the existing Post 2 entrance booth for the Department of Corrections, including the preparation of preliminary plans and specifications and associated work such as plumbing, electrical and exterior improvements, all as set forth in the County's Current Year Capital Budget, as amended. To the extent that the details set forth in this act are inconsistent with any details set forth in the Current Year Capital Budget of the County, such Budget shall be deemed and is hereby amended. The estimated maximum cost of said specific object or purpose, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof is \$1,050,000. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$1,050,000 bonds herein authorized; and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds and the levy of a tax to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds and notes.

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness of said specific object or purpose, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 11(a)(1) of the Law, is thirty (30) years;

Section 3. Current funds are not required to be provided as a down payment pursuant to Section 107.00 d. 9. of the Law prior to issuance of the bonds authorized herein, or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds. The County intends to finance, on an interim basis, the costs or a portion of the costs of said improvements for which bonds are herein authorized, which costs are reasonably expected to be reimbursed with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County, pursuant to this Act, in the maximum amount of

\$1,050,000. This Act is a declaration of official intent adopted pursuant to the requirements of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2.

Section 4. The estimate of \$1,050,000 as the estimated maximum cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is hereby approved.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of this Act and of the Law, and pursuant to the provisions of §30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes or the renewals thereof, and of §\$50.00, 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of said Law, the powers and duties of the County Board of Legislators relative to authorizing the issuance of any notes in anticipation of the sale of the bonds herein authorized, or the renewals thereof, relative to providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, relative to prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the respective amounts of bonds herein authorized, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and relative to executing agreements for credit enhancement, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance of the County, as the chief fiscal officer of the County.

Section 6. Each of the bonds authorized by this Act and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale thereof shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by §52.00 of said Local Finance Law and said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the County of Westchester, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the County. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and provision shall be made annually in the budgets of the County by

appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the notes and bonds to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 7. The validity of the bonds authorized by this Act and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

- (a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or
- (b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this Act or a summary hereof, are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

(c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 8. This Act shall take effect in accordance with Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter.

Section (B). The amendment of the bond act set forth in Section (A) of this act shall in no way affect the validity of the liabilities incurred, obligations issued, or action taken pursuant to said bond act, and all such liabilities incurred, obligations issued, or action taken shall be deemed to have been incurred, issued or taken pursuant to said bond act, as so amended.

Section (C). This Act shall take effect in accordance with Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter.

The County of Westchester (the "County") be and hereby is authorized to enter into an Intermunicipal Agreement ("IMA") with the City of Yonkers ("Yonkers") in order to reimburse Yonkers for the cost to transport prisoners round trip between Yonkers City Court and the Westchester County Jail located at Valhalla, New York, in an amount not to exceed \$332,928.00 in 2026 and \$339,586.56 in 2027, for a total aggregate amount not to exceed \$672,541.56. <u>2026</u> - \$223.00 per round trip with two detention officers; \$334.50 per round trip with three detention officers and \$446.00 per round trip with four detention officers;

<u>2027</u> - \$227.45 per round trip with two detention officers; \$341.17 per round trip with three detention officers and \$454.90 per round trip with four detention officers.

The Municipality shall also be reimbursed for vehicle usage between the City Court of Yonkers and the Westchester County Jail, which is deemed to be sixteen (16) miles each way, at the rate of seventy cents (\$.70) per mile, or at the then current Internal Revenue Service mileage reimbursement rate for the term hereof.

- 3. <u>MEALS</u>: The County shall reimburse the Municipality for meals provided to post-arraignment prisoners for the actual and reasonable costs incurred and receipts submitted as part of the municipality's monthly voucher submitted to the Department of Correction.
- 3. <u>TERM</u>: This Agreement shall commence on January 1, 2026 and shall expire on December 31, 2027. The County or the Municipality may, upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other party, terminate this Agreement in whole or in part when it deems

it to be in its best interest. In such event, the Municipality shall be compensated and the County shall be liable only for payment for services rendered prior to the effective date of termination.

4. PAYMENT: Requests for reimbursement shall be submitted by the Municipality on a monthly basis on properly executed County claim forms and paid after approval by the Commissioner of Correction. The number of round trips made, prisoners transported and dates should be listed on the claim forms submitted to the Department of Correction. Reimbursement request shall be subject to audit by the County, and the Municipality shall keep and make available to the County such detailed books and records as are reasonably necessary to substantiate the basis for reimbursement. The Municipality shall not be entitled to reimbursement for any prisoner transportation expense not specifically provided for herein.

The total aggregate cost to the County under this Agreement pursuant to Act No.

2025 – _____ approved by the Westchester County Board of Legislators on ______, 2025, in 2026 shall not exceed \$332,928.00, and in 2027 shall not exceed \$339,586.56, for a total aggregate cost to the County pursuant to this Agreement, which shall not exceed \$672,514.56. This Agreement shall be deemed executory only to the extent of the monies appropriated and available for the purpose of this Agreement and no liability on account hereof shall be incurred by the County beyond the amount of such monies.

5. INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION: All personnel and vehicles engaged in prisoner transportation duties shall at all times remain and be deemed the employees and property of the Municipality. In addition to, and not in limitation of the insurance provisions contained in Schedule "A" of this Agreement, the Municipality agrees to indemnify, defend and hold the County, its officers, employees and agents harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, damage or expense the County may suffer as a result of any and all claims, demands, causes of action or judgments arising directly or indirectly out

of the transportation of prisoners for which reimbursement is sought hereunder and for losses arising out of the negligent acts or omissions of the Municipality, its agents or employees.

SCHEDULE "A"

STANDARD INSURANCE PROVISIONS (Municipality - LEO)

1. Prior to commencing work, and throughout the term of the Agreement, the Municipality shall obtain at its own cost and expense the required insurance as delineated below from insurance companies licensed in the State of New York, carrying a Best's financial rating of A or better. Municipality shall provide evidence of such insurance to the County of Westchester ("County"), either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County ("Director"). The policies or certificates thereof shall provide that ten (10) days prior to cancellation or material change in the policy, notices of same shall be given to the Director either by overnight mail or personal delivery for all of the following stated insurance policies. All notices shall name the Municipality and identify the Agreement.

If at any time any of the policies required herein shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing any such policy shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, the Municipality shall upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and submit the policy or the certificate as requested by the Director to the Office of Risk Management of the County for approval by the Director. Upon failure of the Municipality to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance, the Agreement, at the election of the County, may be declared suspended, discontinued or terminated.

Failure of the Municipality to take out, maintain, or the taking out or maintenance of any required insurance, shall not relieve the Municipality from any liability under the Agreement, nor shall the insurance requirements be construed to conflict with or otherwise limit the contractual obligations of the Municipality concerning indemnification.

All property losses shall be made payable to the "County of Westchester" and adjusted with the appropriate County personnel.

In the event that claims, for which the County may be liable, in excess of the insured amounts provided herein are filed by reason of Municipality's negligent acts or omissions under the Agreement or by virtue of the provisions of the labor law or other statute or any other reason, the amount of excess of such claims or any portion thereof, may be withheld from payment due or to become due the Municipality until such time as the Municipality shall furnish such additional security covering such claims in form satisfactory to the Director.

In the event of any loss, if the Municipality maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums identified herein, the County shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Municipality. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

- The Municipality shall provide proof of the following coverage (if additional coverage is required for a specific agreement, those requirements will be described in the Agreement):
 - a) Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability. Certificate form C-105.2 or State Fund Insurance Company form U-26.3 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Workers' Compensation Law. State Workers' Compensation Board form DB-120.1 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Disability Benefits Law. Location of operation shall be "All locations in Westchester County, New York."

Where an applicant claims to not be required to carry either a Workers' Compensation Policy or Disability Benefits Policy, or both, the employer must complete NYS form CE-200, available to download at: http://www.wcb.ny.gov.

If the employer is self-insured for Workers' Compensation, he/she should present a certificate from the New York State Worker's Compensation Board evidencing that fact (Either SI-12, Certificate of Workers' Compensation Self-Insurance, or GSI-105.2, Certificate of Participation in Workers' Compensation Group Self-Insurance).

- b) Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of \$5,000,000 (c.s.1) per occurrence limit naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis. This insurance shall include the following coverages:
 - i. Premises Operations.
 - ii. Broad Form Contractual.
 - iii. Independent Contractor and Sub-Contractor.
 - iv. Products and Completed Operations.
- c) Commercial Umbrella/Excess Insurance: This policy can be utilized to supplement the General Liability policy so as to yield a minimum total combined single limit of \$5,000,000 each Occurrence and Aggregate naming the "County of Westchester" as additional insured, written on a "follow the form" basis.

NOTE: Additional insured status shall be provided by standard or other endorsement that extends coverage to the County of Westchester for both on-going and completed operations.

- d) Automobile Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$5,000,000 for bodily injury and property damage unless otherwise indicated in the contract specifications. This insurance shall include for bodily injury and property damage (and can be provided within a Law Enforcement Liability or offered as a stand-alone policy) the following coverages and name the "County of Westchester" as additional insured:
 - (i) Owned automobiles.
 - (ii) Hired automobiles.
 - (iii) Non-owned automobiles.

- e) Law Enforcement Liability/Police Liability insurance The Municipality shall provide proof of such insurance naming the County as additionally insured. (Limits of \$5,000,000 per occurrence). This policy shall include but not be limited to: coverage for moon lighting, assault and battery, excessive force, failure to render medical attention, failed CPR, false arrest, deliberate indifference, misuse of fire arms, Abuse and Molestation, sexual, racial and other forms of harassment and discrimination, auto liability, mistakes resulting in harm.
- f) Professional Liability. The Municipality shall provide proof of such insurance. (Limits of \$5,000,000 per occurrence). This policy can be provided as a stand-alone policy or can be provided within a Law Enforcement Liability policy.
- g) Abuse and Molestation Liability, either by separate policy of insurance or through endorsement to the General Liability Policy or Professional Liability Policy, or can be provided within a Law Enforcement Liability policy. (Limits of \$5,000,000.00 per occurrence). This insurance shall include coverage for the following, including coverage for client on client, counselor client, and third parties:
 - (i) Misconduct
 - (ii) Abuse (including both physical and sexual)
 - (iii) Molestation
- 3. All policies of the Municipality shall be endorsed to contain the following clauses:
- (a) Insurers shall have no right to recovery or subrogation against the County (including its employees and other agents and agencies), it being the intention of the parties that the insurance policies so effected shall protect both parties and be primary coverage for any and all losses covered by the above-described insurance.
- (b) The clause "other insurance provisions" in a policy in which the County is named as an insured, shall not apply to the County.
- (c) The insurance companies issuing the policy or policies shall have no recourse against the County (including its agents and agencies as aforesaid) for payment of any premiums or for assessments under any form of policy.
- (d) Any and all deductibles in the above described insurance policies shall be assumed by and be for the account of, and at the sole risk of, the Municipality.

AN ACT authorizing the County of Westchester to enter into an Intermunicipal Agreement with the City of Mount Vernon in order to provide reimbursement for prisoner transportation to the Westchester County Jail within the period from January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2026, for a total amount not to exceed \$631,024.00.

BE IT ENACTED, by the County Board of the County of Westchester, State of New York as follows:

Section 1. The County of Westchester (the "County") be and hereby is authorized to enter into an Intermunicipal Agreement ("IMA") with the City of Mount Vernon ("Mount Vernon") in order to reimburse Mount Vernon for the cost to transport prisoners round trip between Mount Vernon City Court and the Westchester County Jail located at Valhalla, New York, in the not to exceed amount of \$310,849.00 in 2025 and \$320,175.00 in 2026 for a total aggregate amount not to exceed \$631,024.00 for the term retroactive to January 1, 2025 and extending through December 31, 2026.

\$2. The County will reimburse Mount Vernon for prisoner transportation for the term January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025 at the following rates: \$245.00 per round trip with two police officers; \$367.00 per round trip with three police officers. The County will reimburse Mount Vernon for prisoner transportation for the term January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2026 at the following rates: \$252.00 per round trip with two police officers; \$378.00 per round trip with three police officers. Mount Vernon will also be reimbursed for vehicle usage between the City Court of Mount Vernon and the Westchester County Jail, which is agreed to be sixteen (16) miles each way, at the rate of seventy (\$.70) cents, or at the then current Internal Revenue Service mileage rate for the

term of the IMA. Mount Vernon will also be reimbursed for the actual and reasonable costs of meals provided to post-arraignment prisoners.

- §3. The County Executive or his authorized designee be and hereby is authorized and empowered to execute instruments and take all action necessary and appropriate to accomplish the purposes hereof.
 - §4. This Act shall take effect immediately.

PRISONER TRANSPORTATION: Except for prisoners arrested by the Westchester County Department of Public Safety Services, the Municipality shall provide round trip prisoner transportation using its own police department personnel and vehicles between the Municipality and the Westchester County Department of Correction (the "Department") for all prisoners remanded to the Westchester County Jail by court order or required to appear before the local Court within the Municipality. The County will reimburse

the Municipality for the actual number of round trips. The Municipality, where possible, shall hold prisoners for one daily trip to the Westchester County Jail.

2. <u>PAYMENT TERMS</u>: The Municipality shall be reimbursed by the County for prisoner transportation services at the following rates:

<u>2025</u> - \$245.00 per round trip with two police officers; \$367.00 per round trip with three police officers.

<u>2026</u> - \$252.00 per round trip with two police officers; \$378.00 per round trip with three police officers.

The Municipality shall also be reimbursed for vehicle usage between the City Court of Mount Vernon and the Westchester County Jail, which is deemed to be sixteen (16) miles each way, at the rate of sixty-seven cents (\$.70) per mile, or at the then current Internal Revenue Service mileage reimbursement rate for the term hereof.

The annual cost of this Agreement in 2025 shall not exceed \$310,849.00, and in 2026 shall not exceed \$320,175.00, for a total aggregate cost to the County pursuant to this Agreement which shall not exceed \$631,024.00.

Requests for reimbursement shall be submitted by the Municipality on a monthly basis on properly executed County claim forms and paid after approval by the Commissioner of the Department. The number of round trips made, prisoners transported and dates should be listed on the claim forms submitted to the Department. Reimbursement request shall be subject to audit by the County, and the Municipality shall keep and make available to the County such detailed books and records as are reasonably necessary to substantiate the basis for reimbursement. The Municipality shall not be entitled to reimbursement for any prisoner transportation expense not specifically provided for herein.

This Agreement shall be deemed executory only to the extent of the monies appropriated and available for the purpose of this Agreement and no liability on account hereof shall be incurred by the County beyond the amount of such monies.

- 3. <u>MEALS</u>: The County shall reimburse the Municipality for meals provided to post-arraignment prisoners for the actual and reasonable costs incurred and receipts submitted as part of the Municipality's monthly voucher submitted to the Department.
- 4. **TERM**: This Agreement shall commence retroactively on January 1, 2025 and shall expire on December 31, 2026. The County or the Municipality may, upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other party, terminate this Agreement in whole or in part when it deems it to be in its best interest. In such event, the Municipality shall be compensated and the County shall be liable only for payment for services rendered prior to the effective date of termination.
- 5. INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION: All personnel and vehicles engaged in prisoner transportation duties shall at all times remain and be deemed the employees and property of the Municipality. In addition to, and not in limitation of the insurance provisions contained in Schedule "A" of this Agreement, the Municipality agrees to indemnify, defend and hold the County, its officers, employees and agents harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, damage or expense the County may suffer as a result of any and all claims, demands, causes of action or judgments arising directly or indirectly out of the transportation of prisoners for which reimbursement is sought hereunder for losses arising out of the negligent acts or omissions of the Municipality, its agents or employees.
- 6. **ENTIRE AGREEMENT**: This Agreement constitutes the entire and integrated agreement between and among the parties hereto and supersedes any and all prior negotiations, commitments and writings. It shall not be released, discharged, changed or modified except by an instrument in writing signed by a duly authorized representative of each of the parties.

SCHEDULE "A"

STANDARD INSURANCE PROVISIONS (Municipality - LEO)

1. Prior to commencing work, and throughout the term of the Agreement, the Municipality shall obtain at its own cost and expense the required insurance as delineated below from insurance companies licensed in the State of New York, carrying a Best's financial rating of A or better. Municipality shall provide evidence of such insurance to the County of Westchester ("County"), either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County ("Director"). The policies or certificates thereof shall provide that ten (10) days prior to cancellation or material change in the policy, notices of same shall be given to the Director either by overnight mail or personal delivery for all of the following stated insurance policies. All notices shall name the Municipality and identify the Agreement.

If at any time any of the policies required herein shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing any such policy shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, the Municipality shall upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and submit the policy or the certificate as requested by the Director to the Office of Risk Management of the County for approval by the Director. Upon failure of the Municipality to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance, the Agreement, at the election of the County, may be declared suspended, discontinued or terminated.

Failure of the Municipality to take out, maintain, or the taking out or maintenance of any required insurance, shall not relieve the Municipality from any liability under the Agreement, nor shall the insurance requirements be construed to conflict with or otherwise limit the contractual obligations of the Municipality concerning indemnification.

All property losses shall be made payable to the "County of Westchester" and adjusted with the appropriate County personnel.

In the event that claims, for which the County may be liable, in excess of the insured amounts provided herein are filed by reason of Municipality's negligent acts or omissions under the Agreement or by virtue of the provisions of the labor law or other statute or any other reason, the amount of excess of such claims or any portion thereof, may be withheld from payment due or to become due the Municipality until such time as the Municipality shall furnish such additional security covering such claims in form satisfactory to the Director.

In the event of any loss, if the Municipality maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums identified herein, the County shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Municipality. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

- The Municipality shall provide proof of the following coverage (if additional coverage is required for a specific agreement, those requirements will be described in the Agreement):
 - a) Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability. Certificate form C-105.2 or State Fund Insurance Company form U-26.3 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Workers' Compensation Law. State Workers' Compensation Board form DB-120.1 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Disability Benefits Law. Location of operation shall be "All locations in Westchester County, New York."

Where an applicant claims to not be required to carry either a Workers' Compensation Policy or Disability Benefits Policy, or both, the employer must complete NYS form CE-200, available to download at: http://www.wcb.ny.gov.

If the employer is self-insured for Workers' Compensation, he/she should present a certificate from the New York State Worker's Compensation Board evidencing that fact (Either SI-12, Certificate of Workers' Compensation Self-Insurance, or GSI-105.2, Certificate of Participation in Workers' Compensation Group Self-Insurance).

- b) Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of \$5,000,000 (c.s.1) per occurrence limit naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis. This insurance shall include the following coverages:
 - i. Premises Operations.
 - ii. Broad Form Contractual.
 - iii. Independent Contractor and Sub-Contractor.
 - iv. Products and Completed Operations.
- c) Commercial Umbrella/Excess Insurance: This policy can be utilized to supplement the General Liability policy so as to yield a minimum total combined single limit of \$5,000,000 each Occurrence and Aggregate naming the "County of Westchester" as additional insured, written on a "follow the form" basis.

NOTE: Additional insured status shall be provided by standard or other endorsement that extends coverage to the County of Westchester for both on-going and completed operations.

- d) Automobile Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$5,000,000 for bodily injury and property damage unless otherwise indicated in the contract specifications. This insurance shall include for bodily injury and property damage (and can be provided within a Law Enforcement Liability or offered as a stand-alone policy) the following coverages and name the "County of Westchester" as additional insured:
 - (i) Owned automobiles.
 - (ii) Hired automobiles.
 - (iii) Non-owned automobiles.

- e) Law Enforcement Liability/Police Liability insurance The Municipality shall provide proof of such insurance naming the County as additionally insured. (Limits of \$5,000,000 per occurrence). This policy shall include but not be limited to: coverage for moon lighting, assault and battery, excessive force, failure to render medical attention, failed CPR, false arrest, deliberate indifference, misuse of fire arms, Abuse and Molestation, sexual, racial and other forms of harassment and discrimination, auto liability, mistakes resulting in harm.
- f) Professional Liability. The Municipality shall provide proof of such insurance. (Limits of \$5,000,000 per occurrence). This policy can be provided as a stand-alone policy or can be provided within a Law Enforcement Liability policy.
- g) Abuse and Molestation Liability, either by separate policy of insurance or through endorsement to the General Liability Policy or Professional Liability Policy, or can be provided within a Law Enforcement Liability policy. (Limits of \$5,000,000.00 per occurrence). This insurance shall include coverage for the following, including coverage for client on client, counselor client, and third parties:
 - (i) Misconduct
 - (ii) Abuse (including both physical and sexual)
 - (iii) Molestation
- 3. All policies of the Municipality shall be endorsed to contain the following clauses:
- (a) Insurers shall have no right to recovery or subrogation against the County (including its employees and other agents and agencies), it being the intention of the parties that the insurance policies so effected shall protect both parties and be primary coverage for any and all losses covered by the above-described insurance.
- (b) The clause "other insurance provisions" in a policy in which the County is named as an insured, shall not apply to the County.
- (c) The insurance companies issuing the policy or policies shall have no recourse against the County (including its agents and agencies as aforesaid) for payment of any premiums or for assessments under any form of policy.
- (d) Any and all deductibles in the above described insurance policies shall be assumed by and be for the account of, and at the sole risk of, the Municipality.

Attached for your consideration is an Act which, if approved by your Honorable Board, would authorize the County of Westchester (the "County") to enter into an intermunicipal agreement ("IMA") with the Village of Mount Kisco (the "Village") whereby the County, acting through its Department of Public Safety Services (the "Department"), will provide policing services to the Village for a term commencing retroactively on April 1, 2025 and expiring December 31, 2029.

Under the terms of the proposed IMA, the Department will provide, on a daily basis, policing services to the Village which shall include: 1.) Patrol services consisting of the assignment of seventeen (17) police officer full time equivalents ("FTEs) to patrol the Village in consultation and coordination with the Village, with at least two (2) police officers, each with a patrol car, at any given time; 2.) Investigative services consisting of three (3) detective FTEs assigned at such times as the Department shall deem appropriate, in consultation with the Village, in order to investigate matters that arise in the Village; and 3.) First-line police supervisors consisting of the assignment of five (5) police sergeant FTEs with one (1) police sergeant FTE provided with a patrol car at all times.

The Village will pay the County a sum (the "Annual Fee") equal to the County's costs, including but not limited to salary, overtime, holiday pay, shift differential, and fringe benefits. The Village will pay the Annual Fee in two (2) equal installments due July 1st and December 1st each year. The prorated Annual Fee for the 2025 year of the IMA (April 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025) is \$5,917,237.00. The County will give the Village a credit toward the cost of retiree healthcare included within the Annual Fee. Such credit will be equal to \$1,000.00 per month for each of the eleven (11) former Village employees hired by the County on June 1, 2015 for as long as such employee remains on County payroll for the provision of these services.

By October 1st of years 1 through 4 of the IMA, the County will notify the Village of the Annual Fee for the upcoming year. In the event that either the County or the Village determines that the Annual Fee for any year of the IMA does not accurately reflect the cost to the County for providing the services, or that the policing services provided to the Village do not accurately reflect the scope of services contracted for herein or meet the needs of the Village, either party, on upon sixty (60) days written notice, may schedule a meeting to discuss whether adjustments

to the Annual Fee or scope of additional policing services is warranted. The Village will make any additional payments based on this adjustment calculation for the previous year in two (2) equal installments, payable on or before July 1st and December 1st of the upcoming year of the IMA. If a credit is due, the Village may deduct the amount of such credit from the next payment due to the County. For the final year of the IMA, any credit due to the Village, or additional charge owed by the Village, will be made within thirty (30) days of the expiration of the IMA by the appropriate party.

As your Honorable Board may recall, the County has been providing police services to the Village pursuant to various IMAs since 2015 under substantially the same terms, and the most recent IMA for these services expired on March 31, 2025.

I believe that entering into the IMA with the Village is in the best interests of the County. Therefore, I recommend your favorable action on the annexed proposed Act.

It should be noted that approval of the Act authorizing the County to enter into the IMA requires the affirmative vote of a majority of the voting strength of your Honorable Board.

Your Committee believes that this IMA is in the best interest of the County. Therefore, your Committee recommends adoption of the proposed attached Act.

An Act authorizing the County of Westchester (the "County") to enter into an inter-municipal agreement with the Village of Mount Kisco (the "Village") whereby the County, acting through its Department of Public Safety Services, will provide police services to the Village for a term commencing on April 1, 2025 and expiring December 31, 2029.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED by the County Board of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. The County of Westchester (the "County") is hereby authorized to enter into an intermunicipal agreement ("IMA") with the Village of Mount Kisco (the "Village") for a term commencing retroactively on April 1, 2025 and expiring December 31, 2029, whereby the County, acting through its Department of Public Safety Services (the "Department"), will provide additional general police services to the Village.

- which will include: 1.) Patrol services consisting of the assignment of seventeen (17) police officer full time equivalents ("FTEs) to patrol the Village in consultation and coordination with the Village, with at least two (2) police officers, each with a patrol car, at any given time; 2.) Investigative services consisting of three (3) detective FTEs assigned at such times as the Department shall deem appropriate, in consultation with the Village, in order to investigate matters that arise in the Village; and 3.) First-line police supervisors consisting of the assignment of five (5) police sergeant FTE's with one (1) police sergeant FTE provided with a patrol car at all times.
- §3. The Village will pay the County a sum equal to the County's costs, including but not limited to salary, overtime, holiday pay, shift differential, and fringe benefits for that period.

- §4. The County Executive or his authorized designee is hereby authorized and empowered to execute all instruments and to take all action necessary and appropriate to effectuate the purposes hereof.
 - §5. This Act shall take effect immediately.

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THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, a municipal corporation of the State of New York, having an office and place of business in the Michaelian Office Building, 148 Martine Avenue, White Plains, New York 10601 (hereafter the "County"),

and

THE VILLAGE OF MOUNT KISCO, a municipal corporation of the State of New York, having an office and place of business located at 104 Main Street, Mount Kisco, New York 10549 (hereafter the "Village"),

(The County and the Village shall be referred to each as a "Party" and collectively as the "Parties").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Village desires to obtain policing services from the County, acting through its Department of Public Safety (the "Department"); and

WHEREAS, the Parties have successfully concluded negotiations and have agreed on the relevant terms and conditions pursuant to which such policing services will be provided; and

WHEREAS, Article 5-G of the General Municipal Law authorizes municipal corporations to enter into, amend, cancel and terminate agreements for the performance among themselves or one for the other of their respective functions, powers and duties on a cooperative or contract basis; and

WHEREAS, the Village and County intend to provide cost-effective policing services to the Village; and

WHEREAS, no rights of the Village or its officers shall be deemed curtailed, transferred or abolished pursuant to or by virtue of this Agreement; and;

WHEREAS, the Village has duly adopted a Resolution authorizing its Mayor to execute an agreement with the County whereby the County will provide policing services to the Village for the compensation and upon the terms described below; and

WHEREAS, the County is authorized to enter into this agreement to provide such policing services to the Village for the compensation and upon the terms described below.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms and conditions herein contained, the Parties agree as follows:

FIRST: The Department shall provide general policing services to the Village which shall include: 1) patrol services consisting of the assignment of seventeen (17) police officer full time equivalents ("FTE's) to patrol the Village in consultation and coordination with the Village, with at least two police officers, each with a patrol car, at any given time; 2) investigative services consisting of three detective FTE's assigned at such times as the Department shall deem appropriate, in consultation with the Village, in order to investigate matters requiring same that arise in the Village; and 3) first-line police supervisors consisting of the assignment of five police sergeant FTE's with one assigned, with a patrol car, at all times. The above described services to be provided to the Village shall be the primary job duties of such Department personnel when they are assigned to provide such services.

The scope of policing services to be provided to the Village is more particularly described in Schedule "A" attached hereto and made part hereof. Notwithstanding any other provision within this Agreement, the Village may upon not less than sixty (60) days written notice to the County, modify the aforementioned contract staffing to accommodate either the Village's budgetary constraints or additional policing needs.

SECOND: For the services rendered pursuant to Paragraph "FIRST", the Village shall pay the County a sum (the "Annual Fee") equal to the County's actual costs, including but not limited to salary, overtime, holiday pay, shift differential, fringe benefits, and additional communications personnel costs. The Village shall pay the Annual Fee in two equal installments due July 1st and December 1st. The Annual Fee for the 2025 year of the Agreement (April, 2025)

through December, 2025) is \$5,914,398.00. Attached hereto and made a part hereof as Schedule "B" is a budget upon which the Annual Fee for the 2025 year of the Agreement is based, as well as a projected budget for each subsequent year of the Agreement. The Parties acknowledge and agree that this Annual Fee may require adjustment based on salary and benefit increases required under applicable collective bargaining agreements and as provided in Paragraph FIRST. The County shall give the Village a credit toward the cost of retiree healthcare included within the Annual Fee. Such credit shall be equal to \$1,000.00 per month for each of the twenty-five (25) former Village employees hired by the County on June 1, 2015 for as long as such employee remains on the County payroll for the provision of services outlined in Paragraph "FIRST" of this Agreement. As of the execution date of this agreement, there are eleven (11) such former Village employees on the County payroll.

On or about October 1st of years 1 through 4 of this Agreement, the County shall notify the Village of the Annual Fee for the upcoming year. The County shall also provide the Village with a budget in support of the Annual Fee for each of the remaining years of the Agreement.

Subject to the provisions set forth above, in the event that either the County or the Village determines that the Annual Fee for any year of the Agreement does not accurately reflect the cost to the County for providing the services, or that the policing services provided to the Village does not accurately reflect the scope of services contracted for herein or meet the needs of the Village, either Party, on upon sixty (60) days written notice, may schedule a meeting to discuss whether adjustments to the Annual Fee or scope of policing services is warranted. Any requested adjustment(s) shall be supported by documentation sufficiently detailing the basis for the requested adjustment. If any such notice seeks to modify any prospective Annual Fee, such notice shall be provided at least One Hundred and Twenty (120) days before the beginning of the fiscal year for which the Annual Fee is being adjusted. The Village shall make any additional payments based on this adjustment calculation for the previous year in two equal installments, payable on or before July 1st and December 1st of the upcoming year of this Agreement. If a credit is due, the Village may deduct the amount of such credit from the next payment due to the County. For the final year of this Agreement, any credit due to the Village, or additional charge owed by the Village, shall be made within thirty (30) days of the expiration of this Agreement by the appropriate Party.

Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, the Parties agree that in computing the actual cost of providing police services to the Village, the County shall calculate such figures or true up the costs not less than annually and shall contemporaneously provide copies of such figures to the Village to insure that all Parties are fully familiar with the actual cost of the policing services, as compared to projected costs. Should these figures substantially deviate from the proposed Annual Fee, the Village shall have the right to renegotiate the scope of services provided in Schedule "A" to avoid any potential for cost overruns. In addition, the County agrees to provide monthly reports to the Village on overtime spending. The Parties do hereby further agree that any adjustments to a single year's Annual Fee (truing up) shall not result in a truing up cost to exceed One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) annually without such number having been properly reflected, disclosed or trended in the aforementioned monthly reports and duly consented to by the Village.

Similarly, no prospectively proposed increase in any given year's projected Annual Fee (as set forth in Schedule B), shall exceed two percent (2%) of such projected number unless the number is presented and documented as soon as practicable to the Village by the County.

THIRD: The Village agrees that for so long as this Agreement is effective, the Department shall have joint use of the Village police facility at 40 Green Street, Mount Kisco, New York for purposes of conducting policing services for the Village at no charge to the County. The Village will provide a clearly delineated amount of space in the existing police facility limited to furnished office space for three detectives, space for reporting writing and interviews, a locker room and bathroom facilities for officers assigned to the Village patrol force, and a prisoner detention facility consisting of at least one regular prisoner cell and one temporary prisoner holding cell or cage. The Village shall, during all such times, continue to maintain the police facility, including the provision of utilities and janitorial services at no cost to the County.

The Village also agrees that for so long as this Agreement is effective, the County, its employees, agents and contractors shall have access to the Village's radio communications tower for the purpose of maintaining radio equipment for police communications and also allowing for the installation of such additional equipment as may be necessary or desirable for the maintenance or enhancement of police communications.

FOURTH: The term of this Agreement shall commence retroactively on April 1, 2025 ("Effective Date") and shall expire on December 31, 2029 ("Expiration Date"), unless sooner terminated in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement. Should such termination occur, the Village shall be responsible to the County for the Annual Fee on a per diem basis.

<u>FIFTH:</u> (a) Either Party, upon one (1) year's notice to the other Party, may terminate this Agreement when the terminating Party deems it to be in its best interest.

(b) In the event that there has been a material breach by either Party of any of the terms of the Agreement and such breach remains uncured for thirty (30) days after service on the breaching Party of written notice thereof, or in the event that such breach is not susceptible of being cured within such thirty (30) days, such cure has not been commenced within such period and diligently pursued and completed within a reasonable time thereafter, the non-breaching Party, in addition to any other right or remedy it might have, may terminate this Agreement. Notice hereunder shall be effective on the date of receipt.

Upon termination or expiration of this Agreement, the County shall reimburse the Village for any advance payments made by the Village prior to such termination or expiration. The Village shall satisfy any and all arrears to the County. Any such adjustments shall be made by the responsible Party within thirty days of termination or expiration of this Agreement. In the event of a dispute as to the value of the services rendered by the County prior to the date of termination, it is understood and agreed that the Commissioner of Public Safety ("Commissioner") shall determine the value of such services rendered by the County. Subject to the provisions set forth above, the Village shall accept such reasonable and good faith determination, which will be supported by documentation provided to the Village, as final. Upon termination or expiration of this Agreement, the County shall deliver all relevant records to the Village and shall deliver the police facility to the Village within a mutually agreed upon reasonable time in order to allow the County sufficient time to produce records and to remove its equipment and items.

<u>SIXTH:</u> In addition to, and not in limitation of the insurance requirements contained in Schedule "C" entitled "Standard Insurance Provisions", attached hereto and made a part hereof, the Village agrees:

- (a) that except for the amount, if any, of damage contributed to, caused by, or resulting from the sole negligence of the County, the Village shall indemnify and hold harmless the County, its officers, employees and agents from and against any and all liability, damage, claims, demands, costs, judgments, fees, attorneys' fees or loss arising directly or indirectly out of the acts or omissions hereunder by the Village or third parties under the direction or control of the Village; and
- (b) to provide defense for and defend, at its sole expense, any and all claims, demands or causes of action directly or indirectly arising out of the acts or omissions hereunder by the Village or third parties under the direction or control of the Village and to bear all other costs and expenses related thereto.
- (c) In the event the Village does not provide the above defense and indemnification to the County, and such refusal or denial to provide the above defense and indemnification is found to be in breach of this provision, then the Village shall reimburse the County's reasonable attorney's fees incurred in connection with the defense of any action, and in connection with enforcing this provision of the Agreement.

SEVENTH: The County agrees to self-insure all liability for bodily injury and death and/or property damage under the County's self-insurance program in accordance with Local Law 6-1986 and Chapter 295 of the Laws of Westchester County. Such self-insurance shall insure against all costs, damages, expenses and/or any payment of any and all claims, accidents and injuries, and all damages whatsoever caused to any person or any property. Attached hereto as Schedule "D", is a written assurance from the County of its decision to self-insure. In addition to, and not in limitation of the above, the County agrees:

(a) that except for the amount, if any, of damage contributed to, caused by, or resulting from the sole negligence of the Village, the County shall indemnify and hold harmless the Village, its officers, employees and agents from and against any and all liability, damage, claims, demands, costs, judgments, fees, attorneys' fees or loss arising directly or indirectly out of the acts or omissions hereunder by the County or third parties under the direction or control of the County; and

(b) to provide defense for and defend, at its sole expense, any and all claims, demands or causes of action directly or indirectly arising out of the acts or omissions hereunder by the County or third parties under the direction or control of the County and to bear all other costs and expenses related thereto.

(c) In the event the County does not provide the above defense and indemnification to the Village, and such refusal or denial to provide the above defense and indemnification is found to be in breach of this provision, then the County shall reimburse the Village's reasonable attorney's fees incurred in connection with the defense of any action, and in connection with enforcing this provision of the Agreement.

EIGHTH: All notices of any nature referred to in this Agreement shall be in writing and sent by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, postage pre-paid, or sent by hand or overnight delivery, or sent by facsimile (with acknowledgement received and a copy of the notice sent by overnight courier) to the respective addresses set forth below or to such other addresses as the respective Parties hereto may designate in writing:

NINTH: This Agreement and its attachments constitute the entire Agreement between the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede all previous negotiations, commitments and writings. The recitals set forth in this Agreement are incorporated into the body of this Agreement as if they had been originally set forth herein. This Agreement shall not be released, discharged, changed or modified except by an instrument in writing signed by a duly authorized representative of each of the Parties. In the event of any conflict between this Agreement and any of its attachments, the terms of this Agreement shall control.

In the event that any term or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or void or unenforceable, the remainder of the terms and provisions of this Agreement shall in no way be affected, impaired, or invalidated, and to the extent permitted by applicable law, any such term or provision shall be restricted in applicability or reformed to the minimum extent required for such to be enforceable. This provision shall be interpreted and enforced to give effect to the original written intent of the Parties as expressed herein prior to the determination of such invalidity or unenforceability.

<u>TENTH:</u> This Agreement is not intended to create a partnership or joint venture between the Parties, nor an employer/employee relationship. Instead, the County shall be deemed an independent contractor in the providing of policing services to the Village.

ELEVENTH: Pursuant to Section 308.01 of the Laws of Westchester County, it is the goal of the County to use its best efforts to encourage, promote and increase the participation of business enterprises owned and controlled by persons of color or women in contracts and projects funded by all departments of the County. Under this IMA it is recognized and understood that the County encourages the Municipality to do similarly.

TWELFTH: Any purported delegation of duties or assignment of rights under this Agreement by one Party without the prior express written consent of the other is void.

THIRTEENTH: This Agreement may be executed simultaneously in several counterparts, each of which shall be an original and all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument.

FOURTEENTH: Nothing in this Agreement shall provide any benefit to any third party or entitle any third party to any claim, cause of action, remedy or right of any kind, it being the intent of the Parties that this Agreement shall not be construed as a third party beneficiary contract.

<u>FIFTEENTH:</u> All exhibits or schedules referred to in this Agreement and attached hereto are incorporated herein by reference.

<u>SIXTEENTH:</u> Each Party hereto shall keep complete and accurate records of its operations hereunder and shall maintain such data as may be necessary to determine with reasonable accuracy any item relevant to this Agreement. Each Party shall have the right to examine all such records insofar as may be necessary for the purpose of ascertaining the reasonableness and accuracy of any statements of costs relating to transactions hereunder.

SEVENTEENTH: This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of New York. Should any provision of this Agreement for any reason be declared invalid or unenforceable by final and non-appealable order of any court or regulatory body having jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions, and the remaining portions shall remain in full force and effect as if this Agreement had been executed without the invalid portion.

EIGHTEENTH: This Agreement shall not be enforceable until signed by all Parties and approved by the Office of the County Attorney.

SCHEDULE "A"

Supplementing Paragraph "FIRST", this Schedule "A" is intending to more particularly describe the core policing services, specific items covered, services incidentally included and items expressly excluded or reserved by the Village:

Core Additional Policing Services:

County shall provide 3 police officers and one supervisor on the day tour, 3 police officers and one supervisor on the evening tour and 2 police officers and one supervisor on the overnight tour, with such police officers being assigned to patrol duties, within the municipal boundaries of the Village of Mount Kisco and the Byram Lake Reservoir Watershed Area. The County shall assign 3 detectives exclusively to the Village.

Mount Kisco Police Patrol Sector Checks:

Reporting of non-functioning street lights, traffic control signals and traffic control signs that need repair or replacement to Department of Public Works.

Water line breaks and sanitary sewer overflows reported to Public Works when first observed. Patrol checks of all village owned buildings and facilities, (doors locked and perimeter check) of Village Hall, Library, Senior Center, Byram Lake Water Filtration Plant (gate locked), Byram Lake Reservoir Pump Station (gate locked), water lift stations (Hillside and Chase), water tanks (gates locked: Mountain & Emery Street; driveway off of Rolling Ridge), Saw Mill Sewer Pump Station, sewer lift stations (Radio Circle Drive, Cold Spring Court), Leonard Park Multi-Purpose Building and Leonard Park Teahouse, Public Safety/Court Building, Mutual Fire House, Green Street Fire House, Independent Fire House, Mount Kisco Volunteer Ambulance Corps, Kirbyville Schoolhouse, Maple Avenue Community Center.

Patrol of all parks and recreation facilities (Leonard Park and pool complex, Fox Park, Kirby Plaza, Flewellyn Park, Maple Avenue Park, St. Mark's Cemetery, Conservation Areas defined and regulated under Chapter 54 of the Village Code).

Central business district checks of storefronts and back parking lots.

Police presence to meet all evening trains (after sunset) and checking of sidewalk under Route 133 to North Moger Parking Lot.

Mid-Night tours from November 15 - April 1: winter overnight parking restrictions for snow removal.

Drive through and check of Public Works and Parks maintenance buildings.

Assistance with overcrowding conditions; Notify building inspector of conditions upon entry by police in response to a police matter (Establish protocol for coordination with Building Department).

Dark House patrol and checks.

Other on/off street parking enforcement, particularly during evening and overnight tours.

Byram Lake Reservoir Security and watershed enforcement.

Inspect taxicabs at Taxicab Stand to ensure proper licensing of taxicabs and taxicab drivers under Chapter 98 of the Village Code.

Additional Administrative duties:

Background checks on new hires.

Participation in Drug Council Program.

Assistance with processing Cabaret and Peddling licenses including State Liquor Authority licensing process.

Monthly notice to Clerical staff for Alarm billing based off of IMPACT software.

Conduct letters: applicants to apply to WCPD directly.

WCPD to assist with taxi cab and license inspection and permitting program by processing fingerprinting and background checks in accordance with §98-7 and §98-10 of the Village Code. (MK limits the number of cabs).

WCPD to perform all required fingerprinting for various purposes.

Coordination of police coverage with Village for all special events; i.e. Parades (St. Patrick's Day, Memorial Day, Little League, Fire Parade) and 9-11 memorial (use available Village staff to minimize Police overtime costs) (street closing and postings for no parking).

Court appearances to be scheduled when involved officer is scheduled to work regular tour to the greatest extent possible.

Continue with current initiatives in crime prevention – targeted patrol details.

Assignment of staff duties to patrol sergeants; i.e. traffic committee, facilities management.

Alarm calls for DPW water and sewer lift stations go to PD and need to be forwarded onto Public Works.

Assistance with DPW operations for overnight snow removal, line painting, utility repairs "Dig Safe" Notices go to PD as well as DPW and others.

When feasible or practical, WCPD will provide one Spanish-speaking officer per 8- hour tour.

When feasible or practical, WCPD will endeavor to maintain consistency in assignment of personnel (same group of people generally).

When feasible or practical, WCPD will regularly conduct foot patrols of the downtown area.

WCPD and Village leadership shall convene on a quarterly basis to discuss operational issues and review reporting.

To the extent practical, WCPD shall report to the Village on a monthly basis on the amount and types of VTL and local law violations.

To the extent feasible, WCPD shall endeavor to distinguish the OCR reporting for the Village from that of the rest of the County.

<u>Village Police Jurisdiction to Remain Unchanged and list of Services Exclusively Retained</u> by Village:

The Village of Mount Kisco shall retain jurisdiction to perform any and all of the above-referenced functions, irrespective of County's contracting for services. Notwithstanding the

County's contractual obligations set forth above, the Village's jurisdiction shall be expressly deemed to include but not be limited to core functions, patrols, investigations, background checks, investigations, sector checks, licensing, administrative functions and the like.

As to retained functions of the Village and not deemed part of the IMA:

Courtroom security- Primary courtroom security will be provided by Village. The County may provide additional officers, as needed, provided such service is provided on a non-overtime basis.

The Village reserves the right to utilize its own employees (e.g. parking and traffic control agents), as needed, to perform non-sworn police officer duties such as traffic control, parking enforcement and similar duties.

SCHEDULE "C"

STANDARD INSURANCE PROVISIONS (Municipality - LEO)

1. Prior to commencing work, and throughout the term of the Agreement, the Municipality shall obtain at its own cost and expense the required insurance as delineated below from insurance companies licensed in the State of New York, carrying a Best's financial rating of A or better. Municipality shall provide evidence of such insurance to the County of Westchester ("County"), either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County ("Director"). The policies or certificates thereof shall provide that ten (10) days prior to cancellation or material change in the policy, notices of same shall be given to the Director either by overnight mail or personal delivery for all of the following stated insurance policies. All notices shall name the Municipality and identify the Agreement.

If at any time any of the policies required herein shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing any such policy shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, the Municipality shall upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and submit the policy or the certificate as requested by the Director to the Office of Risk Management of the County for approval by the Director. Upon failure of the Municipality to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance, the Agreement, at the election of the County, may be declared suspended, discontinued or terminated.

Failure of the Municipality to take out, maintain, or the taking out or maintenance of any required insurance, shall not relieve the Municipality from any liability under the Agreement, nor shall the insurance requirements be construed to conflict with or otherwise limit the contractual obligations of the Municipality concerning indemnification.

All property losses shall be made payable to the "County of Westchester" and adjusted with the appropriate County personnel.

In the event that claims, for which the County may be liable, in excess of the insured amounts provided herein are filed by reason of Municipality's negligent acts or omissions under the Agreement or by virtue of the provisions of the labor law or other statute or any other reason, the amount of excess of such claims or any portion thereof, may be withheld from payment due or to become due the Municipality until such time as the Municipality shall furnish such additional security covering such claims in form satisfactory to the Director.

In the event of any loss, if the Municipality maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums identified herein, the County shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Municipality. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

- The Municipality shall provide proof of the following coverage (if additional coverage is required for a specific agreement, those requirements will be described in the Agreement):
 - a) Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability. Certificate form C-105.2 or State Fund Insurance Company form U-26.3 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Workers' Compensation Law. State Workers' Compensation Board form DB-120.1 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Disability Benefits Law. Location of operation shall be "All locations in Westchester County, New York."

Where an applicant claims to not be required to carry either a Workers' Compensation Policy or Disability Benefits Policy, or both, the employer must complete NYS form CE-200, available to download at: http://www.wcb.ny.gov.

If the employer is self-insured for Workers' Compensation, he/she should present a certificate from the New York State Worker's Compensation Board evidencing that fact (Either SI-12, Certificate of Workers' Compensation Self-Insurance, or GSI-105.2, Certificate of Participation in Workers' Compensation Group Self-Insurance).

- b) Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 (c.s.1) per occurrence limit naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis. This insurance shall include the following coverages:
 - i. Premises Operations.
 - ii. Broad Form Contractual.
 - iii. Independent Contractor and Sub-Contractor.
 - iv. Products and Completed Operations.
- c) Commercial Umbrella/Excess Insurance: \$2,000,000 each Occurrence and Aggregate naming the "County of Westchester" as additional insured, written on a "follow the form" basis.


NOTE: Additional insured status shall be provided by standard or other endorsement that extends coverage to the County of Westchester for both on-going and completed operations.

- d) Automobile Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$5,000,000 for bodily injury and a minimum limit of \$100,000 per occurrence for property damage or a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 unless otherwise indicated in the contract specifications. This insurance shall include for bodily injury and property damage the following coverages and name the "County of Westchester" as additional insured:
 - (i) Owned automobiles.
 - (ii) Hired automobiles.
 - (iii) Non-owned automobiles.
- e) Law Enforcement Liability/Police Liability insurance The Municipality shall provide proof of such insurance naming the County as additionally insured. (Limits of \$5,000,000 per occurrence).

- 3. All policies of the Municipality shall be endorsed to contain the following clauses:
- (a) Insurers shall have no right to recovery or subrogation against the County (including its employees and other agents and agencies), it being the intention of the Parties that the insurance policies so effected shall protect both Parties and be primary coverage for any and all losses covered by the above-described insurance.
- (b) The clause "other insurance provisions" in a policy in which the County is named as an insured, shall not apply to the County.
- (c) The insurance companies issuing the policy or policies shall have no recourse against the County (including its agents and agencies as aforesaid) for payment of any premiums or for assessments under any form of policy.
- (d) Any and all deductibles in the above described insurance policies shall be assumed by and be for the account of, and at the sole risk of, the Municipality.

Transmitted herewith for your review and approval is an Act which, if adopted by your Honorable Board, would authorize the County of Westchester ("County"), acting by and through its Department of Public Safety, to enter into an inter-municipal agreement ("IMA") with Putnam Northern Westchester BOCES ("BOCES"), a municipal corporation as defined in Article 5-G of the New York State General Municipal Law, pursuant to which BOCES will coordinate and present a portion of the Bureau of Justice Assistance's STOP School Violence Program by implementing Project Schools Transforming Real Interventions to Violence ("Project STRIV") at various public, private, parochial and charter schools throughout Westchester County, for a term commencing on October 1, 2025 and continuing through September 30, 2026. In consideration for services rendered, the County will pay BOCES an amount not to exceed \$212,000.00, payable in accordance with an approved budget and payment schedule.

Project STRIV, which is funded through a grant from the U.S. Department of Justice ("DOJ"), will expand and build upon existing school violence prevention initiatives and implement trainings to provide students, parents and school personnel with tools to recognize, respond quickly to, and prevent acts of violence. Training will be directed at the safety of the school communities to ensure the development of a positive school community climate and culture where students feel safe, accepted and respected regardless of their gender, race culture or sexual orientation.

Under the proposed IMA, BOCES will offer additional Comprehensive School Threat Assessment Guidelines ("CSTAG") and Digital Threat Assessment trainings. The focused trainings will offer coordinated strategies to increase the levels of security and safety within the school environment. The digital training will help attendees get a better understanding of the social media world and online activity and what tools and methods are available to identify online threat related behavior to prevent tragedy and intervene when worrisome behavior is observed.

I have been advised that because the definition of "municipal corporation" under New York General Municipal Law § 119-n includes "Boards of Cooperative Educational Services", the proposed agreement constitutes an IMA requiring your Honorable Board's approval.

I have been further advised that the proposed IMA is exempt from the requirements of the Westchester County Procurement Policy and Procedures (the "County Procurement Policy") pursuant to section 3(a)xviii thereof, which exempts "any procurement for the purpose of entering into a contract or contracts with persons for the creation and support of recreation

entering into a contract or contracts with persons for the creation and support of recreation projects, youth service projects and other appropriate programs and services for prevention of delinquency and youth crime and the advancement of the moral, physical, mental and social well being of the youth in Westchester County." In addition, these services are funded with Federal grant monies and are, pursuant to Section 11 of the County Procurement Policy, subject to Federal procurement requirements. The Federal procurement regulations (2 CFR§ 200.320) require that contracts in amounts equal to or less than \$250,000.00, be procured competitively, unless such contracts are deemed to be "non-competitive" procurements. In accordance with 2 CFR§ 200.320(c)(4), the County's STOP DWI Office contacted the DOJ requesting that it authorize a non-competitive proposal in this case. The DOJ subsequently approved BOCES as one of the sub awardees under the grant.

Based on the importance of this program to the County, your favorable action on the proposed Act is respectfully requested.

AN ACT authorizing the County of Westchester to enter into an inter-municipal Agreement with Putnam Northern Westchester BOCES, pursuant to which the municipal corporation will coordinate and present a portion of the Bureau of Justice Assistance's STOP School Violence Program by implementing Project Schools Transforming Real Interventions to Violence. for a term commencing on October 1, 2025 and expiring on September 30, 2026, for a total amount not to exceed \$212,000.00.

BE IT ENACTED, by the County Board of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. The County of Westchester (the "County"), acting by and through its Department of Public Safety, is hereby authorized to enter into an inter-municipal agreement (the "IMA") with Putnam Northern Westchester BOCES ("BOCES"), in substantially the form attached hereto, pursuant to which BOCES will coordinate and present a portion of the Bureau of Justice Assistance's STOP School Violence Program, by implementing Project Schools Transforming Real Interventions to Violence ("Project STRIV") at various public, private, parochial and charter schools throughout Westchester County, for a term commencing on October 1, 2025 and continuing through September 30, 2026.

- §2. In consideration for services rendered, the County shall pay BOCES an amount not-to-exceed \$212,000.00, payable in accordance with an approved budget and payment schedule.
- §3. The County Executive or his duly authorized designee is hereby authorized and empowered to execute any and all documents appropriate and necessary to effectuate the purposes hereof.
 - §4. This Act shall take effect immediately.

THIS AGREEMENT, made	, by and between

THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, a municipal corporation of the State of New York, having an office and place of business in the Michaelian Office Building, 148 Martine Avenue, White Plains, New York 10601 (hereinafter referred to as the "County")

and

PNW BOCES (Putnam Northern Westchester Boards of Cooperative Educational Services), a public organization that provides shared educational programs and services to school districts, having an office and principal place of business at 200 Boces Drive, Yorktown Heights, New York 10598 (hereinafter referred to as the "Agency" or "Contractor")

WHEREAS, the County desires to obtain professional services in connection with coordinating the Bureau of Justice Assistance's STOP School Violence Program by implementing Project Schools Transforming Real Interventions ("Project STRIV") that will help improve school safety by providing students, parents and school personnel with tools to recognize, respond quickly, and prevent acts of violence and to help ensure a positive school climate; and

WHEREAS, the Agency helps to create, present and implement curriculum-based school violence prevention and early intervention programming, and training in schools, throughout Westchester County; and

WHEREAS, the County desires to retain the Agency to present and coordinate the CSTAG (Comprehensive School Threat Assessment Guidelines) and Digital Threat Assessment trainings portion of the Project STRIV program; and

WHEREAS, the Agency desires to provide such services for the compensation and on the terms herein provided.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms and conditions herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

FIRST: The Agency shall coordinate and present the threat assessment trainings portion of the Project STRIV program, as more particularly described in the Agency's Scope of Services which is attached hereto and made a part hereof as Schedule "A" (hereinafter the "Services"). The Services shall be carried out by the Agency in accordance with current industry standards and trade practices.

SECOND: The term of this Agreement shall commence on October 1, 2025 and shall terminate on September 30, 2026, unless terminated earlier pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement.

All Services rendered and work performed by the Agency shall be under the direction and subject to the complete approval of the Westchester County Commissioner of Public Safety or his duly authorized designee (the "Commissioner").

<u>THIRD:</u> For the Services rendered pursuant to Paragraph "FIRST," the Agency shall be paid an amount not to exceed TWO HUNDRED TWELVE THOUSAND AND 00/100 (\$212,000.00) DOLLARS, payable in accordance with the Budget and payment schedule set forth in Schedule "B", which is attached hereto and made a part hereof.

The Agency shall submit an invoice in support of each and every request for payment to be made, including any request for partial payment if such is permitted hereunder. Each such invoice shall be uniquely numbered and shall only be paid after approval by the Commissioner. In no event shall *final* payment be made to the Agency prior to completion of all Services, the submission of reports and the approval of same by the Commissioner.

Except as otherwise expressly stated in this Agreement, no payment shall be made by the County to the Agency for out of pocket expenses or disbursements made in connection with the services rendered or the work to be performed hereunder.

The Agency shall, at no additional charge, furnish all labor, services, materials, tools, equipment and other appliances necessary to complete the Services, unless specific additional charges are expressly permitted under this Agreement. It is recognized and understood that even if specific additional charges are expressly permitted under this Agreement, in no event shall total payment to the Agency exceed the not-to-exceed amount set forth above.

FOURTH: Prior to the making of any payments hereunder, the County may, at its option, audit such books and records of the Agency as are reasonably pertinent to this Agreement to substantiate the basis for payment. The County will not withhold payment pursuant to this paragraph for more than thirty (30) days after payment would otherwise be due pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement, unless the County shall find cause to withhold payment in the course of such audit or

because of failure of the Agency to cooperate with such audit. The County shall, in addition, have the right to audit such books and records subsequent to payment.

FIFTH: The Agency shall issue progress reports to the County as the Commissioner may direct and shall immediately inform the Commissioner in writing of any cause for delay in the performance of its obligations under this Agreement. The Commissioner shall receive a copy of all such progress reports and shall use said reports in determining the progress of this contract and in such evaluation in deciding to award future contracts. In addition, the County shall have the right to periodically monitor and record the Agency's performance during the term of the contract.

SIXTH: The parties recognize and acknowledge that the obligations of the County under this Agreement are subject to the County's receipt of funding from the U.S. Department of Justice. The Agency agrees that the County shall not be liable for any of the payments hereunder unless and until the County Commissioner of Finance has received said funds.

If, for any reason, the full amount of said funds is not paid over or made available to the County by the U.S. Department of Justice, the County may terminate this Agreement immediately or reduce the amount payable to the Agency, in the discretion of the County. The County shall give prompt notice of any such termination or reduction to the Agency. If the County subsequently offers to pay a reduced amount to the Agency, then the Agency shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon reasonable prior written notice.

In addition, the parties recognize and acknowledge that the obligations of the County under this Agreement are subject to annual appropriations by its Board of Legislators pursuant to the Laws of Westchester County. Therefore, this Agreement shall be deemed executory only to the extent of the monies appropriated and available. The County shall have no liability under this Agreement beyond funds appropriated and available for payment pursuant to this Agreement. The parties understand and intend that the obligation of the County hereunder shall constitute a current expense of the County and shall not in any way be construed to be a debt of the County in contravention of any applicable constitutional or statutory limitations or requirements concerning the creation of indebtedness by the County, nor shall anything contained in this Agreement constitute a pledge of the general tax revenues, funds or moneys of the County. The County shall pay amounts due under this Agreement exclusively from legally available funds appropriated for this purpose. The County shall retain the right, upon the occurrence of the adoption of any County Budget by its Board of

Legislators during the term of this Agreement or any amendments thereto, and for a reasonable period of time after such adoption(s), to conduct an analysis of the impacts of any such County Budget on County finances. After such analysis, the County shall retain the right to either terminate this Agreement or to renegotiate the amounts and rates set forth herein. If the County subsequently offers to pay a reduced amount to the Agency, then the Agency shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon reasonable prior written notice.

Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, the parties hereto agree that should funding levels change or services not be performed by the Agency hereunder, the County's payment obligation will cease and any unexpended money owed the County shall be repaid by the Agency within thirty (30) days of notification by the County.

SEVENTH: (a) The County, upon ten (10) days notice to the Agency, may terminate this Agreement in whole or in part when the County deems it to be in its best interest. In such event, the Agency shall be compensated and the County shall be liable only for payment for Services already rendered under this Agreement prior to the effective date of termination in accordance with the payment schedule specified in Schedule "B," which payments shall be prorated to the actual date of termination. Upon receipt of notice that the County is terminating this Agreement in its best interests, the Agency shall stop work immediately and incur no further costs in furtherance of this Agreement without the express approval of the Commissioner, and the Agency shall direct any approved subcontractors to do the same.

In the event of a dispute as to the value of the Services rendered by the Agency prior to the date of termination, it is understood and agreed that the Commissioner shall determine the value of such Services rendered by the Agency. The Agency shall accept such reasonable and good faith determination as final.

(b) In the event the County determines that there has been a material breach by the Agency of any of the terms of the Agreement and such breach either, (i) remains uncured for forty-eight (48) hours after service on the Agency of written notice thereof, or (ii) is not capable of being cured, the County, in addition to any other right or remedy it might have, may terminate this Agreement and the County shall have the right, power and authority to complete the Services provided for in this Agreement, or contract for its completion, and any additional expense or cost of such completion shall be charged to and paid by the Agency. Without limiting the foregoing, upon written notice to

the Agency, repeated breaches by the Agency of duties or obligations under this Agreement shall be deemed a material breach of this Agreement justifying termination for cause hereunder without requirement for further opportunity to cure.

EIGHTH: The Agency represents and warrants that all prices quoted herein for the work to be performed hereunder have been arrived at by the Agency independently and have been submitted without collusion with any other vendor of similar materials, supplies, equipment or services.

NINTH: All records or recorded data of any kind compiled by the Agency in completing the Services described in this Agreement, including but not limited to written reports, studies, drawings, blueprints, computer printouts, graphs, charts, plans, specifications and all other similar recorded data, shall become and remain the property of the County. The Agency may retain copies of such records for its own use and shall not disclose any such information without the express written consent of the Commissioner. The County shall have the right to reproduce and publish such records, if it so desires, at no additional cost to the County.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, all deliverables created under this Agreement by the Agency are to be considered "works made for hire." If any of the deliverables do not qualify as "works made for hire," the Agency hereby assigns to the County all right, title and interest (including ownership of copyright) in such deliverables and such assignment allows the County to obtain in its name copyrights, registrations and similar protections which may be available. The Agency agrees to assist the County, if required, in perfecting these rights. The Agency shall provide the County with at least one copy of each deliverable.

The Agency agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the County for all damages, liabilities, losses and expenses arising out of any claim that a deliverable infringes upon an intellectual property right of a third party. If such a claim is made, or appears likely to be made, the Agency agrees to enable the County's continued use of the deliverable, or to modify or replace it. If the County determines that none of these alternatives is reasonably available, the deliverable may be returned.

TENTH: The Agency shall not delegate any duties or assign any of its rights under this Agreement without the prior express written consent of the County. The Agency shall not subcontract any part of the Services without the prior written consent of the County. Any purported

delegation of duties or assignment of rights under this Agreement without the prior express written consent of the County is void. All subcontracts that have received such prior written approval shall provide that subcontractors are subject to all terms and conditions set forth in the Agreement. It is recognized and understood by the Agency that for the purposes of this Agreement, all Services performed by a County-approved sub-contractor shall be deemed Services performed by the Agency and the Agency shall insure that such subcontracted work is subject to the material terms and conditions of this Agreement. All subcontracts for the Services shall expressly reference the subcontractor's duty to comply with the material terms and conditions of this Agreement and shall attach a copy of the County's contract with the Agency. The Agency shall obtain a written acknowledgement from the owner and/or chief executive of subcontractor or his/her duly authorized representative that the subcontractor has received a copy of the County's contract, read it and is familiar with the material terms and conditions thereof. The Agency shall include provisions in its subcontracts designed to ensure that the Agency and/or its auditor has the right to examine all relevant books, records, documents or electronic data of the subcontractor necessary to review the subcontractor's compliance with the material terms and conditions of this Agreement. For each and every year for which this Agreement continues, the Agency shall submit to the Commissioner a letter signed by the owner and/or chief executive officer of the Agency or his/her duly authorized representative certifying that each and every approved subcontractor is in compliance with the material terms and conditions of the Agreement.

ELEVENTH: Failure of the Gounty to insist, in any one or more instances, upon strict performance of any term or condition herein contained shall not be deemed a waiver or relinquishment of such term or condition, but the same shall remain in full force and effect. Acceptance by the County of any Service or the payment of any fee or reimbursement due hereunder with knowledge of a breach of any term or condition hereof, shall not be deemed a waiver of any such breach and no waiver by the County of any provision hereof shall be implied.

TWELFTH: The Agency represents and warrants that it has not employed or retained any person, other than a bona fide full-time salaried employee working solely for the Agency to solicit or secure this agreement, and that it has not paid or agreed to pay any person (other than payments of fixed salary to a bona fide full-time salaried employee working solely for the Agency) any fee, commission, percentage, gift or other consideration, contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this agreement. For the breach or violation of this provision, without limiting any other

rights or remedies to which the County may be entitled or any civil or criminal penalty to which any violator may be liable, the County shall have the right, in its discretion, to terminate this agreement without liability, and to deduct from the contract price, or otherwise to recover, the full amount of such fee, commission percentage, gift or consideration.

THIRTEENTH: The Agency shall obey, perform and comply, at its own expense, with the provisions of all applicable federal, state and local laws, rules, regulations orders or ordinances and requirements of every kind and nature, which now exist or are hereinafter enacted or promulgated ("Laws") applicable to this Agreement or the Services to be performed under this Agreement. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Agency further agrees to comply, at its own expense, with all Laws applicable to it as an employer of labor, and all Laws and licensing requirements pertaining to its professional status and that of its employees, partners, associates, subcontractors and others employed to render the Services hereunder.

It is the intent and understanding of the County and Agency that each and every provision required by law, contract, or other proper authority to be included in this Agreement shall, for all intents and purposes, be considered and deemed included herein. The Agency understands and acknowledges that for each and every such provision that has, through mistake or otherwise, either not been inserted in writing or been inserted in writing in an incorrect form, the Agency hereby consents to amending this Agreement in writing, upon receipt of notice from the County, for the purpose of inserting or correcting the provision in question.

FOURTEENTH: The Agency expressly agrees that neither it nor any Agency, subcontractor, employee, or any other person acting on its behalf shall discriminate against or intimidate any employee or other individual on the basis of race, creed, religion, color, gender, age, national origin, ethnicity, alienage or citizenship status, disability, marital status, sexual orientation, familial status, genetic predisposition or carrier status during the term of or in connection with this Agreement, as those terms may be defined in Chapter 700 of the Laws of Westchester County. The Agency acknowledges and understands that the County maintains a zero tolerance policy prohibiting all forms of harassment or discrimination against its employees by co-workers, supervisors, vendors, contractors, or others.

FIFTEENTH: The Agency agrees to procure and maintain insurance naming the County as additional insured, as provided and described in Schedule "C" entitled "Standard Insurance Provisions", which is attached hereto and made a part hereof. In addition to, and not in limitation of

the insurance requirements contained in Schedule "C" entitled "Standard Insurance Provisions," the

Agency agrees:

(a.) that except for the amount, if any, of damage contributed to, caused by or resulting from

the sole negligence of the County, the Agency shall indemnify and hold harmless the County, its

officers, employees and agents from and against any and all liability, damage, claims, demands,

costs, judgments, fees, attorneys' fees or loss arising directly or indirectly out of the performance or

failure to perform hereunder by the Agency or third parties under the direction or control of the

Agency; and

(b.) to provide defense for and defend, at its sole expense, any and all claims, demands or

causes of action directly or indirectly arising out of this Agreement and to bear all other costs and

expenses related thereto; and

(c.) in the event the Agency does not provide the above defense and indemnification to the

County, and such refusal or denial to provide the above defense and indemnification is found to be in

breach of this provision, then the Agency shall reimburse the County's reasonable attorney's fees

incurred in connection with the defense of any action, and in connection with enforcing this

provision of the Agreement.

SIXTEENTH: All notices of any nature referred to in this Agreement shall be in writing

and sent by registered or certified mail postage pre-paid, to the respective addresses set forth below

or to such other addresses as the respective parties hereto may designate in writing. Notice shall be

effective on the date of receipt. Notices shall be sent to the following:

SEVENTEENTH: This Agreement and its attachments constitute the entire Agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede all previous negotiations, commitments and writings. It shall not be released, discharged, changed or modified except by an instrument in writing signed by a duly authorized representative of each of the parties.

In the event of a conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the terms of any schedule or attachment hereto, it is understood that the terms of this Agreement shall be controlling with respect to any interpretation of the meaning and intent of the parties.

EIGHTEENTH: Nothing herein is intended or shall be construed to confer upon or give to any third party or its successors and assigns any rights, remedies or basis for reliance upon, under or by reason of this Agreement, except in the event that specific third party rights are expressly granted herein.

<u>NINETEENTH:</u> The Agency recognizes that this Agreement does not grant the Agency the exclusive right to perform the Services for the County and that the County may enter into similar agreements with other contractors on an "as needed" basis.

<u>TWENTIETH</u>: The Agency hereby represents that, if operating under an assumed name, it has filed the necessary certificate pursuant to New York State General Business Law Section 130.

TWENTY-FIRST: Attached hereto and forming parts hereof are the schedules listed below. Simultaneous with its execution of this Agreement, the Agency shall provide the County with a completed copy of each schedule. The Agency agrees that the terms of each of these schedules has been accepted and agreed-to by the Agency by virtue of its execution of this Agreement, and the

Agency represents and warrants that it has completed each of these schedules accurately and completely.

 Schedule "D" — "Business Enterprises Owned and Controlled by Women or Persons of Color"

Pursuant to Section 308.01 of the Laws of Westchester County, it is the goal of the County to use its best efforts to encourage, promote and increase the participation of business enterprises owned and controlled by women or persons of color in contracts and projects funded by all departments of the County.

2.) Schedule "E" — "Required Disclosure of Relationships to County"

In the event that any information provided in Schedule "E" must be changed during the term of this Agreement, the Contractor agrees to notify the County in writing within ten (10) business days and provide an updated version of the schedule. The Contractor shall also have each approved subcontractor complete a separate Schedule "E" and shall advise the subcontractor of the duty to report any changes to the information contained therein to the Contractor within ten (10) business days of such event and such information shall be forwarded by the Contractor to the County in the manner described above.

3.) Schedule "F" — "Criminal Background Disclosure"

This schedule is required pursuant to Executive Order No. 1-2008.

4.) Schedule "G" — "Certification Regarding Business Dealings with Northern Ireland"

Pursuant to Section 310.01 of the Laws of Westchester County, no County procuring officer may award or recommend for award any contract not subject to competitive bidding to a party that does not execute a certification in substantially the form contained in Schedule "G".

5.) Schedule "H" — "Questionnaire Regarding Business Enterprises Owned and Controlled by Service-Disabled Veterans"

The County believes it is a laudable goal to provide business opportunities to veterans

who were disabled while serving our country, and wants to encourage the participation in County contracts of certified business enterprises owned and controlled by service-disabled veterans. This schedule is required as part of the County's program to encourage the participation of such business enterprises in County contracts, and in furtherance of Article 3 of the New York State Veterans' Service Law.

6.) Schedule "I" — "Vendor Direct Program - Electronic Funds Transfer"

All payments made by the County to the Contractor will be made by electronic funds transfer ("EFT") pursuant to the County's Vendor Direct Program. If the Contractor is not already enrolled in the Vendor Direct Program, the Contractor shall fill out and submit an EFT Authorization Form as part of this Agreement. (In rare cases, a hardship waiver may be granted. For a Hardship Waiver Request Form, the Contractor understands that it must contact the County's Finance Department.)

If the Contractor is already enrolled in the Vendor Direct Program, the Contractor hereby agrees to immediately notify the County's Finance Department in writing if the EFT Authorization Form on file must be changed, and provide an updated version of the document.

TWENTY-SECOND: Pursuant to Federal Executive Order 12549, and as prescribed by federal regulations, including 48 C.F.R. Subpart 9.4, the Agency agrees to complete and comply with all attached the schedules to this Agreement, including without limitation the following which are attached hereto and made a part hereof: "Certification Regarding Lobbying" (Schedule "J"); the "Certification Regarding Drug Free Workplace Requirements" (Schedule "K"); and "Certification Regarding Debarment and Suspension" (Schedule "L").

TWENTY-THIRD: The Agency shall use all reasonable means to avoid any conflict of interest with the County and shall immediately notify the County in the event of a conflict of interest. The Agency shall also use all reasonable means to avoid any appearance of impropriety.

TWENTY-FOURTH: This Agreement may be executed simultaneously in several counterparts, each of which shall be an original and all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument. This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State

of New York. In addition, the parties hereby agree that any cause of action arising out of this Agreement shall be brought in the County of Westchester.

If any term or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or void or unenforceable, the remainder of the terms and provisions of this Agreement shall in no way be affected, impaired, or invalidated, and to the extent permitted by applicable law, any such term, or provision shall be restricted in applicability or reformed to the minimum extent required for such to be enforceable. This provision shall be interpreted and enforced to give effect to the original written intent of the parties prior to the determination of such invalidity or unenforceability.

<u>TWENTY-FIFTH:</u> This Agreement shall not be enforceable until signed by all parties and approved by the Office of the County Attorney.

PROJECT STRIV (Schools Transforming Real Intervention to Violence) SCHEDULE A

Schools Transforming Real Intervention to Violence (aka Project STRIV) will expand and build upon existing school violence prevention initiatives and implement trainings to provide students, parents and school personnel with tools to recognize, respond quickly to, and prevent acts of violence. Training will be directed at the safety of the school communities to ensure the development of a positive school community climate and culture where students feel safe, accepted and respected regardless of their gender, race culture or sexual orientation.

PNW BOCES (Boards of Cooperative Educational Services) will offer additional CSTAG (Comprehensive School Threat Assessment Guidelines) and Digital Threat Assessment trainings. The focused trainings will offer coordinated strategies to increase the levels of security and safety within the school environment. The digital training will help attendees get a better understanding of the social media world and online activity and what tools and methods are available to identify online threat related behavior to prevent tragedy and intervene when worrisome behavior is observed.

A. Continue with CSTAG (Comprehensive School Threat Assessment Guidelines) trainings and implement Digital Threat Assessment Training

- Schedule and facilitate up to 5 trainings
- Provide additional focused school violence prevention trainings for school personnel – administration and support staff, law enforcement personnel and parents

B. Work with the County RTC (Real Time Crime) Center to create a dedicated School Desk

C. Technical Assistance and Reporting

- i. Collect baseline data for school violence
- ii. Create and analyze evaluation forms for the terms of the Program
- iii. Assist the County and Technical Assistance Coordinator and Evaluator in preparing all reports for the federal agency, Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance pertaining to the project, including the quarterly progress reports
- iv. Ensure that all required data are collected, tracked and submitted for reporting purposes on a timely basis

D. Work with the Project Coordinator and Evaluator

SCHEDULE "C"

STANDARD INSURANCE PROVISIONS (Contractor)

1. Prior to commencing work, and throughout the term of the Agreement, the Contractor shall obtain at its own cost and expense the required insurance as delineated below from insurance companies licensed in the State of New York, carrying a Best's financial rating of A or better. Contractor shall provide evidence of such insurance to the County of Westchester ("County"), either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County ("Director"). The policies or certificates thereof shall provide that ten (10) days prior to cancellation or material change in the policy, notices of same shall be given to the Director either by overnight mail or personal delivery for all of the following stated insurance policies. All notices shall name the Contractor and identify the Agreement.

If at any time any of the policies required herein shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing any such policy shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, the Contractor shall upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and submit the policy or the certificate as requested by the Director to the Office of Risk Management of the County for approval by the Director. Upon failure of the Contractor to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance, the Agreement, at the election of the County, may be declared suspended, discontinued or terminated.

Failure of the Contractor to take out, maintain, or the taking out or maintenance of any required insurance, shall not relieve the Contractor from any liability under the Agreement, nor shall the insurance requirements be construed to conflict with or otherwise limit the contractual obligations of the Contractor concerning indemnification.

All property losses shall be made payable to the "County of Westchester" and adjusted with the appropriate County personnel.

In the event that claims, for which the County may be liable, in excess of the insured amounts provided herein are filed by reason of Contractor's negligent acts or omissions under the Agreement or by virtue of the provisions of the labor law or other statute or any other reason, the amount of excess of such claims or any portion thereof, may be withheld from payment due or to become due the Contractor until such time as the Contractor shall furnish such additional security covering such claims in form satisfactory to the Director.

In the event of any loss, if the Contractor maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums identified herein, the County shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Contractor. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

- The Contractor shall provide proof of the following coverage (if additional coverage is required for a specific agreement, those requirements will be described in the Agreement):
 - a) Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability. Certificate form C-105.2 or State Fund Insurance Company form U-26.3 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Workers' Compensation Law. State Workers' Compensation Board form DB-120.1 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Disability Benefits Law. Location of operation shall be "All locations in Westchester County, New York."

Where an applicant claims to not be required to carry either a Workers' Compensation Policy or Disability Benefits Policy, or both, the employer must complete NYS form CE-200, available to download at: http://www.wcb.ny.gov.

If the employer is self-insured for Workers' Compensation, he/she should present a certificate from the New York State Worker's Compensation Board evidencing that fact (Either SI-12, Certificate of Workers' Compensation Self-Insurance, or GSI-105.2, Certificate of Participation in Workers' Compensation Group Self-Insurance).

- b) Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 (c.s.1) per occurrence and a \$2,000,000 aggregate limit naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis. This insurance shall include the following coverages:
 - i. Premises Operations.
 - ii. Broad Form Contractual.
 - iii. Independent Contractor and Sub-Contractor.
 - iv. Products and Completed Operations.
- c) Commercial Umbrella/Excess Insurance: \$2,000,000 each Occurrence and Aggregate naming the "County of Westchester" as additional insured, written on a "follow the form" basis.

NOTE: Additional insured status shall be provided by standard or other endorsement that extends coverage to the County for both on-going and completed operations.

All Contracts involving the use of explosives, demolition and/or underground work shall provide proof that XCU is covered.

- d) Automobile Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$1,000,000 for bodily injury and a minimum limit of \$100,000 per occurrence for property damage or a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 unless otherwise indicated in the contract specifications. This insurance shall include for bodily injury and property damage the following coverages and name the "County of Westchester" as additional insured:
 - (i) Owned automobiles.
 - (ii) Hired automobiles.
 - (iii) Non-owned automobiles.
 - 3. All policies of the Contractor shall be endorsed to contain the following clauses:

- (a) Insurers shall have no right to recovery or subrogation against the County (including its employees and other agents and agencies), it being the intention of the parties that the insurance policies so effected shall protect both parties and be primary coverage for any and all losses covered by the above-described insurance.
- (b) The clause "other insurance provisions" in a policy in which the County is named as an insured, shall not apply to the County.
- (c) The insurance companies issuing the policy or policies shall have no recourse against the County (including its agents and agencies as aforesaid) for payment of any premiums or for assessments under any form of policy.
- (d) Any and all deductibles in the above described insurance policies shall be assumed by and be for the account of, and at the sole risk of, the Contractor.

- B. For purposes of this Certification, "MacBride Principles" shall mean those principles relating to nondiscrimination in employment and freedom of workplace opportunity which require employers doing business in Northern Ireland to:
- (1) increase the representation of individuals from underrepresented religious groups in the work force, including managerial, supervisory, administrative, clerical and technical jobs;
- (2) take steps to promote adequate security for the protection of employees from underrepresented religious groups both at the workplace and while traveling to and from work;

If the County receives information that the Contractor is in violation of paragraph "A", the County shall review such information and give the Contractor opportunity to respond. If the County finds that such a violation has occurred, the County may declare the Contractor in default, and/or terminate this Agreement. In the event of any such termination, the County may procure the supplies, services or work from another source in accordance with applicable law. The Contractor shall pay to the County the difference between the contract price for the uncompleted portion of this Agreement and the cost to the County of completing performance of this Agreement either by itself or by engaging another contractor. If this

is a contract other than a construction contract, the Contractor shall be liable for the difference in price if the cost of procurement from another source is greater than what the County would have paid the Contractor plus any reasonable costs the County incurs in any new procurement and if this is a construction contract, the County shall also have the right to hold the Contractor in partial or total default in accordance with the default provisions of this Agreement. In addition, the Contractor may be declared not to be a responsible bidder or proposer for up to three (3) years, following written notice to the Contractor, giving the Contractor the opportunity for a hearing at which the Contractor may be represented by counsel. The rights and remedies of the County hereunder shall be in addition to, and not in lieu of, any rights and remedies the County has pursuant to this Agreement or by operation of law or in equity.



Transmitted herewith for your review and approval is an amended and restated bond act (the "Amended Bond Act") which, if adopted, would amend and restate prior Bond Act No. 110-2022 to expand the scope of services for the following capital project:

BIT32 – Radio System Replacement ("BIT32")

Pursuant to Bond Act No. 110-2022 duly adopted on September 12, 2022, your Honorable Board authorized the County of Westchester (the "County") to issue bonds in the total aggregate amount of \$32,018,183, which included \$23,518,183 in previously authorized bonds of the County, and \$8,500,000 in additional funding for BIT32 for the acquisition of equipment, assets, and services needed to complete the replacement and expansion of County emergency communications systems, which enable fire, EMS, police, and other emergency personnel dispatch and communication, and expand the scope of services under BIT32 to include the design of structures at the County's Montrose Station Road site located in Blue Mountain Reservation (the "Park"), as part of the County's Voice Radio Communications Systems Replacement Project (the "Project").

The Department of Information Technology (the "Department"), which oversees the Project for the Department of Emergency Services ("DES"), the Department of Public Safety ("DPS"), and the Department of Public Works and Transportation ("DPWT"), has recently been informed that additional stormwater management and tree removal work is required at the County's Sun Valley Drive site located at 40 Sun Valley Drive, Croton Falls, in the Town of North Salem, New York (the "Site"), as requested by the Town of North Salem.

The Amended Bond Act would expand the scope of services under Bond Act No. 110-2022 to include stormwater management and tree removal work at the Site, which is part of the Project, at no additional cost.

BOND ACT OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK, AMENDING AND RESTATING BOND ACT NO. 110-2022, ADOPTED SEPTEMBER 12, 2022, AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$32,018,183 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, OR SO MUCH THEREOF AS MAY BE NECESSARY, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE RADIO SYSTEM REPLACEMENT PROJECT FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY; STATING THE ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST THEREOF IS \$32,018,183; STATING THE PLAN OF FINANCING SAID COST INCLUDES THE ISSUANCE OF \$32,018,183 BONDS HEREIN AUTHORIZED TO FINANCE SUCH COST; AND PROVIDING FOR A TAX TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS. (Adopted , 20__).

Recitals

WHEREAS, this Board has heretofore duly authorized the issuance of bonds to finance various elements of Capital Project BIT32 pursuant to Act Nos. 109-2018, 110-2018, 111-2018, 112-2018, 113-2018, 114-208 and 115-2018 duly adopted on July 16, 2018, including amendments to 110-2018, 113-2018 and 114-2018 by amending bond acts 146-2019, 147-2019 and 148-2019 duly adopted on July 15, 2019 (collectively, the "Previous Bond Acts",

WHEREAS, on November 9, 2020, the Board adopted Bond Act No. 203-20 which (i) amended Bond Act 109-2018 to expand the scope of project to be financed pursuant to such bond act to encompass all project elements as collectively authorized in the Previous Bond

Acts, and (ii) revoked the Previous Bond Acts, except for 109-2018 which was amended hereby, to the extent of authorized but unissued amounts of bonds pursuant to each respective bond act;

WHEREAS, on November 22, 2021, the Board adopted Bond Act No. 208-2021 which increased the appropriation for the project by \$2,360,000 for increased costs of such project;

WHEREAS, on September 12, 2022, the Board adopted Bond Act No. 110-2022, to (i) expand and revise the scope of the project and (ii) increase the appropriation for the project by \$8,500,000, including increasing the maximum cost and the amount of bonds authorized in connection therewith; and

WHEREAS, it is now necessary to expand and revise the scope of the project by adding stormwater management and additional tree removal work; and

WHEREAS, in order to accomplish such purpose it is necessary to amend and restate Bond Act 110-2022 to expand and revise the scope of the project;

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), TO AMEND AND RESTATE BOND ACT NO. 110-2022 IN ITS ENTIRETY AS FOLLOWS:

BOND ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$32,018,183 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, OR SO MUCH THEREOF AS MAY BE NECESSARY, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE RADIO SYSTEM REPLACEMENT PROJECT FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY; STATING THE ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST THEREOF IS \$32,018,183; STATING THE PLAN OF FINANCING SAID

COST INCLUDES THE ISSUANCE OF \$32,018,183 BONDS HEREIN AUTHORIZED TO FINANCE SUCH COST; AND PROVIDING FOR A TAX TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS. (Adopted ______, 20__)

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (the "Law"), the Westchester County Administrative Code, being Chapter 852 of the Laws of 1948, as amended, to the provisions of other laws applicable thereto, \$32,018,183 bonds of the County, or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby authorized to be issued to finance the cost of the radio system replacement project for the Department of Information Technology, including stormwater management and additional tree removal; all as collectively set forth in section 1 of each of the Previous Bond Acts, the County's 2021 Capital Budget, the County's current year Capital Budget, and includes any new or additional costs in connection with the project. To the extent that the County has previously issued bonds pursuant to each of the Previous Bond Acts as detailed in column E of the attached Schedule I, the proceeds of such previously issued bonds shall only be expended for the scope of the project as set forth in the respective bond act, from which such proceeds are derived, when originally adopted and/or amended as set forth in column A of Schedule I. The total estimated maximum cost of said objects or purposes, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof is \$32,018,183. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$32,018,183 bonds herein authorized, and any bond

anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds, and the levy of a tax to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds.

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness of said class of objects or purposes, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 25 of the Law, is ten (10) years.

Section 3. Current funds are not required to be provided as a down payment pursuant to Section 107.00 d. 9. of the Law prior to issuance of the bonds authorized herein, or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds. The County intends to finance, on an interim basis, the costs or a portion of the costs of said improvements for which bonds are herein authorized, which costs are reasonably expected to be reimbursed with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County, pursuant to this Act, in the maximum amount of \$32,018,183. This Act is a declaration of official intent adopted pursuant to the requirements of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of this Act and of the Law, and pursuant to the provisions of §30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes or the renewals thereof, and of §\$50.00, 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of said Law, the powers and duties of the County Board of Legislators relative to authorizing the issuance of any notes in anticipation of the sale of the bonds herein authorized, or the renewals thereof, relative to providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, relative to prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the respective amounts of bonds herein authorized, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and relative to executing agreements for credit enhancement, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance of the County, as the chief fiscal officer of the County.

Section 5. Each of the bonds authorized by this Act and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale thereof shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by §52.00 of said Local Finance Law and said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the County of Westchester, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the County. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and provision shall be made annually in the budgets of the County by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the notes and bonds to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 6. The validity of the bonds authorized by this Act and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

- (a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or
- (b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this Act or a summary hereof, are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

(c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This Act shall take effect in accordance with Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter.

Transmitted herewith for your review and approval is a bond act ("Bond Act") which, if adopted, would authorize the County of Westchester ("County") to issue bonds in the amount of \$100,000 to finance the following capital project:

CC105 - Technology Upgrade Off Campus 2022/23-2026/27 ("CC105").

The Bond Act, in the amount of \$100,000, would finance the County's approximately 50% share of the cost of technology upgrades off campus for Westchester Community College ("College"), including replacement of older computers, printers and scanners, new initiatives for Academic Technology, and expansion for remote work/desktop equipment, unified communications, wireless, and tablet and mobile devices and digital signage replacements for regular and emergency communications

The College has advised that it is essential to replace and purchase new computer hardware equipment for the college community.

The College has advised that the total amount appropriated for CC105 is \$200,000. This bond request in the amount of \$100,000, represents the County's approximately 50% share of CC105. The remaining 50% will be funded by New York State.

Following bonding authorization, it is anticipated that the upgrades will take twenty-four months to complete. It is anticipated that the work will be completed by in-house staff.

Based on the importance of this project to the County, favorable action on the proposed Bond Act is respectfully requested.

Your Committee is in receipt of a transmittal from the County Executive recommending approval by the County of Westchester ("County") of a bond act ("Bond Act") in the amount of \$100,000 to finance capital project CC105 – Technology Upgrade Off Campus 2022/23-2026/27 ("CC105"). The Bond Act, which was prepared by the law firm Harris Beach, will finance the County's approximately 50% share of the cost of technology upgrades off campus for Westchester Community College ("College"), including replacement of older computers, printers and scanners, new initiatives for Academic Technology, and expansion for remote work/desktop equipment, unified communications, wireless, and tablet and mobile devices and digital signage replacements for regular and emergency communications

The College has advised that it is essential to replace and purchase new computer hardware equipment for the college community.

The College has advised that the total amount appropriated for CC105 is \$200,000. This bond request in the amount of \$100,000, represents the County's approximately 50% share of CC105. The remaining 50% will be funded by New York State.

Following bonding authorization, it is anticipated that the upgrades will take twenty-four months to complete. It is anticipated that the work will be completed by in-house staff.

The Planning Department has advised your Committee that based on its review, CC105 may be classified as a Type "II" action pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQR") and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617. Therefore, no environmental review is required. Your Committee has reviewed the annexed SEQR documentation and concurs with this recommendation.

It should be noted that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of your Honorable Board is required in order to adopt the Bond Act. Your Committee recommends the adoption of the proposed Bond Act.



BOND ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$100,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, OR SO MUCH THEREOF AS MAY BE NECESSARY, TO FINANCE THE COST OF TECHNOLOGY UPGRADES OFF CAMPUS FOR WESTCHESTER COMMUNITY COLLEGE; STATING THE TOTAL ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST THEREOF IS \$200,000; STATING THE PLAN OF FINANCING SAID COST INCLUDES THE ISSUANCE OF \$100,000 BONDS HEREIN AUTHORIZED TO FINANCE THE COUNTY'S SHARE OF SUCH COST AND THE APPLICATION OF \$100,000 EXPECTED TO BE RECEIVED FROM THE STATE OF NEW YORK TOWARDS THE COST OF SAID OBJECTS OR PURPOSES; AND PROVIDING FOR A TAX TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS. (Adopted , 20__)

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than Third-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (the "Law"), the Westchester County Administrative Code, being Chapter 852 of the Laws of 1948, as amended, to the provisions of other laws applicable thereto, \$100,000 bonds of the County, or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby authorized to be issued to finance the cost of technology upgrades off campus for Westchester Community College, including replacement of older computers, printers and scanners, new initiatives for Academic Technology, and expansion for remote

work/desktop peripheral, unified communications, wireless, and tablet and mobile devices and digital signage replacements for regular and emergency communications; all as set forth in the County's current year Capital Budget, as amended. To the extent that the details set forth in this act are inconsistent with any details set forth in the current year Capital Budget of the County, such Budget shall be deemed and is hereby amended. The estimated maximum cost of said object or purpose, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof is \$200,000. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$100,000 bonds herein authorized and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds, the application of \$100,000 expected to be received from the State of New York to be expended towards the cost of said objects or purposes, and the levy of a tax to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds and notes.

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness applicable to the specific object or purpose for which the bonds authorized by this resolution is to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 89 of the Law, is five (5) years.

Section 3. Current funds are not required to be provided as a down payment pursuant to Section 107.00 d. 9. of the Law prior to issuance of the bonds authorized herein, or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds. It is estimated that construction will take eighteen months to complete and will begin after award and execution of construction contracts.

The Planning Department has advised your Committee that based on its review, CC109 may be classified as a Type "II" action pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQR") and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617. Therefore, no environmental review is required. Your Committee has reviewed the annexed SEQR documentation and concurs with this recommendation.

It should be noted that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of your Honorable Board is required in order to adopt the Bond Act. Your Committee recommends the adoption of the proposed Bond Act.

ACT NO. -20

BOND ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$750,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, OR SO MUCH THEREOF AS MAY BE NECESSARY, TO FINANCE THE COST OF HARTFORD HALL HVAC IMPROVEMENTS AT THE WESTCHESTER COMMUNITY COLLEGE; STATING THE TOTAL ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST THEREOF IS \$1,500,000; STATING THE PLAN OF FINANCING SAID COST INCLUDES THE ISSUANCE OF \$750,000 BONDS HEREIN AUTHORIZED TO FINANCE THE COUNTY'S SHARE OF SUCH COST AND THE APPLICATION OF \$750,000 EXPECTED TO BE RECEIVED FROM THE STATE OF NEW YORK TOWARDS THE COST OF SAID OBJECTS OR PURPOSES; AND PROVIDING FOR A TAX TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS. (Adopted , 20)

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than Third-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (the "Law"), the Westchester County Administrative Code, being Chapter 852 of the Laws of 1948, as amended, to the provisions of other laws applicable thereto, \$750,000 bonds of the County, or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby authorized to be issued to finance the cost of Hartford Hall HVAC improvements at the Westchester Community College; including the design and construction of the full system replacement of the Harford Hall ductless split air conditioning systems, and the

reconfiguring and replacement of the related piping and insulation, and air conditioning controls. The purpose of this project is to make the mechanical repairs and upgrades all as set forth in the County's current year Capital Budget, as amended. To the extent that the details set forth in this act are inconsistent with any details set forth in the current year Capital Budget of the County, such Budget shall be deemed and is hereby amended. The estimated maximum cost of said object or purpose, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof is \$1,500,000. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$750,000 bonds herein authorized and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds, the application of \$750,000 expected to be received from the State of New York to be expended towards the cost of said objects or purposes, and the levy of a tax to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds and notes.

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness applicable to the specific object or purpose for which the bonds authorized by this resolution is to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 13 of the Law, is ten (10) years.

Section 3. Current funds are not required to be provided as a down payment pursuant to Section 107.00 d. 9. of the Law prior to issuance of the bonds authorized herein, or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds. The County intends to finance, on an interim basis, the costs or a portion of the costs of said improvements for which bonds are herein authorized, which costs are reasonably expected to be reimbursed with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County, pursuant to this Act, in the maximum amount of \$750,000. This Act is a declaration of official intent adopted pursuant to the requirements of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of this Act and of the Law, and pursuant to the provisions of §30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes or the renewals thereof, and of §§50.00, 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of said Law, the powers and duties of the County Board of Legislators relative to authorizing the issuance of any notes in anticipation of the sale of the bonds herein authorized, or the renewals thereof, relative to providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, relative to prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the respective amounts of bonds herein authorized, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and relative to executing agreements for credit enhancement, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance of the County, as the chief fiscal officer of the County.

Section 5. Each of the bonds authorized by this Act and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale thereof shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by §52.00 of said Local Finance Law and said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the County of Westchester, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the County. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and provision shall be made annually in the budgets of the County by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the notes and bonds to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 6. The validity of the bonds authorized by this Act and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

- (a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or
- (b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this Act or a summary hereof, are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

(c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This Act shall take effect in accordance with Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter.

The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$4,927,000 bonds herein authorized and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds, the application of \$4,926,000 expected to be received from the State of New York to be expended towards the cost of said objects or purposes, and the levy of a tax to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds and notes..

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness applicable to the specific object or purpose for which the bonds authorized by this resolution is to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 12(a)(2) of the Law, is fifteen (15) years.

Section 3. Current funds are not required to be provided as a down payment pursuant to Section 107.00 d. 9. of the Law prior to issuance of the bonds authorized herein, or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds. The County intends to finance, on an interim basis, the costs or a portion of the costs of said improvements for which bonds are herein authorized, which costs are reasonably expected to be reimbursed with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County, pursuant to this Act, in the maximum amount of \$9,150,000. Dear Members of the Board of Legislators:

Transmitted herewith for your review and approval is a bond act ("Bond Act"), which, if adopted, would authorize the County of Westchester ("County") to issue up to \$2,000,000.00 in bonds of the County to finance a component of capital project BPL26 - Flood Mitigation ("BPL26"). Also attached is an act ("IMA Act") authorizing the County to enter an intermunicipal agreement ("IMA") with the Town of Rye ("Town"), setting forth the terms of the flood mitigation project ("Project").

The Bond Act, in the amount of \$2,000,000.00, would finance the County's share of the cost of the Project in the area of Rye Town Park, in the Town, ("Property") as part of the Storm Water Reconnaissance Plan for the Coastal Long Island Sound Basin ("Plan"), which was adopted by your Honorable Board by Act No. 134 – 2014 on August 4, 2014.

The Department of Planning ("Department") has advised that the Project will address significant recurring flooding on the Property as well as in the Property's immediate vicinity.

Design for the Project has been completed by a consultant retained by the Town. The Department estimates that the Project's construction phase will take no more than two years to complete and will begin after award and execution of the construction contracts, which are subject to the approval of construction financing by your Honorable Board.

The proposed IMA sets forth the responsibilities of the County and the Town in connection with the Project. Under the proposed IMA, the Town will grant the County a non-exclusive easement over the Property in order to facilitate the issuance of County bonds to finance the capital project's construction, and such easement shall encumber the Property for so long as the bonds of the County are outstanding. The Town shall construct, operate, maintain, repair, replace, inspect, or restore the Project. In accordance with the IMA, the County and the Town will each provide up to fifty percent of the total cost of the Project, which is estimated to be \$3,800,000.00. The County will pay to the Town, on a reimbursement basis, an amount not to exceed \$1,900,000.00. Should the Project costs exceed the amount contributed by the County, the Town shall be solely responsible for any additional amount. Following construction, the Town will be responsible for the operation, maintenance, scheduling, and security of the Property and the Project at its expense. The term of the IMA will commence upon execution, and will continue for a period at least equal to the life of any County bonds issued to fund the Project, which is estimated to be thirty years.

In 2011, your Honorable Board enacted the Westchester County Storm Water Management Law ("SWML") to assist municipalities with storm water management (flood mitigation). See Laws of Westchester County ("LWC") Chapter 241, Article III-A, Sections 241.252-241.260. The SWML

provides for the evaluation of flooding within the County through preparation of watershed "reconnaissance plans," and the SWML authorizes County cooperation with municipalities, including funding assistance, to improve storm water management and reduce flooding.

The Property is located within an area designated as a flood hazard area by the Federal Emergency Management Agency and shown on the flooding or storm water management maps included in the Plan. As such, the Property meets the definition of a "Flood or Storm Water Management Problem," pursuant to LWC Section 241.253(6), and is eligible for County funding as a "Storm Water Management Project," pursuant to LWC Section 241.256. Criteria for funding flood mitigation projects are also described in the Plan, including discretionary fund policy requirements to affirmatively further fair housing. The IMA requires the Town to adopt regulations and policies consistent with the flood mitigation criteria in the Plan for the Coastal Long Island Sound Watershed.

It should be noted that your Honorable Board has authorized the County to issue bonds in connection with prior components of BPL26 as indicated in the annexed fact sheet.

It should also be noted that since BPL26 is a "general fund" project, specific components are subject to a capital budget amendment. Section 1 of the Bond Act authorizes an amendment to the County's capital budget to the extent the Project scope is inconsistent with any details set forth in the current capital budget. Accordingly, the Bond Act, in addition to authorizing the issuance of bonds for this Project, will also amend the current-year capital budget to reflect the specific location of this Project component.

LWC Section 167.131 mandates that a capital budget amendment that introduces a new capital project or changes the location, size or character of an existing capital project be accompanied to the Board of Legislators by a report of the Westchester County Planning Board (the "Planning Board") with respect to the physical planning aspects of the project. Accordingly, the Planning Board report for BPL26 is annexed.

Based on the importance of this Project to the County, favorable action on the annexed proposed Acts is respectfully requested from your Honorable Board.

As such, the area meets the definition of "Flood or Storm Water Management Problem," pursuant to LWC Section 241.253(6), and is eligible for County funding as a "Storm Water Management Project," pursuant to LWC Section 241.256. Criteria for funding flood mitigation projects are also described in the Plan, including discretionary fund policy requirements to affirmatively further fair housing. The IMA requires the Town to adopt regulations and policies consistent with the flood mitigation criteria in the Plan for the Coastal Long Island Sound Watershed.

It should be noted that your Honorable Board has authorized the County to issue bonds in connection with previous components of BPL26 as indicated in the annexed fact sheet.

It should also be noted that since BPL26 is a "general fund" project, specific components are subject to a capital budget amendment. Section 1 of the Bond Act authorizes an amendment

to the County's capital budget to the extent the Project scope is inconsistent with any details set forth in the current capital budget. Accordingly, the Bond Act, in addition to authorizing the issuance of bonds for this Project, will also amend the current-year capital budget to reflect the specific location of this Project component.

Your Committee is advised that LWC Section 167.131 mandates that a capital budget amendment that introduces a new capital project or changes the location, size or character of an existing capital project be accompanied to the Board of Legislators by a report of the Westchester County Planning Board (the "Planning Board") with respect to the physical planning aspects of the project. Accordingly, the Planning Board report for BPL26 is annexed.

The Planning Department has advised your Committee that based on its review, the Project may be classified as an "Unlisted" action under the State Environmental Quality Review Act and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617 ("SEQR"). A Resolution, and Short Environmental Assessment Form ("EAF"), prepared by the Planning Department, are attached to assist your Honorable Board in complying with SEQR. For the reasons set forth in the attached EAF, your Committee believes that the proposed action will not have any significant adverse impact on the environment and recommends the adoption of the Resolution prior to enacting the aforementioned Bond Act.

Please note that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of your Honorable Board is required in order to adopt the Bond Act, while a simple majority of the voting strength of your Honorable Board is required to adopt the IMA Act.

Based on the importance of this Project to the County, your Committee recommends favorable action on the annexed proposed Acts.



The project will not have significant adverse impact as it involves the installation of new stormwater infrastructure in previously disturbed areas. New stormwater infrastructure will divert stormwater from the Forest Avenue-Oakland Beach Avenue intersection away from Rye Town Park pond. As such, a proposed pipe will run through Rye Town Park and the park parking lot and out to Dearborn Avenue, then turning east down Dearborn Avenue and discharging directly into Long Island Sound. A water treatment device and velocity dissipator will be installed as part of the project. Installation of this pipe and associated equipment will require minor earthwork within open space areas of the park. Erosion and sediment controls will be employed in accordance with State standards to minimize impacts during construction. Affected areas will be restored for their continued use as open space within the park.

The Rye Town Park and Oakland Beach are listed on the National Register of Historic Places. However, the action will install new subsurface drainage infrastructure that is will not affect the historic character of the adjacent buildings, park or beach. No modifications are proposed to any buildings nor is any disturbance planned for the beach. As stated previously, all open space areas that are disturbed, will be mitigated to ensure their previous functions are maintained within the park.

The project is intended to reduce flooding in connection with storm water from the City of Rye. Proposed improvements will have the capacity to attenuate up to the 100-year frequency storm originating from surrounding community which is already heavily disturbed. Excess stormwater will be metered back into the Long Island Sound as temporary impoundment drain and return to their pre-storm state. The overall drainage pattern will not change.

The proposed action is also a regulated activity requiring a Coastal Erosion Management Permit from the NYSDEC. Development under the permit requires actions be undertaken in a manner that minimizes damage to property and natural protective features, natural resources, minimizes erosion and protect human life.

BOND ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$2,000,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, OR SO MUCH THEREOF AS MAY BE NECESSARY, TO FINANCE THE COUNTY'S SHARE OF THE COST OF A FLOOD MITIGATION PROJECT IN THE TOWN OF RYE, STATING THE ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST THEREOF IS \$2,000,000; STATING THE PLAN OF FINANCING SAID COST INCLUDES THE ISSUANCE OF \$2,000,000 BONDS HEREIN AUTHORIZED; AND PROVIDING FOR A TAX TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS (Adopted , 20)

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (the "Law"), the Westchester County Administrative Code, being Chapter 852 of the Laws of 1948, as amended, an Intermunicipal Agreement between the County and the Town of Rye, and to the provisions of other laws applicable thereto; \$2,000,000 bonds of the County, or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby authorized to be issued to finance the County's share of the cost of a flood mitigation project in the area of Rye Town Park, in the Town of Rye, as part of the Stormwater Reconnaissance Plan for the Coastal Long Island Sound Basin, as set forth in the County's Current Year Capital Budget, as amended. To the extent that the details set forth in this act are inconsistent with any details set forth in the Current Year Capital Budget of the County, such

Budget shall be deemed and is hereby amended. The estimated maximum cost of the County's share of said specific object or purpose, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof is \$2,000,000. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$2,000,000 bonds herein authorized, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds, and the levy of a tax to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds and notes.

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness of said specific object or purpose, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 3 of the Law, is thirty (30) years;

Section 3. Current funds are not required to be provided as a down payment pursuant to Section 107.00 d. 9. of the Law prior to issuance of the bonds authorized herein, or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds. The County intends to finance, on an interim basis, the costs or a portion of the costs of said improvements for which bonds are herein authorized, which costs are reasonably expected to be reimbursed with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County, pursuant to this Act, in the maximum amount of \$2,000,000. This Act is a declaration of official intent adopted pursuant to the requirements of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2.

Section 4. The estimate of \$2,000,000 as the estimated maximum cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is hereby approved.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of this Act and of the Law, and pursuant to the provisions of §30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes or the renewals thereof, and of §\$50.00, 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of said Law, the powers and duties of the County Board of Legislators relative to authorizing the issuance of any notes in anticipation of the sale of the bonds herein authorized, or the renewals thereof, relative to

providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, relative to prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the respective amounts of bonds herein authorized, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and relative to executing agreements for credit enhancement, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance of the County, as the chief fiscal officer of the County.

Section 6. Each of the bonds authorized by this Act and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale thereof shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by §52.00 of said Local Finance Law and said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the County of Westchester, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the County. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and provision shall be made annually in the budgets of the County by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the notes and bonds to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 7. The validity of the bonds authorized by this Act and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

- (a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or
- (b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this Act or a summary hereof, are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

(c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 8. This Act shall take effect in accordance with Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter.

AN ACT authorizing the County of Westchester to enter into an intermunicipal agreement with the Town of Rye in connection with a flood mitigation project (Capital Project BPL26, Unique ID# 2981).

BE IT ENACTED by the County Board of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. The County of Westchester (the "County") is hereby authorized to enter into an intermunicipal agreement (the "IMA") with the Town of Rye (the "Town"), in connection with a flood mitigation and/or flood damage reduction project in the area of Rye Town Park, pursuant to capital project BPL26 – Flood Mitigation (the "Project").

- §2. The County will contribute an amount of \$1,900,000 to finance up to 50% of the costs associated with the Project.
- §3. In order to give the County the necessary interest in real property to be able to issue bonds towards the Project, the Town shall grant a non-exclusive easement in, on, over, under, and through the Property where the Project is located to the County, for a term commencing upon execution and continuing for a period at least equal to the life of any County bonds issued by the County for the construction of the Project, estimated to be thirty years.
- §4. The term of the IMA shall commence upon execution thereof by both parties and approval of same by the Office of the County Attorney, and shall continue for the life of the bonds issued by the County for the construction of the Project, estimated to be thirty years.
- §5. The County Executive or his authorized designee is empowered to execute any and all documents necessary and appropriate to effectuate the purposes hereof.
 - **§6.** This Act shall take effect immediately.

THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, a municipal corporation of the State of New York, having an office and place of business in the Michaelian Office Building, 148 Martine Avenue, White Plains, New York 10601,

(hereinafter referred to as the "County")

TOWN OF RYE, a municipal corporation of the State of New York, having an office and place of business at 222 Grace Church Street, 3rd Floor, Port Chester, NY 10573,

(hereinafter referred to as the "Municipality").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, in response to serious flooding issues throughout Westchester County, in 2011 the County enacted the Westchester County Storm Water Management Law ("SWML") to assist municipalities with storm water management (flood mitigation). See Laws of Westchester County Chapter 241, Article III-A, Sections 241.252-241.260. The SWML provides for the evaluation of flooding within the County through preparation of watershed "reconnaissance plans", and the SWML authorizes County cooperation with municipalities, including funding assistance, to improve storm water management and reduce flooding. The SWML authorizes the creation of a Storm Water Advisory Board (the "SWAB") to assist County municipalities in addressing flooding; and

WHEREAS, the SWML enables the County to partner with County municipalities to provide funding for flood mitigation and/or flood damage reduction projects; and

WHEREAS, the SWML funding program is divided into "Phase I" funding and "Phase II" funding; and

WHEREAS, Phase I funding is up to fifty (50) percent toward the costs for the preparation of detailed design, specification and construction documents for flood mitigation and/or flood damage reduction projects; and

WHEREAS, Phase II funding is up to fifty (50) percent toward the costs for the implementation and construction of flood mitigation and/or flood damage reduction projects; and

WHEREAS, approval by the Board of Legislators for Phase I funding does not guarantee approval for Phase II funding; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality wishes to participate in the SWML funding program and has submitted an application to the County for Phase II financial assistance to address flooding problems within the Municipality; and

WHEREAS, a Storm Water Reconnaissance Plan has been prepared by the County departments of Planning and Public Works and Transportation pursuant to the SWML entitled the Stormwater Reconnaissance Plan for the Coastal Long Island Sound Watershed (the "Reconnaissance Plan"); and

WHEREAS, the Reconnaissance Plan was recommended by the SWAB to the County Executive and the Board of Legislators; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators approved the Reconnaissance Plan on August 4th 2014 by Act No. 134 - 2014; and

WHEREAS, the area of flooding for which the Municipality wishes to participate in the SWML funding program is located within a Special Flood Hazard Area as defined by the Federal Emergency Management Agency and shown on the Flood Prone Areas Maps included in the Reconnaissance Plan; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the SWML funding program and in an effort to protect County-owned and/or managed infrastructure, assets and property, including the protection of County bridges, sanitary sewer and/or storm water pipes, and County parkland and other municipal and private property, the County desires to contribute Phase II funding to the costs of a flood mitigation and/or flood damage reduction project known as the Rye Town Park (the "Project"), and further described herein, to be undertaken by the Municipality; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality has prepared designs, specifications and construction documents for the Project and the Project has been presented to and received support from the County Stormwater Advisory Board.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual representations, covenants and agreements herein set forth, the County and the Municipality, each binding itself, its successors and assigns, do mutually promise, covenant and agree as follows:

ARTICLE I

TERM

Section 1.0. The recitals are hereby incorporated by reference into the body of this Agreement.

Section 1.1. The term of this Agreement shall be for a period commencing upon full execution thereof by both parties and approval of same by the Office of County Attorney, as evidenced by the date at the top of Page 1 of this Agreement, and shall continue for a period equal to or greater than the life of any bonds issued by the County to fund the County's portion of the Project.

ARTICLE II

TERMS OF PAYMENT, EASEMENT AND MUNICIPALITY REPRESENTATIONS

Section 2.0. Pursuant to the County's SWML funding program and in an effort to protect County-owned and/or managed infrastructure, assets and property, including the protection of County bridges, sanitary sewer and/or stormwater pipes, and County parkland and other municipal and private property, the County desires at this time to contribute Phase II funding toward construction costs of the Project, including any associated final designs and specifications. The Project is owned by the Municipality and consists of flood mitigation and/or flood damage reduction work. The scope of work for this Phase II funding agreement is more fully described in Schedule "A", attached hereto and made a part hereof. In consideration for the County's aforesaid contribution, the Municipality represents that it shall complete the design, specification, construction documents and construction of the Project in accordance with Schedule "A" and all of the other terms of this Agreement.

The County agrees to finance the design, specification, construction documents and construction for the Project on a reimbursement basis. It is recognized and understood by the Municipality that at the time of execution of this Agreement, the County has obtained appropriations and bonding authority to fund up to \$1,900,000.00 for the construction of the Project. The County share of the construction of the Project shall not exceed that amount. Eligible project construction costs up to \$3,800,000.00 shall be paid up to fifty (50) percent by the County (up to \$1,900,000.00) and fifty (50) percent by the Municipality; provided, however, should the total eligible project construction costs be less than \$3,800,000.00, the County shall only be responsible for fifty (50) percent of the lesser amount. The Municipality shall be responsible for all costs in relation to the Project that exceed the County's

contribution set forth herein, and under no circumstances or conditions, whether now existing or hereafter arising, or whether beyond the present contemplation of the parties, shall the County be expected or required to make any payment of any kind whatsoever or be under any other obligation or liability hereunder in connection with this Project except as herein expressly set forth.

The County does not provide or extend any warranty of fitness for a particular purpose or workmanship for any work undertaken in connection with, or paid under, this Agreement. Payment hereunder by the County shall operate as a release to the County from any and all obligations or liabilities in connection herewith to the Municipality, its contractor(s), or subcontractor(s) hereunder.

Section 2.1. The Municipality represents that within one (1) year of the date hereof that the "Flood Mitigation Criteria" developed by the SWAB and approved by the Board of Legislators will have been adopted in the Municipality's appropriate land use regulations, guidelines and policies or in standalone form, and documentation of the adoption of such policies must be provided to and approved by the Commissioner of the County Department of Planning ("Planning Commissioner"). It is understood and agreed to by the Municipality that the payment of County funds under this Agreement for the Project is contingent upon the Municipality's adoption of the aforesaid policies.

Section 2.2. The parties agree that all payments made by the County to the Municipality shall be on a reimbursement basis only. Any and all requests for payment to be made, including any request for partial payment upon completion of a portion of the Project, shall be submitted by the Municipality on properly executed payment vouchers of the County and paid only after approval by the Planning Commissioner and the Commissioner of the Westchester County Department of Public Works and Transportation ("DPWT Commissioner"). The Municipality agrees that it shall submit all documentation that the County may require to substantiate all requests for payment. All payment vouchers must be accompanied by a numbered invoice and must contain the invoice number where indicated. All invoices submitted during each calendar year shall utilize consecutive numbering and be non-repeating. In no event shall a *final* payment be made to the Municipality prior to completion of the Project and the approval of same by the Planning Commissioner and DPWT Commissioner. If at any time the Municipality shall neglect or fail to perform properly any of its obligations under this Agreement, the County shall have the right to withhold, in whole or in part, any payments otherwise due or to become due to the Municipality hereunder until such neglect or failure shall have been remedied to the reasonable satisfaction of the County.

Section 2.3. Prior to the construction of the Project, the Municipality agrees to convey to the County, its successors, and assigns a non-exclusive easement(s) (the "Easement(s)") in, upon, under and over that portion of the Municipality's property within which the Project is located (the "Property"), which Easement(s) shall be substantially in the form attached hereto and made a part hereof as Schedule "B". The Municipality shall be solely responsible for obtaining any and all easements on non-Municipally-owned property needed in connection with the carrying out of the Project and shall provide copies of said easements to the Planning Commissioner. Said easements shall name Westchester County as a Grantee solely for the purposes of carrying out the work needed to accomplish the Project and said easements shall be for a term equal to or greater than the life of any bonds issued by the County to fund the County's portion of the Project.

Section 2.4. The Municipality represents warrants and guarantees that:

- (a) It is a municipal corporation duly organized, validly existing under the laws of the State of New York; the execution and performance of this Agreement by the Municipality has been duly authorized by its governing body; this Agreement, and any other documents required to be delivered by the Municipality when so delivered, will constitute the legal, valid and binding obligations of the Municipality in accordance with their respective terms; and the Municipality will deliver to the County at the time of execution of this Agreement a resolution adopted by its governing body authorizing the execution of this Agreement, and any other documents required to be delivered by the Municipality, including the aforesaid Easement;
- (b) The person signing this Agreement on behalf of the Municipality has full authority to bind the Municipality to all of the terms and conditions of this Agreement pursuant to the resolution granting such authority by the Municipality's governing body, as noted above;
- (c) It is financially and technically qualified to perform its obligations hereunder, including without limitation, full implementation of the Project; and
- (d) The Municipality acknowledges that the County is acting in reliance on the above representations.

ARTICLE III

MANAGEMENT OF THE PROJECT

Section 3.0. The Municipality shall be responsible for all construction phases of the Project, including, but not limited to, any additional study or engineering necessary to fully comply with the requirements of the funding program, final engineering, specifications and designs, and all phases of construction and post-construction elements. The Municipality shall submit any required documentation, including additional engineering or progress reports, to the DPWT Commissioner or his duly authorized representative and to the Planning Commissioner or her duly authorized designee for review, and said design plans and specifications shall be mutually approved by all parties. The Municipality shall fully complete the project tasks as set forth in Schedule "A" and submit proof of such completion to the County for its review and approval on or before five (5) years from the date of the execution of this Agreement by all parties. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the parties may agree to a twelve (12) month extension of time for completion, subject to all necessary legal approvals for such extension of time. In the event that the Municipality fails to complete the scope of work set forth in Schedule "A" and submit proof of such completion to the County in a timely manner as set forth herein, including any twelve (12) month extension agreed to between the parties, it shall remit all funds disbursed hereunder to the County within thirty (30) days of receipt of written request from the County unless an extension of time for completion is mutually agreed to between the parties, subject to all necessary legal approvals for said extension of time.

Section 3.1. In connection with the Project, the Municipality shall obtain all required approvals and permits and promptly execute and comply with all statutes, ordinances, rules, orders, regulations, codes and requirements of the Federal, State, County and municipal governments of the County. The Municipality shall also comply with any and all sanitary rules and regulations of the State and County Health Departments and with the State Environmental Quality Review Act. The Municipality shall comply with the aforementioned statutes, ordinances, rules, orders, regulations, codes and requirements in its implementation of the Project including, but not limited to management, operation, maintenance and supervision of same.

ARTICLE IV

FAIR AND AFFORDABLE HOUSING CONDITIONS

Section 4.0. The Municipality hereby commits to the County that it is in compliance with the terms and conditions set forth in the County's Discretionary Funding Policy annexed hereto and forming a part hereof as Schedule "E" or has submitted documentation to the satisfaction of the County that the Municipality is not considered an eligible municipality under these requirements.

Section 4.1. As further consideration for the County's financial contribution toward the Project, the Municipality certifies that it has adopted municipal zoning code provisions and/or policies which reflect the guidance provided in the Model Ordinance Provisions and the Municipality is committed to affirmatively further fair housing, including a ban on local residency requirements and preferences and other selection preferences that do not affirmatively further fair housing, except to the extent provided in the Model Ordinance Provisions.

<u>Section 4.2.</u> The Municipality agrees to offer to the County a Right of First Refusal to retain and/or purchase any and all land acquired in rem to be used for housing that affirmatively furthers fair housing ("AFFH").

Section 4.3. The Municipality agrees to actively affirmatively further fair housing through its land use regulations and other affirmative measures to assist the development of affordable housing.

<u>Section 4.4.</u> The Municipality further agrees to market housing units that affirmatively further fair housing in accordance with Westchester County's Affirmative Fair Housing Marketing Plan throughout the period of affordability.

<u>Section 4.5.</u> Nothing in this Agreement is intended to affect the County's interest in the Project or release the Municipality from its obligations under the law with respect to affordable AFFH units.

<u>Section 4.6.</u> Should the Municipality fail to abide by any of the above conditions, the Municipality shall, upon thirty (30) days written notice by the County, refund any funds paid to the Municipality under this Agreement.

ARTICLE V

ACCOUNTING

Section 5.0. The Municipality shall cause accurate records and books of account to be maintained in which shall be entered all matters relating to this Agreement, including all liabilities thereof and all expenditures, and payments to any and all contractors or subcontractors involved in the Project. Such books and records shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, consistently applied and shall be kept at a location within Westchester County. The Municipality will provide the County with documentation, upon the County's request, in order to verify same. The County shall have the right to audit, inspect, examine and copy such books and records of the Municipality at all reasonable times during normal business hours at the office of the Municipality. The County's audit rights hereunder extend to all documents, reports, and records which relate to the Municipality's commitment to affirmatively further fair housing as described in Article IV herein.

ARTICLE VI

NOTICES

Section 6.0. All notices of any nature referred to in this Agreement shall be in writing and either sent by registered or certified mail postage pre-paid, or delivered by hand or overnight courier, (with acknowledgement received and a copy of the notice sent by registered or certified mail, postage pre-paid), as set forth below or to such other addresses as the respective parties hereto may designate in writing. Notice shall be effective on the date of receipt. Notices shall be sent to the following:

ARTICLE VII INDEMNIFICATION

Section 7.0. To the fullest extent permitted by law, the Municipality shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the County, its elected officials, officers, employees and agents (the "Indemnitees") from and against, any and all liability, damage, claims, demands, costs, judgments, fees, attorney's fees or loss arising directly or indirectly from the Project, including any which may arise from a change in applicable laws, rules and regulations, that may be imposed upon or incurred by or asserted against any of the Indemnitees by reason of any of the following:

- (a) <u>Work</u>. Any construction, repair, alteration, addition, replacement, restoration or improvement work done by or on behalf of the Municipality in, on or about the Project or any part thereof;
- (b) <u>Use</u>. The use, occupation, condition, operation, maintenance, management, supervision or development of or providing security for all or any portion of the Project, or the affected portion thereof, by or on behalf of the Municipality, including without limitation, any liability with respect to the any violations imposed by any governmental authorities in respect of any of the foregoing;
- (c) Act or Failure to Act of Municipality. Any act performed by, or any failure to perform any act required to be performed by the Municipality, a third party under the direction or control of the Municipality, or any of the Municipality's officers, agents, contractors, servants, employees, lessees or invitees in connection with this Agreement or the Project;

- (d) <u>Accidents, Injury to Person or Property</u>. Any accident, injury, (including death at any time resulting therefrom) or damage to any person, including, without limitation, employees of the Municipality or any Indemnitee, or property occurring in, on, or about the Project or any part thereof; or
- (e) <u>Breach of Municipality's Obligation</u>. Any failure or refusal on the part of the Municipality to perform its obligations pursuant to this Agreement.
- (f) <u>Municipality's Obligations</u>. The Municipality's failure, within any applicable grace period, to perform or comply with any of the covenants, terms or conditions contained in this Agreement on the Municipality's part to be kept, observed, performed or complied with within any applicable grace period.
- Section 7.1. The Municipality hereby further acknowledges and agrees that it shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the County for any "Environmental Damages" to the Property. "Environmental Damages" shall mean all claims, damages, demands losses, penalties, fines, fees, liabilities (including strict liability), encumbrances, liens, costs and expenses of investigation and defense of any, whether or not such claim is ultimately defeated, and of any good faith settlement or judgment, of whatever kind or nature, contingent or otherwise, matured or unmatured, foreseeable or unforeseeable, including, without limitation, reasonable attorney's fees and disbursements and consultants' fees, any of which are incurred as the result of the existence of "Hazardous Material" or "Hazardous Waste" upon, beneath, or about the Property or migrating or threatening to migrate to or from the Property, or the existence of a violation of "Environmental Requirements" pertaining to the Property, regardless of whether the existence of such "Hazardous Materials" or "Hazardous Waste" or the violation of "Environmental Requirements" arose prior to the Municipality or County's ownership of the Property, including, without limitation:
 - (i) damages for personal injury, or injury to Property or natural resources occurring upon or off the Property, foreseeable or unforeseeable, including, without limitation, lost profits, consequential damages, the cost of demolition or rebuilding of any improvements of real property, interest and penalties;
 - (ii) fees incurred for the service of attorneys, consultants, contractors or experts, laboratories and all other costs incurred in connection with the investigation or remediation of such "Hazardous Materials" or "Hazardous Waste" or violation of "Environmental Requirements" including, but not limited to, the preparation of any feasibility studies or reports or the performance of any cleanup, remediation, removal, response, abatement, containment, closure, restoration or monitoring work required by

any federal, state or local governmental agency or political subdivision, or reasonably necessary to make the full use of the Property or any other property or otherwise expended in connection with such conditions; and

- (iii) liability to any third person or governmental agency to indemnify such person or agency for the costs expended in connection with the items referenced in subparagraph (ii) herein;
- (iv) diminution in the value of the Property and damages for loss of business and restriction on the use of the Property or any part thereof.

Section 7.1.a. Definitions. For the purposes of this Agreement, the following definitions shall apply:

- (1) "Hazardous Materials" or "Hazardous Waste" shall mean any substance:
 - (i) the presence of which requires investigation or remediation under any federal, state, or local statute, regulation, ordinance, order, action, policy or common law; or
 - (ii) which is or becomes defined as a hazardous waste, hazardous substance, pollutant or contaminant under any federal, state or local statute, regulation, rule, or ordinance or amendments thereto including, without limitations, the United States Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act, as amended, 42 USC §9601 (14) 42 USC §9602 and any "hazardous waste" as defined in or listed under the United States Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended, 42 USC §6901(5), 42 USC §6921; or
 - (iii) which is toxic, explosive, corrosive, flammable, infectious, radioactive, carcinogenic, mutagenic, or otherwise hazardous and is or becomes regulated by any governmental authority, agency, department, commission, board or instrumentality of the United States, the State of New York or any political subdivision thereof; or
 - (iv) the presence of which, on the Property, causes or threatens to cause a nuisance on the Property or to nearby properties or poses or threatens to pose a hazard to the health and safety of persons on, about or nearby the Property; or
 - (v) the presence of which on nearby properties would constitute a trespass by the owner of the Property; or
 - (vi) without limitation which contains gasoline, diesel fuel, or other petroleum hydrocarbons; or
 - (vii) without limitation which contains polychlorinated bipheynols (PCBs), asbestos, or urea formaldehyde foam insulation.
- (2) "Environmental Requirements" shall mean all applicable present and future statutes, regulations, rules, ordinances, codes, licenses, permits, orders, approvals, plans, authorizations,

concessions, franchises, and similar items, of all government agencies, departments, commissions, boards, bureaus, or instrumentalities of the United States, the State of New York and the political subdivisions thereof; and all applicable judicial, administrative, and regulatory decrees, judgments, and orders relating to the protection of human health or the environment.

Section 7.2. The Municipality shall promptly notify the County in writing of any claims made or any suits instituted against the Municipality of which it has knowledge arising from its performances hereunder or in connection with this Agreement or in connection with the Project.

<u>Section 7.3.</u> In the event the Municipality does not provide the above defense and indemnification to the County, and such refusal or denial to provide the above defense and indemnification is found to be in breach of all or part of this Article, then the Municipality shall reimburse the County's reasonable attorney's fees incurred in connection with the defense of any action, and in connection with enforcing all or part of this Article of the Agreement.

Section 7.4. This Article shall survive termination or expiration of this Agreement.

ARTICLE VIII MISCELLANEOUS

Section 8.0. Any purported delegation of duties or assignment of rights under this Agreement without the prior express written consent of the County is void.

Section 8.1. The Municipality shall submit documentation to the County demonstrating compliance with the State Environmental Quality Review Act and its implementing regulations ("SEQR"), including those activities that have been determined not to constitute an action as defined by SEQR or activities determined to be Type II actions as defined by SEQR. The Municipality shall act as the lead agency for meeting the requirements of SEQR for any Unlisted or Type I action that is undertaken pursuant to this Agreement, unless otherwise directed by the Planning Commissioner. The Municipality shall include the County as an Involved Agency (as defined in SEQR) in all matters relating to SEQR and conduct a coordinated review where applicable.

<u>Section 8.2.</u> The failure of the County to insist upon strict performance of any term, condition or covenant herein shall not be deemed a waiver of any rights or remedies that the County may have and shall not be deemed a waiver of any subsequent breach or default in the terms, conditions or covenants herein.

<u>Section 8.3.</u> It is mutually understood and agreed that the terms, covenants, conditions and agreements herein contained shall be binding upon the parties hereto and upon their respective successors, legal representatives and assigns.

Section 8.4. This Agreement and its attachments constitute the entire agreement between the parties hereto with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede all previous negotiations, commitments and writings. This Agreement shall not be released, discharged, changed or modified except by an instrument in writing signed by a duly authorized representative of each of the parties, and approved by the Office of the County Attorney.

Section 8.5. It is recognized and understood that the Municipality is not an agent of the County and in accordance with such status, the Municipality, its consultant(s), its subcontractor(s), and their respective officers, agents, employees, representatives and servants shall at all times during the term of this Agreement neither hold themselves out as, nor claim to be acting in the capacity of officers, employees, agents, representatives or servants of the County, nor make any claim, demand or application for any right or privilege applicable to the County, including without limitation, rights or privileges derived from workers compensation coverage, unemployment insurance benefits, social security coverage and retirement membership or credit.

Section 8.6. The Municipality shall comply with the insurance requirements contained in Schedule "C" entitled "Standard Insurance Provisions," attached hereto and made a part hereof. The Municipality may, in lieu of procuring and maintaining the aforesaid insurance, elect to obtain such coverage through a program of self-insurance, which coverage and program shall be in accordance with generally accepted standards for similarly situated entities. In addition to the foregoing, the Municipality shall contractually ensure that all of its contractors, subcontractors and/or independent contractors (individually a "Contractor" or collectively, the "Contractors") that are engaged to construct the Project

shall provide such insurance coverage as described in Schedule "C" naming as additional insured, the Municipality and the County and their respective officials (elected or otherwise), officers, employees and agents (collectively the "Additional Insureds"). The Municipality shall require, before the Project commences that each such insurance policy be endorsed to contain the following clauses: (a) the insurer shall have no right to recovery or subrogation against the Additional Insureds (including their respective officials (elected or otherwise), officers, employees and agents), it being the intention that the insurance policy shall protect both the insured and the Additional Insureds and be primary coverage for any and all losses covered by such insurance; (b) the clause "other insurance provisions" in any such insurance policy shall not apply to the Additional Insureds or their insurance policies; (c) the insurer issuing the policy shall have no recourse against the Additional Insureds (including their respective officials (elected or otherwise), officers, employees and agents) for payment of any premiums or for assessments under any form of policy; and (d) any and all deductibles in such insurance policy shall be assumed by and be for the account of, and at the sole risk of the Contractor.

Section 8.7. This Agreement shall not be enforceable until signed by all parties and approved by the Office of the County Attorney.

Section 8.8. In the event that any one or more provisions, sections, subsections, clauses or words of this Agreement are for any reason held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provision of this Agreement, but this Agreement shall be construed and enforced as if such illegal or invalid section, subsection, clause or word has not been contained herein.

<u>Section 8.9.</u> This Agreement shall be deemed executory only to the extent of funds appropriated and made available for the purpose of this Agreement and no liability on account thereof shall be incurred by the County beyond the amount of such appropriated funds.

Section 8.10. All covenants, stipulations, promises, agreements and obligations of the Municipality and the County contained herein shall be deemed to be stipulations, promises, agreements and obligations of the Municipality and the County and not of any member, officer or employee of the Municipality or the County in his/her individual capacity and no recourse shall be had for any obligation

or liability herein or any claim based thereon against any member, officer or employee of the Municipality or the County or any natural person executing this Agreement.

Section 8.11. The parties represent that they have all requisite power and authority to execute, deliver and perform this Agreement, and this Agreement has been duly authorized by all necessary action on the part of the parties. The parties each agree to execute and deliver such further instruments and to seek such additional authority as may be required to carry out the intent and purpose of this Agreement, including providing the County with any necessary property interests in the Project in order for the County to fund the Project.

Section 8.12. This Agreement may be executed in two or more counterparts and all counterparts so executed shall for all purposes constitute one agreement binding upon all the parties hereto.

Section 8.13. Nothing in this Agreement shall act to confer third-party beneficiary rights on any person or entity not a party to this Agreement.

Section 8.14. The headings in this Agreement are for reference purposes only and shall not be used in construing the terms of this Agreement.

<u>Section 8.15.</u> The Municipality agrees to comply with the terms set forth in Schedule "D", attached hereto and made a part hereof, regarding Vendor Direct Payment Terms.

<u>Section 8.16</u>. The Municipality hereby acknowledges that any provision of this Agreement which requires consent of the County shall be subject to receipt by the County of any and all necessary legal approvals.

Section 8.17. No director, officer, employee, agent or other person authorized to act on behalf of the County shall have any personal liability in connection with this Agreement or any failure of the County to perform its obligations hereunder. No director, officer, employee, agent or other person authorized to act on behalf of the Municipality shall have any personal liability in connection with this Agreement or any failure of the Municipality to perform its obligations hereunder.

<u>Section 8.18.</u> The Municipality agrees to allow the County reasonable access to the Project, during normal business hours, to permit inspection and observation of the Project. The Municipality may require the County to provide reasonable notice prior to such inspection and observation.

STANDARD INSURANCE PROVISIONS (MUNICIPALITY)

1. Prior to commencing work, and throughout the term of the Agreement, the Municipality shall obtain at its own cost and expense the required insurance as delineated below from insurance companies licensed in the State of New York, carrying a Best's financial rating of A or better. Municipality shall provide evidence of such insurance to the County of Westchester ("County"), either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County ("Director"). The policies or certificates thereof shall provide that ten (10) days prior to cancellation or material change in the policy, notices of same shall be given to the Director either by overnight mail or personal delivery for all of the following stated insurance policies. All notices shall name the Municipality and identify the Agreement.

If at any time any of the policies required herein shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing any such policy shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, the Municipality shall upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and submit the policy or the certificate as requested by the Director to the Office of Risk Management of the County for approval by the Director. Upon failure of the Municipality to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance, the Agreement, at the election of the County, may be declared suspended, discontinued or terminated.

Failure of the Municipality to take out, maintain, or the taking out or maintenance of any required insurance, shall not relieve the Municipality from any liability under the Agreement, nor shall the insurance requirements be construed to conflict with or otherwise limit the contractual obligations of the Municipality concerning indemnification.

All property losses shall be made payable to the "County of Westchester" and adjusted with the appropriate County personnel.

In the event that claims, for which the County may be liable, in excess of the insured amounts provided herein are filed by reason of Municipality's negligent acts or omissions under the Agreement or by virtue of the provisions of the labor law or other statute or any other reason, the amount of excess of such claims or any portion thereof, may be withheld from payment due or to become due the Municipality until such time as the Municipality shall furnish such additional security covering such claims in form satisfactory to the Director.

In the event of any loss, if the Municipality maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums identified herein, the County shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Municipality. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

- The Municipality shall provide proof of the following coverage (if additional coverage is required for a specific agreement, those requirements will be described in the Agreement):
 - a) Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability. Certificate form C-105.2 or State Fund Insurance Company form U-26.3 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Workers' Compensation Law. State Workers' Compensation Board form DB-120.1 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Disability Benefits Law. Location of operation shall be "All locations in Westchester County, New York."

Where an applicant claims to not be required to carry either a Workers' Compensation Policy or Disability Benefits Policy, or both, the employer must complete NYS form CE-200, available to download at: http://www.wcb.ny.gov.

If the employer is self-insured for Workers' Compensation, he/she should present a certificate from the New York State Worker's Compensation Board evidencing that fact (Either SI-12, Certificate of Workers' Compensation Self-Insurance, or GSI-105.2, Certificate of Participation in Workers' Compensation Group Self-Insurance).

- b) Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 (c.s.1) per occurrence and a \$2,000,000 aggregate limit naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis. This insurance shall include the following coverages:
 - i.Premises Operations.
 - ii.Broad Form Contractual.
 - iii.Independent Contractor and Sub-Contractor.
 - iv. Products and Completed Operations.
- c) Commercial Umbrella/Excess Insurance: \$2,000,000 each Occurrence and Aggregate naming the "County of Westchester" as additional insured, written on a "follow the form" basis.

NOTE: Additional insured status shall be provided by standard or other endorsement that extends coverage to the County of Westchester for both on-going and completed operations.

- d) Automobile Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$1,000,000 for bodily injury and a minimum limit of \$100,000 per occurrence for property damage or a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 unless otherwise indicated in the contract specifications. This insurance shall include for bodily injury and property damage the following coverages and name the "County of Westchester" as additional insured:
 - (i) Owned automobiles.
 - (ii) Hired automobiles.
 - (iii) Non-owned automobiles.

- 3. All policies of the Municipality shall be endorsed to contain the following clauses:
- (a) Insurers shall have no right to recovery or subrogation against the County (including its employees and other agents and agencies), it being the intention of the parties that the insurance policies so effected shall protect both parties and be primary coverage for any and all losses covered by the above-described insurance.
- (b) The clause "other insurance provisions" in a policy in which the County is named as an insured, shall not apply to the County.
- (c) The insurance companies issuing the policy or policies shall have no recourse against the County (including its agents and agencies as aforesaid) for payment of any premiums or for assessments under any form of policy.
- (d) Any and all deductibles in the above described insurance policies shall be assumed by and be for the account of, and at the sole risk of, the Municipality.

Westchester County Vendor Direct Program Frequently Asked Questions

1. WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF THE ELECTRONIC FUNDS TRANSFER (EFT) ASSOCIATED WITH THE VENDOR DIRECT PROGRAM?

There are several advantages to having your payments automatically deposited into your designated bank account via EFT:

Payments are secure – Paper checks can be lost in the mail or stolen, but money deposited directly into your bank account is more secure.

You save time – Money deposited into your bank account is automatic. You save the time of preparing and delivering the deposit to the bank. Additionally, the funds are immediately available to you.

- 2. ARE MY PAYMENTS GOING TO BE PROCESSED ON THE SAME SCHEDULE AS THEY WERE BEFORE VENDOR DIRECT? Yes.
- 3. HOW QUICKLY WILL A PAYMENT BE DEPOSITED INTO MY ACCOUNT? Payments are deposited two business days after the voucher/invoice is processed. Saturdays, Sundays, and legal holidays are not considered business days.

4. HOW WILL I KNOW WHEN THE PAYMENT IS IN MY BANK ACCOUNT AND WHAT IT IS FOR?

Under the Vendor Direct program you will receive an e-mail notification two days prior to the day the payment will be credited to your designated account. The e-mail notification will come in the form of a remittance advice with the same information that currently appears on your check stub, and will contain the date that the funds will be credited to your account.

- 5. WHAT IF THERE IS A DISCREPANCY IN THE AMOUNT RECEIVED?
 Please contact your Westchester County representative as you would have in the past if there were a discrepancy on a check received.
- 6. WHAT IF I DO NOT RECEIVE THE MONEY IN MY DESIGNATED BANK ACCOUNT ON THE DATE INDICATED IN THE E-MAIL?

- 7. WHAT MUST I DO IF I CHANGE MY BANK OR MY ACCOUNT NUMBER? Whenever you change any information or close your account a new Vendor Direct Payment Authorization Form must be submitted. Appendix D-2(ii): Discretionary Funding Allocation Policy as approved January 10, 2012

DISCRETIONARY FUNDING POLICY

In August 2009, Westchester County entered into a Stipulation and Order of Settlement and Dismissal in US. ex rel. Anti-Discrimination Center of Metro New York v. Westchester County, New York (the "Settlement Agreement"). Beginning on March 1, 2012, the grant of discretionary intermunicipal funding, including but not limited to County Open Space funds and CDBG funding, ("Discretionary Funding") to municipalities eligible under the Settlement Agreement ("Recipient Eligible Municipalities") shall be conditioned, as appropriate, upon the Recipient Eligible Municipality's commitment to affirmatively further fair housing within its borders. This policy does not apply to municipalities in Westchester County other than the Recipient Eligible Municipalities.

Each Recipient Eligible Municipality shall be required to commit to the County, in writing, that it is in compliance with the following terms and conditions in connection with its commitment to affirmatively further fair housing:

- (a) Recipient Eligible Municipality has adopted municipal zoning code provisions and/or policies which reflect the guidance provided in the Model Ordinance Provisions approved pursuant to the Settlement Agreement and demonstrate a commitment by the Recipient Eligible Municipality to affirmatively further fair housing, including a ban on local residency requirements and preferences and other selection preferences that do not affirmatively further fair housing, except to the extent provided in the Model Ordinance Provisions;
- (b) Recipient Eligible Municipality will offer the County a Right of First Refusal to retain and/or purchase any and all land acquired in rem to be used for housing that affirmatively furthers fair housing; and
- (c) Recipient Eligible Municipality will actively further implementation of the Settlement Agreement through its land use regulations and other affirmative measures to assist the development of affordable housing.

Such commitments by Recipient Eligible Municipality shall be stated in the funding agreement between the County and the Recipient Eligible Municipality.

The funding agreement will also provide that housing units that affirmatively further fair housing must be marketed in accordance with Westchester County's Affirmative Fair Housing Marketing Plan approved pursuant to the Settlement Agreement, throughout the period of affordability.

Applications for Discretionary Funding submitted by non-municipal entities will be reviewed to determine whether or not such entity is acting as an agent of a municipality for purposes of the project for which funding is sought. If such entity is deemed to be acting in the capacity of agent for a municipality, the application will be subject to a review of the agent-municipality's compliance with the policy of affirmatively furthering fair housing stated above. The determination as to whether an agency relationship exists will be based on the principles of law relating to agency relationships in New York State, and the fact that the non-municipal entity/applicant may be required by local municipal codes to obtain municipal approvals or abide by municipal processes for such approvals in connection with such application will not be determinative of the agency relationship. Westchester County will provide notice of all non-municipal applications for funding to the local municipality in which the funding is proposed to be spent.

The County's audit rights under any grant of or funding agreement for Discretionary Funding will extend to all documents, reports, and records which relate to the Recipient Eligible Municipality's commitment to affirmatively further fair housing as described herein. Should Recipient Eligible Municipality fail to abide by any of the above conditions, Recipient Eligible Municipality will be obliged, upon thirty (30) days written notice by the County to refund any Discretionary Funding paid to the Recipient Eligible Municipality.

SUBJECT:

of \$33.50 per hour per escort.

A few days ago, a person physically assaulted a caseworker for the Department of Social Services ("DSS") while the caseworker was making contact with clients in the field. The caseworker suffered major, life-threatening injuries and is currently fighting for her life. DSS has determined that there is, therefore, an urgent need to take action to protect DSS staff from further physical harm while they are performing their duties on behalf of the County of Westchester (the "County").

Based on the details specified in the emergency-declaration memorandum, dated June 4, 2024, which I have submitted to your Honorable Board, in accordance with Section 167.171(3) of the Laws of Westchester County, it has been determined that this is a condition that was unforeseen, affects the life, health, and safety the staff of DSS and the other inhabitants of the County, and requires immediate action that cannot await competitive bidding. Therefore, this situation meets the legal requirements for an emergency contract under Section 167.171(5) of the Laws of Westchester County and Section 103(4) of the New York General Municipal Law. This procurement, which is funded in part by federal funds, also meets the requirements of 2 C.F.R. 200.320(c)(3), which allows for non-competitive procurement when "[t]he public exigency or emergency for the requirement will not permit a delay resulting from publicizing a competitive solicitation", based on the emergency need for security escort services (the "Services"), as described above and in the referenced emergency-declaration memorandum.

In response to this emergency, DSS solicited quotations for hourly rates from three (3) contractors that customarily provide the Services. The best hourly rate for the Services has been offered by Century Protective Services Inc. ("Century").

Accordingly, authority is requested from your Honorable Board for the County to enter into an emergency contract with Century, pursuant to which it will provide the County with the Services for DSS personnel, for a period of one (1) year, commencing upon execution, for a total amount not-to-exceed \$209,040.00, payable at a rate of \$33.50 per hour per escort (the "Emergency Contract"; DSS3027-24).

The proposed Emergency Contract will serve a public purpose by ensuring that DSS personnel have sufficient security in order to carry out their duties for the County and its inhabitants.

The goal and objective of the proposed Emergency Contract is to ensure that DSS personnel have sufficient security in order to carry out their duties for the County and its inhabitants.

The goal and objective of the proposed Emergency Contract is in the best interests of the County in terms of public health and safety, as ensuring that DSS personnel have sufficient security in order to carry out their duties for the County and its inhabitants will ultimately help safeguard the health and safety of DSS personnel, the persons with whom the DSS personnel are interacting, and the public, overall.

The goal and objective of the proposed Emergency Contract will be tracked and monitored by DSS personnel.

I respectfully recommend the adoption of the attached resolution.

The attached Resolution is being submitted pursuant to the Emergency Declaration that was submitted to your Honorable Board on October 1, 2024.

On September 13, 2024, an inspection conducted by Johnson Controls, Inc. ("JCI"), as required by the County's on-going maintenance contract, at the Westchester County Center, revealed that a leak exists in the heat exchanger in one of the three boilers. The damaged heat exchanger requires replacement prior to the winter months, but due to a backlog the necessary parts will take roughly 14 weeks which means the County would not be able to properly heat the building or provide hot water. It is recommended by the County's contractor that the best solution is to replace the entire boiler, which is readily available and can be installed prior to the cold weather arriving and will avoid any service disruption at the County Center.

As noted in the Emergency Declaration, the Department of Parks, Recreation and Conservation (the "Department"), following its standard emergency contract protocols, selected JCI to perform Contract PRC-1448 Emergency Boiler Service, at Westchester County Center, 198 Central Avenue, White Plains, New York. The emergency work includes the replacement of (1) AERCO BMK 2000 Benchmark boiler, including all necessary labor and materials to remove the current boiler and install the replacement boiler. JCI will remove and reinstall duct work for a rigger to move the boiler and will disconnect and reconnect all gas and water piping along with breeching and provide startup by a factory service representative.

Attached for your consideration is a resolution, which, if approved by your Honorable Board, would authorize the County of Westchester ("County") to enter into Contract No. PRC-1448 with JCI in an amount not to exceed \$119,588.00, payable in accordance with an approved budget. The Department has reviewed JCI's breakdown for the work and has determined that the costs are consistent with similar items of work on other County Projects. The term of the Agreement shall be October 21, 2024 through November 30, 2024.

This emergency contract is in the public's best interest to protect the public health, safety, and security of the residents of Westchester County.

This emergency contract has been reviewed by the Law Department and a proposed form of Resolution is attached hereto for your approval.

It is my recommendation that Emergency Contract No. PRC-1448 be awarded to Johnson Controls, Inc. in the amount of \$119,588.00.

As we informed your Honorable Board in a Declaration of Emergency Situation memorandum dated October 24, 2024 (the "Memorandum"), after the deadline for voter registration expired on October 26, 2024, the County of Westchester ("County"), through its Board of Elections ("BOE"), was required by law to print direct mail postcards and send them to all registered voters residing in Westchester County. This work is normally handled through the County's own print shop. However, because the County print shop was overwhelmed by producing this year's numerous State ballot proposals and County abstract proposal, it could not print the direct mail postcards for the BOE within the allotted time frame for voters to receive the information prior to early voting. Therefore, the BOE encountered an emergency situation that, if not addressed promptly, would have resulted in voters not being notified in a timely manner.

Based on the details specified in the Memorandum, which was submitted to your Honorable Board in accordance with Section 167.171(3) of the Laws of Westchester County, it has been determined that this was a condition that was unforeseen and required immediate action that could not await competitive bidding. Therefore, this situation met the legal requirements for an emergency contract under Section 167.171(5) of the Laws of Westchester County and Section 103(4) of the New York General Municipal Law.

Accordingly, authority is now requested from your Honorable Board for the County to enter into an Emergency Contract with Phoenix Graphics Inc. ("Phoenix"), pursuant to which Phoenix agreed to print direct mail postcards for the BOE and deliver same to the White Plains Post Office for mailing (the "Emergency Contract"). The term of the Emergency Contract commenced retroactively on October 1, 2024 and expired on October 31, 2024. In consideration for the printing and delivery services rendered, the County will pay Phoenix an amount not-to-exceed \$71,175.00, payable in full upon execution of the Emergency Contract.

The proposed Emergency Contract serves a public purpose by enabling the BOE to provide complete election information to registered voters.

Accordingly, we most respectfully recommend the adoption of the attached resolution.

Attached for your consideration is a resolution, which, if approved by your Honorable Board, would authorize the County of Westchester ("County") to enter into an agreement with Zamperla, Inc. ("Zamperla") to perform emergency work, which includes inspecting, repairing, replacing and maintaining certain rides at Playland Park and procuring necessary supplies and parts, retroactive to April 15, 2025 and continuing through September 5, 2025 ("Agreement"). The Agreement shall be in an amount not to exceed \$1,506,639.48 for ride restoration, maintenance and support, parts, overhead and contingency, plus a County option for additional operations support services, in an amount not to exceed \$228,390.00, for a total aggregate amount not to exceed \$1,735,029.48, pursuant to an approved budget and subject to appropriations.

This Resolution is being submitted pursuant to the Emergency Declaration that was submitted to your Honorable Board on May 1, 2025 (the "Emergency Declaration"), which outlined the reasons and nature of the emergency.

In summary, on April 12, 2021 the Board of Legislators adopted an Act authorizing the County to enter into a Second Restated and Amended Playland Management Agreement (the "Second Restated Agreement") with Standard Amusements LLC ("Standard"). The Second Restated Agreement was duly executed on or about July 22, 2021. On January 21, 2025, the County received a Notice of Termination from Standard effective February 20, 2025, which purports to terminate the Second Restated Agreement. On January 22, 2025 the County sent a response rejecting Standard's Notice of Termination and reciting a number of breaches on the part of Standard. On January 30, 2025, Standard sent another letter stating, *inter alia*, that its termination notice was valid, that Standard will not manage Playland in 2025, and the County's breach claims were frivolous. Thereafter on February 4, 2025 the County sent a letter to Standard's attorneys escalating the dispute to arbitration pursuant to Section 43(ii) of the Second Restated Agreement. In accordance with the Second Restated Agreement

the parties have selected arbitrators and have each submitted documents in support of their claims. The arbitration hearing is scheduled to commence on August 12, 2025.

In order to open the iconic Playland Amusement Park for a portion of the 2025 operating season, the County Department of Parks, Recreation and Conservation ("Department") declared an emergency situation. As an emergency, this situation cannot await competitive bidding. The Department selected Zamperla to perform the necessary emergency work, which includes inspecting, repairing, replacing and maintaining specific rides and procuring necessary supplies and parts. The County owns 11 rides that were manufactured by Zamperla and a number of other rides manufactured by a company that is no longer in business. Zamperla not only has familiarity with the rides but also has the expertise and ability to provide the parts and maintenance.

Based on the above, it's in the best interest of the County to enter into an agreement with Zamperla on an emergency basis as it is the most-timely and fiscally efficient solution and will safeguard the County's property and secure the public safety of park attendees and staff.

Attached hereto please find a resolution, which if approved by your Honorable Board, would authorize the County of Westchester (the "County") to enter into an emergency contract with Smart Moving & Storage, Inc. ("Smart Move") for a term commencing on June 1, 2025 and terminating one year thereafter for Smart Move to provide Primary, Special, Early and General Election Moving Services of Voting Machines, E-Poll Books and Printers, Cabinets, PPE, Supply Bags, Privacy Booths and Peripheral Markers between the County Warehouse and Various Polling Place Locations in Westchester County for Zone 1 – CORTLANDT, OSSINING, PEEKSKILL, SOMES AND YORKTOWN, and Zone 2 – BEDFORD, LEWISBORO, MOUNT KISCO, NEW CASTLE, NORTH CSTLE, NORTH SALEM, MOUNT PLEASANT, AND POUND RIDGE, for an amount not to exceed \$314,240.00, payable pursuant to an approved budget.

As your Honorable Board may recall, on May 20, 2025, the Westchester County Board of Elections ("WBOE") filed a Declaration of Emergency (the "Declaration") with your Honorable Board in which it set forth in detail how Whalen's Moving & Storage of Westchester, LLC ("Whalen") failed to fulfill its obligations under its agreement with the County, dated November 24, 2024, for 2025 and 2026 Primary, Special, Early and General Election Moving Services for Voting Machines, E-Poll Books and Printers, Cabinets, PPE, Supply Bags, Privacy Booths and Peripheral Markers between the County Warehouse and Various Polling Place Locations in Westchester County for the following three (3) zones:

ZONE 1 - Cortlandt, Ossining, Peekskill, Somers and Yorktown

ZONE 2 – Bedford, Lewisboro, Mount Kisco, New Castle, North Castle, North Salem, Mount Pleasant, and Pound Ridge, and

ZONE 3 - Greenburgh, Harrison and White Plains.

In the Declaration, the WBOE explained how the moving of voting machine equipment is a critical service, and, due to Whalen's poor performance, the County had no choice but to terminate its agreement with Whalen.

The Declaration further explained that, after the termination of Whalen's agreement, the WBOE encountered an emergency situation for which it could not await procurement of a replacement contract through the usual bid processes.

The WBOE informed your Honorable Board that it would need to immediately engage alternative provider(s) to provide the moving services for Zones 1, 2 and 3 without interruption and would submit a resolution to your Honorable Board at a later date requesting approval of the contract(s) to address the emergency.

In furtherance of the Declaration, the WBOE has secured two emergency replacement contracts.

One replacement contract, which is the subject of this resolution, is with Smart Move for Zones 1 and 2 as described above.

The second emergency contract is with Ron's Trucking Corporation for Zone 3, which is being submitted to your Honorable for approval under a separate resolution.

The public purpose, as well as the goal and objective of this contract, is to address the emergency and allow the Board of Elections to continue to carry out its statutory duties in connection with all upcoming 2025 and 2026 Primary, Special, Early and General Elections and to ensure that all eligible County residents have the opportunity to exercise their right to vote.

County Board of Elections staff will monitor the contractor's performance of the contract.

Accordingly, it is our recommendation that aforementioned agreement with Smart Move be approved by your Honorable Board.

RESOLVED, that this Agreement is subject to County appropriations; and be it further

Resolution authorizing the County of Westchester to enter into an emergency contract with Ron's Trucking Corporation for a term commencing on June 1, 2025 and terminating one year thereafter for Ron Trucking's to provide Primary, Special, Early and General Election Moving Services of Voting Machines, E-Poll Books and Printers, Cabinets, PPE, Supply Bags, Privacy Booths and Peripheral Markers between the County Warehouse and Various Polling Place Locations in Westchester County for Zone 3 – GREENBURGH, HARRISON AND WITTE PLAINS, for an amount not to exceed \$94,236.00, payable pursuant to an approved budget.

Attached hereto please find a resolution, which if approved by your Honorable Board, would authorize the County of Westchester (the "County") to enter into an emergency contract with Ron's Trucking Corporation for a term commencing on June 1, 2025 and terminating one year thereafter for Ron Trucking's to provide Primary, Special, Early and General Election Moving Services of Voting Machines, E-Poll Books and Printers, Cabinets, PPE, Supply Bags, Privacy Booths and Peripheral Markers between the County Warehouse and Various Polling Place Locations in Westchester County for Zone 3 – GREENBURGH, HARRISON AND WHITE PLAINS, for an amount not to exceed \$94,236.00, payable pursuant to an approved budget.

As your Honorable Board may recall, on May 20, 2025, the Westchester County Board of Elections ("WBOE") filed a Declaration of Emergency (the "Declaration") with your Honorable Board in which it set forth in detail how Whalen's Moving & Storage of Westchester, LLC ("Whalen") failed to fulfill its obligations under its agreement with the County, dated November 24, 2024, for 2025 and 2026 Primary, Special, Early and General Election Moving Services for Voting Machines, E-Poll Books and Printers, Cabinets, PPE, Supply Bags, Privacy Booths and Peripheral Markers between the County Warehouse and Various Polling Place Locations in Westchester County for the following three (3) zones:

ZONE 1 - Cortlandt, Ossining, Peekskill, Somers and Yorktown

ZONE 2 – Bedford, Lewisboro, Mount Kisco, New Castle, North Castle, North Salem, Mount Pleasant, and Pound Ridge, and

ZONE 3 - Greenburgh, Harrison and White Plains.

In the Declaration, the WBOE explained how the moving of voting machine equipment is a critical service, and, due to Whalen's poor performance, the County had no choice but to terminate its agreement with Whalen.

The Declaration further explained that, after the termination of Whalen's agreement, the WBOE encountered an emergency situation for which it could not await procurement of a replacement contract through the usual bid processes.

The WBOE informed your Honorable Board that it would need to immediately engage alternative provider(s) to provide the moving services for Zones 1, 2 and 3 without interruption and would submit a resolution to your Honorable Board at a later date requesting approval of the contract(s) to address the emergency.

In furtherance of the Declaration, the WBOE has secured two emergency replacement contracts.

One first replacement contract, which is the subject of this resolution, is with Ron's Trucking for Zone 3 as described above.

The second replacement contract is with Smart Moving & Storage, Inc. for Zones 1 and 2, which is being submitted to your Honorable for approval under a separate resolution.

The public purpose, as well as the goal and objective of this contract, is to address the emergency and allow the Board of Elections to continue to carry out its statutory duties in connection with all upcoming 2025 and 2026 Primary. Special, Early and General Elections and to ensure that all eligible County residents have the opportunity to exercise their right to vote.

County Board of Elections staff will monitor the contractor's performance of the contract.

Accordingly, it is our recommendation that aforementioned agreement with Ron's Trucking be approved by your Honorable Board.
