Transmitted herewith for your consideration is legislation which, if approved, would establish a revised Policy for Investing and Protecting Public Funds for the County of Westchester (the "County"), pursuant to New York State General Municipal Law Section 39 (the "Investment Policy"). The annexed Act would authorize the adoption of a revised Investment Policy.

In order to comply with the provisions of General Municipal Law Section 39, your Honorable Board has from time to time established a comprehensive Investment Policy which details County government operative policy and instructions to officers and staff regarding the investment, monitoring and reporting of County government funds. In order to comply with the provision above, the Investment Policy is reviewed annually by the Department of Finance (the "Department") and submitted to your Honorable Board for its approval. The Investment Policy currently in effect addresses several topics, including but not limited to the following: (1) a list of permitted types of investments of the County; (2) procedures and policies to secure in a satisfactory manner the County's financial interest in investments; (3) standards for written agreements pursuant to which investments are made; (4) procedures for monitoring, control, deposit and retention of investments and collateral; (5) standards for security and custodial agreements with banks or trust companies authorized to do business in the State of New York, pursuant to which obligations and collateral are held by such banks and trust companies for the County; (6) standards for the diversification of investments and firms with whom the County transacts business; and (7) standards for the qualification of investment agents which transact business with the County, such as criteria covering credit worthiness, experience, capitalization, size and other factors that make a firm capable and qualified to do business with the County.

As your Honorable Board is aware, the Investment Policy was last amended by Act No. 230-2024.

I have been advised that the Department has reviewed the current Investment Policy and recommends the following amendments:

Amend the dollar limits and banking institutions listed in Section VII. <u>Designation of Depositories</u> in order to take advantage of competitive opportunities at depositories as follows:

- increase the total dollar limit at Customers Bank from \$100 million to \$150 million;
- increase the total dollar limit at Metropolitan Commercial Bank from \$25 million to \$75 million;

- increase the total dollar limit at Valley National Bank from \$50 million to \$100 million;
- increase the total dollar limit at Orange Bank and Trust Company from \$25 million to \$50 million;
- increase the total dollar limit at Flagstar Bank from \$200 million to \$300 million;
- add Israel Discount Bank with a total dollar limit of \$25 million; and
- reduce the total dollar limit at M&T Bank from \$300 million to \$150 million.

Therefore, the Commissioner of Finance is requesting the following changes to the list of approved depositories contained in Section VII of the Investment Policy:

ACT NO. - 2025

Section 1. Pursuant to New York State General Municipal Law Section 39, the annexed Investment Policy for the County of Westchester (the "County"), which details the County's operative policy and instructions to officers and staff regarding the investment, monitoring and reporting of funds of the County, is hereby amended. The annexed Investment Policy shall supersede all prior versions of said policy.

- **§2.** This Investment Policy shall be reviewed on an annual basis by the County.
 - §3. This Act shall take effect immediately.

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I. Scope

The County of Westchester (the "County") policy for investing and protecting public funds (the "Investment Policy") applies to all monies and/or other financial resources available for investment on its own behalf or on behalf of any other entity or individual. This Investment Policy is adopted pursuant to Section 39 of the New York State General Municipal Law and has used the model investment policy for local governments which the New York State Legislature required the New York State Comptroller to provide pursuant to Laws of 1992, Chapter 708, Section 44 for guidance. This Investment Policy shall be implemented in accordance with all applicable laws, rules and regulations ("Applicable Law") including but not limited to, Sections 10 and 11 of the New York State General Municipal Law.

II. Objectives

The primary objectives of the County's investment activities are, in priority order:

- To conform with all applicable Federal, State and other legal requirements.
- To positively safeguard principal.
- To provide sufficient liquidity to meet all operating requirements.
- To obtain a reasonable rate of return, consistent with safety, liquidity and prevailing financial market conditions.

III. Delegation of Authority

The County Board of Legislators' responsibility for administration of the County's investment program is delegated to the Commissioner of Finance who shall establish written procedures for the operation of the investment program consistent with this investment Policy. Such procedures shall include internal controls to provide a satisfactory level of accountability based upon records incorporating the description and amounts of investments, the fund(s) for which they are held, the place(s) where kept, and other relevant information, including dates of sale or other dispositions and amounts realized. In addition, the internal control procedures shall describe the responsibilities and levels of authority for key individuals involved in the investment program.

Such procedures shall follow guidelines established by the New York State Comptroller, be consistent with conservative investment principles and with the applicable provisions of the County Charter and Administrative Code with respect to control of funds and investments. These procedures shall also include an internal control and operating policy designed to provide security, a high level of accountability, a database of records and other relevant information relating to funds control and investment activity by delegated employees.

The Commissioner of Finance is designated as the County's chief fiscal officer, as such term is used in Applicable Law, including but not limited to New York State General Municipal Law Sections 10 and 11.

IV. Prudence

All participants in the investment process shall seek to act responsibly as custodians of the public trust and shall avoid any transaction that might impair public confidence in the County to govern effectively.

Investments shall be made with prudence, diligence, skill, judgment and care, under circumstances then prevailing, which knowledgeable and prudent persons acting in like capacity would use, not for speculation, but for investment, considering the safety of principal as well as the probable income to be derived.

All participants involved in the investment process shall refrain from personal business activity that could conflict with proper execution of the investment program or which could impair their ability to make impartial investment decisions. Accordingly, all participants involved in the investment process are required:

- To disclose any personal business activity or relationship which could conflict or create the appearance of conflict with either the spirit or execution of the Investment Policy or investment programs of the County.
- To abstain from any beneficial personal financial activity which is in actual
 or apparent conflict with the Investment Policy or investment programs of the
 County.
- To abstain from any personal or financial activity which would impair the participant's ability to make impartial and ethical investment decisions for the County.

V. <u>Diversification</u>

It is the policy of the County to diversify its deposits and investments by financial institution, by investment instrument, and by maturity scheduling, consistent with the operation of the County's cash and investment management policies. Additionally, this diversification policy shall be executed so as not to exceed the limits authorized by the County Board of Legislators for each depository set forth in Section VII of this Investment Policy.

VI. Internal Controls

The Commissioner of Finance is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control procedures to provide reasonable, but not absolute assurance that deposits and investments are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization, properly recorded, and managed in compliance with Applicable Law. These internal controls will also include provisions for monitoring collateral pledged by institutions as required from time to time.

A) Funds Controls

It is the policy of the County to monitor all receivables due the County and to require the deposit of all monies collected by any officer or employee of County government to depositories designated by the Commissioner of Finance as soon as possible. Should Applicable Law indicate a specific time frame, that period will apply. The Commissioner of Finance or those appropriately designated by the Commissioner are responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure in their designated department or area to provide assurance of the following:

- That deposits, investments and financial computer systems or other assets are safeguarded against monetary and/or data loss from unauthorized or improper use or disposition.
- That transactions are completed in accordance with management's direction within a framework of safe execution, and effective safekeeping.
- That transactions are recorded promptly in order to receive full investment value in accordance with Applicable Law and County operating policies.

B) <u>Transfer Controls</u>

In implementing investment and funds transfer instructions, all Authorized Financial Institutions and Dealers as defined in Section XI below shall receive from the County, with an acknowledgment request, a list indicating all individuals authorized to give verbal, written or electronic instructions regarding investments and/or funds transfers for the County.

Third party transfer instructions are not authorized unless subsequently authenticated by the Authorized Financial Institution or Dealer with one or more of the authorized individuals listed.

The County shall covenant with its Authorized Financial Institution or Dealer to have unlimited unrestricted access to any recordings or records made of such transactions or authentications by its Authorized Financial Institutions or Dealers.

VII. Designation of Depositories

Certification to the designated depository list requires that a depository must be ranked within acceptable federal regulatory risk-based capital parameters and be designated as an institution acceptable to the Commissioner of Finance after an appropriate departmental due diligence review.

The Commissioner of Finance shall evaluate the Community Reinvestment Act rating of a financial institution before depositing County Funds.

Banks and trust companies herein authorized by the County Board of Legislators for investments and the deposit of monies with maximum dollar designations are as follows:

In the event that any of the above-named authorized depositories' name should change due to a merger, acquisition or other reason, the Commissioner of Finance may continue to use such new named depository until a new Investment Policy is adopted by the County Board of Legislators after the required annual review of said Policy, provided that the Commissioner conducts due diligence after being formally notified of such name change, before continuing to do business with such depository.

VIII. Collateralization of Deposits

In accordance with the provisions of General Municipal Law Section 10, all deposits of the County, including certificates of deposit and special time deposits in excess of the amount insured under the provision of the Federal Deposit Insurance Act, shall be secured by either:

1. A pledge of "Eligible Securities" (see Appendix A) with an aggregate "Market Value", as defined by General Municipal Law Section 10 for the various defined categories of eligible securities at least equal to the aggregate amount of deposits.

or:

2. An "irrevocable letter of credit" issued in favor of **Westchester County** by a federal home loan bank whose commercial paper and other unsecured short-term debt obligations are rated in the highest rating category by at least one nationally recognized statistical rating organization, as security for the payment of 100 percent of the aggregate amount of deposits and the agreed-upon interest, if any.

IX. Safekeeping and Collateralization

Eligible securities used for collateralizing deposits shall be held by a custodian (third party depository, bank or trust company), except as provided below.

Eligible securities used for collateralizing deposits for institutions with an approved limit of at least \$500 million may be held at the same bank or trust company that is holding the deposit, provided that before doing so the Commissioner of Finance shall evaluate the financial strength of said same bank or trust company in accordance with the provisions of Section XI below. Depository collateralization shall be subject to appropriate security and custodial agreements.

The security agreement shall provide that eligible securities as agreed upon by the County and its Authorized Financial Institutions or Dealers, are pledged to secure County deposits together with agreed upon interest, if any, and any costs or expenses arising out of the collection of such deposits, upon default. It shall also provide the conditions under which the securities may be sold, presented for payment, transferred or released, and the events which will enable the County to exercise its rights against said pledged securities. In the event that these securities are not registered or inscribed in the name of the County, such securities shall be delivered in a form suitable for transfer or with an assignment in blank to the County or its custodial bank or trust company. Whenever eligible securities delivered to the custodial bank or trust company are transferred by entries on the books of a federal reserve bank or other book-entry system operated by a federally regulated entity without physical delivery of the evidence of the obligations, then the records of the custodial bank or trust company shall be required to show, at all times, the interest of the County in the securities as set forth in the security agreement.

The custodial agreement shall be consistent with General Municipal Law Section 10(3(a). It shall provide that pledged securities will be held by the custodial bank or trust company as agent of, and custodian for, the County, will be kept separate and apart

from the general assets of the custodial bank or trust company and will not be commingled with or become part of the backing of any other deposit or other bank liability. The custodial agreement should also describe how the custodian shall confirm in writing the receipt, substitution or release of securities. The custodial agreement shall also provide for the frequency of re-evaluation of collateral by the custodial bank or trust company and for the substitution of collateral when a change in the rating of a security causes ineligibility. The security and custodial agreements shall also include all other provisions necessary to provide the County with a perfected security interest in the eligible securities and to otherwise secure the County's interest in the collateral.

The custodial agreement shall also provide for increases or decreases in securities held when a change in the value of a security may occur. The agreement shall stipulate that only Eligible Securities set forth in Appendix A may be used as collateral in accordance with Section VIII of this policy. Such agreement shall include all provisions necessary and sufficient to secure in a manner satisfactory to the Commissioner of Finance, the County's interest in the securities.

Such security and custodial agreements shall include any other provisions and executions necessary and sufficient to secure, in a manner satisfactory to the Commissioner of Finance, the County's interest in the securities.

X. Permitted Investments

As authorized by General Municipal Law Section 11, the County Board of Legislators authorizes the Commissioner of Finance, at her/his discretion, to invest monies not required for immediate expenditure, for terms not to exceed the County's projected cash flow needs in any of the following types of investments which are specifically selected by the Commissioner of Finance and stipulated in the documentation executed with its trading partners and/or depositories.

- Special time deposit accounts in, or certificates of deposit issued by, a bank or trust company located and authorized to do business in the State of New York.
- Through a Deposit Placement Program, certificates of deposit in one or more "banking institutions", as defined in Banking Law Section 9-r;
- Direct obligations of the United States of America.
- Obligations guaranteed by agencies of the United States of America where the payment of principal and interest are guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the United States of America.
- Obligations of New York State.
- Obligations issued pursuant to New York State Local Finance Law Sections 24 or 25 (with approval of the State Comptroller) by any school district, district corporation or municipality, other than the County itself.
- Obligations of public authorities, public housing authorities,

Urban renewal agencies and industrial development agencies where the general state statute governing such entities, or whose specific enabling legislation authorizes such investment.

• Obligations of the County, but only with any monies in a reserve fund established pursuant to General Municipal Law Sections 6-c, 6-d, 6-e, 6-f, 6-g, 6-h, 6-j, 6-k, 6-l, 6-m or 6-n.

All of the above shall be defined as Permitted County Investments.

In addition to the above, Cooperative Investment pool s as defined in Article 5-G of the General Municipal Law and in accordance with Article 3-A of the General Municipal Law shall also be considered to be a Permitted County Investment with the following conditions:

- Investments held by any pools are acceptable to and meet the due diligence standards of the Commissioner of Finance.
- Additionally, County investment in any such pools must be periodically evaluated by the Commissioner of Finance against County investment return and/or other industry performance results.

All investment obligations shall be payable or redeemable at the option of the County, within such times as the proceeds are required to meet expenditures for purposes for which the monies were obtained. Time deposits and certificates of deposit shall be payable within such times as the proceeds will be needed to meet expenditures for which the moneys were obtained, and shall be secured as set forth in Sections VIII, IX and X of this Investment Policy.

Except as may otherwise be provided in a contract with bondholders or noteholders, any moneys of the County authorized to be invested may be commingled for investment purposes, provided that any investment of commingled moneys shall be payable or redeemable at the option of the County within such time as the proceeds shall be needed to meet expenditures for which such moneys were obtained, or as otherwise specifically provided in General Municipal Law Section 11. The separate identity of the sources of these funds shall be maintained at all times and income received shall be credited on a pro rata basis to the fund or account from which the moneys were invested.

Any obligation that provides for the adjustment of its interest rate on set dates is deemed to be payable or redeemable on the date on which the principal amount can be recovered through demand by the holder.

XI. <u>Authorized Financial Institutions and Dealers</u>

The Commissioner of Finance shall develop and maintain a list of depository financial institutions (from the County Board of Legislators' approved depository list as specified in Section VII) and primary security dealers (from the list of primary government security dealers published by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, a copy of such list as of the date specified is attached hereto as Appendix B, such list may be updated by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York from time to time).

All financial institutions and dealers with which the County transacts business must be creditworthy, and have an appropriate level of experience, capitalization, size and other factors that make the financial institution or the dealer capable and qualified to transact business with the County. The Commissioner of Finance shall conduct reasonable due diligence to evaluate the financial position of depositories, trading partners and custodians. Recent reports of condition and income (call reports) shall be obtained for proposed banks to be added to the list of approved depositories.

Upon request, County depositories shall provide their most recent consolidated report of condition and income (call report) to the Commissioner of Finance.

Upon request, County non-bank trading partners shall provide to the Commissioner of Finance their most recent annual financial statements as reported to the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission (the "S.E.C."), and at the request of the County, make available their monthly "focus" report to the S.E.C.

The Commissioner of Finance is responsible for evaluating the financial position of proposed and present depositories, trading partners and custodians. Such evaluations shall be conducted on a continuing basis.

XII. Purchase of Investments

The Commissioner of Finance is authorized to contract for the purchase of investments:

- Directly, including through a repurchase agreement or an authorized trading partner.
- By participation in a cooperative investment program with another authorized governmental entity pursuant to Article 5G of the General Municipal Law and in accordance with Article 3A of the General Municipal Law.
- All purchased obligations, unless registered or inscribed in the name of the County, shall be purchased through, delivered to and held in the custody of a bank or trust company. Such obligations shall be purchased, sold or presented for redemption or payment by such bank or trust company only in accordance with prior written authorization from the officer or employee designated and authorized to make such investment. All such transactions shall be confirmed in writing to the County by the bank or trust company.
- Any obligation held in the custody of a bank or trust company shall be held pursuant to a written agreements set forth in Section IX above of this policy.
- The Commissioner of Finance is authorized to direct the bank or trust company to register and hold the evidences of investments in the name of its nominee, or arrange for the deposit of any such evidences of investments with a federal reserve bank or other book-entry transfer system operated by a federally registered entity. The records of the bank or trust company shall show, at all times, the ownership of such evidences of investments, and they shall be, when held in the possession of the bank or trust company, at all times, kept separate from the assets of the bank or trust company. All evidences of investments delivered to a bank or trust company shall be held by the bank or trust company pursuant to a written custodial agreement as set forth in Section IX above of this policy. When any such evidences of investments are so registered in the name of

a nominee, the bank or trust company shall be absolutely liable for any loss occasioned by the acts of such nominee with respect to such evidences of investments.

XIII. Repurchase Agreements

Repurchase agreements are authorized subject to the following restrictions:

- All such agreements must be entered into subject to a
 Master Repurchase Agreement, outlining basic responsibilities and
 liabilities of the buyer and seller and a written agreement with the
 custodial bank or trust company, outlining the basic responsibilities and
 liabilities of the buyer, seller and custodian.
- Trading partners shall be limited to creditworthy banks or trust companies authorized to do business in New York State and/or registered primary government securities dealers as determined by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York.
- Unless the obligations that are purchased pursuant to the repurchase
 agreement are registered and inscribed in the name of the County,
 obligations must be purchased through, delivered to and held in the
 custody of a bank or trust company located and authorized to do business
 in New York State. The custodial bank or trust company should not be the
 seller of the obligations that are the subject of the repurchase agreement.
- The custodial agreement shall provide that the custodian takes
 possession and maintains custody of the obligations exclusively for the
 County, that the obligations are free of any claims against the trading
 partner, and that any claims by the custodian are subordinate to the
 County's claims or rights to those obligations.
- The obligations must be credited to the County on the records of the custodial bank or trust company, and the transactions must be confirmed in writing to the County by the custodial bank or trust company.
- The obligations purchased by the County may only be sold or presented for redemption or payment by the County's custodian upon written instructions from the Commissioner of Finance.
- The County must obtain a perfected security interest in the obligation.
- Agreements should be for short periods of time of no more than thirty (30) days.
- The Commissioner of Finance, with the assistance of a qualified financial advisor, shall determine whether to include margin requirements.
- No substitution of obligations is permitted.

- Payment for the purchased obligations should not be made by the custodial bank or trust company until the obligations are actually received, which is usually done simultaneously.
- Obligations shall be limited to obligations of the United States of America and obligations of United States Government as set forth in Appendix A.
- All repurchase agreements are purchases and sales and shall be so identified to all trading partners.
- The custodian shall be a party or entity other than the trading partner.
- When possession of securities shall be domiciled with a third party custodian, County interests shall be secured in a manner satisfactory to the Commissioner of Finance.
- All repurchase partners shall receive and acknowledge a copy of the Investment Policy.

Obligations that are purchased pursuant to a repurchase agreement are deemed to be payable or redeemable, for purpose of the General Municipal Law, on the date on which the purchased obligations are scheduled to be repurchased by the seller.

XIV. Courier Service

The Commissioner of Finance may, subject to the approval of a resolution by the County Board of Acquisition and Contract, enter into a contract with a courier service for the purpose of causing the deposit of public funds with a bank or trust company. The courier service shall be required to obtain a surety bond for the full amount entrusted to the courier, payable to the County and executed by an insurance company authorized to do business in the State of New York, with a claims-paying ability that is rated in the highest rating category by at least two nationally recognized statistical rating organizations, to insure against any loss of public deposits entrusted to the courier service for deposit or the failure to deposit the full amount entrusted to the courier service.

The County may agree with the depository bank or trust company that the bank or trust company will reimburse all or part of, but not more than, the actual cost incurred by the County in transporting items for deposit through a courier service. Any such reimbursement agreement shall apply only to a specified deposit transaction, and may be subject to such terms, conditions and limitations as the bank or trust company deems necessary to ensure sound banking practices, including, but not limited to, any terms, conditions or limitations that may be required by the New York State Department of Financial Services or other Federal or State authority.

XV. Annual Review and Amendments

The County Board of Legislators shall review this policy for investing and protecting public funds annually, and shall have the power to amend it at any time.

XVI. Definitions

The terms "public funds," "public deposits," "bank," "trust company," "eligible securities," and "eligible letter of credit" shall have the same meanings as set forth in General Municipal Law Section 10.

Attached for your consideration is an Act which, if approved by your Honorable Board, would authorize the County of Westchester (the "County") to enter into an intermunicipal agreement ("IMA") with the Village of Mount Kisco (the "Village") whereby the County, acting through its Department of Public Safety Services (the "Department"), will provide policing services to the Village for a term commencing retroactively on April 1, 2025 and expiring December 31, 2029.

Under the terms of the proposed IMA, the Department will provide, on a daily basis, policing services to the Village which shall include: 1.) Patrol services consisting of the assignment of seventeen (17) police officer full time equivalents ("FTEs) to patrol the Village in consultation and coordination with the Village, with at least two (2) police officers, each with a patrol car, at any given time; 2.) Investigative services consisting of three (3) detective FTEs assigned at such times as the Department shall deem appropriate, in consultation with the Village, in order to investigate matters that arise in the Village; and 3.) First-line police supervisors consisting of the assignment of five (5) police sergeant FTEs with one (1) police sergeant FTE provided with a patrol car at all times.

The Village will pay the County a sum (the "Annual Fee") equal to the County's costs, including but not limited to salary, overtime, holiday pay, shift differential, and fringe benefits. The Village will pay the Annual Fee in two (2) equal installments due July 1st and December 1st each year. The prorated Annual Fee for the 2025 year of the IMA (April 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025) is \$5,917,237.00. The County will give the Village a credit toward the cost of retiree healthcare included within the Annual Fee. Such credit will be equal to \$1,000.00 per month for each of the eleven (11) former Village employees hired by the County on June 1, 2015 for as long as such employee remains on County payroll for the provision of these services.

By October 1st of years 1 through 4 of the IMA, the County will notify the Village of the Annual Fee for the upcoming year. In the event that either the County or the Village determines that the Annual Fee for any year of the IMA does not accurately reflect the cost to the County for providing the services, or that the policing services provided to the Village do not accurately reflect the scope of services contracted for herein or meet the needs of the Village, either party, on upon sixty (60) days written notice, may schedule a meeting to discuss whether adjustments

to the Annual Fee or scope of additional policing services is warranted. The Village will make any additional payments based on this adjustment calculation for the previous year in two (2) equal installments, payable on or before July 1st and December 1st of the upcoming year of the IMA. If a credit is due, the Village may deduct the amount of such credit from the next payment due to the County. For the final year of the IMA, any credit due to the Village, or additional charge owed by the Village, will be made within thirty (30) days of the expiration of the IMA by the appropriate party.

As your Honorable Board may recall, the County has been providing police services to the Village pursuant to various IMAs since 2015 under substantially the same terms, and the most recent IMA for these services expired on March 31, 2025.

I believe that entering into the IMA with the Village is in the best interests of the County. Therefore, I recommend your favorable action on the annexed proposed Act.

Your Committee is in receipt of a communication from the County Executive requesting that your Honorable Board authorize the County of Westchester (the "County") to enter into an intermunicipal agreement ("IMA") with the Village of Mount Kisco (the "Village") whereby the County, acting through its Department of Public Safety Services (the "Department"), will provide policing services to the Village for a term commencing retroactively on April 1, 2025 and expiring December 31, 2029.

Under the terms of the proposed IMA, the Department will provide, on a daily basis, policing services to the Village which shall include: 1.) Patrol services consisting of the assignment of seventeen (17) police officer full time equivalents ("FTEs) to patrol the Village in consultation and coordination with the Village, with at least two (2) police officers, each with a patrol car, at any given time; 2.) Investigative services consiting of three (3) detective FTEs assigned at such times as the Department shall deem appropriate, in consultation with the Village, in order to investigate matters that arise in the Village; and 3.) First-line police supervisors consisting of the assignment of five (5) police sergeant FTEs with one (1) police sergeant FTE provided with a patrol car at all times.

The Village will pay the County a sum (the "Annual Fee") equal to the County's costs, including but not limited to salary, overtime, holiday pay, shift differential, and fringe benefits. The Village will pay the Annual Fee in two (2) equal installments due July 1st and December 1st each year. The prorated Annual Fee for the 2025 year of the IMA (April 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025) is \$5,917,237.00. The County will give the Village a credit toward the cost of retiree healthcare included within the Annual Fee. Such credit will be equal to \$1,000.00 per month for each of the eleven (11) former Village employees hired by the County on June 1, 2015 for as long as such employee remains on County payroll for the provision of these services.

By October 1st of years 1 through 4 of the IMA, the County will notify the Village of the Annual Fee for the upcoming year. In the event that either the County or the Village determines that

the Annual Fee for any year of the IMA does not accurately reflect the cost to the County for providing the services, or that the policing services provided to the Village do not accurately reflect the scope of services contracted for herein or meet the needs of the Village, either party, on upon sixty (60) days written notice, may schedule a meeting to discuss whether adjustments to the Annual Fee or scope of additional policing services is warranted. The Village will make any additional payments based on this adjustment calculation for the previous year in two (2) equal installments, payable on or before July 1st and December 1st of the upcoming year of the IMA. If a credit is due, the Village may deduct the amount of such credit from the next payment due to the County. For the final year of the IMA, any credit due to the Village, or additional charge owed by the Village, will be made within thirty (30) days of the expiration of the IMA by the appropriate party.

Your Committee has been advised that the proposed IMA does not meet the definition of an action under the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617. Therefore, no environmental review is required. Please refer to the memorandum from the Department of Planning dated January 14, 2025, which is on file with the Clerk of your Honorable Board.

Your Committee has been advised that the County has been providing police services to the Village pursuant to various IMAs since 2015 under substantially the same terms, and the most recent IMA for these services expired on March 31, 2025.

It should be noted that approval of the Act authorizing the County to enter into the IMA requires the affirmative vote of a majority of the voting strength of your Honorable Board.

Your Committee believes that this IMA is in the best interest of the County. Therefore, your Committee recommends adoption of the proposed attached Act.

An Act authorizing the County of Westchester (the "County") to enter into an inter-municipal agreement with the Village of Mount Kisco (the "Village") whereby the County, acting through its Department of Public Safety Services, will provide police services to the Village for a term commencing on April 1, 2025 and expiring December 31, 2029.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED by the County Board of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. The County of Westchester (the "County") is hereby authorized to enter into an intermunicipal agreement ("IMA") with the Village of Mount Kisco (the "Village") for a term commencing retroactively on April 1, 2025 and expiring December 31, 2029, whereby the County, acting through its Department of Public Safety Services (the "Department"), will provide additional general police services to the Village.

- which will include: 1.) Patrol services consisting of the assignment of seventeen (17) police officer full time equivalents ("FTEs) to patrol the Village in consultation and coordination with the Village, with at least two (2) police officers, each with a patrol car, at any given time; 2.) Investigative services consisting of three (3) detective FTEs assigned at such times as the Department shall deem appropriate, in consultation with the Village, in order to investigate matters that arise in the Village; and 3.) First-line police supervisors consisting of the assignment of five (5) police sergeant FTE's with one (1) police sergeant FTE provided with a patrol car at all times.
- §3. The Village will pay the County a sum equal to the County's costs, including but not limited to salary, overtime, holiday pay, shift differential, and fringe benefits for that period.

- §4. The County Executive or his authorized designee is hereby authorized and empowered to execute all instruments and to take all action necessary and appropriate to effectuate the purposes hereof.
 - §5. This Act shall take effect immediately.

THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, a municipal corporation of the State of New York, having an office and place of business in the Michaelian Office Building, 148 Martine Avenue, White Plains, New York 10601 (hereafter the "County"),

and

THE VILLAGE OF MOUNT KISCO, a municipal corporation of the State of New York, having an office and place of business located at 104 Main Street, Mount Kisco, New York 10549 (hereafter the "Village"),

(The County and the Village shall be referred to each as a "Party" and collectively as the "Parties").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Village desires to obtain policing services from the County, acting through its Department of Public Safety (the "Department"); and

WHEREAS, the Parties have successfully concluded negotiations and have agreed on the relevant terms and conditions pursuant to which such policing services will be provided; and

WHEREAS, Article 5-G of the General Municipal Law authorizes municipal corporations to enter into, amend, cancel and terminate agreements for the performance among themselves or one for the other of their respective functions, powers and duties on a cooperative or contract basis; and

WHEREAS, the Village and County intend to provide cost-effective policing services to the Village; and

WHEREAS, no rights of the Village or its officers shall be deemed curtailed, transferred or abolished pursuant to or by virtue of this Agreement; and;

WHEREAS, the Village has duly adopted a Resolution authorizing its Mayor to execute an agreement with the County whereby the County will provide policing services to the Village for the compensation and upon the terms described below; and

WHEREAS, the County is authorized to enter into this agreement to provide such policing services to the Village for the compensation and upon the terms described below.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms and conditions herein contained, the Parties agree as follows:

FIRST: The Department shall provide general policing services to the Village which shall include: 1) patrol services consisting of the assignment of seventeen (17) police officer full time equivalents ("FTE's) to patrol the Village in consultation and coordination with the Village, with at least two police officers, each with a patrol car, at any given time; 2) investigative services consisting of three detective FTE's assigned at such times as the Department shall deem appropriate, in consultation with the Village, in order to investigate matters requiring same that arise in the Village; and 3) first-line police supervisors consisting of the assignment of five police sergeant FTE's with one assigned, with a patrol car, at all times. The above described services to be provided to the Village shall be the primary job duties of such Department personnel when they are assigned to provide such services.

The scope of policing services to be provided to the Village is more particularly described in Schedule "A" attached hereto and made part hereof. Notwithstanding any other provision within this Agreement, the Village may upon not less than sixty (60) days written notice to the County, modify the aforementioned contract staffing to accommodate either the Village's budgetary constraints or additional policing needs.

SECOND: For the services rendered pursuant to Paragraph "FIRST", the Village shall pay the County a sum (the "Annual Fee") equal to the County's actual costs, including but not limited to salary, overtime, holiday pay, shift differential, fringe benefits, and additional communications personnel costs. The Village shall pay the Annual Fee in two equal installments due July 1st and December 1st. The Annual Fee for the 2025 year of the Agreement (April, 2025)

through December, 2025) is \$5,914,398.00. Attached hereto and made a part hereof as Schedule "B" is a budget upon which the Annual Fee for the 2025 year of the Agreement is based, as well as a projected budget for each subsequent year of the Agreement. The Parties acknowledge and agree that this Annual Fee may require adjustment based on salary and benefit increases required under applicable collective bargaining agreements and as provided in Paragraph FIRST. The County shall give the Village a credit toward the cost of retiree healthcare included within the Annual Fee. Such credit shall be equal to \$1,000.00 per month for each of the twenty-five (25) former Village employees hired by the County on June 1, 2015 for as long as such employee remains on the County payroll for the provision of services outlined in Paragraph "FIRST" of this Agreement. As of the execution date of this agreement, there are eleven (11) such former Village employees on the County payroll.

On or about October 1st of years 1 through 4 of this Agreement, the County shall notify the Village of the Annual Fee for the upcoming year. The County shall also provide the Village with a budget in support of the Annual Fee for each of the remaining years of the Agreement.

Subject to the provisions set forth above, in the event that either the County or the Village determines that the Annual Fee for any year of the Agreement does not accurately reflect the cost to the County for providing the services, or that the policing services provided to the Village does not accurately reflect the scope of services contracted for herein or meet the needs of the Village, either Party, on upon sixty (60) days written notice, may schedule a meeting to discuss whether adjustments to the Annual Fee or scope of policing services is warranted. Any requested adjustment(s) shall be supported by documentation sufficiently detailing the basis for the requested adjustment. If any such notice seeks to modify any prospective Annual Fee, such notice shall be provided at least One Hundred and Twenty (120) days before the beginning of the fiscal year for which the Annual Fee is being adjusted. The Village shall make any additional payments based on this adjustment calculation for the previous year in two equal installments, payable on or before July 1st and December 1st of the upcoming year of this Agreement. If a credit is due, the Village may deduct the amount of such credit from the next payment due to the County. For the final year of this Agreement, any credit due to the Village, or additional charge owed by the Village, shall be made within thirty (30) days of the expiration of this Agreement by the appropriate Party.

Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, the Parties agree that in computing the actual cost of providing police services to the Village, the County shall calculate such figures or true up the costs not less than annually and shall contemporaneously provide copies of such figures to the Village to insure that all Parties are fully familiar with the actual cost of the policing services, as compared to projected costs. Should these figures substantially deviate from the proposed Annual Fee, the Village shall have the right to renegotiate the scope of services provided in Schedule "A" to avoid any potential for cost overruns. In addition, the County agrees to provide monthly reports to the Village on overtime spending. The Parties do hereby further agree that any adjustments to a single year's Annual Fee (truing up) shall not result in a truing up cost to exceed One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) annually without such number having been properly reflected, disclosed or trended in the aforementioned monthly reports and duly consented to by the Village.

Similarly, no prospectively proposed increase in any given year's projected Annual Fee (as set forth in Schedule B), shall exceed two percent (2%) of such projected number unless the number is presented and documented as soon as practicable to the Village by the County.

THIRD: The Village agrees that for so long as this Agreement is effective, the Department shall have joint use of the Village police facility at 40 Green Street, Mount Kisco, New York for purposes of conducting policing services for the Village at no charge to the County. The Village will provide a clearly delineated amount of space in the existing police facility limited to furnished office space for three detectives, space for reporting writing and interviews, a locker room and bathroom facilities for officers assigned to the Village patrol force, and a prisoner detention facility consisting of at least one regular prisoner cell and one temporary prisoner holding cell or cage. The Village shall, during all such times, continue to maintain the police facility, including the provision of utilities and janitorial services at no cost to the County.

The Village also agrees that for so long as this Agreement is effective, the County, its employees, agents and contractors shall have access to the Village's radio communications tower for the purpose of maintaining radio equipment for police communications and also allowing for the installation of such additional equipment as may be necessary or desirable for the maintenance or enhancement of police communications.

FOURTH: The term of this Agreement shall commence retroactively on April 1, 2025 ("Effective Date") and shall expire on December 31, 2029 ("Expiration Date"), unless sooner terminated in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement. Should such termination occur, the Village shall be responsible to the County for the Annual Fee on a per diem basis.

<u>FIFTH:</u> (a) Either Party, upon one (1) year's notice to the other Party, may terminate this Agreement when the terminating Party deems it to be in its best interest.

(b) In the event that there has been a material breach by either Party of any of the terms of the Agreement and such breach remains uncured for thirty (30) days after service on the breaching Party of written notice thereof, or in the event that such breach is not susceptible of being cured within such thirty (30) days, such cure has not been commenced within such period and diligently pursued and completed within a reasonable time thereafter, the non-breaching Party, in addition to any other right or remedy it might have, may terminate this Agreement. Notice hereunder shall be effective on the date of receipt.

Upon termination or expiration of this Agreement, the County shall reimburse the Village for any advance payments made by the Village prior to such termination or expiration. The Village shall satisfy any and all arrears to the County. Any such adjustments shall be made by the responsible Party within thirty days of termination or expiration of this Agreement. In the event of a dispute as to the value of the services rendered by the County prior to the date of termination, it is understood and agreed that the Commissioner of Public Safety ("Commissioner") shall determine the value of such services rendered by the County. Subject to the provisions set forth above, the Village shall accept such reasonable and good faith determination, which will be supported by documentation provided to the Village, as final. Upon termination or expiration of this Agreement, the County shall deliver all relevant records to the Village and shall deliver the police facility to the Village within a mutually agreed upon reasonable time in order to allow the County sufficient time to produce records and to remove its equipment and items.

<u>SIXTH:</u> In addition to, and not in limitation of the insurance requirements contained in Schedule "C" entitled "Standard Insurance Provisions", attached hereto and made a part hereof, the Village agrees:

- (a) that except for the amount, if any, of damage contributed to, caused by, or resulting from the sole negligence of the County, the Village shall indemnify and hold harmless the County, its officers, employees and agents from and against any and all liability, damage, claims, demands, costs, judgments, fees, attorneys' fees or loss arising directly or indirectly out of the acts or omissions hereunder by the Village or third parties under the direction or control of the Village; and
- (b) to provide defense for and defend, at its sole expense, any and all claims, demands or causes of action directly or indirectly arising out of the acts or omissions hereunder by the Village or third parties under the direction or control of the Village and to bear all other costs and expenses related thereto.
- (c) In the event the Village does not provide the above defense and indemnification to the County, and such refusal or denial to provide the above defense and indemnification is found to be in breach of this provision, then the Village shall reimburse the County's reasonable attorney's fees incurred in connection with the defense of any action, and in connection with enforcing this provision of the Agreement.

SEVENTH: The County agrees to self-insure all liability for bodily injury and death and/or property damage under the County's self-insurance program in accordance with Local Law 6-1986 and Chapter 295 of the Laws of Westchester County. Such self-insurance shall insure against all costs, damages, expenses and/or any payment of any and all claims, accidents and injuries, and all damages whatsoever caused to any person or any property. Attached hereto as Schedule "D", is a written assurance from the County of its decision to self-insure. In addition to, and not in limitation of the above, the County agrees:

(a) that except for the amount, if any, of damage contributed to, caused by, or resulting from the sole negligence of the Village, the County shall indemnify and hold harmless the Village, its officers, employees and agents from and against any and all liability, damage, claims, demands, costs, judgments, fees, attorneys' fees or loss arising directly or indirectly out of the acts or omissions hereunder by the County or third parties under the direction or control of the County; and

(b) to provide defense for and defend, at its sole expense, any and all claims, demands or causes of action directly or indirectly arising out of the acts or omissions hereunder by the County or third parties under the direction or control of the County and to bear all other costs and expenses related thereto.

(c) In the event the County does not provide the above defense and indemnification to the Village, and such refusal or denial to provide the above defense and indemnification is found to be in breach of this provision, then the County shall reimburse the Village's reasonable attorney's fees incurred in connection with the defense of any action, and in connection with enforcing this provision of the Agreement.

EIGHTH: All notices of any nature referred to in this Agreement shall be in writing and sent by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, postage pre-paid, or sent by hand or overnight delivery, or sent by facsimile (with acknowledgement received and a copy of the notice sent by overnight courier) to the respective addresses set forth below or to such other addresses as the respective Parties hereto may designate in writing:

NINTH: This Agreement and its attachments constitute the entire Agreement between the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede all previous negotiations, commitments and writings. The recitals set forth in this Agreement are incorporated into the body of this Agreement as if they had been originally set forth herein. This Agreement shall not be released, discharged, changed or modified except by an instrument in writing signed by a duly authorized representative of each of the Parties. In the event of any conflict between this Agreement and any of its attachments, the terms of this Agreement shall control.

In the event that any term or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or void or unenforceable, the remainder of the terms and provisions of this Agreement shall in no way be affected, impaired, or invalidated, and to the extent permitted by applicable law, any such term or provision shall be restricted in applicability or reformed to the minimum extent required for such to be enforceable. This provision shall be interpreted and enforced to give effect to the original written intent of the Parties as expressed herein prior to the determination of such invalidity or unenforceability.

<u>TENTH:</u> This Agreement is not intended to create a partnership or joint venture between the Parties, nor an employer/employee relationship. Instead, the County shall be deemed an independent contractor in the providing of policing services to the Village.

ELEVENTH: Pursuant to Section 308.01 of the Laws of Westchester County, it is the goal of the County to use its best efforts to encourage, promote and increase the participation of business enterprises owned and controlled by persons of color or women in contracts and projects funded by all departments of the County. Under this IMA it is recognized and understood that the County encourages the Municipality to do similarly.

TWELFTH: Any purported delegation of duties or assignment of rights under this Agreement by one Party without the prior express written consent of the other is void.

THIRTEENTH: This Agreement may be executed simultaneously in several counterparts, each of which shall be an original and all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument.

FOURTEENTH: Nothing in this Agreement shall provide any benefit to any third party or entitle any third party to any claim, cause of action, remedy or right of any kind, it being the intent of the Parties that this Agreement shall not be construed as a third party beneficiary contract.

<u>FIFTEENTH:</u> All exhibits or schedules referred to in this Agreement and attached hereto are incorporated herein by reference.

<u>SIXTEENTH:</u> Each Party hereto shall keep complete and accurate records of its operations hereunder and shall maintain such data as may be necessary to determine with reasonable accuracy any item relevant to this Agreement. Each Party shall have the right to examine all such records insofar as may be necessary for the purpose of ascertaining the reasonableness and accuracy of any statements of costs relating to transactions hereunder.

SEVENTEENTH: This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of New York. Should any provision of this Agreement for any reason be declared invalid or unenforceable by final and non-appealable order of any court or regulatory body having jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions, and the remaining portions shall remain in full force and effect as if this Agreement had been executed without the invalid portion.

EIGHTEENTH: This Agreement shall not be enforceable until signed by all Parties and approved by the Office of the County Attorney.

SCHEDULE "A"

Supplementing Paragraph "FIRST", this Schedule "A" is intending to more particularly describe the core policing services, specific items covered, services incidentally included and items expressly excluded or reserved by the Village:

Core Additional Policing Services:

County shall provide 3 police officers and one supervisor on the day tour, 3 police officers and one supervisor on the evening tour and 2 police officers and one supervisor on the overnight tour, with such police officers being assigned to patrol duties, within the municipal boundaries of the Village of Mount Kisco and the Byram Lake Reservoir Watershed Area. The County shall assign 3 detectives exclusively to the Village.

Mount Kisco Police Patrol Sector Checks:

Reporting of non-functioning street lights, traffic control signals and traffic control signs that need repair or replacement to Department of Public Works.

Water line breaks and sanitary sewer overflows reported to Public Works when first observed. Patrol checks of all village owned buildings and facilities, (doors locked and perimeter check) of Village Hall, Library, Senior Center, Byram Lake Water Filtration Plant (gate locked), Byram Lake Reservoir Pump Station (gate locked), water lift stations (Hillside and Chase), water tanks (gates locked: Mountain & Emery Street; driveway off of Rolling Ridge), Saw Mill Sewer Pump Station, sewer lift stations (Radio Circle Drive, Cold Spring Court), Leonard Park Multi-Purpose Building and Leonard Park Teahouse, Public Safety/Court Building, Mutual Fire House, Green Street Fire House, Independent Fire House, Mount Kisco Volunteer Ambulance Corps, Kirbyville Schoolhouse, Maple Avenue Community Center.

Patrol of all parks and recreation facilities (Leonard Park and pool complex, Fox Park, Kirby Plaza, Flewellyn Park, Maple Avenue Park, St. Mark's Cemetery, Conservation Areas defined and regulated under Chapter 54 of the Village Code).

Central business district checks of storefronts and back parking lots.

Police presence to meet all evening trains (after sunset) and checking of sidewalk under Route 133 to North Moger Parking Lot.

Mid-Night tours from November 15 - April 1: winter overnight parking restrictions for snow removal.

Drive through and check of Public Works and Parks maintenance buildings.

Assistance with overcrowding conditions; Notify building inspector of conditions upon entry by police in response to a police matter (Establish protocol for coordination with Building Department).

Dark House patrol and checks.

Other on/off street parking enforcement, particularly during evening and overnight tours.

Byram Lake Reservoir Security and watershed enforcement.

Inspect taxicabs at Taxicab Stand to ensure proper licensing of taxicabs and taxicab drivers under Chapter 98 of the Village Code.

Additional Administrative duties:

Background checks on new hires.

Participation in Drug Council Program.

Assistance with processing Cabaret and Peddling licenses including State Liquor Authority licensing process.

Monthly notice to Clerical staff for Alarm billing based off of IMPACT software.

Conduct letters: applicants to apply to WCPD directly.

WCPD to assist with taxi cab and license inspection and permitting program by processing fingerprinting and background checks in accordance with §98-7 and §98-10 of the Village Code. (MK limits the number of cabs).

WCPD to perform all required fingerprinting for various purposes.

Coordination of police coverage with Village for all special events; i.e. Parades (St. Patrick's Day, Memorial Day, Little League, Fire Parade) and 9-11 memorial (use available Village staff to minimize Police overtime costs) (street closing and postings for no parking).

Court appearances to be scheduled when involved officer is scheduled to work regular tour to the greatest extent possible.

Continue with current initiatives in crime prevention – targeted patrol details.

Assignment of staff duties to patrol sergeants; i.e. traffic committee, facilities management.

Alarm calls for DPW water and sewer lift stations go to PD and need to be forwarded onto Public Works.

Assistance with DPW operations for overnight snow removal, line painting, utility repairs "Dig Safe" Notices go to PD as well as DPW and others.

When feasible or practical, WCPD will provide one Spanish-speaking officer per 8- hour tour.

When feasible or practical, WCPD will endeavor to maintain consistency in assignment of personnel (same group of people generally).

When feasible or practical, WCPD will regularly conduct foot patrols of the downtown area.

WCPD and Village leadership shall convene on a quarterly basis to discuss operational issues and review reporting.

To the extent practical, WCPD shall report to the Village on a monthly basis on the amount and types of VTL and local law violations.

To the extent feasible, WCPD shall endeavor to distinguish the OCR reporting for the Village from that of the rest of the County.

<u>Village Police Jurisdiction to Remain Unchanged and list of Services Exclusively Retained</u> <u>by Village</u>:

The Village of Mount Kisco shall retain jurisdiction to perform any and all of the abovereferenced functions, irrespective of County's contracting for services. Notwithstanding the County's contractual obligations set forth above, the Village's jurisdiction shall be expressly deemed to include but not be limited to core functions, patrols, investigations, background checks, investigations, sector checks, licensing, administrative functions and the like.

As to retained functions of the Village and not deemed part of the IMA:

Courtroom security- Primary courtroom security will be provided by Village. The County may provide additional officers, as needed, provided such service is provided on a non-overtime basis.

The Village reserves the right to utilize its own employees (e.g. parking and traffic control agents), as needed, to perform non-sworn police officer duties such as traffic control, parking enforcement and similar duties.

SCHEDULE "C"

STANDARD INSURANCE PROVISIONS (Municipality - LEO)

1. Prior to commencing work, and throughout the term of the Agreement, the Municipality shall obtain at its own cost and expense the required insurance as delineated below from insurance companies licensed in the State of New York, carrying a Best's financial rating of A or better. Municipality shall provide evidence of such insurance to the County of Westchester ("County"), either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County ("Director"). The policies or certificates thereof shall provide that ten (10) days prior to cancellation or material change in the policy, notices of same shall be given to the Director either by overnight mail or personal delivery for all of the following stated insurance policies. All notices shall name the Municipality and identify the Agreement.

If at any time any of the policies required herein shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing any such policy shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, the Municipality shall upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and submit the policy or the certificate as requested by the Director to the Office of Risk Management of the County for approval by the Director. Upon failure of the Municipality to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance, the Agreement, at the election of the County, may be declared suspended, discontinued or terminated.

Failure of the Municipality to take out, maintain, or the taking out or maintenance of any required insurance, shall not relieve the Municipality from any liability under the Agreement, nor shall the insurance requirements be construed to conflict with or otherwise limit the contractual obligations of the Municipality concerning indemnification.

All property losses shall be made payable to the "County of Westchester" and adjusted with the appropriate County personnel.

In the event that claims, for which the County may be liable, in excess of the insured amounts provided herein are filed by reason of Municipality's negligent acts or omissions under the Agreement or by virtue of the provisions of the labor law or other statute or any other reason, the amount of excess of such claims or any portion thereof, may be withheld from payment due or to become due the Municipality until such time as the Municipality shall furnish such additional security covering such claims in form satisfactory to the Director.

In the event of any loss, if the Municipality maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums identified herein, the County shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Municipality. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

- The Municipality shall provide proof of the following coverage (if additional coverage is required for a specific agreement, those requirements will be described in the Agreement):
 - a) Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability. Certificate form C-105.2 or State Fund Insurance Company form U-26.3 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Workers' Compensation Law. State Workers' Compensation Board form DB-120.1 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Disability Benefits Law. Location of operation shall be "All locations in Westchester County, New York."

Where an applicant claims to not be required to carry either a Workers' Compensation Policy or Disability Benefits Policy, or both, the employer must complete NYS form CE-200, available to download at: http://www.wcb.ny.gov.

If the employer is self-insured for Workers' Compensation, he/she should present a certificate from the New York State Worker's Compensation Board evidencing that fact (Either SI-12, Certificate of Workers' Compensation Self-Insurance, or GSI-105.2, Certificate of Participation in Workers' Compensation Group Self-Insurance).

- b) Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 (c.s.1) per occurrence limit naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis. This insurance shall include the following coverages:
 - i. Premises Operations.
 - ii. Broad Form Contractual.
 - iii. Independent Contractor and Sub-Contractor.
 - iv. Products and Completed Operations.
- c) Commercial Umbrella/Excess Insurance: \$2,000,000 each Occurrence and Aggregate naming the "County of Westchester" as additional insured, written on a "follow the form" basis.

NOTE: Additional insured status shall be provided by standard or other endorsement that extends coverage to the County of Westchester for both on-going and completed operations.

- d) Automobile Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$5,000,000 for bodily injury and a minimum limit of \$100,000 per occurrence for property damage or a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 unless otherwise indicated in the contract specifications. This insurance shall include for bodily injury and property damage the following coverages and name the "County of Westchester" as additional insured:
 - (i) Owned automobiles.
 - (ii) Hired automobiles.
 - (iii) Non-owned automobiles.
- e) Law Enforcement Liability/Police Liability insurance The Municipality shall provide proof of such insurance naming the County as additionally insured. (Limits of \$5,000,000 per occurrence).

- 3. All policies of the Municipality shall be endorsed to contain the following clauses:
- (a) Insurers shall have no right to recovery or subrogation against the County (including its employees and other agents and agencies), it being the intention of the Parties that the insurance policies so effected shall protect both Parties and be primary coverage for any and all losses covered by the above-described insurance.
- (b) The clause "other insurance provisions" in a policy in which the County is named as an insured, shall not apply to the County.
- (c) The insurance companies issuing the policy or policies shall have no recourse against the County (including its agents and agencies as aforesaid) for payment of any premiums or for assessments under any form of policy.
- (d) Any and all deductibles in the above described insurance policies shall be assumed by and be for the account of, and at the sole risk of, the Municipality.

I have been advised by the Commissioner of Environmental Facilities that the Town of Mount Pleasant (the "Town") has requested, pursuant to the attached Resolution of the Town, that the Saw Mill Valley Sanitary Sewer District (the "District") be modified to remove one (1) parcel of property more particularly described as 485 Chappaqua Road, Sec. 98.8, Block 1, Lot 2 (hereinafter the "Parcel") from the District. This removal is being requested because the Parcel is not serviced by sanitary sewers and it is not anticipated that sanitary sewers will be constructed for this Parcel in the foreseeable future.

I am advised that the feasibility report prepared by the Department of Environmental Facilities (the "Department") dated March 18, 2025 and attached hereto (the "Feasibility Report"), indicates that the proposed removal of the Parcel represents a net decrease of 0.0025% to the Equalized Full Value of the District. Therefore, the removal of the Parcel will not cause significant changes in the tax rate of the District.

According to the Department, the proposal to remove the Parcel from the District is feasible because: 1) the proposed change was requested by the Town; 2) the subject change requires no engineering modifications to the District facilities and there is no impact on the County facilitates because the Parcel was never connected to the sewerage system; 3) the subject change removes from ad valorem taxation a property that has not benefited and foreseeably will not benefit from connection to District facilities based on information received from the Town; 4) the subject change frees reserve capacity at the District treatment plant for future enlargement of the District from surrounding areas without the capital costs of expanding treatment facilitates; 5) the subject Parcel, once removed from the District will be required to petition the County to re-enter the District and the County is not obligated to reserve any capacity for the Parcel once it has been removed; and 6) the subject Parcel was reviewed by the Westchester County Health Department.

As your Honorable Board knows, Laws of Westchester County ("LWC") Section 237.131 authorizes the alteration or change of a County Sanitary Sewer District. However, the Board of Legislators may only alter or change a district after it has held a public hearing thereon, upon notice thereof given by publication in such manner and for such time as the Board of Legislators

shall direct. Therefore, attached hereto is a Resolution which will authorize the date and time of the public hearing.

Based upon the foregoing, I respectfully recommend that your Board adopt a Resolution which will authorize Legal Notice for the public hearing as required by the Laws of Westchester County in such matters, and, after such hearing, urges your Honorable Board to adopt the annexed Act which accomplishes the removal of the Parcel from the District.

reviewed the attached Short Environmental Assessment Form ("EAF") and the criteria contained

in Section 617.7 of Title 6 of the New York State Code of Rules and Regulations, the SEQR

regulations, to identify the relevant areas of environmental concern. For the reasons set forth in

the attached EAF, your Committee believes that the proposed action will not have any significant

adverse impact on the environment and urges your Honorable Board to adopt the annexed

resolution by which this Board would issue a Negative Declaration for this proposed action.

Based on the above facts, the Feasibility Report prepared by the Department, and the

review by the Planning Department, your Committee concurs with the recommendation of the

County Executive and recommends that your Honorable Board adopt the annexed Resolution

which will authorize publication of the Legal Notice for the public hearing as required by the

Laws of Westchester County in such matters, and, after such hearing, urges your Honorable

Board to adopt the annexed Act which accomplishes the removal of the Parcel from the District.

C. Summary and Recommendations

The proposal to remove certain parcels in the Saw Mill Valley Sanitary Sewer Districts is feasible because:

- 1. The proposed changes were requested by the Town of Mount Pleasant
- 2. The subject changes require no engineering modifications to the district facilities and there is no impact on the County facilities because these parcels were never connected to the sewerage system.
- 3. The subject changes remove from ad valorem taxation properties that have not benefited and foreseeably will not benefit from connection to District facilities based on information received from the Town of Mount Pleasant.
- 4. The subject changes free reserve capacity at the District treatment plant for future enlargement of the District from surrounding areas without the capital costs of expanding treatment facilities.
- 5. The subject parcels once removed from the district will be required to petition the County to re-enter the district. The County is not obligated to reserve any capacity for these parcels once they have been removed.
- 6. The subject parcels were reviewed by the Westchester County Health Department.

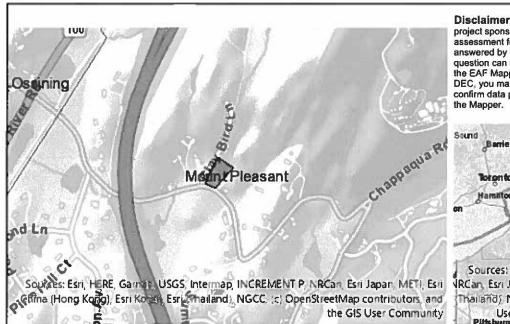

BE IT ENACTED by the County Board of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. The following property known and designated as 485 Chappaqua Road, Sec. 98.8, Block 1, Lot 2 (the "Parcel") on the assessment maps of the Town of Mount Pleasant (the "Town") is hereby removed from the Saw Mill Valley Sanitary Sewer District (the "District").

- § 2. The Parcel is to be forgiven its obligation for future debt service requirement and is to relinquish its equity in existing sewage facilities in the District, and in return the District is relieved of its responsibility to provide sanitary sewer service and sewerage facilities to the Parcel.
- § 3. This Act and the District and assessment areas as so altered, changed, modified, reduced and/or enlarged hereby, shall become effective immediately and the assessment rolls filed after the next taxable status date shall show County sewer district assessments and taxes on the basis of such revised District, and taxes levied on such rolls shall be based thereon, but any sewer district tax or assessment levied on any valid assessment rolls in effect prior to the next taxable status date, on any parcel affected by the revisions made by this Act, shall continue valid as such or as a tax lien, until paid and the amount paid shall be credited to the sewer district in which such parcel was assessed on the role on which said tax is levied.
- § 4. The County Executive or his authorized designee be and hereby is authorized and empowered to execute any and all instruments and to take all action necessary and appropriate to accomplish the purposes hereof.
 - § 5. This Act shall take effect immediately.

Dear Honorable Members of the Board of Legislators:

Pursuant to New York State Correction Law sections 500-c and 500-d, the County of Westchester ("County") is required to transport, at its own expense, prisoners between local municipalities and the Westchester County Jail located at Valhalla, New York. In addition, the County is required to provide meals to such prisoners. The County relies on assistance from local municipalities to carry out these functions and by so doing saves taxpayer funds.

Transmitted herewith for your review and approval is legislation which would authorize the County to enter into an intermunicipal agreement ("IMA") with the City of Yonkers ("Yonkers") in order to reimburse Yonkers an amount not to exceed \$332,928.00 in 2026, and \$339,586.56 in 2027, for a total amount not to exceed \$672,514.56, for the term commencing January 1, 2026 and expiring December 31, 2027. This IMA will allow the County to reimburse Yonkers for the costs incurred by Yonkers to transport prisoners who have been arraigned to and from Yonkers and the Westchester County Jail located at Valhalla, New York.

Reimbursement to Yonkers in 2026 for round trip prisoner transportation, will be at the following rates: \$223.00 per round trip with two detention officers; \$334.50 per round trip with three detention officers, and \$446.00 per round trip with four detention officers. In 2027, Yonkers will be reimbursed as follows: \$227.45 per round trip with two detention officers; \$341.17 per round trip with three detention officers, and \$454.90 per round trip with four detention officers. Yonkers will also be reimbursed for vehicle usage at the rate of seventy cents (\$.70) per mile, or at the then current Internal Revenue Service mileage reimbursement rate multiplied by the mileage to and from the Westchester County Jail, which is agreed to be 16 miles each way. The County will also reimburse Yonkers for the actual and reasonable cost of meals provided to post-arraignment prisoners.

Your Committee has been advised that pursuant to sections 500-c and 500-d of the New York State Correction Law, the County of Westchester ("County") is required at its own expense to transport prisoners between local municipalities and the Westchester County Jail located at Valhalla, New York. Your Committee is in receipt of a communication from the County Executive recommending approval of an Act, which, if adopted, would authorize the County to enter into an intermunicipal agreement ("IMA") with the City of Yonkers ("Yonkers") in order to reimburse Yonkers an amount not to exceed \$332,928.00 in 2026 and \$339,586.56 in 2027, for a total aggregate amount not to exceed \$672,514.56, for the term commencing January 1, 2026 and expiring December 31, 2027. This IMA will allow the County to reimburse Yonkers for the costs incurred by Yonkers to transport prisoners who have been arraigned to and from Yonkers and the Westchester County Jail located at Valhalla, New York.

Your Committee is further advised that reimbursement to Yonkers will be for round trip transportation and will be based on the per trip labor costs of detention officers and for vehicle usage. - 3. <u>MEALS</u>: The County shall reimburse the Municipality for meals provided to post-arraignment prisoners for the actual and reasonable costs incurred and receipts submitted as part of the municipality's monthly voucher submitted to the Department of Correction.
- 3. <u>TERM</u>: This Agreement shall commence on January 1, 2026 and shall expire on December 31, 2027. The County or the Municipality may, upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other party, terminate this Agreement in whole or in part when it deems

it to be in its best interest. In such event, the Municipality shall be compensated and the County shall be liable only for payment for services rendered prior to the effective date of termination.

SCHEDULE "A"

STANDARD INSURANCE PROVISIONS (Municipality - LEO)

1. Prior to commencing work, and throughout the term of the Agreement, the Municipality shall obtain at its own cost and expense the required insurance as delineated below from insurance companies licensed in the State of New York, carrying a Best's financial rating of A or better. Municipality shall provide evidence of such insurance to the County of Westchester ("County"), either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County ("Director"). The policies or certificates thereof shall provide that ten (10) days prior to cancellation or material change in the policy, notices of same shall be given to the Director either by overnight mail or personal delivery for all of the following stated insurance policies. All notices shall name the Municipality and identify the Agreement.

If at any time any of the policies required herein shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing any such policy shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, the Municipality shall upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and submit the policy or the certificate as requested by the Director to the Office of Risk Management of the County for approval by the Director. Upon failure of the Municipality to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance, the Agreement, at the election of the County, may be declared suspended, discontinued or terminated.

Failure of the Municipality to take out, maintain, or the taking out or maintenance of any required insurance, shall not relieve the Municipality from any liability under the Agreement, nor shall the insurance requirements be construed to conflict with or otherwise limit the contractual obligations of the Municipality concerning indemnification.

All property losses shall be made payable to the "County of Westchester" and adjusted with the appropriate County personnel.

In the event that claims, for which the County may be liable, in excess of the insured amounts provided herein are filed by reason of Municipality's negligent acts or omissions under the Agreement or by virtue of the provisions of the labor law or other statute or any other reason, the amount of excess of such claims or any portion thereof, may be withheld from payment due or to become due the Municipality until such time as the Municipality shall furnish such additional security covering such claims in form satisfactory to the Director.

In the event of any loss, if the Municipality maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums identified herein, the County shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Municipality. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

- The Municipality shall provide proof of the following coverage (if additional coverage is required for a specific agreement, those requirements will be described in the Agreement):
 - a) Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability. Certificate form C-105.2 or State Fund Insurance Company form U-26.3 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Workers' Compensation Law. State Workers' Compensation Board form DB-120.1 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Disability Benefits Law. Location of operation shall be "All locations in Westchester County, New York."

Where an applicant claims to not be required to carry either a Workers' Compensation Policy or Disability Benefits Policy, or both, the employer must complete NYS form CE-200, available to download at: http://www.wcb.ny.gov.

If the employer is self-insured for Workers' Compensation, he/she should present a certificate from the New York State Worker's Compensation Board evidencing that fact (Either SI-12, Certificate of Workers' Compensation Self-Insurance, or GSI-105.2, Certificate of Participation in Workers' Compensation Group Self-Insurance).

- b) Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of \$5,000,000 (c.s.1) per occurrence limit naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis. This insurance shall include the following coverages:
 - i. Premises Operations.
 - ii. Broad Form Contractual.
 - iii. Independent Contractor and Sub-Contractor.

- d) Automobile Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$5,000,000 for bodily injury and property damage unless otherwise indicated in the contract specifications. This insurance shall include for bodily injury and property damage (and can be provided within a Law Enforcement Liability or offered as a stand-alone policy) the following coverages and name the "County of Westchester" as additional insured:
 - (i) Owned automobiles.
 - (ii) Hired automobiles.
 - (iii) Non-owned automobiles.

- e) Law Enforcement Liability/Police Liability insurance The Municipality shall provide proof of such insurance naming the County as additionally insured. (Limits of \$5,000,000 per occurrence). This policy shall include but not be limited to: coverage for moon lighting, assault and battery, excessive force, failure to render medical attention, failed CPR, false arrest, deliberate indifference, misuse of fire arms, Abuse and Molestation, sexual, racial and other forms of harassment and discrimination, auto liability, mistakes resulting in harm.
- f) Professional Liability. The Municipality shall provide proof of such insurance. (Limits of \$5,000,000 per occurrence). This policy can be provided as a stand-alone policy or can be provided within a Law Enforcement Liability policy.
- g) Abuse and Molestation Liability, either by separate policy of insurance or through endorsement to the General Liability Policy or Professional Liability Policy, or can be provided within a Law Enforcement Liability policy. (Limits of \$5,000,000.00 per occurrence). This insurance shall include coverage for the following, including coverage for client on client, counselor client, and third parties:
 - (i) Misconduct
 - (ii) Abuse (including both physical and sexual)
 - (iii) Molestation
- 3. All policies of the Municipality shall be endorsed to contain the following clauses:
- (a) Insurers shall have no right to recovery or subrogation against the County (including its employees and other agents and agencies), it being the intention of the parties that the insurance policies so effected shall protect both parties and be primary coverage for any and all losses covered by the above-described insurance.
- (b) The clause "other insurance provisions" in a policy in which the County is named as an insured, shall not apply to the County.
- (c) The insurance companies issuing the policy or policies shall have no recourse against the County (including its agents and agencies as aforesaid) for payment of any premiums or for assessments under any form of policy.
- (d) Any and all deductibles in the above described insurance policies shall be assumed by and be for the account of, and at the sole risk of, the Municipality.

Mount Vernon will also be reimbursed for vehicle usage between the City Court of Mount Vernon and the Westchester County Jail, which is agreed to be sixteen (16) miles each way, at the rate of seventy (\$.70) cents, or at the then current Internal Revenue Service mileage rate for the

term of the IMA. Mount Vernon will also be reimbursed for the actual and reasonable costs of meals provided to post-arraignment prisoners.

- §3. The County Executive or his authorized designee be and hereby is authorized and empowered to execute instruments and take all action necessary and appropriate to accomplish the purposes hereof.
 - §4. This Act shall take effect immediately.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms and conditions herein contained, the County and the Municipality agree as follows:

1. PRISONER TRANSPORTATION: Except for prisoners arrested by the Westchester County Department of Public Safety Services, the Municipality shall provide round trip prisoner transportation using its own police department personnel and vehicles between the Municipality and the Westchester County Department of Correction (the "Department") for all prisoners remanded to the Westchester County Jail by court order or required to appear before the local Court within the Municipality. The County will reimburse

the Municipality for the actual number of round trips. The Municipality, where possible, shall hold prisoners for one daily trip to the Westchester County Jail.

2. <u>PAYMENT TERMS</u>: The Municipality shall be reimbursed by the County for prisoner transportation services at the following rates:

<u>2025</u> - \$245.00 per round trip with two police officers; \$367.00 per round trip with three police officers.

<u>2026</u> - \$252.00 per round trip with two police officers; \$378.00 per round trip with three police officers.

The Municipality shall also be reimbursed for vehicle usage between the City Court of Mount Vernon and the Westchester County Jail, which is deemed to be sixteen (16) miles each way, at the rate of sixty-seven cents (\$.70) per mile, or at the then current Internal Revenue Service mileage reimbursement rate for the term hereof.

The annual cost of this Agreement in 2025 shall not exceed \$310,849.00, and in 2026 shall not exceed \$320,175.00, for a total aggregate cost to the County pursuant to this Agreement which shall not exceed \$631,024.00.

Requests for reimbursement shall be submitted by the Municipality on a monthly basis on properly executed County claim forms and paid after approval by the Commissioner of the Department. The number of round trips made, prisoners transported and dates should be listed on the claim forms submitted to the Department. Reimbursement request shall be subject to audit by the County, and the Municipality shall keep and make available to the County such detailed books and records as are reasonably necessary to substantiate the basis for reimbursement. The Municipality shall not be entitled to reimbursement for any prisoner transportation expense not specifically provided for herein.

This Agreement shall be deemed executory only to the extent of the monies appropriated and available for the purpose of this Agreement and no liability on account hereof shall be incurred by the County beyond the amount of such monies.

- 3. <u>MEALS</u>: The County shall reimburse the Municipality for meals provided to post-arraignment prisoners for the actual and reasonable costs incurred and receipts submitted as part of the Municipality's monthly voucher submitted to the Department.
- 4. **TERM**: This Agreement shall commence retroactively on January 1, 2025 and shall expire on December 31, 2026. The County or the Municipality may, upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other party, terminate this Agreement in whole or in part when it deems it to be in its best interest. In such event, the Municipality shall be compensated and the County shall be liable only for payment for services rendered prior to the effective date of termination.
- 5. INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION: All personnel and vehicles engaged in prisoner transportation duties shall at all times remain and be deemed the employees and property of the Municipality. In addition to, and not in limitation of the insurance provisions contained in Schedule "A" of this Agreement, the Municipality agrees to indemnify, defend and hold the County, its officers, employees and agents harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, damage or expense the County may suffer as a result of any and all claims, demands, causes of action or judgments arising directly or indirectly out of the transportation of prisoners for which reimbursement is sought hereunder for losses arising out of the negligent acts or omissions of the Municipality, its agents or employees.
- 6. **ENTIRE AGREEMENT**: This Agreement constitutes the entire and integrated agreement between and among the parties hereto and supersedes any and all prior negotiations, commitments and writings. It shall not be released, discharged, changed or modified except by an instrument in writing signed by a duly authorized representative of each of the parties.

In the event of any conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the terms of any schedule or attachment hereto, it is understood that the terms of this Agreement shall be controlling with respect to any interpretation of the meaning and intent of the parties.

- 7. <u>APPLICABLE LAW</u>: This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of New York.
- 8. <u>APPROVALS</u>: This Agreement is subject to the approval of the Westchester County Board of Legislators and the governing legislative bodies of the Municipality.

SCHEDULE "A"

STANDARD INSURANCE PROVISIONS (Municipality - LEO)

1. Prior to commencing work, and throughout the term of the Agreement, the Municipality shall obtain at its own cost and expense the required insurance as delineated below from insurance companies licensed in the State of New York, carrying a Best's financial rating of A or better. Municipality shall provide evidence of such insurance to the County of Westchester ("County"), either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County ("Director"). The policies or certificates thereof shall provide that ten (10) days prior to cancellation or material change in the policy, notices of same shall be given to the Director either by overnight mail or personal delivery for all of the following stated insurance policies. All notices shall name the Municipality and identify the Agreement.

If at any time any of the policies required herein shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing any such policy shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, the Municipality shall upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and submit the policy or the certificate as requested by the Director to the Office of Risk Management of the County for approval by the Director. Upon failure of the Municipality to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance, the Agreement, at the election of the County, may be declared suspended, discontinued or terminated.

Failure of the Municipality to take out, maintain, or the taking out or maintenance of any required insurance, shall not relieve the Municipality from any liability under the Agreement, nor shall the insurance requirements be construed to conflict with or otherwise limit the contractual obligations of the Municipality concerning indemnification.

All property losses shall be made payable to the "County of Westchester" and adjusted with the appropriate County personnel.

In the event that claims, for which the County may be liable, in excess of the insured amounts provided herein are filed by reason of Municipality's negligent acts or omissions under the Agreement or by virtue of the provisions of the labor law or other statute or any other reason, the amount of excess of such claims or any portion thereof, may be withheld from payment due or to become due the Municipality until such time as the Municipality shall furnish such additional security covering such claims in form satisfactory to the Director.

In the event of any loss, if the Municipality maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums identified herein, the County shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Municipality. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

- The Municipality shall provide proof of the following coverage (if additional coverage is required for a specific agreement, those requirements will be described in the Agreement):
 - a) Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability. Certificate form C-105.2 or State Fund Insurance Company form U-26.3 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Workers' Compensation Law. State Workers' Compensation Board form DB-120.1 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Disability Benefits Law. Location of operation shall be "All locations in Westchester County, New York."

Where an applicant claims to not be required to carry either a Workers' Compensation Policy or Disability Benefits Policy, or both, the employer must complete NYS form CE-200, available to download at: http://www.wcb.ny.gov.

If the employer is self-insured for Workers' Compensation, he/she should present a certificate from the New York State Worker's Compensation Board evidencing that fact (Either SI-12, Certificate of Workers' Compensation Self-Insurance, or GSI-105.2, Certificate of Participation in Workers' Compensation Group Self-Insurance).

- b) Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of \$5,000,000 (c.s.1) per occurrence limit naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis. This insurance shall include the following coverages:
 - i. Premises Operations.
 - ii. Broad Form Contractual.
 - iii. Independent Contractor and Sub-Contractor.
 - iv. Products and Completed Operations.
- c) Commercial Umbrella/Excess Insurance: This policy can be utilized to supplement the General Liability policy so as to yield a minimum total combined single limit of \$5,000,000 each Occurrence and Aggregate naming the "County of Westchester" as additional insured, written on a "follow the form" basis.

NOTE: Additional insured status shall be provided by standard or other endorsement that extends coverage to the County of Westchester for both on-going and completed operations.

- d) Automobile Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$5,000,000 for bodily injury and property damage unless otherwise indicated in the contract specifications. This insurance shall include for bodily injury and property damage (and can be provided within a Law Enforcement Liability or offered as a stand-alone policy) the following coverages and name the "County of Westchester" as additional insured:
 - (i) Owned automobiles.
 - (ii) Hired automobiles.
 - (iii) Non-owned automobiles.

- e) Law Enforcement Liability/Police Liability insurance The Municipality shall provide proof of such insurance naming the County as additionally insured. (Limits of \$5,000,000 per occurrence). This policy shall include but not be limited to: coverage for moon lighting, assault and battery, excessive force, failure to render medical attention, failed CPR, false arrest, deliberate indifference, misuse of fire arms, Abuse and Molestation, sexual, racial and other forms of harassment and discrimination, auto liability, mistakes resulting in harm.
- f) Professional Liability. The Municipality shall provide proof of such insurance. (Limits of \$5,000,000 per occurrence). This policy can be provided as a stand-alone policy or can be provided within a Law Enforcement Liability policy.
- g) Abuse and Molestation Liability, either by separate policy of insurance or through endorsement to the General Liability Policy or Professional Liability Policy, or can be provided within a Law Enforcement Liability policy. (Limits of \$5,000,000.00 per occurrence). This insurance shall include coverage for the following, including coverage for client on client, counselor client, and third parties:
 - (i) Misconduct
 - (ii) Abuse (including both physical and sexual)
 - (iii) Molestation
- 3. All policies of the Municipality shall be endorsed to contain the following clauses:
- (a) Insurers shall have no right to recovery or subrogation against the County (including its employees and other agents and agencies), it being the intention of the parties that the insurance policies so effected shall protect both parties and be primary coverage for any and all losses covered by the above-described insurance.
- (b) The clause "other insurance provisions" in a policy in which the County is named as an insured, shall not apply to the County.
- (c) The insurance companies issuing the policy or policies shall have no recourse against the County (including its agents and agencies as aforesaid) for payment of any premiums or for assessments under any form of policy.
- (d) Any and all deductibles in the above described insurance policies shall be assumed by and be for the account of, and at the sole risk of, the Municipality.

Under the factual and legal circumstances regarding this matter, the settlement is reasonable and is recommended.

Your Committee is in receipt of a proposed Act which, if enacted by your Board, would authorize the settlement of the lawsuit of LYNNE HOFFMAN and JEROME P.

SILVERMAN, in Supreme Court Westchester County, Index No. 61952/2022, in the amount of \$200,000.00, inclusive of attorney's fees.

The matter arises from a bicyclist's fall while riding on the Heathcote Bypass, a

County-designated roadway located in the Village of Scarsdale. The accident occurred on

April 7, 2021, at approximately 3:00 p.m. Plaintiff Lynne Hoffman was riding her bicycle

when she entered a section of the roadway that was in an alleged state of disrepair. Plaintiff hit
a pothole with her front tire that caused her to fall from the bicycle and suffer personal physical
injuries of a permanent nature. Plaintiff's husband filed loss of consortium claims against the

County as well.

This settlement takes into consideration the factual allegations, the nature of plaintiffs' injuries, and the County's issues regarding prior notice and the duty to maintain and repair the accident location. It is likely that if this matter were to proceed to trial the County would be found liable for plaintiffs' injuries and expose the County to a substantial monetary verdict.

Under the circumstances, the County Attorney's Office engaged in protracted negotiation with plaintiffs and the Court's assistance to arrive at this settlement.

Plaintiffs are represented by Daniel Heyman, Esq., 500 Summit Lake Drive, Valhalla, New York 10595, and Ellen M. Hoffer, Esq., 500 Mamaroneck Avenue, Harrison, New York 10528.

Dear Honorable Members of the Board:

Attached for your consideration is an Act which, if enacted by your Board, would authorize the settlement of the lawsuit entitled, <u>Darrell W. Roberts v. Liberty Lines Transit, Inc.</u>, et al, in Bronx County Supreme Court, Index No. 20424/2013E.

This claim tentatively settled on September 8, 2025 in the amount of \$500,000. pending this Board's approval, of which the County will pay only the \$250,000 self-insured retention in the County's insurance policy.

This matter is pending in the Bronx County Supreme Court. The law firm of Bernstein & Bernstein, 599 West Hartsdale Avenue, White Plains, New York is representing the plaintiff. The law firm of Cascone & Kluepfel, 497 Main Street, Farmingdale, New York 11735 is representing the County.

This matter arises out of a Liberty Lines Bus incident that occurred on September 4, 2012. The circumstances of this incident consist of a pedestrian knockdown that occurred at the bus depot located in White Plains. Mr. Roberts was allegedly struck by the side mirror of the bus as he stood on the sidewalk at the bus depot. Ultimately, Mr. Roberts underwent a partial fusion of the cervical spine from C3-C6 on February 26, 2014 at Mt. Sinai Hospital.

Plaintiff moved for and was granted summary judgment against the County on liability by Order dated 11/18/13. However, the County appealed and by Order dated 11/30/15, Justice Gonzalez decided correctly that the plaintiff's credibility must be determined by a jury. The 11/18/13 Order was vacated and summary judgment was reversed.

The settlement takes into consideration the uncertainty of litigation and the potential costs of trial, subsequent proceedings, and potential appeal. Both outside counsel and our insurance companies recommend this settlement. The County will only pay the \$250,000 self-insured retention in its insurance policy and the County's insurer will pay the \$250,000 balance.

The accompanying Act will authorize settlement of the lawsuit entitled, <u>Darrell W. Roberts v. Liberty Lines Transit, Inc.</u>, et al, in Bronx County Supreme Court, Index No. 20424/2013E, in the amount of \$500,000.00, inclusive of attorney's fees.

Your Committee is in receipt of a proposed Act, which if enacted by your Board, would authorize the settlement of the County's potential liability in the lawsuit entitled, <u>Darrell W. Roberts v. Liberty Lines Transit, Inc.</u>, et al, Bronx County Supreme Court, Index No. 20424/2013E, in the amount of \$500,000, inclusive of attorney's fees.

This matter is pending in the Bronx County Supreme Court. This claim tentatively settled on September 8, 2025 in the amount of \$500,000. pending this Board's approval, of which the County will only pay the \$250,000 self-insured retention in the County's insurance policy.

This matter arises out of a Liberty Lines Bus incident which occurred on September 4, 2012. The circumstances of this incident consist of a pedestrian knockdown that occurred at the bus depot located in White Plains. Mr. Roberts was allegedly struck by the side mirror of the bus as he stood on the sidewalk at the bus depot.

The settlement takes into consideration the uncertainty of litigation and the potential costs of trial, subsequent proceedings, and potential appeal. Both outside counsel and our insurance companies recommend this settlement.

Your Committee has carefully considered the subject matter, the settlement proposal, the attached Act and recommends authorizing the County Attorney or his designee to settle the lawsuit entitled, <u>Darrell W. Roberts v. Liberty Lines Transit, Inc.</u>, et al, in Bronx County Supreme Court, Index No. 20424/2013E, in the amount of \$500,000, inclusive of attorney's fees.

An affirmative vote of a majority of the Board is required to pass this legislation.

Transmitted herewith is an Act that, if adopted by your Honorable Board, would authorize the County of Westchester (the "County") to amend an agreement with the law firm of McCarthy Fingar LLP ("McCarthy Fingar"), as previously amended, (the "Agreement") pursuant to which the firm was retained, at County expense, to serve in an "of counsel" capacity to the County Attorney, as needed. The retention was made in connection with litigation relating to a will and indenture, which conveyed to the County parkland known as Merestead (the "Litigation"). I am now requesting an increase in the authorized not-to-exceed amount of the Agreement by One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-One Dollars and Five Cents (\$1,761.05).

Under the Agreement, McCarthy Fingar was to be paid a total amount not-to-exceed Three Hundred and Seventy-Six Thousand Dollars (\$376,000.00), payable at various hourly rates for various personnel. The proposed amendment would authorize the County to increase the not-to-exceed amount of the Agreement to a new total amount not-to-exceed Three Hundred and Seventy-Seven Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-One Dollars and Five Cents (\$377,761.05).

As your Honorable Board is aware, the Litigation was commenced pursuant to the Real Property Actions and Proceedings Law Section 1955 and the Estates, Powers and Trusts Law Section 8-1.1 to obtain relief from certain restrictions in the deed and trust that conveyed Merestead to the County. The original agreement with McCarthy Fingar was authorized by your Honorable Board, and thereafter executed by the County, in 2019, by Act 2019-18. Your Honorable Board subsequently authorized, and the County thereafter executed, amendments in 2020, by Act 2020-53; in 2022, by Act 2022-17; and in 2024, by Act 2024-92. The County Attorney has, however, advised your Committee that a small amount of additional work concerning the Litigation was subsequently requested, and additional billing, in the amount specified above, was generated.

According to the memorandum from the Planning Department, dated January 14, 2025, which is on file with the Clerk of the Board, with respect to the State Environmental Quality Review Act, the proposed local law does not constitute an action as defined in section 617.2(b) of 6 NYCRR Part 617. As such, no environmental review is required. Your Committee concurs

Dear Honorable Members of the Board of Legislators:

Transmitted herewith is an Act which, if adopted by your Honorable Board, would authorize the County of Westchester (the "County") to enter into an agreement (the "Agreement") to retain, at County expense, the law firm of Broadfield US LLP (the "Firm"), to serve in an "of counsel" capacity to the County Attorney, as needed, in connection with the follorwing two matters: (i) a claim asserted by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (the "EPA") for response costs incurred while investigating contamination levels on real property located in the Village of Mount Kisco (the "Kisco Ave Matter"); and (ii) legal issues relating to the portion of the County Trunk Sanitary Sewer System located on real property currently owned by ARCO Environmental Remediation LLC ("ARCO") on River Street in the Village of Hastings-on-Hudson (the "River Street Matter" and together with the Kisco Ave Matter, collectively, the "Environmental Matters"). The term of the proposed Agreement will commence retroactive to September 11, 2025 and will continue until the Environmental Matters have been resolved.

By way of background with respect to the Kisco Ave Matter, during World War II, the Canadian Radium & Uranium Corp. participated in the Manhattan Project by operating a uranium refinery on real property located at 105 Kisco Avenue in the Village of Mount Kisco, identified as Tax Map Parcel Nos. 69.65-2-4 (with a parcel address of 107 Kisco Avenue, Mount Kisco, New York) and 69.65-2-5 (with a parcel address of 95 Kisco Avenue, Mount Kisco, New York) on the Tax Assessment Maps for the Village/Town of Mount Kisco (the "Mount Kisco Property"). Hazardous substances, including but not limited to radioactive materials, were later found on the Mount Kisco Property. In 2015, the current owner of the Mount Kisco Property, 105 Mt. Kisco Associates LLC ("105 LLC"), filed a complaint entitled 105 Mt. Kisco Associates LLC et al v. Paul Carozza et al (the "Action") alleging, among other things, causes of action pursuant to the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act ("CERCLA"), 42 U.S.C. § 9601 et seq. More specifically, 105 LLC alleged that the Westchester County Department of Health ("DOH") participated in an attempt to remediate the Mount Kisco Property by arranging for and/or transporting for disposal hazardous substances resulting in the contamination of soil, groundwater, and/or soil vapor associated with spills, discharges, releases

and threatened releases of hazardous substances, including but not limited to radioactive materials in and around the Mount Kisco Property. The Action was subsequently settled pursuant to that certain Stipulation and Order Approving Settlement Agreements on Third Parties, Dismissing All Claims, and Dismissing This Action, dated April 14, 2022 (the "Stipulation"). Notably, the Stipulation stated that, notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained therein or contained in any settlement agreement entered into in accordance therewith, the EPA would retain its right to assert any claim or cause of action relating to the Mount Kisco Property in any subsequent action or administrative proceeding. Accordingly, the EPA has now asserted a claim against DOH alleging that, pursuant to CERCLA, DOH is responsible for the reimbursement of response costs incurred by the EPA while investigating the contamination levels of the Mount Kisco Property. As such, the County needs the expertise of environmental counsel to resolve this claim.

Additionally, with respect to the River Street Matter, on or about 1939, the County constructed sanitary sewers and the Hastings Pumping Station on a portion of the real property currently owned by ARCO and located on River Street in the Village of Hastings-on-Hudson, identified as Tax Map Parcel Nos. 4.70-47-1, 4.70-47-2, 4.70-47-3 and 4.30-19-1 on the Tax Assessment Maps for the Town of Greenburgh (the "ARCO Property"). The Anaconda Wire and Cable Company and subsequent owners used the site for a variety of industrial purposes, including a wire and cable manufacturing facility. Hazardous substance contamination was discovered on the ARCO Property in the late 1980s, and the ARCO Property was classified as an Inactive Hazardous Waste Disposal Site, Number 3-60-022, by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation ("NYSDEC"). The County needs to perform various sanitary sewer projects on the sanitary sewers and the Hastings Pump Station located on the ARCO Property. As a result of these projects, environmental issues have been identified, including issues under the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act ("RCRA"), 42 U.S.C. § 6901 *et seq*, and CERCLA, for which the County needs the expertise of environmental counsel.

The Firm's lead environmental attorney, Edward A. Smith, Esq., has extensive experience in the area of environmental law, including CERCLA cases, serving as an Assistant United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York for ten years, from 1990-2000. In addition, Mr. Smith previously provided similar legal services to the County in connection with each of the Environmental Matters, pursuant to two (2) agreements between the County and Mr. Smith's former law firm, Abrams, Fensterman, Fensterman, Eisman, Formato, Ferra, Wolf & Carone, LLP, dated February 23, 2020 and November 29, 2021, respectively (the "Prior Agreements"), both of which are now expired. As there were no additional issues necessitating Mr. Smith's services at the time, the County did not extend either of the Prior Agreements. However, now that new issues have arisen in connection with the Environmental Matters, the County once again requires his services.

Under the proposed Agreement, the Firm will be paid a total amount not-to-exceed \$20,000.00, payable at various hourly rates for various personnel.

The proposed Agreement is exempt from the Westchester County Procurement Policy and Procedures pursuant to Section 3(a) x thereof which exempts "procurements for the services of lawyers . . .".

For the reasons set forth above, I most respectfully recommend your Honorable Board's approval of the attached Act.

HONORABLE BOARD OF LEGISLATORS THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER

Your Committee is in receipt of a communication from the County Attorney recommending the approval of an Act which, if adopted by your Honorable Board, would authorize the County of Westchester (the "County") to enter into an agreement (the "Agreement") to retain, at County expense, the law firm of Broadfield US LLP (the "Firm"), to serve in an "of counsel" capacity to the County Attorney, as needed, in connection with the following two matters: (i) a claim asserted by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (the "EPA") for response costs incurred while investigating contamination levels on real property located in the Village of Mount Kisco (the "Kisco Ave Matter"); and (ii) legal issues relating to the portion of the County Trunk Sanitary Sewer System located on real property currently owned by ARCO Environmental Remediation LLC ("ARCO") in the Village of Hastings-on-Hudson (the "River Street Matter" and together with the Kisco Ave Matter, collectively, the "Environmental Matters"). The term of the proposed Agreement will commence retroactive to September 11, 2025 and will continue until the Environmental Matters have been resolved.

Your Committee is advised that, in regard to the Kisco Ave Matter, during World War II, the Canadian Radium & Uranium Corp. participated in the Manhattan Project by operating a uranium refinery on real property located at 105 Kisco Avenue in the Village of Mount Kisco, identified as Tax Map Parcel Nos. 69.65-2-4 (with a parcel address of 107 Kisco Avenue, Mount Kisco, New York) and 69.65-2-5 (with a parcel address of 95 Kisco Avenue, Mount Kisco, New York) on the Tax Assessment Maps for the Village/Town of Mount Kisco (the "Mount Kisco Property"). Hazardous substances, including but not limited to radioactive materials, were later found on the Mount Kisco Property. In 2015, the current owner of the Mount Kisco Property, 105 Mt. Kisco Associates LLC ("105 LLC"), filed a complaint entitled 105 Mt. Kisco Associates LLC et al v. Paul Carozza et al (the "Action") alleging, among other things, causes of action pursuant to the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act ("CERCLA"), 42 U.S.C. § 9601 et seq. More specifically, 105 LLC alleged that the Westchester County Department of Health ("DOH") participated in an attempt to remediate the Mount Kisco Property by arranging for and/or transporting for disposal hazardous substances resulting in the contamination of soil, groundwater, and/or soil vapor associated with spills, discharges, releases and threatened releases of hazardous substances, including but not limited to radioactive materials

in and around the Mount Kisco Property. The Action was subsequently settled pursuant to that certain Stipulation and Order Approving Settlement Agreements on Third Parties, Dismissing All Claims, and Dismissing This Action, dated April 14, 2022. (the "Stipulation"). Notably, the Stipulation stated that, notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained therein or contained in any settlement agreement entered into in accordance therewith, the EPA would retain its right to assert any claim or cause of action relating to the Mount Kisco Property in any subsequent action or administrative proceeding. Accordingly, the EPA has now asserted a claim against DOH alleging that, pursuant to CERCLA, DOH is responsible for the reimbursement of response costs incurred by the EPA while investigating the contamination levels of the Mount Kisco Property. As such, the County needs the expertise of environmental counsel to resolve this claim.

Your Committee is further advised that, with respect to the River Street Matter, on or about 1939, the County constructed sanitary sewers and the Hastings Pumping Station on a portion of real property currently owned by ARCO and located on River Street in the Village of Hastings-on-Hudson, identified as Tax Map Parcel Nos. 4.70-47-1, 4.70-47-2, 4.70-47-3 and 4.30-19-1 on the Tax Assessment Maps for the Town of Greenburgh (the "ARCO Property"). The Anaconda Wire and Cable Company and subsequent owners used the site for a variety of industrial purposes, including a wire and cable manufacturing facility. Hazardous substance contamination was discovered on the ARCO Property in the late 1980s, and the ARCO Property was classified as an Inactive Hazardous Waste Disposal Site, Number 3-60-022, by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation ("NYSDEC"). The County needs to perform various sanitary sewer projects on sanitary sewers and Hastings Pump Station located on the ARCO Property.. As a result of these projects, environmental issues have been identified, including issues under the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act ("RCRA"), 42 U.S.C. § 6901 *et seq*, and CERCLA, for which the County needs the expertise of environmental counsel.

The Firm's lead environmental attorney, Edward A. Smith, Esq., has extensive experience in the area of environmental law, including CERCLA cases, serving as an Assistant United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York for ten years, from 1990-2000. In addition, Mr. Smith previously provided similar legal services to the County in connection with each of the Environmental Matters, pursuant to two (2) agreements between the County and Mr. Smith's former law firm, Abrams, Fensterman, Fensterman, Eisman, Formato, Ferra, Wolf & Carone, LLP,

dated February 23, 2020 and November 29, 2021, respectively (the "Prior Agreements"), both of

which are now expired. As there were no additional issues necessitating Mr. Smith's services at

the time, the County did not extend either of the Prior Agreements. However, now that new issues

have arisen in connection with the Environmental Matters, the County once again requires his

services.

Under the proposed Agreement, the Firm will be paid a total amount not-to-exceed

\$20,000.00, payable at various hourly rates for various personnel.

Your Committee is advised that the proposed Agreement is exempt from the Westchester

County Procurement Policy and Procedures pursuant to Section 3(a) x thereof which exempts

"procurements for the services of lawyers . . .".

The Planning Department has advised your Committee that based on its review, the

proposed Agreement does not meet the definition of an "action" under New York State

Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA") and its implementing regulations 6 NYCRR part

617(2)(b). Please refer to the memorandum from the Department of Planning dated January 14,

2025, which is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Legislators. Your Committee concurs with

this recommendation.

It should be noted that an affirmative vote of a majority of the members of your Honorable

Board is required to adopt the attached Act. Accordingly, your Committee recommends the

adoption of the proposed Act.

BE IT ENACTED by the County Board of the County of Westchester, as follows:

- **Section 1.** The County of Westchester (the "County") is hereby authorized to enter into an agreement (the "Agreement") to retain, at County expense, the law firm of Broadfield US LLP (the "Firm"), to serve in an "of counsel" capacity to the County Attorney, as needed, in connection with the following two matters: (i) a claim asserted by the United States Environmental Protection Agency for response costs incurred while investigating contamination levels on real property located at 105 Kisco Avenue in the Village of Mount Kisco (the "Kisco Ave Matter"); and (ii) in connection with the portion of the County Trunk Sanitary Sewer System located on the real property owned by ARCO Environmental Remediation LLC, classified as Inactive Hazardous Waste Disposal Site Number 3-60-022 by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation, identified as Tax Map Parcel Nos. 4.70-47-1, 4.70-47-2, 4.70-47-3 and 4.30-19-1 on the Tax Assessment Maps for the Town of Greenburgh and having an address of River Street, Village of Hastings-on-Hudson (the "River Street Matter" and together with the Kisco Ave Matter, collectively, the "Environmental Matters").
- **§2.** The Agreement shall be for a term that will commence retroactive to September 11, 2025 and continue until the Environmental Matters are resolved. For the services rendered, the Firm shall be paid a total amount not-to-exceed \$20,000.00, payable at various hourly rates for various personnel. In addition, the Firm will be reimbursed, at cost, for *reasonable and necessary* out of pocket expenses and disbursements.
- **§3.** The Firm is hereby authorized to take any and all steps that are reasonably necessary to represent the County concerning the Environmental Matters, in accordance with the terms to be specified in the Agreement.

- **§4.** The County Executive or his authorized designee is hereby authorized to execute all instruments and take all actions reasonably necessary to carry out the purposes of this Act.
 - **§5.** This Act shall take effect immediately.

A few days ago, a person physically assaulted a caseworker for the Department of Social Services ("DSS") while the caseworker was making contact with clients in the field. The caseworker suffered major, life-threatening injuries and is currently fighting for her life. DSS has determined that there is, therefore, an urgent need to take action to protect DSS staff from further physical harm while they are performing their duties on behalf of the County of Westchester (the "County").

Based on the details specified in the emergency-declaration memorandum, dated June 4, 2024, which I have submitted to your Honorable Board, in accordance with Section 167.171(3) of the Laws of Westchester County, it has been determined that this is a condition that was unforeseen, affects the life, health, and safety the staff of DSS and the other inhabitants of the County, and requires immediate action that cannot await competitive bidding. Therefore, this situation meets the legal requirements for an emergency contract under Section 167.171(5) of the Laws of Westchester County and Section 103(4) of the New York General Municipal Law. This procurement, which is funded in part by federal funds, also meets the requirements of 2 C.F.R. 200.320(c)(3), which allows for non-competitive procurement when "[t]he public exigency or emergency for the requirement will not permit a delay resulting from publicizing a competitive solicitation", based on the emergency need for security escort services (the "Services"), as described above and in the referenced emergency-declaration memorandum.

In response to this emergency, DSS solicited quotations for hourly rates from three (3) contractors that customarily provide the Services. The best hourly rate for the Services has been offered by Century Protective Services Inc. ("Century").

Accordingly, authority is requested from your Honorable Board for the County to enter into an emergency contract with Century, pursuant to which it will provide the County with the Services for DSS personnel, for a period of one (1) year, commencing upon execution, for a total amount not-to-exceed \$209,040.00, payable at a rate of \$33.50 per hour per escort (the "Emergency Contract"; DSS3027-24).

The proposed Emergency Contract will serve a public purpose by ensuring that DSS personnel have sufficient security in order to carry out their duties for the County and its inhabitants.

The goal and objective of the proposed Emergency Contract is to ensure that DSS personnel have sufficient security in order to carry out their duties for the County and its inhabitants.

The goal and objective of the proposed Emergency Contract is in the best interests of the County in terms of public health and safety, as ensuring that DSS personnel have sufficient security in order to carry out their duties for the County and its inhabitants will ultimately help safeguard the health and safety of DSS personnel, the persons with whom the DSS personnel are interacting, and the public, overall.

The goal and objective of the proposed Emergency Contract will be tracked and monitored by DSS personnel.

I respectfully recommend the adoption of the attached resolution.

The attached Resolution is being submitted pursuant to the Emergency Declaration that was submitted to your Honorable Board on October 1, 2024.

On September 13, 2024, an inspection conducted by Johnson Controls, Inc. ("JCI"), as required by the County's on-going maintenance contract, at the Westchester County Center, revealed that a leak exists in the heat exchanger in one of the three boilers. The damaged heat exchanger requires replacement prior to the winter months, but due to a backlog the necessary parts will take roughly 14 weeks which means the County would not be able to properly heat the building or provide hot water. It is recommended by the County's contractor that the best solution is to replace the entire boiler, which is readily available and can be installed prior to the cold weather arriving and will avoid any service disruption at the County Center.

As noted in the Emergency Declaration, the Department of Parks, Recreation and Conservation (the "Department"), following its standard emergency contract protocols, selected JCI to perform Contract PRC-1448 Emergency Boiler Service, at Westchester County Center, 198 Central Avenue, White Plains, New York. The emergency work includes the replacement of (1) AERCO BMK 2000 Benchmark boiler, including all necessary labor and materials to remove the current boiler and install the replacement boiler. JCI will remove and reinstall duct work for a rigger to move the boiler and will disconnect and reconnect all gas and water piping along with breeching and provide startup by a factory service representative.

Attached for your consideration is a resolution, which, if approved by your Honorable Board, would authorize the County of Westchester ("County") to enter into Contract No. PRC-1448 with JCl in an amount not to exceed \$119,588.00, payable in accordance with an approved budget. The Department has reviewed JCl's breakdown for the work and has determined that the costs are consistent with similar items of work on other County Projects. The term of the Agreement shall be October 21, 2024 through November 30, 2024.

This emergency contract is in the public's best interest to protect the public health, safety, and security of the residents of Westchester County.

This emergency contract has been reviewed by the Law Department and a proposed form of Resolution is attached hereto for your approval.

It is my recommendation that Emergency Contract No. PRC-1448 be awarded to Johnson Controls, Inc. in the amount of \$119,588.00.

As we informed your Honorable Board in a Declaration of Emergency Situation memorandum dated October 24, 2024 (the "Memorandum"), after the deadline for voter registration expired on October 26, 2024, the County of Westchester ("County"), through its Board of Elections ("BOE"), was required by law to print direct mail postcards and send them to all registered voters residing in Westchester County. This work is normally handled through the County's own print shop. However, because the County print shop was overwhelmed by producing this year's numerous State ballot proposals and County abstract proposal, it could not print the direct mail postcards for the BOE within the allotted time frame for voters to receive the information prior to early voting. Therefore, the BOE encountered an emergency situation that, if not addressed promptly, would have resulted in voters not being notified in a timely manner.

Based on the details specified in the Memorandum, which was submitted to your Honorable Board in accordance with Section 167.171(3) of the Laws of Westchester County, it has been determined that this was a condition that was unforeseen and required immediate action that could not await competitive bidding. Therefore, this situation met the legal requirements for an emergency contract under Section 167.171(5) of the Laws of Westchester County and Section 103(4) of the New York General Municipal Law.

Accordingly, authority is now requested from your Honorable Board for the County to enter into an Emergency Contract with Phoenix Graphics Inc. ("Phoenix"), pursuant to which Phoenix agreed to print direct mail postcards for the BOE and deliver same to the White Plains Post Office for mailing (the "Emergency Contract"). The term of the Emergency Contract commenced retroactively on October 1, 2024 and expired on October 31, 2024. In consideration for the printing and delivery services rendered, the County will pay Phoenix an amount not-to-exceed \$71,175.00, payable in full upon execution of the Emergency Contract.

The proposed Emergency Contract serves a public purpose by enabling the BOE to provide complete election information to registered voters.

Accordingly, we most respectfully recommend the adoption of the attached resolution.

The Agreement shall be in an amount not to exceed \$1,506,639.48 for ride restoration, maintenance and support, parts, overhead and contingency, plus a County option for additional operations support services, in an amount not to exceed \$228,390.00, for a total aggregate amount not to exceed \$1,735,029.48, pursuant to an approved budget and subject to appropriations.

This Resolution is being submitted pursuant to the Emergency Declaration that was submitted to your Honorable Board on May 1, 2025 (the "Emergency Declaration"), which outlined the reasons and nature of the emergency.

In summary, on April 12, 2021 the Board of Legislators adopted an Act authorizing the County to enter into a Second Restated and Amended Playland Management Agreement (the "Second Restated Agreement") with Standard Amusements LLC ("Standard"). The Second Restated Agreement was duly executed on or about July 22, 2021. On January 21, 2025, the County received a Notice of Termination from Standard effective February 20, 2025, which purports to terminate the Second Restated Agreement. On January 22, 2025 the County sent a response rejecting Standard's Notice of Termination and reciting a number of breaches on the part of Standard. On January 30, 2025, Standard sent another letter stating, *inter alia*, that its termination notice was valid, that Standard will not manage Playland in 2025, and the County's breach claims were frivolous. Thereafter on February 4, 2025 the County sent a letter to Standard's attorneys escalating the dispute to arbitration pursuant to Section 43(ii) of the Second Restated Agreement. In accordance with the Second Restated Agreement

the parties have selected arbitrators and have each submitted documents in support of their claims. The arbitration hearing is scheduled to commence on August 12, 2025.

In order to open the iconic Playland Amusement Park for a portion of the 2025 operating season, the County Department of Parks, Recreation and Conservation ("Department") declared an emergency situation. As an emergency, this situation cannot await competitive bidding. The Department selected Zamperla to perform the necessary emergency work, which includes inspecting, repairing, replacing and maintaining specific rides and procuring necessary supplies and parts. The County owns 11 rides that were manufactured by Zamperla and a number of other rides manufactured by a company that is no longer in business. Zamperla not only has familiarity with the rides but also has the expertise and ability to provide the parts and maintenance.

Based on the above, it's in the best interest of the County to enter into an agreement with Zamperla on an emergency basis as it is the most-timely and fiscally efficient solution and will safeguard the County's property and secure the public safety of park attendees and staff.

FIRST AMENDMENT TO TAX AGREEMENT

THIS FIRST AMENDMENT TO TAX AGREEMENT (this "Amendment") is made as of October 15, 2025 (the "Effective Date") and is by and between CITY OF YONKERS INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AGENCY, a public benefit corporation duly existing under the laws of the State of New York with offices located at 470 Nepperhan Avenue, Suite 200, Yonkers, New York 10701 (the "Agency") and MIROZA TOWER LLC, a liability company duly organized and validly existing under the laws of the State of New York, c/o CREFA Companies, 3611 14th Avenue, Suite 514, Brooklyn, New York 11218 (the "Company").

WHEREAS, the Company and the Agency previously entered into various agreements in furtherance of a certain Project (as defined in the herein defined Tax Agreement), including that certain Tax Agreement dated as of May 17, 2024 (the "Tax Agreement") pursuant to which the Company receives certain real property tax benefits relating to the Facility (as such term is defined in the Tax Agreement), which Facility is located at 44 (a/k/a 40) Hudson Street (Section: 1, Block: 502, Lot: 1.10) (the "44 Hudson") and 56-60 Buena Vista Avenue (Section: 1, Block: 511, Lots: 30 and 31) (the "Original Off-Site Parking"), City of Yonkers, Westchester County, New York; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to a certain Purchase and Sale Agreement, dated as of February 4, 2025, as amended by that certain First Amendment to Purchase and Sale Agreement, dated as of April 3, 2025, by and between the Company and 13 Hawthorne Yonkers, LLC, 15 Hawthorne Yonkers AMS LLC, 17 Hawthorne Yonkers AMS LLC, 52 BV Yonkers AMS LLC and 56-60 BV Yonkers AMS LLC (collectively, "AMS") agreed to an in-kind exchange for adjacent parcels, including a portion of the Original Off-Site Parking; and

WHEREAS, the Company will convey fee title to a portion of the Original Off-Site Parking to AMS and AMS will convey fee title to 13 Hawthorne Avenue (Section: 1, Block: 511, Lot: 11; f/k/a 13, 15, and 17 Hawthorne Avenue (Section 1, Block: 511, Lots: 11, 12, and 13), p/o 60 Buena Vista Avenue (p/o Section: 1, Block: 511, Lot: 30) and p/o 64 Buena Vista Avenue (Section: 1, Block: 511, Lot: 28) (the "New Off-Site Parking") to the Company; and

WHEREAS, in 2019, the Company purchased approximately 1,035 square feet of the parcel adjacent to 44 Hudson, commonly known as p/o 25 Prospect Street (p/o Section: 1, Block: 502, Lot: 40) (the "Additional Land"), for purposes of locating certain Equipment, as well as the construction of retaining walls and access stairs; and

WHEREAS, as of the date hereof, the Additional Land has been merged with 44 Hudson (as so merged, the Facility Realty"); and

WHEREAS, the Facility Realty shall continue to be commonly referred to as 44 (a/k/a 40) Hudson Street, and designated as Section: 1, Block: 502. Lot: 1.10 on the Tax Map of the City of Yonkers; and

WHEREAS, the Company and the Agency desire to amend the Tax Agreement for the purpose of: (i) releasing the portion of the Original Off-Site Parking being conveyed to AMS (ii) making the New Off-Site Parking and the Facility Realty subject to the Tax Agreement.

NOW THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto agree as follows:

Section 1. <u>Definitions</u>. Capitalized terms used in this First Amendment and not heretofore defined shall have the meanings set forth in the Tax Agreement.

Section 2. Amendments.

- (a) In all instances in the Tax Agreement, references to 56-60 Buena Vista Avenue (Section: 1, Block: 511, Lots: 30 and 31) are amended by deletion and replaced with 13 Hawthorne Avenue (Section: 1, Block: 511, Lot: 11).
- (b) In all instances in the Tax Agreement, all references to the "Off-Site Parking" shall be understood to refer to the New Off-Site Parking.
- (c) In all instances in the Tax Agreement, the term "Land" shall be understood to describe (i) the Facility Realty and (ii) the New Off-Site Parking.
- (d) Schedule A to the Tax Agreement is amended by deletion and replaced with Exhibit A attached hereto.
- Section 3. <u>Existing Agreement.</u> Except as expressly modified by this First Amendment, all of the terms, conditions, and covenants in the Tax Agreement shall remain in full force and effect. In the event of any conflict between this First Amendment and the Tax Agreement, this First Amendment shall govern.
- Section 4. <u>Counterparts.</u> This First Amendment may be executed in counterparts, and by different parties hereto on separate counterparts, each of which will be deemed an original, but all of which together will constitute one and the same instrument.

FIRST AMENDMENT TO AGENT AND FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE AND PROJECT AGREEMENT AND PAYMENT IN LIEU OF TAX AGREEMENT

THIS FIRST AMENDMENT TO AGENT AND FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE AND PROJECT AGREEMENT AND PAYMENT IN LIEU OF TAX AGREEMENT (hereinafter, this "Agreement"), made as of the 10th day of October, 2025, by and between the VILLAGE OF PORT CHESTER INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AGENCY, a public benefit corporation of the State of New York, with offices at 222 Grace Church St, Port Chester, New York 10573 (the "Agency"), and G&S PORT CHESTER UNIT 2B, LLC, a New York limited liability company having offices at c/o G&S Investors, 211 East 43rd Street, New York, New York 10017 (the "Company").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Agency and Company entered into (i) a certain Agent and Financial Assistance and Project Agreement (the "Agent Agreement"), and (ii) a certain PILOT Agreement (the "PILOT Agreement"), each dated as of June 19, 2020 and relating to a certain project (the "Project"), as approved by the Agency pursuant to a certain Project Authorizing Resolution adopted April 10, 2019 (the "Project Authorizing Resolution"); and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to memorialize certain technical amendments and clarifications within the Agent Agreement and PILOT Agreement, including (i) establishing annual reporting protocols for certain school mitigation payments (the "School Mitigation") required pursuant to the Project's regulatory permits issued by the Village of Port Chester (the "Village"), and (ii) to establish annual reporting requirements for Project gross revenues (the "Annual Gross Revenues"), as required pursuant to the Agency-approved Cost-Benefit Analysis and PILOT formula, as contained within the Project Authorizing Resolution and within **Exhibit D** of the Agent Agreement; and

WHEREAS, in furtherance of the foregoing, the parties hereto are amending the Agent Agreement to replace **Exhibit F**, thereto, and to amend **Schedule A** of the PILOT Agreement.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants herein contained and other good and valuable consideration the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, it is mutually agreed as follows:

- 1. <u>Amendment to Agent Agreement</u>. Exhibit F of the Agent Agreement is hereby replaced with the new <u>Exhibit F</u>, as attached hereto as <u>Attachment 1</u>.
- 2. <u>Amendment to PILOT Agreement</u>. Schedule A of the PILOT Agreement is hereby replaced with the new Schedule A, as attached hereto as <u>Attachment 2</u>.
- 3. All other provisions of the Agent Agreement and PILOT Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

During the term of the PILOT Agreement, the Company shall report all gross project revenues received for the prior calendar year, including all commercial and residential rents, all Project amenity revenues, parking revenues, and other sources of income derived by the Company in connection with ownership and operation of the Project (herein, "Project Gross Revenue"). This annual report shall contain all income line items and details as set forth within the attached report submitted for the years 2022-2024. Pursuant to the PILOT Agreement, as amended, the Company shall be obligated to pay certain Supplemental PILOT Payments, as defined therein, which shall be based upon Project Gross Revenue reported by the Company each year.

Mandatory School-age Child Occupant Reporting. For the period of November, 2022 through December 31, 2032, the Company shall report all school-age children occupants within the Project for purposes of compliance with the Company and Project's site plan, permitting certificate of occupancy approvals issued by the Village of Port Chester. The Company, for itself and its successors and assigns, has agreed that if the increase of PILOT Revenues over the real estate taxes generated for the School District from the Project at the time the Project is placed into use do not generate an amount that would cover the annual cost per student occupant of \$13,723 for the actual number of students generated each school year, increased annually from January 1st by the increase, if any, in the cost of living index for the metropolitan New York region, the Company will directly pay the School District any deficit within thirty (30) days after being informed by the School District of such deficiency. Upon receipt of the School-age Child Occupant Reporting from the Company, the Agency shall provide the School District with such reporting, along with the amount of Annual PILOT Revenue distributed by the Agency to the School District for the prior year.

TAX AGREEMENT

THIS TAX AGREEMENT (the "Agreement"), dated as of October 1, 2025, by and between CITY OF YONKERS INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AGENCY, a public benefit corporation duly existing under the laws of the State of New York with its offices located at 470 Nepperhan Avenue, Suite 200, Yonkers, New York 10701 (the "Agency") and TITAN REAL ESTATE DEVELOPMENT LLC, a New York limited liability company, having offices at 136 Willis Avenue, Mineola, New York 11501 (the "Company").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Agency was created by Chapter 83 of the Laws of 1982 of the State of New York pursuant to Title I of Article 18-A of the General Municipal Law of the State of New York (collectively, the "Act") as a body corporate and politic and as a public benefit corporation of the State of New York; and

WHEREAS, the Company has submitted an application (the "Application") to the Agency requesting the Agency's assistance with respect to a certain project (the "Project") consisting of: (A) the acquisition or retention of approximately 3.88 acres of land, including, but not limited to, all easements, licenses, and other real property interests owned or controlled by the Company where improvements benefitting the Project are situated, commonly known as 1 Loehr Place (Section 2, Block 2081, Lot 1, f/k/a36, 50 and 56 St Josephs Avenue, 1, 6, 7, and 10 Cavalli Circle, and 55 Vineyard Avenue (Section 2, Block 2081, Lots 1, 2, 3 and 4, and Section 2, Block 2082, Lots 1, 2, 3 and 4)), City of Yonkers, New York (the "Land"); (B) the construction, improving and equipping on the Land of a 6-story mixed-use facility consisting of: (i) 340 residential rental units (198 studio and 142 one-bedroom units), (ii) related residential amenities, (iii) 420 parking spaces and (iv) approximately 20,000 sq. ft. of commercial space (the "Improvements); and (C) the acquisition and installation in and around the Land and Improvements of certain items of equipment and other tangible personal property (the "Equipment", which together with the Land and Improvements are the "Facility"); and

WHEREAS, in order to induce the Company to acquire, renovate, construct, reconstruct and equip the Facility, the Agency is willing to take title to or a leasehold interest in the Facility pursuant to a certain lease agreement, dated as of October 1, 2025 (the "Company Lease Agreement"), by and between the Company, as lessor, and the Agency; as lessee; and

WHEREAS, the Agency will lease its interest in the Facility back to the Company pursuant to the terms and conditions of a certain Leaseback Agreement, dated as of October 1, 2025 (the "Leaseback Agreement"; and, together with the Company Lease Agreement, the "Lease Agreements"), by and between the Agency, as sublessor, and the Company, as sublessee; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 874(1) of the Act, the Agency is exempt from the payment of taxes imposed upon real property and improvements owned by it or under its jurisdiction, control or supervision, other than special charges as defined by Section 2.1 which shall be paid by the Company outside this Tax Agreement as billed by the respective third parties; and

WHEREAS, the Agency and the Company deem it necessary and proper to enter into an agreement making provisions for payments in lieu of taxes by the Company to the Agency for the benefit of Westchester County and the City of Yonkers, inclusive of the City of Yonkers Dependent School District (collectively, the "Affected Tax Jurisdictions"); and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants herein contained, and other good and valuable consideration the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, it is mutually agreed as follows:

Section I - Payment in lieu of Ad Valorem Taxes:

- Exemption Application. A.) Subject to the completion and filing by the Agency or its designee at the direction of the Agency on or before the taxable status date October 15, 2026 (the "Taxable Status Date") of New York State Form RP-412-a Application For Real Property Tax Exemption (the "Exemption Application") under Section 412-a of the New York State Real Property Tax Law and Section 874 of the Act and the approval of the Exemption Application by the appropriate assessors or Board of Assessment Review, the Facility shall be exempt from Real Estate Taxes for the periods set forth in Section 1.3. For purposes of the foregoing "Real Estate Taxes" means all general levy real estate taxes levied against the Facility by the County and City, including Real Estate Taxes levied by the City for its Dependent School District. The Company shall provide the Agency with the information necessary for the completion and filing of the Exemption Application and shall provide such additional information and take such actions as are required by the appropriate assessors or Board of Assessment Review to process and approve the Exemption Application. Notwithstanding anything contained herein or in the Leaseback Agreement to the contrary, in the event the exemption from Real Estate Taxes is denied for any reason, the Company shall pay (and hereby agrees to pay) all Real Estate Taxes levied upon the Facility as they become due, specifically including but not limited to Real Estate Taxes for years prior to and after the tax years covered by this Tax Agreement. After giving written notice to the Agency, the Company may in good faith contest the denial of the Exemption Application, provided that (i) the overall operating efficiency of the Facility is not impaired and the Facility continues to qualify as a "project" under the Act; (ii) neither the Facility nor any part of or interest in it would be in any danger of being sold, forfeited or lost; or (iii) neither the Company nor the Agency, as a result of such contest, shall be in any danger of any civil or criminal liability. The Company hereby waives any claim or cause of action against the Agency, and releases the Agency from any liability to the Company, arising from the denial of an exemption from Real Estate Taxes except to the extent that such denial results solely from the failure of the Agency to file the Exemption Application with the appropriate assessors or Board of Assessment Review by the Taxable Status Date.
- B.) Agreement to Make Payments. The parties agree and acknowledge that payments made under this Agreement are for purposes of obtaining revenues for public purposes, and to provide a revenue source that the Affected Tax Jurisdictions would otherwise lose because the subject parcels are exempt from the payment of real property taxes pursuant to Section 412-a of the Real Property Tax Law and Section 874 of the General Municipal Law. The Company shall pay to the Agency, on September 1 of each year beginning on September 1, 2027 (for the benefit of the Affected Tax Jurisdictions), as an in lieu of tax payment, an amount equal to the Tax Payments as set forth on Schedule A (the "Tax Payments") for the periods described in

- Section 1.3. All Tax Payments shall be mailed to the Agency at: City of Yonkers Industrial Development Agency (Attn: Executive Director), 470 Nepperham Avenue, Suite 200, Yonkers, New York 10701, or as otherwise directed by the Agency. The Company hereby agrees to make all such Tax Payments without further notice or invoice from the Agency or the Affected Tax Jurisdictions. All checks shall be made payable as directed by the Agency from time to time.
 - (i) The Company hereby waives any and all rights it may have to any refund of prior tax payments for the periods prior to the periods described in Section 1.3.
 - (ii) The Agency and the Company intend to establish a payment schedule of Tax Payments that are in lieu of real estate taxes with respect to the Facility that, absent a default by the Company or a change in law, shall provide tax certainty for the Company and revenue certainty for the Affected Tax Jurisdictions. The Tax Payments shall be calculated, as set for in Schedule A hereto, as a percentage of the full tax payments that would otherwise be due, if the Agency were not the holder of a leasehold interest in the Facility. The parties hereto acknowledge that the Company shall have all of the rights and remedies of a taxpayer, including the right to institute a grievance with respect to Real Estate Taxes. The Company hereby agrees for the benefit of the Affected Tax Jurisdictions to not seek a refund of any taxes paid or to be paid for periods prior to the periods described in Section 1.3. Any grievance the Company institutes shall only cause an adjustment in the Special District Charges (as defined in Section 2.1) and the Company shall have the right to any refunds related to grievances involving Special Charges.
 - (iii) Allocation. The Agency shall remit to the Affected Tax Jurisdictions amounts received hereunder, if any, within thirty (30) days of receipt of said payment and shall allocate said payments among the Affected Tax Jurisdictions in the same proportion as taxes would have been allocated but for the Agency's involvement, unless the Affected Tax Jurisdictions have consented in writing to a specific allocation.
- 1.2 Valuation of Future Additions to the Facility: If there shall be a future addition to the Facility that has not been described in the Application constructed or added in any manner after the date of this Agreement, the Company shall notify the Agency of such future addition ("Future Addition"). The notice to the Agency shall contain a copy of the Application for a building permit, plans and specifications, and any other relevant evidence that the Agency may thereafter request. Upon the earlier of substantial completion, or the issuance of a certificate of occupancy for any such Future Addition to the Facility, the Company shall become liable for payment of an increase in the Tax Payment. The Agency shall notify the Company of any proposed increase in the Tax Payment related to such Future Addition. If the Company shall disagree with the determination of assessed value for any Future Additions made by the Agency, then and in that event that valuation shall be fixed by a court of competent jurisdiction. Notwithstanding any disagreement between the Company and the Agency, the Company shall pay the increased Tax payment until a different Tax Payment shall be established. If a lesser Tax Payment is determined in any proceeding or by subsequent agreement of the parties, the Tax Payment shall be re-computed and any excess payment shall be refunded to the Company or, in

the Agency's sole discretion, such excess payment shall be applied as a credit against the next succeeding Tax payment(s).

Period of Benefits. The tax benefits provided for herein shall be deemed to 1.3 include: (i) the 2028 County tax year through the 2047 County tax year, and (ii) the 2027-2028 City tax year through the 2046-2047 City tax year. This Tax Agreement shall expire on December 31, 2047 (with the understanding that the Company will be making a payment hereunder for 2048 County tax year and the 2047-2048 City tax year in the amounts as if the Agency were not in title on the tax lien date with respect to said tax years). In no event shall the Company be entitled to receive tax benefits relative to the Facility for more than the periods provided for herein, unless the period is extended by amendment to this Agreement executed by both parties after any applicable public hearings. The Company agrees that it will not seek any tax exemption for the Facility which could provide benefits for more than the periods provided for herein and specifically agrees that the exemptions provided for herein, to the extent actually received (based on the number of lease years elapsed), supersede and are in substitution of the exemptions provided by Section 485-b of the New York Real Property Tax Law ("RPTL"); provided, the foregoing shall not be interpreted to limit the Company and Agency from subsequently agreeing to additional benefits based upon commitments to make additional improvements or changes in use from time to time between the Agency and the Company. It is hereby agreed and understood that the Affected Tax Jurisdictions can rely upon and enforce the above waiver to the same extent as if they were signatories hereto.

Section II - Special District Charges, Special Assessments and other charges.

2.1 Special District Charges and other payments: Special district charges, special assessments, special ad valorem levies specifically including but not limited to charges imposed by the City of Yonkers for frontage feet ("CC001"); Housing Units ("CC002"); ETPA Charge ("CC003"); and a Safety Inspection Fee ("CC004") and district charges including but not limited to pure water charges and Westchester County sewer district charges (collectively the "Special Charges"), are not included in the amount of the Tax Payment and are to be paid in full in accordance with normal billing practices.

Section III - Transfer of Facility.

.1 In the event this Agreement terminates and the property is not timely transferred back to the Company, the Company agrees to pay no later than the next tax lien date (plus any applicable grace period), to each of the Affected Tax Jurisdictions, an amount equal to the taxes and assessments which would have been levied on the Facility if the Facility had been classified as fully taxable as of the date of transfer or loss of eligibility of all or a portion of the exemption described herein or date of termination.

Section IV - Assessment Challenges.

4.1 The Company shall have all of the rights and remedies of a taxpayer as if and to the same extent as if the Company were the owner of the Facility, with respect to any proposed assessment or change in assessment with respect to the Facility by any of the Affected Tax Jurisdictions and likewise shall be entitled to protest before and be heard by the appropriate

assessors or Board of Assessment Review, and shall be entitled to take any and all appropriate appeals or initiate any proceedings to review the validity or amount of any assessment.

- 4.2 The Company shall have all of the rights and remedies of a taxpayer with respect to any Special Charges as if and to the same extent as if the Company were the owner of the Facility.
- 4.3 The Company shall file any accounts or tax returns required by the appropriate real estate tax assessment office and tax levy officers and provide information to the Agency as requested from time to time.

Section V - Changes in Law.

5.1 To the extent the Facility is declared to be subject to taxation or assessment by an amendment to the Act, other legislative change, or by final judgment of a Court of competent jurisdiction, the obligations of the Company hereunder shall, to such extent, be null and void.

Section VI - Events of Default.

- 6.1 The following shall constitute "Events of Default" hereunder. The failure by the Company to: (i) make the payments described in Section I within thirty (30) days of the Payment Date (the "Delinquency Date"); (ii) make any other payments described herein on or before the last day of any applicable cure period within which said payment can be made without penalty; or (iii) the occurrence and continuance of any events of default under the Lease Agreements after the expiration of any applicable cure periods. Upon the occurrence of any Event of Default hereunder, in addition to any other right or remedy the Agency and/or the Affected Tax Jurisdictions may have at law or in equity, the Agency and/or Affected Tax Jurisdictions may, immediately and without further notice to the Company (but with notice to the Agency with respect to actions maintained by the Affected Tax Jurisdictions) pursue any action in the courts to enforce payment or to otherwise recover directly from the Company any amounts so in default. The Agency and the Company hereby acknowledge the right of the Affected Tax Jurisdictions to recover directly from the Company any amounts so in default pursuant to Section 874(6) of the General Municipal Law and the Company shall immediately notify the Agency of any action brought, or other measure taken, by any Affected Tax Jurisdiction to recover any such amount.
- 6.2 If payments pursuant to Section I herein are not made by the Delinquency Dates, or if any other payment required to be made hereunder is not made by the last day of any applicable cure period within which said payment can be made without penalty, the Company shall pay penalties and interest as follows. With respect to payments to be made pursuant to Section I herein, if said payment is not received by the Delinquency Date defined in Section 6.1 herein, Company shall pay, in addition to said payment, (i) a late payment penalty equal to five percent (5%) of the amount due and (ii) for each month, or any part thereof, that any such payment is delinquent beyond the first month, interest on the total amount due plus the late payment penalty, in an amount equal to one percent (1%) per month. With respect to all other payments due hereunder, if said payment is not paid within any applicable cure period, Company shall pay, in addition to said payment, the greater of the applicable penalties and interest or

penalties and interest which would have been incurred had payments made hereunder been tax payments to the Affected Tax Jurisdictions.

6.3 Prior to exercising any remedy hereunder, any Lender, as defined in the Leaseback Agreement dated the date hereof, between the Agency and the Company, shall be afforded notice and the cure rights set forth in such section, as if such section were set forth in full herein.

Section VII - Assignment.

7.1 No portion of any interest in this Agreement may be assigned by the Company, nor shall any person other than the Company be entitled to succeed to or otherwise obtain any benefits of the Company hereunder without the prior written consent of the Agency, which shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed.

Section VIII - Miscellaneous.

- 8.1 This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts each of which shall be deemed an original but which together shall constitute a single instrument.
- 8.2 <u>Notices</u>. All notices, certificates and other communications hereunder shall be in writing and shall be sufficiently given and shall be deemed given when delivered and, if delivered by mail, shall be sent by certified mail, postage prepaid, or to a nationally recognized courier such as Federal Express, addressed as follows:

- 8.4 Notwithstanding any other term or condition contained herein, all obligations of the Agency hereunder shall constitute a special obligation payable solely from the revenues and other monies, if any, derived from the Facility and paid to the Agency by the Company. Neither member of the Agency nor any person executing this Agreement on its behalf shall be liable personally under this Agreement. No recourse shall be had for the payment of the principal or interest on amounts due hereunder or for any claim based upon or in respect of any modification of or supplement hereto against any past, present or future member, officer, agent, servant, or employee, as such, of the Agency, or of any successor or political subdivision, either directly or through the Agency or any such successor, all such liability of such members, officer, agents, servants and employees being, to the extent permitted by law, expressly waived and released by the acceptance hereof and as part of the consideration for the execution of this Agreement.

SECOND AMENDMENT TO LEASE AGREEMENT

THIS SECOND AMENDMENT TO LEASE AGREEMENT (this "Second Amendment"), dated as of the 30th day of October, 2025, is by and between NEW ROCHELLE GARDENS, LP, a Delaware limited partnership having offices at 999 Waterside Drive, Floor 23, Norfolk, VA 23510 (the "Lessee") and the NEW ROCHELLE INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AGENCY, a public benefit corporation of the State of New York with offices at 515 North Avenue, New Rochelle, New York 10801 ("Agency").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Title 1 of Article 18-A of the General Municipal Law of the State of New York (the "Enabling Act") was duly enacted into law as Chapter 1030 of the Laws of 1969 of the State of New York (the "State"); and

WHEREAS, the Enabling Act authorizes the creation of industrial development agencies for the benefit of the several counties, cities, towns and villages in the State and empowers such agencies, among other things, to acquire, construct, reconstruct, lease, improve, maintain, equip and sell land and any building or other improvement, and all real and personal properties, including, but not limited to, machinery and equipment deemed necessary in connection therewith, whether or not now in existence or under construction, which shall be suitable for manufacturing, warehousing, research, commercial or industrial facilities, in order to advance job opportunities, health, general prosperity and the economic welfare of the people of the State and to improve their standard of living; and

WHEREAS, the Enabling Act further authorizes each such agency to lease any or all of its facilities at such rentals and on such other terms and conditions as it deems advisable; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to and in connection with the provisions of the Enabling Act, Chapter 875 of the Laws of 1976 of the State (hereinafter collectively with the Enabling Act, the "Act") created the Agency which is empowered under the Act to undertake the leasing of the facility described below; and

WHEREAS, to accomplish the purposes of the Act, the Agency has entered into a certain Lease Agreement (the "Lease Agreement"), dated as of December 21, 2004, with Avalon New Rochelle II, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company (the "Original Lessee") in connection with a "project" within the meaning of the Act (the "Original Project") within the territorial boundaries of the City and located on that certain lot, piece or parcel of land generally known as the Lawton Parcels, in the City of New Rochelle, Westchester County, New York (the "Land") and otherwise described on Exhibit A attached hereto; and

WHEREAS, the Original Project includes (i) the acquisition of certain real property located in the City of New Rochelle, New York and (ii) the construction of a market rate residential housing development with associated parking and retail establishments thereon and (iii) the acquisition of machinery and equipment related thereto for use by the Original Lessee in

the market rate rental of housing units for profit (said facilities are hereinafter referred to as the "Original Facility"); and

WHEREAS, to facilitate the Original Project, the Agency and the Original Lessee entered into that certain "straight lease transaction" within the meaning of the Act, in which the Agency acquired a fee simply interest to the Original Facility and the Agency leased its interest in the Original Facility to the Original Lessee pursuant to the Lease Agreement, and, in furtherance of such purposes, on December 7, 2004, the Agency adopted a resolution (the "Original Authorizing Resolution") authorizing the undertaking of the Original Project, the acquisition of the Original Facility by the Agency and the lease of the Original Facility by the Agency to the Original Lessee; and

WHEREAS, on November 1, 2013, the Original Lessee assigned its interest in the Lease Agreement to DSF IV NEW ROCHELLE OWNER LLC, a Delaware limited liability company (the "Lessee's Predecessor Entity"), and pursuant to a certain Assignment and Assumption Agreement with Consent and Release dated as of November 1, 2013, the Agency consented to such assignment; and

WHEREAS, to further facilitate the provisions of funds by the Lessee's Predecessor Entity to finance the costs of the Original Project, the Agency and the Lessee's Predecessor Entity entered into that certain Amendment to Lease Agreement (the "First Amendment to Lease Agreement"), dated as of November 1, 2013; and

WHEREAS, on September 13, 2018, Lessee's Predecessor Entity changed its name from DSV IV NEW ROCHELLE OWNER LLC TO 40 MEMORIAL OWNER LLC; and

WHEREAS, on December 4, 2018, (i) the Lessee's Predecessor Entity converted from a Delaware limited liability company named 40 MEMORIAL OWNER LLC to a Delaware limited partnership named NEW ROCHELLE GARDENS, LP; and (ii) DSF CAPITAL PARTNERS IV, LP and DSF CAPITAL PARTNERS IV-A, LP (in their capacities as the indirect owner of Lessee) ("DSF Assignors") entered into that certain Assignment and Assumption Agreement with Consent and Release dated as of December 4, 2018 with NEW ROCHELLE JV, LP, a Delaware limited partnership and an affiliate of Lessee ("New Rochelle JV"), that assigned certain rights and obligations of the DSF Assignors to JV LP, and the Agency consented to such assignment;

WHEREAS, Lessee, for itself or on behalf of an entity formed or to be formed by it or on its behalf, previously submitted an Application to the Agency (the "Application") requesting the Agency's assistance with respect to a certain project (the "Project") for the benefit of the Lessee consisting of: (i) the retention by the Agency of its fee or other interest in the Land and the existing improvements located thereon consisting principally of the existing 588-unit mixed-use residential building (formerly known as "Avalon II Apartments" and now known as "Skyline New Rochelle Apartments") that contains approximately 5,584 square feet of commercial space (the "Existing Improvements"); (ii) the renovation and equipping of the Existing Improvements through modernization of amenities and renovation and equipping of the Existing Improvements

through modernization of amenities and upgrades to the existing residential units (the "Improvements"); (iii) the acquisition of an installation in and around the Land, the Existing Improvements and the Improvements by the Lessee of machinery, equipment, fixtures, and other items of tangible personal property (the "Equipment"; and, together with the Land, the Existing Improvements and the Improvements, the "Facility"); (iv) the designation of fifty-nine (59) of the residential units as "affordable rate units"; and (v) the allocation of eighty (80) parking spaces for use by the City of New Rochelle pursuant to a parking agreement with the City of New Rochelle; all in furtherance of the request by the Company to extend by 15 years the payment in lieu of tax agreement (the "PILOT Agreement") set out in Section 4.3 of the Lease Agreement, in accordance with the Agency's policies; and

WHEREAS, in order to further facilitate the Project and the extension of the PILOT Agreement, the Lessee has requested that certain amendments to the Lesse be made by the Agency and the Lessee; and

WHEREAS, the Agency has determined that providing the Project will accomplish, in part, its public purposes.

NOW THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the premises and the mutual covenants hereinafter contained, and other good and valuable consideration the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto hereby formally covenant, agree and bind themselves as follows:

1. Definitions. Capitalized terms used but not defined in this Second Amendment have the meanings assigned to them in the Lease Agreement.

"Extension PILOT Payments" "shall mean the PILOT Payment schedule attached hereto as Exhibit B which shall commence on the PILOT Extension Commencement Date.

"LDA" shall mean that certain Land Disposition and Development Agreement between the City of New Rochelle, Avalon Bay Communities, Inc. and Avalon New Rochelle II, LLC as successor to AvalonBay Redevelopment, LLC, dated June 17, 1999, as amended by that First Amendment dated January 29, 2002, Second Amendment dated December 21, 2004, Third Amendment dated September 1, 2005 and Fourth Amendment dated April 23, 2010, and as affected by an Assignment and Assumption of Phase II Rights dated December 21, 2004 and by a certain LDA Release and Modification Agreement dated as of March 31, 2010, as subsequently assigned by Avalon New Rochelle II, LLC to Lessee's Predecessor Entity on November 1, 2013, and as further modified by that certain Assignment and Assumption Agreement, dated as of December 4, 2018, by and between the DSF Assignors, in their capacity as the former indirect owners of Lessee, and New Rochelle JV, in its capacity as the new indirect owner of Lessee.

"Lessee" shall mean NEW ROCHELLE GARDENS, LP, a Delaware limited partnership (formerly known as DSF IV NEW ROCHELLE OWNER LLC and 40 MEMORIAL OWNER LLC), and its permitted successors and assigns pursuant to Sections 6.1 or 9.3 hereof.

"PILOT Extension Commencement Date" shall mean January 1, 2035.

"PILOT Mortgage" shall mean that certain PILOT Mortgage made by the Agency and the Original Lessee, as mortgagors, and the City, as mortgagee, dated as of December 21, 2004, as assigned by that certain Assignment and Assumption Agreement, dated as of November 1, 2013 by and between Original Lessee and Lessee's Predecessor Entity, that certain Assignment and Assumption Agreement, dated as of December 4, 2018, by and between the DSF Assignors, in their capacity as the former indirect owners of Lessee, and New Rochelle JV, in its capacity as new indirect owner of Lessee, as such PILOT Mortgage has been amended by that certain First Amendment to PILOT Mortgage, dated as of the date hereof, by the Agency and Lessee, as mortgagors, and the City, as mortgagee, as the same may be further amended, restated, modified or supplemented from time to time, securing the payment of (i) the amount due as payments in lieu of taxes hereunder, (ii) any fees and expenses of the Agency due the Agency hereunder, and (iii) payments to the Business Improvement District due hereunder.

"Project Agreement" shall mean the Project Agreement, dated as of October 30, 2025, by and between the Agency and Lessee.

"Project" shall have the meaning ascribed to such term in the recitals hereto.

- 2. Subsection (a) of Section 1.5 of the Lease Agreement is amended and restated as follows:
 - "(a) The Lessee is a limited partnership duly organized, validly existing and in good standing under the laws of the State of Delaware, is qualified to conduct business as a foreign limited partnership in the State, is not in violation of any provision of its Certificate of Formation or limited partnership agreement, has the power and authority to own its property and assets, to carry on its business as now being conducted by it and to execute, deliver and perform this Agreement and each other Project Document to which it is or shall be a party."
- 3. The following new subsections are hereby added to Section 1.5:
 - "(t) The Lessee acknowledges receipt of the Agency's Economic Opportunity and Nondiscrimination Policy (the "Policy"), represents that it has reviewed the Policy and understands the terms and conditions set forth therein and agrees to be bound by the terms and conditions thereof."
 - "(u) The Lessee acknowledges receipt of the Agency's Debarment Policy, represents that it has reviewed the Debarment Policy, understands the

terms and conditions set forth therein and agrees to be bound by the terms and conditions thereof."

- "(v) The Lessee hereby acknowledges and agrees that the foregoing Agency Financial Assistance constitutes "public funds" unless otherwise excluded under Section 224-a(3) of the New York State Labor Law (the "Labor Law"), and by executing this Lease Agreement, (i) confirms that it has received notice from the Agency pursuant to Section 224-a(8)(d) of the Labor Law and (ii) acknowledges its obligations pursuant to Section 224-a(8)(a) of the New York Labor Law. Other than the Agency Financial Assistance estimates provided herein and disclosed to the Lessee, the Agency makes no representations or covenants with respect to the total sources of "public funds" received by the Lessee in connection with the Project."
- 4. Section 3.2 of the Lease Agreement is amended and restated as follows:

"<u>Duration of Term</u>. The term of this Agreement shall expire on December 31, 2049, or such earlier date as this Agreement may be terminated as hereinafter provided."

5. Subsection (d) of Section 4.3 of the Lease Agreement is amended and restated as follows:

"Payments in Lieu of Taxes on the Land:

No payments in lieu of real estate taxes shall be due and payable under this Section 4.3 for so long as the LDA is in effect and the Lessee has made all required payments under Section 3.2 thereof, as the same may be amended from time to time, except that payments in lieu of taxes shall be due and payable for those portions of each phase of the Project devoted to retail uses equal to the assessed valuation of the retail portion of such phase of the Project multiplied by the applicable tax rates for the City, School and County taxing jurisdictions, it being understood that such retail uses for any phase of the Project shall not be entitled to any exemptions as would be made available by Section 485-b of the New York Real Property Tax Law. Upon the PILOT Extension Commencement Date, the tax benefits provided for herein should be deemed to include (i) the 2034-2035 School District tax year through the 2049-2050 School District tax year, and (ii) the 2035 County and City tax year through the 2049 County and City tax year. The Extension PILOT Payments payable hereunder shall begin on the PILOT Extension Commencement Date and expire on December 31, 2049. In no event shall the Lessee be entitled to receive tax benefits relative to the Facility for more than the periods provided for herein, unless the period is extended by amendment to this Agreement executed by both parties after any applicable public hearings. The Lessee agrees that it will not seek any tax exemption for the Facility which could provide benefits for more than the periods provided for herein and specifically agrees that the exemptions provided for herein, to the extent actually

received (based on the number of lease years elapsed), supersede and are in substitution of the exemptions provided by Section 485-b of the New York Real Property Tax Law ("RPTL"). It is hereby agreed and understood that the Affected Tax Jurisdictions can rely upon and enforce the above waiver to the same extent as if they were signatories hereto. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the payment in lieu of real estate taxes shall not be effective unless and until the Facility and the operation thereof conforms with all applicable zoning, planning, building and environmental laws and regulations of governmental authorities having jurisdiction over the Facility. The payments provided for in this subsection 4.3(d) shall be deemed to have commenced on the PILOT Commencement Date, being December 21, 2004."

6. The Lease Agreement is amended to add the following Section 6.15 entitled "Right to Inspect the Facility":

"The Agency and its duly authorized agents shall have the right at all reasonable times and upon reasonable notice to inspect the Facility. The Agency shall honor and comply with any restricted access policy of the Lessee relating to the Facility."

7. The Lease Agreement is amended to add the following Section 6.16 entitled "Agreement to Provide Information":

"The Lessee agrees, whenever requested by the Agency, to provide and certify or cause to be provided and certified, without delay, such information concerning the Lessee, the Lessee's employment history and statistics related thereto, the Facility and other topics necessary to enable the Agency to make any report required by law or governmental regulation or as otherwise reasonably requested by the Agency."

8. The Lease Agreement is amended to add the following Section 6.17 entitled "Books of Record and Account; Financial Statements":

"The Lessee at all times agrees to maintain proper accounts, records and books in which full and correct entries shall be made, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, of all business and affairs of the Lessee relating to the Facility."

- 9. Unless otherwise amended pursuant to the terms contained herein, the terms of the Lease Agreement shall remain unchanged.
- 10. This Second Amendment to Lease Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, and all of which shall together constitute one and the same instrument.

Your Committee is in receipt of a proposed Act, which if enacted by your Board, would authorize the settlement of the County's potential liability in the lawsuit entitled, <u>Leonard Mack v. Westchester County</u>, et al, United States District Court for the Southern District of New York, Case No. 7:24-cv-08990-KMK, in the amount of \$341,250, inclusive of attorney's fees.

This matter is pending in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York. The matter tentatively settled on June 27, 2025 pending this Board's approval of a settlement in the amount of \$341,250, inclusive of attorney's fees.

This matter arises out of a lawsuit that alleges, among other things, that Leonard Mack was arrested on May 22, 1975 for an attack on two teenaged girls, and thereafter was wrongfully convicted in connection with the attack and a rape of one girl, and as a result was subsequently incarcerated from May 1975 to December 1982. However, in 2022, as a result of DNA testing that did not exist in 1975, DNA testing established conclusively that Mack was not the rapist. A search of a law enforcement DNA database identified the actual perpetrator of the crime; that perpetrator has since admitted his responsibility for the crime and that he acted alone. Consequently, on September 5, 2023, a court granted a motion to vacate Mack's conviction and dismissed the indictment.

The settlement takes into consideration the uncertainty of litigation and the potential costs of trial, subsequent proceedings, and potential appeal, as well as the potential for any future claims against the County defendants by the Greenburgh defendants. Both outside counsel and our insurance companies recommend this settlement.

Your Committee has carefully considered the subject matter, the settlement proposal, the attached Act and recommends authorizing the County Attorney or his designee to settle the lawsuit entitled, <u>Leonard Mack v.</u>

<u>Westchester County, et al.</u> United States District Court for the Southern District of New York, Case No. 7:24-cv-08990-KMK, in the amount of \$341,250, inclusive of attorney's fees.

An affirmative vote of a majority of the Board is required to pass this legislation.

TO: BOARD OF LEGISLATORS COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER

Your Committee has reviewed "A LOCAL LAW amending Chapter 295 of the Laws of Westchester County to conform the County's law governing liability and casualty reserve fund payments to New York State's corresponding law."

Your Committee notes that, in 1986, this Honorable Board enacted Chapter 295 of the Laws of Westchester County, creating the County's Liability and Casualty Reserve Fund ("Chapter 295"), known as the County's "6-n Fund," to act as a self-insurance fund in accordance with Section 6-n of the New York State General Municipal Law ("the State Law"). As enacted, Chapter 295 only discusses expenditures for settlements of claims and litigation. However, the State Law authorizes additional expenditures, including for the uninsured portion of losses (such as deductible payments) for property damage, and other insurable events. As the State Law specifically authorizes these expenditures, it is unclear if their absence from Chapter 295 impacts the County's ability to pay these expenditures from the 6-n Fund.

Your Committee is informed that the proposed Local Law amends Chapter 295 to include all expenditures authorized under the State Law, in order to eliminate this ambiguity.

Your Committee is informed that the proposed legislation does not meet the definition of an action under New York State Environmental Quality Review Act and its implementing regulations 6 NYCRR Part 617. Please refer to the memorandum from the Department of Planning dated January 14, 2025, which is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Legislators. Your Committee

concurs in this conclusion.

In light of all of the foregoing, your Committee recommends the adoption of this Local Law.

A Local Law amending Chapter 295 of the Laws of Westchester County to conform the County's law governing liability and casualty reserve fund payments to New York State's corresponding law

BE IT ENACTED by the County Board of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. Effective January 1, 2026, Section 295.31 of the Laws of Westchester County is hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 295.31. - Expenditures.

An expenditure may be made from this fund for the payment of all or part of the costs, including interest, of:

- 1. Judgments;
- 2. Actions and claims.
- a. Actions that have been compromised or settled and that have been approved by the court in which the action or proceeding is pending;
- b. Claims that have been compromised or settled and that have been approved by a Justice of the Supreme Court of the Ninth Judicial District;
- c. Expert or professional services rendered in connection with investigation, adjustment, settlement or defense of claims, actions or judgments;
- d. Claims, demands or actions that have been compromised, settled or adjusted by the County Attorney or County Board of Acquisition and Contract pursuant to <u>Chapter 158</u>.
- e. Any other expenditure authorized by subdivision 2 of section 6-n of the General Municipal Law.

Section 2. This Local Law shall take effect immediately.

HONORABLE BOARD OF LEGISLATORS THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK

Your Committee is in receipt of a transmittal from the County Executive recommending approval by the County of Westchester ("County") of a bond act ("Bond Act") in the amount of \$5,000,000 to finance capital project RHTF1 – Hilltop Hanover Farm and Environmental Center Improvements ("RHTF1"). The Bond Act, which was prepared by the law firm Harris Beach, will finance the cost of design for improvements to the existing buildings and infrastructure at Hilltop Hanover Farm and Environmental Center in Yorktown, including environmental studies, design, and engineering services for new buildings, and site improvements.

The Department of Parks, Recreation and Conservation ("Department") has advised that the Hilltop Hanover Farm and Environmental Center is a County-owned resource that operates both as an agricultural production farm and a native plant nursery, providing fresh produce to the community and supporting ecosystem restoration projects across the County. Advancing the Hilltop Hanover Farm Master Plan is the next critical step to ensure the Farm can sustain its mission, expand educational programming, and strengthen its role as a valued community asset. Design funding is necessary to prepare the detailed plans and specifications necessary to move the project forward.

Following bonding authorization, design will be scheduled and is anticipated to take twenty-four months to complete. It is anticipated that the design work will be completed by consultants. It is estimated that construction will take thirty-six months to complete and will begin after award and execution of the construction contracts.

The Planning Department has advised your Committee that based on its review, RHTF1 may be classified as a Type "II" action pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQR") and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617. Therefore, no environmental review is required. Your Committee has reviewed the annexed SEQR documentation and concurs with this recommendation.

It should be noted that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of your Honorable Board is required in order to adopt the Bond Act. Your Committee recommends the adoption of the proposed Bond Act.

ACT NO. -20

BOND ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$5,000,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, OR SO MUCH THEREOF AS MAY BE NECESSARY, TO FINANCE THE COST OF PLANNING IMPROVEMENTS TO THE EXISTING BUILDINGS AND INFRASTRUCTURE AT HILLTOP HANOVER FARM AND ENVIRONMENTAL CENTER IN YORKTOWN; STATING THE ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST THEREOF IS \$5,000,000; STATING THE PLAN OF FINANCING SAID COST INCLUDES THE ISSUANCE OF \$5,000,000 BONDS HEREIN AUTHORIZED TO FINANCE SUCH COST; AND PROVIDING FOR A TAX TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS. (Adopted , 20)

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (the "Law"), the Westchester County Administrative Code, being Chapter 852 of the Laws of 1948, as amended, to the provisions of other laws applicable thereto, \$5,000,000 bonds of the County, or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby authorized to be issued to finance the cost of planning improvements to the existing buildings and infrastructure at Hilltop Hanover Farm and

Environmental Center in Yorktown, including environmental studies, design, and engineering services for new buildings, and site improvements; all as set forth in the County's current year Capital Budget, as amended. To the extent that the details set forth in this act are inconsistent with any details set forth in the current year Capital Budget of the County, such Budget shall be deemed and is hereby amended. The estimated maximum cost of said objects or purposes, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof is \$5,000,000. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$5,000,000 bonds herein authorized, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds, and the levy of a tax to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds.

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness applicable to the class of objects or purposes for which bonds authorized by this resolution is to be issued within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 62(2nd) of the Law, is five (5) years.

Section 3. Current funds are not required to be provided as a down payment pursuant to Section 107.00 d. 9. of the Law prior to issuance of the bonds authorized herein, or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds. The County intends to finance, on an interim basis, the costs or a portion of the costs of said improvements for which bonds are herein authorized, which costs are reasonably expected to be reimbursed with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County, pursuant to this Act, in the maximum amount of \$5,000,000. This Act is a declaration of official intent adopted pursuant to the requirements of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of this Act and of the Law, and pursuant to the provisions of §30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes or the renewals thereof, and of §§50.00, 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of said Law, the powers and duties of the County Board of Legislators relative to authorizing the issuance of any notes in anticipation of the sale of the bonds herein authorized, or the renewals thereof, relative to providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, relative to prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the respective amounts of bonds herein authorized, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and relative to executing agreements for credit enhancement, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance of the County, as the chief fiscal officer of the County.

Section 5. Each of the bonds authorized by this Act and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale thereof shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by §52.00 of said Local Finance Law and said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the County of Westchester, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and provision shall be made annually in the budgets of the County by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the notes and bonds to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 6. The validity of the bonds authorized by this Act and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

- (a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or
- (b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this Act or a summary hereof, are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

(c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This Act shall take effect in accordance with Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter.

Your Committee is in receipt of an amended bond act ("Amended Bond Act") in the total amount of \$14,550,000, which includes \$3,850,000 in previously authorized bonds of the County of Westchester ("County"), to finance Capital Project RGM01 - Mohansic Maintenance Facility ("RGM01").

The Amended Bond Act, which was prepared by the law firm Harris Beach Murtha, is required to finance the cost of construction and construction management associated with a new maintenance building complex at Mohansic Golf Course in Yorktown Heights. Work will include the construction of a new maintenance building, renovation of the existing maintenance building and shop, as well as demolition and removal of two existing barn structures, and associated site work and improvements.

The Department of Parks, Recreation and Conservation (the "Department") has advised that most of the existing buildings on the golf course are original to the site and were built over 80 years ago. The current maintenance facilities have well exceeded their intended useful life and no longer align with today's standards for safety, efficiency, or functionality. As a result, the Department has determined that a comprehensive upgrade of the entire maintenance complex is necessary to ensure continued support for the effective maintenance and operation of the golf course.

Your Committee is advised that design is underway and is anticipated to take two (2) months to complete and is being performed by consultants and in-house staff. It is estimated that construction will take approximately eighteen (18) months to complete and will begin after award and execution of the construction contracts.

Your Committee notes that your Honorable Board has previously authorized the County to issue bonds to finance RGM01, as follows: Bond Act No. 45-2015 in the amount of \$350,000, which funded design associated with the new maintenance and storage building complex; and Bond Act No. 135-2024, which amended Bond Act No. 45-2015 by expanding the scope of the project to include construction and construction management associated with the replacement of the existing electrical service into the park, by increasing the initial amount authorized by \$3,500,000, from \$350,000 to \$3,850,000, and by increasing the period of probable usefulness of said bonds. \$217,778 in bonds have been sold under Bond Act No. 135-2024. Accordingly, authority is now requested to amend Bond Act No. 135-2024, to further expand the scope of the project to include construction and construction management associated with a

new maintenance building complex, including the construction of a new maintenance building, renovation of the existing maintenance building and shop, as well as demolition and removal of two existing barn structures, and associated site work and improvements, and to increase the amount of bonds authorized by \$10,700,000, from \$3,850,000 to \$14,550,000.

The Planning Department has advised your Committee that based on its review, the current request under Capital Project RGM01 has been classified as an "Unlisted" action under the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA"), which requires an appropriate environmental review. Your Committee has carefully considered the proposed legislation. It has reviewed the attached Full Environmental Assessment Form (EAF) and the criteria contained in Section 617.7 of Title 6 of the New York Codes, Rules and Regulations, the SEQRA regulations, to identify the relevant areas of environmental concern. For the reasons set forth in the attached EAF, your Committee believes that the proposed action will not have any significant adverse impact on the environment and urges your Honorable Board to adopt the annexed resolution by which this Board would issue a Negative Declaration for this proposed action.

It should be noted that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of your Honorable Board is required in order to adopt the Amended Bond Act. Accordingly, your Committee recommends the adoption of the proposed Amended Bond Act.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, there is pending before this Honorable Board an amended bond act in connection with Capital Project RGM01 – Mohansic Maintenance Facility (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, this Honorable Board has determined that the current request under the proposed Project would constitute an action under Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law, known as the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA"); and

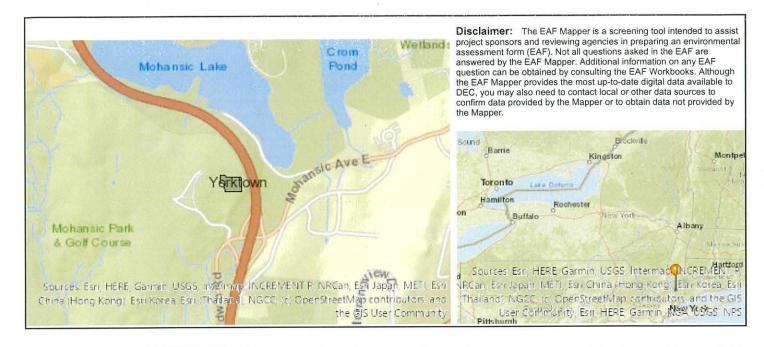

The project will not have a significant environmental impact as it involves enhancements to an existing facility and is within an area that is already disturbed. There are no streams or wetlands on or near the site. Only four trees will need to be removed in order to accommodate the proposed improvements. New, more efficient structures will be offset by the removal of old structures which are past their useful life.

Since the project involves an existing maintenance facility, the improvements will serve to enhance maintenance operations as well as better protect the environment from these existing operations. Building renovations will improve the housing of pesticides and fertilizers. Surface and groundwater will be better protected by the new septic system, equipment wash and fueling station, and stormwater management infrastructure. Underground fuel tanks will be removed. All of the buildings will be electrically heated, which will reduce petroleum consumption as well as carbon emissions.

The County designated all County and State park lands as Critical Environmental Areas for the variety of benefits they provide, including recreational, educational, social, cultural and ecological benefits. The project will serve to support recreation by improving the maintenance of this popular public golf course.

WHEREAS, this Board of Legislators (the "Board") has heretofore duly authorized the issuance of bonds to finance the costs for recreational area improvements for Mohansic Golf Course located in Yorktown Heights at the estimated maximum cost of \$3,850,000 (the "Amended Project"), pursuant to Amending and Restating Bond Act No. 135-2024, duly adopted on July 15, 2024, and it has now been determined that (i) additional costs for the construction of recreational area improvements for Mohansic Golf Course located in Yorktown Heights in the amount of \$10,700,000 shall be added to the costs of the Amended Project (collectively, the "Project") and the amount of serial bonds authorized herein and (ii) the maximum cost of the Project shall now total \$14,550,000; and

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (the "Law"), the Westchester County Administrative Code, being Chapter 852 of the Laws of 1948, as amended, to the provisions of other laws applicable thereto, \$14,550,000 bonds of the County, or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby authorized to be issued to finance the cost for recreational area improvements for Mohansic Golf Course located in Yorktown Heights, including construction and construction management for the replacement of the existing electrical service into the park with a new three-phase electrical service and the design of the rehabilitation of the maintenance and storage building complex, construction and construction management of a new maintenance building complex including the construction of a new maintenance building, renovation of the existing maintenance building and shop, demolition and removal of two existing barn structures, and associated site work and improvements; all as set forth in the County's current year Capital

Budget, as amended. To the extent that the details set forth in this act are inconsistent with any details set forth in the current year Capital Budget of the County, such Budget shall be deemed and is hereby amended. The estimated maximum cost of said objects or purposes, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof, is \$14,550,000. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$14,550,000 bonds herein authorized, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds, and the levy of a tax to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds.

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness applicable to the specific object or purpose for which the bonds authorized by this resolution is to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 19(c) of the Law, is fifteen (15) years.

Section 3. Current funds are not required to be provided as a down payment pursuant to Section 107.00 d. 9. of the Law prior to issuance of the bonds authorized herein, or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds. The County intends to finance, on an interim basis, the costs or a portion of the costs of said improvements for which bonds are herein authorized, which costs are reasonably expected to be reimbursed with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County, pursuant to this Act, in the maximum amount of \$14,550,000. This Act is a declaration of official intent adopted pursuant to the requirements of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of this Act and of the Law, and pursuant to the provisions of §30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes or the renewals thereof, and of §§50.00, 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of said Law, the powers and duties of the County Board of Legislators relative to authorizing the issuance of any notes in

anticipation of the sale of the bonds herein authorized, or the renewals thereof, relative to providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, relative to prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the respective amounts of bonds herein authorized, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and relative to executing agreements for credit enhancement, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance of the County, as the chief fiscal officer of the County.

Section 5. Each of the bonds authorized by this Act and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale thereof shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by §52.00 of said Local Finance Law and said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the County of Westchester, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the County. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and provision shall be made annually in the budgets of the County by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the notes and bonds to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 6. The validity of the bonds authorized by this Act and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

(a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or

(b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this Act or a summary hereof, are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

(c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This Act shall take effect in accordance with Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter.

Section (B). The further amendment and restatement of the bond act set forth in Section (A) of this act shall in no way affect the validity of the liabilities incurred, obligations issued, or action taken pursuant to said bond act, and all such liabilities incurred, obligations issued, or action taken shall be deemed to have been incurred, issued or taken pursuant to said bond act, as so amended.

Section (C). This Act shall take effect in accordance with Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter.

HONORABLE BOARD OF LEGISLATORS THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK

Your Committee is in receipt of a transmission from the County Executive recommending approval by the County of Westchester ("County") of an act amending the County's current-year capital budget ("Capital Budget Amendment"), as well as adoption of a related amending and superseding bond act prepared by the law firm Norton Rose Fulbright ("Amended Bond Act") in connection with capital projects SPC03 - Port Chester Waste Water Treatment Plant – Electrical System Upgrade ("SPC03"), and SPC09 – Port Chester Waste Water Treatment Plant HVAC Systems Upgrade ("SPC09").

The Amended Bond Act would amend and supersede Bond Act No. 52-2024 to:

- (i) increase the amount of bonds authorized by Act 52-2024 by \$18,000,000, from \$11,000,000 to a new total of \$29,000,000,
- (ii) increase the estimated maximum cost of the combined SPC03 and SPC09 projects from \$45,200,000 to \$63,200,000 (an increase of \$18,000,000), and
- (iii) update the plan of financing to include (a) \$34,200,000 bonds authorized under Bond Act No. 5-2021 and (b) the new total of \$29,000,000 to be authorized by the Amended Bond Act.

The proposed Capital Budget Amendment will amend the County's capital budget to increase the appropriations for SPC03 and SPC09 by a total aggregate amount of \$18,000,000, comprised of a \$6,000,000 increase for SPC03, and a \$12,000,000 increase for SPC09.

The Department of Environmental Facilities (the "Department") advised that all bids received exceeded available construction budgets for SPC03 and SPC09. Cost increases are attributable to tariffs and unpredictable market conditions. Many raw materials and manufactured electrical and heating, ventilation, and air conditioning ("HVAC") components are imported and therefore subject to increased tariffs. In addition, tariffs are causing supply chain disruption thereby risking long lead times and further increasing costs.

The Amended Bond Act would authorize the County to issue \$29,000,000 bonds of the County (including \$11,000,000 previously authorized by Bond Act 52-2024) to finance a portion of the \$63,200,000 estimated maximum cost of the design, construction management and

construction for the replacement and upgrading of the electrical system and replacement of the HVAC system at the County's Port Chester Water Resource Recovery Facility, including incidental expenses.

The Department advised that SPC03 and SPC09 provide for replacement and upgrade of plant electrical system and HVAC system at the Port Chester Water Resource Recovery Facility. The electrical system replacement and upgrade includes but is not limited to replacement of the electrical switch gear, electrical panel boards, motor controls centers, emergency generators and any other related ancillary equipment reaching the end of its useful life. The HVAC system replacement and upgrade includes but is not limited to replacement of the HVAC units, as well as odor control equipment and all ancillary systems and controls.

Design has been completed by a consultant. It is estimated that construction will take thirty-six months to complete and will begin after award and execution of the construction contracts.

Section 167.131 of the County Charter mandates that a capital budget amendment that introduces a new capital project or changes the location, size or character of an existing capital project be accompanied to the Board of Legislators by a report of the Westchester County Planning Board (the "Planning Board") with respect to the physical planning aspects of the project. The Planning Department has advised that the Planning Board has previously reviewed SPC03 and SPC09 and issued reports, and that since there is no change in the location, size or character of the project and this is simply a change in the financing plan, no further action by the Planning Board is necessary at this time.

The Planning Department has advised your Committee that based on its review, the above-referenced capital projects may be classified as Type "II" actions pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617 ("SEQR"). Therefore, no environmental review is required. Your Committee has reviewed the annexed SEQR documentation and concurs with this recommendation.

Your Committee has carefully considered the proposed Capital Budget Amendment, as well as the related Amended Bond Act, and recommends approval of both of the proposed Acts,

noting that the Amended Bond Act can only be enacted following adoption of the Capital Budget Amendment. It should be noted that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of your Honorable Board is required in order to amend the County's Capital Budget and to adopt the Amended Bond Act.

A BOND ACT OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK, AMENDING AND SUPERSEDING BOND ACT NO. 52-2024 TO INCREASE THE AMOUNT OF BONDS AUTHORIZED THEREIN FROM \$11,000,000 TO \$29,000,000 (AN INCREASE OF \$18,000,000) TO PAY A PORTION OF THE \$63,200,000 REVISED ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF THE DESIGN, CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT, AND CONSTRUCTION OF THE REPLACEMENT AND UPGRADING OF THE ELECTRICAL SYSTEM AND REPLACEMENT OF THE HEATING, VENTILATING AND AIR CONDITIONING SYSTEM AT THE PORT CHESTER WATER RESOURCE RECOVERY FACILITY, FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE PORT CHESTER SANITARY SEWER DISTRICT.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Bond Act No. 68-2014, \$2,150,000 bonds were authorized to finance the design and construction management costs of the replacement and upgrading of the electrical system at the Port Chester Water Resource Recovery Facility (previously called the Port Chester Wastewater Treatment Plant) ("SPC03"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Bond Act No. 91-2014, \$2,300,000 bonds were authorized to finance the design and construction management costs of the replacement of heating, ventilating and air conditioning equipment at the Port Chester Water Resource Recovery Facility ("SPC09"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Bond Act No. 5-2021, (i) the purposes described in Bond Acts No. 68-2014 and 91-2014 were combined ("SPC03/SPC09 project"), (ii) the scope of the project was expanded to include construction of the replacement and upgrading of the electrical system and replacement of the heating, ventilating and air conditioning system at the Port Chester Water Resource Recovery Facility, and (iii) the estimated maximum cost of such combined SPC03/SPC09 project and the amount of bonds authorized to be issued for such purposes was increased by \$29,750,000 for a total aggregate amount of \$34,200,000; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Bond Act No. 52-2024, (i) the estimated maximum cost of the combined SPC03/SPC09 project was increased from \$34,200,000 to \$45,200,000 (an increase

of \$11,000,000), (ii) an additional \$11,000,000 bonds were authorized to pay of a portion of such increased estimated maximum cost and (iii) the plan of financing was updated to include (a) \$34,200,000 bonds authorized under Bond Act No. 5-2021 and (b) the \$11,000,000 bonds to be authorized in therein; and

WHEREAS, no obligations have been issued under Bond Act No. 52-2024; and

WHEREAS, it is now desired to amend and supersede Bond Act No. 52-2024 to (i) increase the estimated maximum cost from \$45,200,000 to \$63,200,000 (an increase of \$18,000,000) (ii) increase the amount of bonds authorized therein from \$11,000,000 to \$29,000,000 (an increase of \$18,000,000) and (iii) update the plan of financing to include (a) \$34,200,000 bonds authorized under Bond Act No. 5-2021 and (b) the \$29,000,000 bonds to be authorized herein; and

WHEREAS, the plan for the financing of the estimated maximum cost of such capital purpose, as hereinafter set forth in this Bond Act, is in conformity with such capital budget; and

WHEREAS, all conditions precedent to the financing of the capital project hereinafter described, including compliance with the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, to the extent required, have been performed; and

WHEREAS, the cost of said class of objects or purposes shall be specially assessed against properties in the County's Port Chester Sanitary Sewer District, which are specially benefitted by said class of objects or purpose; and

WHEREAS, it is now desired to authorize the financing of such capital purpose; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ENACTED, by the Board of Legislators of the County of Westchester, New York, by the affirmative vote of not less than two thirds of the entire voting strength thereof, as follows:

Section 1. There are hereby authorized to be issued \$29,000,000 bonds of the County of Westchester to finance a portion of the \$63,200,000 estimated maximum cost of the design,

construction management and construction for the replacement and upgrading of the electrical system and replacement of the heating, ventilating and air conditioning system at the Port Chester Water Resource Recovery Facility, including incidental expenses in connection therewith, which is a class of objects or purposes, in and for the benefit of the Port Chester Sanitary Sewer District. To the extent that the details of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes set forth in this act are inconsistent with any details set forth in the current Capital Budget of the County, such Budget shall be deemed and is hereby amended to the extent inconsistent herewith.

Section 2. It is hereby determined that the estimated maximum cost of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is \$63,200,000, and that the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of (i) \$34,200,000 bonds of said County authorized to be issued pursuant to Bond Act 5-2021 and (ii) \$29,000,000 bonds of said County authorized to be issued pursuant to this Bond Act.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is thirty years pursuant to subdivision four of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Commissioner of Finance, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 5. The faith and credit of the County of Westchester, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. To the extent not paid from the assessment of properties assessable for this purpose in County's Port

Chester Sanitary Sewer District, or other sources, there shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 6. Such bonds shall be in fully registered form and shall be signed in the name of the County of Westchester, New York, by the manual or facsimile signature of the Commissioner of Finance and a facsimile of the corporate seal shall be imprinted or impressed thereon and may be attested by the manual or facsimile signature of the County Clerk.

Section 7. The powers and duties of advertising such bonds for sale, conducting the sale and awarding the bonds, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance, who shall advertise such bonds for sale, conduct the sale, and award the bonds in such manner as said Commissioner of Finance shall deem best for the interests of the County; including, but not limited to, the power to sell said bonds to the New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation; provided, however, that in the exercise of these delegated powers, the Commissioner of Finance shall comply fully with the provisions of the Local Finance Law and any order or rule of the State Comptroller applicable to the sale of municipal bonds. The receipt of the Commissioner of Finance shall be a full acquittance to the purchaser of such bonds, who shall not be obliged to see to the application of the purchase money.

Section 8. The Commissioner of Finance is hereby further delegated the power to authorize the sale and issuance of the bonds authorized pursuant to this Bond Act (a) at a discount in the manner authorized by paragraphs e and f of Section 57.00 of the Local Finance Law, (b) at private sale pursuant to the applicable provisions of the Local Finance Law and any regulations of the New York State Comptroller appertaining thereto, including the private sale of bonds at a premium, (c) as capital appreciation bonds or term bonds at public sale or private sale pursuant to the applicable provisions of the Local Finance Law and any regulations of the New York State Comptroller appertaining thereto, and (d) at a variable rate of interest in the manner authorized by

Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law, including notes issued in anticipation thereof. The Commissioner of Finance is hereby authorized to enter into such agreements as said Commissioner of Finance shall determine reasonable and necessary to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and, or repurchase of such bonds or notes pursuant to the provisions of Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. Such bonds and, or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Commissioner of Finance.

Section 9. The power to issue and sell notes to the New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation pursuant to Section 169.00 of the Local Finance Law is hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents as may be prescribed by said Commissioner of Finance consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 10. The Commissioner of Finance is hereby further authorized, at his or her sole discretion, to execute a project financing and loan agreement, and any other agreements with the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation and/or the New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation, including amendments thereto, and including any instruments (or amendments thereto) in the effectuation thereof, in order to effect the financing or refinancing of the specific object or purpose described in Section 1 hereof, or a portion thereof, by a bond, and, or note issue of said County in the event of the sale of same to the New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation.

Section 11. The intent of this Bond Act is to give the Commissioner of Finance sufficient authority to execute those applications, agreements, instruments or to do any similar acts necessary to effect the issuance of the aforesaid bonds and, or notes without resorting to further action of this Board of Legislators.

Section 12. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds, including determining whether to issue such bonds having substantially level or declining annual debt service and all matters related thereto, prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on

said bonds, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds (and if said bonds are to be executed in the name of the County by the facsimile signature of the Commissioner of Finance and, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, denominations, maturities and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Commissioner of Finance. It is hereby determined that it is to the financial advantage of the County not to impose and collect from registered owners of such bonds any charges for mailing, shipping and insuring bonds transferred or exchanged by the fiscal agent, and, accordingly, pursuant to paragraph c of Section 70.00 of the Local Finance Law, no such charges shall be so collected by the fiscal agent. Such bonds shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Commissioner of Finance shall determine.

- Section 13. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:
 - Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said
 County is not authorized to expend money, or
 - The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this Bond Act are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 14. This Bond Act shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Treasury Regulations Section 1.150 - 2. Other than as specified in this Bond Act, no moneys are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the object or purpose described herein.

Section 15. This bond act amends and supersedes Bond Act No, 52-2024, except to the extent that any liabilities or indebtedness shall have been contracted, and encumbrances made or actions taken thereunder.

Section 16. This Bond Act, which shall take effect immediately in accordance with the provisions of Section 33.10 of the Local Finance Law and as provided in Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter, shall be published in summary form in the official newspaper of said County for purposes of this Bond Act, together with a notice of the Clerk of the County Board of Legislators in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

HONORABLE BOARD OF LEGISLATORS THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER

Your Committee is in receipt of a communication from the County Executive recommending the enactment of the following:

Land Purchase and Conveyance. An Act (the "Land Acquisition Act") to authorize the purchase and subsequent conveyance of approximately +/- 0.577 acres (25,137 square feet) of real property located at 438 Main Street in the City of New Rochelle (the "Property") to 438 Main Development LLC, its successors, assigns or any entity created to carry out the purposes of the proposed transaction (the "Developer"), as part of the County's program to support the creation of affordable housing units that affirmatively further fair housing (the "Affordable AFFH Units"). The Land Acquisition Act also authorizes the County to grant and accept any property rights necessary in furtherance thereof. This Property was formerly improved by the Union Baptist Church which was destroyed by fire in 2011. It should be noted that the Development includes over 10,000 square feet of church and retail space. This space is not part of the acquisition by the County. It is anticipated that a condominium ownership structure will be set up by the Developer for the residential, church and retail space prior to the County's acquisition of the real property. The County will only acquire the portion of the Property containing the Affordable AFFH Units and their associated parking and amenities, excluding the nonresidential space.

Acquisition Financing. A New Homes Land Acquisition Bond Act (the "NHLA Bond Act"), prepared by the firm of Hawkins Delafield & Wood LLP, to authorize the issuance of bonds of the County in a total amount not to exceed \$4,505,000 as a part of Capital Project BPL37 New Homes Land Acquisition III. The Department of Planning ("Planning") has advised that subject to the receipt of approval of your Honorable Board, the proposed NHLA Bond Act will authorize an amount not to exceed \$4,505,000 to be used toward the purchase price for the Property from the current owner to create one-hundred fourteen (114) Affordable AFFH Units for rent and approximately forty-five (45) parking spaces for use by the residents (the "Development"). The purchase price for the Property is \$5,300,000. The Developer will be responsible for the remainder of the purchase price.

Upon acquisition, the County will file a Declaration of Restrictive Covenants against the Property, to require that the proposed Affordable AFFH Units be marketed and leased in accordance with an approved affirmative affordable fair housing marketing plan to eligible senior households aged sixty-two and over, with income at or below 50% and up to 60% of the Westchester County area median income. The units will remain affordable for a period of not less than fifty (50) years noting that the income limits are subject to change based on the median income levels at the time of initial occupancy and subsequent occupancies, as established by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

In accordance with the Land Acquisition Act, the County will subsequently convey the Property to the Developer for One (\$1.00) Dollar to construct the Affordable AFFH Units.

Your Committee has been advised that additional funds for the Development are anticipated to be provided by Federal and State Low Income Housing Tax Credits, New York State Homes and Community Renewal ("HCR"), Westchester County Housing Flex Fund, funding from the sale of a condominium unit that will be purchased by the Union Baptist Church, a first mortgage from a conventional bank, and a deferred developer fee for an estimated total Development cost of approximately \$69.82 Million.

As your Honorable Board is aware, no action may be taken with regard to the proposed legislation until the requirements of the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA") and its implementing regulations have been met. Your Committee has been advised by Planning that the proposed Development was reviewed by the City of New Rochelle Planning Board, which classified it as an Unlisted action under SEQRA, conducted an environmental review and adopted a Negative Declaration for the project on November 22, 2022. The City Planning Board, however, did not undertake coordinated review or otherwise include the County as an involved agency in connection with SEQRA. This Developer subsequently came before the County seeking financial assistance through the County's Housing Flex Fund Program (Capital Project BPL42). In order to authorize the use of County funds for the Development, the County Board of Acquisition and Contract needed to undertake the requisite environmental review. A

Full Environmental Assessment Form was prepared and a Negative Declaration was issued by the County Board of Acquisition and Contract, via Resolution OnBase No. 110117, on December 12, 2024. Since the County Board of Acquisition and Contract conducted SEQRA on behalf of the County, no further environmental review is required. Your Committee has reviewed the documentation provided by Planning and concurs with this recommendation.

Your Committee has been further advised that Section 167.131 of the County Charter mandates that a Capital Budget Amendment that introduces a new capital project or changes the location, size or character of an existing capital project be accompanied by a report of the Westchester County Planning Board ("Planning Board") with respect to the physical planning aspects of the project. On September 3, 2025, the Planning Board adopted Resolution No. 25-25 that recommends funding for the purchase and conveyance of the Property which is annexed hereto. In addition, the report of the Commissioner of Planning is annexed pursuant to Section 191.41 of the County Charter.

Based on the foregoing, your Committee believes that the Land Acquisition Act and the NHLA Bond Act are in the best interest of the County and therefore recommends their adoption noting that the Land Acquisition Act and NHLA Bond Act require the affirmative vote of twothirds of the members of your Honorable Board.

Pursuant to your request, Environmental Planning staff has reviewed the above referenced project with respect to the State Environmental Quality Review Act and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617 (SEQR).

This action involves the provision of County funding under capital project BPL30 – New Homes Land Acquisition II (Fact Sheet Unique ID: 3043) to facilitate the development of affordable housing at 438 Main Street in the City of New Rochelle. County funds will be applied toward the purchase of approximately 0.577 acres of real property, which will be transferred to a developer, who will create approximately 115 dwelling units, 114 of which will be affordable rental housing that will affirmatively further fair housing. The development will include 45 parking spaces for residents.

This project is part of a larger project involving the construction of a six-story building on the site of the historic Union Baptist Church which had been destroyed by fire. The larger project includes approximately 10,000 square feet of building space for the church, along with 35 additional parking spaces, as well as a separate unit for retail use. The overall project was reviewed by the City of New Rochelle Planning Board, which classified it as an Unlisted action under SEQR, conducted an environmental review and adopted a Negative Declaration for the project on November 22, 2022. The City Planning Board, however, did not undertake coordinated review or otherwise include the County as an involved agency in connection with SEQR.

The project subsequently came before the County seeking financial assistance through the County's Housing Flex Fund Program (capital project BPL42). In order to authorize the use of County funds for the project, the County Board of Acquisition and Contract needed to undertake the requisite environmental review. A Full Environmental Assessment Form was prepared and a Negative Declaration was issued by the Board of Acquisition and Contract, via Resolution # 110117, on December 12, 2024.

Since the Board of Acquisition and Contract conducted SEQR on behalf of the County, no further environmental review is required for the proposed bond authorization.

SUBJECT: Acquisition of Real Property – 438 Main Street – City of New Rochelle

Pursuant to Section 191.41 of the County Charter, submitted herewith is the required report of the Commissioner of Planning on the proposed acquisition and subsequent conveyance of +/-0.577 acres (25,137 square feet) of real property located at 438 Main Street in the City of New Rochelle, identified on the City tax maps as Section 1 Block 211 Lots: 43 and 43A (the "Property") for the purpose of creating 114 affordable housing units (the "Affordable AFFH Units"), that will affirmatively further fair housing ("AFFH"). The development will also provide approximately 45 parking spaces for residents.

The County of Westchester ("the County") intends to finance the purchase of the Property from the current owner in an amount not to exceed \$4,505,000 as a part of Capital Project BPL37 New Homes Land Acquisition III. Upon acquisition of the Property, the County will file a Declaration of Restrictive Covenants to require that the Affordable AFFH Units are marketed and leased in accordance with an approved fair housing marketing plan and will remain available to eligible households for a period of not less than 50 years. The County will then convey ownership of the Property to 438 Main Development LLC (the "Developer"), its successors or assigns, for One (\$1.00) Dollar.

The Developer proposes to construct one building of six-stories on the Property that will include a mix of affordable studio and one -bedroom rental apartments that will be leased to households who earn at or below 50% and up to 60% of the area median income (collectively the "Development").

I recommend funding for acquisition and conveyance of the Property for the following reasons:

- 1. The acquisition of this Property will advance the County's efforts to provide fair and affordable housing;
- 2. The acquisition and subsequent conveyance of the Property to develop fair and affordable housing is consistent with development policies adopted by the County Planning Board as set forth in Westchester 2025 Context for County and Municipal Planning in Westchester County and Policies to Guide County Planning, adopted May 6, 2008,

- and amended January 5, 2010, and the recommended strategies set forth in *Patterns for Westchester: The Land and the People*, adopted December 5, 1995;
- 3. The Development is proposed to include green technology, such as energy efficient appliances, lighting and heating systems and water-conserving fixtures to reduce operating and maintenance costs, minimize energy consumption and conserve natural resources. The Development is designed to meet the sustainability guidelines of New York State Homes and Community Renewal and is seeking the following green building certification: 2020 Enterprise Green Communities;
- 4. The Development is consistent with the land use policies and regulations of the City of New Rochelle; and
- 5. On September 3, 2025, the County Planning Board adopted a resolution to recommend County financing towards the purchase of the Property to support the Development.

WHEREAS, the County will transfer ownership of the Property to the Developer to construct a mix of studio, one and two-bedroom apartments to be leased to eligible households, pursuant to an approved Affirmative Fair Housing Marketing Plan, for a minimum of 50 years; and

WHEREAS, in furtherance of the above, the County Executive will be submitting legislation to the Board of Legislators to amend Capital Project BPL37 NHLA III to add the Property, 438 Main Street; City of New Rochelle, and authorize bonding in a not to exceed amount of \$4,505,000 to develop the Property; and

WHEREAS, the Development is subject to approvals by the City of New Rochelle; and

WHEREAS, the funding to support the development of the Affordable Units is consistent with and reinforces Westchester 2025 – Policies to Guide County Planning, the County Planning Board's adopted long-range land use and development policies, by contributing to the development of "a range of housing types" "affordable to all income levels"; and

WHEREAS, the staff of the County Department of Planning have reviewed the proposal

and recommend the requested funding associated with acquisition of the Property; and

RESOLVED, that the Westchester County Planning Board after completing a review of the physical planning aspects of the Affordable Units, subject to an appraisal, recommends that the County provide financial assistance in a not-to-exceed amount of \$4,505,000 from BPL37 NHLA III for property acquisition; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Westchester County Planning Board amends its report on the 2025 Capital Project requests to include 438 Main Street in the City of New Rochelle, as a new component project in Capital Project BPL37 NHLA III under the heading of Buildings, Land and Miscellaneous.

BOND ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$4,505,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, OR SO MUCH THEREOF AS MAY BE NECESSARY, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE PURCHASE OF REAL PROPERTY LOCATED ON 438 MAIN STREET, IN THE CITY OF NEW ROCHELLE, IN ORDER TO AFFIRMATIVELY FURTHER FAIR HOUSING ("AFFH"); STATING THE ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST THEREOF IS \$4,505,000; STATING THE PLAN OF FINANCING SAID COST INCLUDES THE ISSUANCE OF \$4,505,000 BONDS HEREIN AUTHORIZED; AND PROVIDING FOR A TAX TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS (Adopted , 20)

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (the "Law"), the Westchester County Administrative Code, being Chapter 852 of the Laws of 1948, as amended, and other laws applicable thereto, bonds of the County in the aggregate amount of \$4,505,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby authorized to be issued to finance the cost of the purchase of approximately 25,137 square feet of real property located on 438 Main Street, in the City of New Rochelle and identified on the tax maps as Section 1: Block 211: Lots 43 and 43A (the "AFFH Property") from the current owner(s) of record at a cost of \$4,505,000, including acquisition and settlement costs, in order to support the construction of 114 affordable housing units and one

employee unit that will affirmatively further fair housing ("AFFH"). The County will file, or cause to be filed, a Declaration of Restrictive Covenants in the Westchester County Clerk's office requiring that the AFFH Property remain affordable for a period of not less than 50 years. The funding requested herein is in support of the construction of 114 affordable AFFH rental units, and one employee unit, and 45 parking spaces, at the aggregate estimated maximum cost of \$4,505,000 for the acquisition of the AFFH Property. The AFFH Property shall be acquired by the County, subjected to said Declaration of Restrictive Covenants and subsequently conveyed to 438 Main Development LLC (the "Developer"), its successors or assigns. The County's acquisition of the AFFH Property is set forth in the County's Current Year Capital Budget, as amended. To the extent that the details set forth in this act are inconsistent with any details set forth in the Current Year Capital Budget of the County and the Statement of Need, such Budget and Statement of Need shall be deemed and are hereby amended. The estimated maximum cost of said object or purpose, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof, is \$4,505,000. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$4,505,000 bonds herein authorized, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds, and the levy and collection of a tax on taxable real property in the County to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds and notes.

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness for which said \$4,505,000 bonds are authorized to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 21 of the Law, is thirty (30) years.

Section 3. The County intends to finance, on an interim basis, the costs or a portion of the costs of said object or purpose for which bonds are herein authorized, which costs are

reasonably expected to be reimbursed with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County, pursuant to this Bond Act, in the maximum amount of \$4,505,000. This Act is a declaration of official intent adopted pursuant to the requirements of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2.

Section 4. The estimate of \$4,505,000 as the estimated maximum cost of the aforesaid object or purpose is hereby approved.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of this Act and of the Law, and pursuant to the provisions of section 30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes and the renewals thereof, and of sections 50.00, 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of said Law, the powers and duties of the County Board of Legislators relative to authorizing the issuance of any notes in anticipation of the sale of the bonds herein authorized, and the renewals thereof, relative to providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, relative to prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the bonds herein authorized, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds and the renewals of said notes, and relative to executing agreements for credit enhancement, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance of the County, as the chief fiscal officer of the County.

Section 6. Each of the bonds authorized by this Act and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale thereof shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by section 52.00 of said Local Finance Law and said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the County of Westchester, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the County. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on

said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds and the renewals of said notes, and provision shall be made annually in the budgets of the County by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the notes and bonds to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 7. The validity of the bonds authorized by this Act and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

- (a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or
- (b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this Act or a summary hereof, are not substantially complied with,
 and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after
 the date of such publication, or
 - (c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 8. This Act shall take effect in accordance with Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter.

This project provides funds to acquire property for the construction of fair and affordable housing. The purpose of the New Homes Land Acquisition (NHLA) Fund is to increase the inventory of available properties for fair and affordable housing development. In addition to the acquisition cost of properties, other costs associated with, and often required for, site acquisition may be considered eligible costs to be funded through the NHLA program. Such associated costs may include, but are not limited to, closing costs, appraisals, property surveys, environmental assessments, hazardous materials reports and demolition of existing structures. Funds can be used in all municipalities.

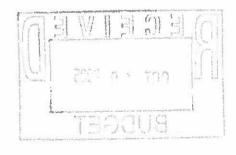

Section 1. The County of Westchester (the "County") is hereby authorized to purchase from the current owner(s) of record approximately +/- 0.577 acres (25,137 square feet) of real property located at 438 Main Street in the City of New Rochelle (the "Property") to construct 114 affordable senior rental housing units that will affirmatively further fair housing (the "Affordable AFFH Units") as set forth in 42 U.S.C. Section 5304(b)(2).

- **§2.** The County is hereby authorized to purchase the Property for an amount not to exceed FOUR MILLION FIVE HUNDRED FIVE THOUSAND AND 00/100 (\$4,505,000.00) DOLLARS.
- §3. The County is hereby authorized to convey the Property to 438 Main Development LLC, its successors, assigns or any entity created to carry out the purposes of the proposed transaction, for One (\$1.00) Dollar to construct the Affordable AFFH Units that will be marketed and leased to eligible senior households aged sixty-two and over with income at or below 50% and up to 60% of the Westchester County area median income, that will remain affordable for a period of not less than fifty (50) years, and will be marketed and leased in accordance with an approved fair housing marketing plan, noting that the income limits are subject to change based on the median income levels at the time of initial occupancy and subsequent occupancies, as established

by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

- **§4.** The County is hereby authorized to grant and accept any and all property rights necessary in furtherance hereof.
- **§5.** The transfers of the Property shall be by such deeds as approved by the County Attorney.

This first matter is pending in the Westchester County Supreme Court before the Honorable Alexandra D. Murphy. The lawsuit tentatively settled, pending this Board's approval, for a total amount of \$5,000,000.00 inclusive of attorney's fees.

Craig Bernhardt Esq. and Daniel Hunter, Esq. of Herman Law, 434 W. 33rd Street Penthouse, New York, New York 10001, are representing the plaintiff, Joseph Paladino.

Kelly A. Hodges, Esq. and Benjamin Pucci, Esq. of Darger Errante Tavitz & Blau LLP, 116 E. 27th Street, 12th Floor, New York, New York 10016 is representing the County of Westchester.

This matter arises in the context of The Child Victim's Act (the "CVA"). The legislation was enacted in 2019 and allowed for victims of childhood sexual abuse to file lawsuits despite expired statutes of limitations. In this case, the plaintiff alleges that between 1980 and continuing through 1984 he was sexually abused by John Baterbury, while plaintiff was a resident at Lakeside School and St. Dominic's Children's Home, during overnight weekend visits at Baterbury's home and other locations. Plaintiff claims he told a nun and two counselors from St. Dominic's Children's Home about the abuse he sustained but the visits continued. Plaintiff claims that the County had a non-delegable duty to provide for his safety and that the County sat "in loco parentis" and as such the County is ultimately responsible for his care. The County has denied having any knowledge of the sexual abuse allegations. The Plaintif argued, and a jury would likely have believed, that the County was negligent in its supervision of Lakeside School and St. Dominic's Children's Home and that the County's negligence was the proximate cause of his injuries and resulting damages.

The settlement takes into consideration the likelihood of an adverse verdict, the exposure to a substantial jury verdict, subsequent proceedings and potential appeal. The accompanying Act will authorize settlement of the lawsuit entitled of JOSEPH PALADINO f/k/a JEFFREY PALADINO v ARCHIDIOCESE OF NEW YORK, ST. DOMINIC'S FAMILY SERVICES f/k/a ST. DOMINIC'S HOME FOR CHILDREN a/k/a ST. DOMINIC'S HOME; SISTERS OF ST. DOMINIC'S OF BLAUVELT NEW YORK; DOMINICAN FRIARS PROVINCE OF ST. JOSEPH; CATHOLIC CHARITIES OF THE ARCHIDIOCESE OF NEW YORK; WESTCHESTER COUNTY; LAKESIDE FAMILY AND CHILDREN'S SERVICES, INC.

f/k/a LAKESIDE SCHOOL; and DOES 1-10 in Supreme Court Westchester County, Index No. 58180/2021, in the amount of \$5,000,000.00, inclusive of attorney's fees.

The second matter arises out of an insurance contract between the County and Liberty Mutual Insurance Company ("Liberty") for the defense and indemnification of the County under insurance policies issued for 1982 through 1984. At the outset of the Paladino litigation (the "underlying" case), the County demanded Liberty cover the cost of the defense of the litigation and indemnify the County for any settlement or judgment ordered against the County, pursuant to the terms and conditions of the insurance contracts. Liberty accepted the County's demand under reservation of rights and agreed to cover the cost of the defense of the County in the litigation and reserved the right to refuse to pay for or contribute to a settlement or judgment in resolution of the matter. Liberty has yet to make a final determination regarding its decision to provide insurance coverage to the County.

The County, through this office, will continue to seek a resolution to the claim. However, if a satisfactory resolution cannot be obtained with Liberty, litigation will be necessary.

In order to protect the County's interests, authority to commence an action against Liberty, and any other party as may be necessary and appropriate to enforce the County's rights, is recommended.

Therefore, I am respectfully requesting that this Honorable Board pass the accompanying Act authorizing the County to initiate all legal action, if necessary, including, but not limited to, third-party claims, cross-claims, and/or counterclaims on behalf of the County, as may be necessary against Liberty Mutual Insurance Company, and/or all other

parties deemed responsible as may be necessary and appropriate to enforce the terms and conditions of the insurance contracts with Liberty and to obtain appropriate insurance coverage under the policies

HONORABLE BOARD OF LEGISLATORS THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK

Your Committee is in receipt of a transmittal from the County Executive recommending approval of an act, which, if adopted, will authorize the County of Westchester ("County") to amend the County's current-year capital budget ("Capital Budget Amendment"), as well as adopt a related amended bond act (the "Amended Bond Act") in the total amount of \$8,550,000, which includes \$3,900,000 in previously authorized bonds of the County, to finance capital project RB199 – Tuckahoe Road, CR 36 & CR 59, Yonkers ("RB199").

Your Committee is advised that the Capital Budget Amendment will amend the County's current-year capital budget to increase the County share for RB199 by \$4,650,000. The Department of Public Works and Transportation ("Department") has advised that the bids received for the construction contract exceeded the available funding for the project. There have been significant material cost increases across the construction industry due to current global and national economic conditions. The market volatility has resulted in unknown material costs day-to-day and thus, asphalt and steel suppliers are increasing prices to account for the ever-changing prices. On a regional level, there is a shortage of ready-mix concrete suppliers in Westchester County, which has led to less competitive bidding and increased material costs for concrete items. Therefore, \$4,650,000 in additional appropriations are needed to award the construction contract.

Your Committee is further advised that the Amended Bond Act, prepared by the law firm of Harris Beach Murtha, would finance additional construction management and construction costs associated with the rehabilitation of approximately 1.5 miles of roadway from Cassilis Avenue to the southbound I-87 entrance ramp, including milling, resurfacing, concrete curb replacement, drainage repairs, new traffic loops, new pavement markings and related work.

The Department has advised that this road, which has an average annual daily traffic count ("AADT") of 14,138, is in need of rehabilitation to provide a safe roadway for the travelling public. The associated pavement condition index ("PCI") in 2023 was 62 and the roadway has continued to deteriorate. The PCI rating is a pavement condition rating with a range of 0 to 100, with 0 signifying that the road requires reconstruction and 100 signifying that the road is new. Based on this rating, this road requires corrective rehabilitation to extend the life of the roadway.

Your Committee is advised that design has been completed for this project by an outside consultant. Construction is estimated to take eighteen (18) months and shall begin after award and execution of the construction contracts.

It should be noted that your Honorable Board has previously authorized the County to issue bonds for RB199 as follows: Bond Act No. 31-2020 in the amount of \$3,900,000 which financed the cost of design, construction management and construction associated with this project. \$348,929 in bonds authorized by Bond Act No. 31-2020 have been sold. Accordingly, authority is now requested to amend Bond Act No. 31-2020 to increase the initial amount authorized thereunder by \$4,650,000, for a total authorized amount, as amended, of \$8,550,000.00, to include additional construction and construction management costs necessary to complete this project.

The Department of Planning has advised your Committee that based on its review, the authorization of the proposed referenced capital project may be classified as a Type "II" action pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617 ("SEQR"). Therefore, no environmental review is required. Your Committee has reviewed the annexed SEQR documentation and concurs with this recommendation.

The Planning Department has further advised your Committee that the Planning Board has previously reviewed this project and issued a report, and that since there is no change in the scope

of the work but simply a change in the financing plan, no further action by the Planning Board is necessary at this time.

Your Committee has carefully considered the proposed Capital Budget Amendment, as well as the related Amended Bond Act, and recommends approval of both proposed Acts, noting that the Amended Bond Act may only be enacted following adoption of the Capital Budget Amendment. It should also be noted that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of your Honorable Board is required in order to amend the County's Capital Budget and to adopt the Amended Bond Act.

Your Committee is in receipt of a transmittal from the County Executive recommending approval of an act, which, if adopted, will authorize the County of Westchester ("County") to amend the County's current-year capital budget ("Capital Budget Amendment"), as well as adopt a related amended bond act (the "Amended Bond Act") in the total amount of \$5,125,000, which includes \$3,775,000 in previously authorized bonds of the County, to finance capital project RB03I – Tuckahoe Road Bridge Over Bronx River, Yonkers and Tuckahoe (BIN 3364940) ("RB03I").

Your Committee is advised that the Capital Budget Amendment will amend the County's current-year capital budget to increase the County share for RB03I by \$1,350,000. The Department of Public Works and Transportation ("Department") has advised that the bids received for the construction contract exceeded the available funding for the project. There have been significant material cost increases across the construction industry due to current global and national economic conditions. The market volatility has resulted in unknown material costs day-to-day and thus, asphalt and steel suppliers are increasing prices to account for the ever-changing prices. On a regional level, there is a shortage of ready-mix concrete suppliers in Westchester County, which has led to less competitive bidding and increased material costs for concrete items. Therefore, \$1,350,000 in additional appropriations are needed to award the construction contract.

Your Committee is further advised that the Amended Bond Act, prepared by the law firm of Hawkins, Delafield & Wood LLP, would finance additional construction management and construction costs associated with the rehabilitation of the Tuckahoe Road bridge over the Bronx River. The work includes the complete removal and replacement of the pavement, fill, sidewalks and waterproofing membrane, the removal and replacement of deteriorated concrete on the structure, address erosion and scour problems with riprap and bioremediation along the banks and stone facing repair and repoint work, as well as additional work and coordination to shut down power and expose, support and protect a high-voltage line (NYPA) on the bridge during construction.

The Department has advised that this bridge, which has an annual daily traffic count ("AADT") of 7,340, is in need of rehabilitation to maintain a safe roadway for the travelling

public. In 2025 the New York State Department of Transportation gave the bridge a condition rating of 4.22 and the bridge has continued to deteriorate. This rating system, using a scale of 1 ("hazardous") through 7 ("new"), is a weighted average of the conditions of an evaluated bridge. A rating below 5 indicates that a bridge requires work and delay of this work could result in the continued deterioration of the bridge.

Your Committee is advised that design has been completed for this project by an outside consultant. Construction is estimated to take eighteen (18) months and shall begin after award and execution of the construction contracts.

It should be noted that your Honorable Board has previously authorized the County to issue bonds for RB03I as follows: Bond Act No. 43-2015 in the amount of \$280,000 which financed the design portion of this project, as amended and restated by Bond Act No. 216-2024 in the total amount of \$3,775,000, to finance the cost of construction and construction management associated with this project. No bonds have been issued under the previous bond acts. Accordingly, authority is now requested to amend Bond Act No. 216-2024 to increase the amount authorized thereunder by \$1,350,000, for a total authorized amount, as amended, of \$5,125,000.00, to include additional construction and construction management costs necessary to complete this project.

The Department of Planning has advised your Committee that based on its review, the authorization of the proposed referenced capital project may be classified as a Type "II" action pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617 ("SEQR"). Therefore, no environmental review is required. Your Committee has reviewed the annexed SEQR documentation and concurs with this recommendation.

The Planning Department has further advised your Committee that the Planning Board has previously reviewed this project and issued a report, and that since there is no change in the scope of the work but simply a change in the financing plan, no further action by the Planning Board is necessary at this time.

Your Committee has carefully considered the proposed Capital Budget Amendment, as well as the related Amended Bond Act, and recommends approval of both proposed Acts, noting that the Amended Bond Act may only be enacted following adoption of the Capital Budget Amendment. It

should also be noted that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of your Honorable Board is required in order to amend the County's Capital Budget and to adopt the Amended Bond Act.

HONORABLE BOARD OF LEGISLATORS THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK

Your Committee is in receipt of a transmittal from the County Executive recommending approval of an act, which, if adopted, will authorize the County of Westchester ("County") to amend the County's current-year capital budget ("Capital Budget Amendment"), as well as adopt a related amended bond act (the "Amended Bond Act") in the total amount of \$6,400,000, which includes \$4,750,000 in previously authorized bonds of the County, to finance capital project RB04D – Park Avenue Viaduct Over Bronx River Parkway, Yonkers (BIN3348850) ("RB04D").

Your Committee is advised that the Capital Budget Amendment will amend the County's current-year capital budget to increase the County share for RB04D by \$1,650,000. The Department of Public Works and Transportation ("Department") has advised that the bids received for the construction contract exceeded the available funding for the project. There have been significant material cost increases across the construction industry due to current global and national economic conditions. The market volatility has resulted in unknown material costs day-to-day and thus, asphalt and steel suppliers are increasing prices to account for the ever-changing prices. On a regional level, there is a shortage of ready-mix concrete suppliers in Westchester County, which has led to less competitive bidding and increased material costs for concrete items. Therefore, \$1,650,000 in additional appropriations are needed to award the construction contract.

Your Committee is further advised that the Amended Bond Act, prepared by the law firm of Hawkins, Delafield & Wood LLP, would finance additional construction management and construction costs associated with the rehabilitation of the concrete arch and abutments, waterproofing of the concrete arch, installing new pavement and sidewalks and associated work.

The Department has advised that this bridge, which has an annual daily traffic count ("AADT") of 2,710, is in need of rehabilitation to maintain a safe roadway for the travelling public. In 2025 the New York State Department of Transportation gave the bridge a condition rating of 4.03 and the bridge has continued to deteriorate. This rating system, using a scale of 1 ("hazardous") through 7 ("new"), is a weighted average of the conditions of an evaluated bridge.

A rating below 5 indicates that a bridge requires work and delay of this work could result in the continued deterioration of the bridge.

Your Committee is advised that design has been completed for this project by an outside consultant. Construction is estimated to take eighteen (18) months and shall begin after award and execution of the construction contracts.

It should be noted that your Honorable Board has previously authorized the County to issue bonds for RB04D as follows: Bond Act No. 21-2023 in the amount of \$875,000 to finance the design portion of this project, as amended and restated by Bond Act No. 182-2024 in the total amount of \$4,750,000, to finance the estimated cost associated with this project. No bonds have been issued under the previous bond acts. Accordingly, authority is now requested to amend Bond Act No. 182-2024 to increase the amount authorized thereunder by \$1,650,000, for a total authorized amount, as amended, of \$6,400,000.00, to include additional construction and construction management costs necessary to complete this project.

The Department of Planning has advised your Committee that based on its review, the authorization of the proposed referenced capital project may be classified as a Type "II" action pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617 ("SEQR"). Therefore, no environmental review is required. Your Committee has reviewed the annexed SEQR documentation and concurs with this recommendation.

The Planning Department has further advised your Committee that the Planning Board has previously reviewed this project and issued a report, and that since there is no change in the scope of the work but simply a change in the financing plan, no further action by the Planning Board is necessary at this time.

Your Committee has carefully considered the proposed Capital Budget Amendment, as well as the related Amended Bond Act, and recommends approval of both proposed Acts, noting that the Amended Bond Act may only be enacted following adoption of the Capital Budget Amendment. It should also be noted that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of your Honorable Board is required in order to amend the County's Capital Budget and to adopt the

Amended Bond Act.

The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and provision shall be made annually in the budgets of the County by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the notes and bonds to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 7. The validity of the bonds authorized by this Act and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

- (a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or
- (b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this Act or a summary hereof, are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

(c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 8. This Act shall take effect in accordance with Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter.

Section (B). The amendment of the bond act set forth in Section (A) of this act shall in no way affect the validity of the liabilities incurred, obligations issued, or action taken pursuant to said bond act, and all such liabilities incurred, obligations issued, or action taken shall be deemed to have been incurred, issued or taken pursuant to said bond act, as so amended.

Section (C). This Act shall take effect in accordance with Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter.

WHEREAS, this Board has heretofore duly authorized the issuance of \$4,750,000 bonds to finance the design, construction management and construction for the rehabilitation of the concrete arch and abutments; waterproofing of the concrete arch; installing new pavement and sidewalks; and associated work necessary for the rehabilitation of the Park Avenue Viaduct over the Bronx River Parkway, in Yonkers, pursuant to Act No. 182-2024 duly adopted on September 30, 2024; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to increase the amount of bonds to be issued and the appropriation for such project for the estimated cost of such improvement;

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), AS FOLLOWS:

Section (A). The bond act duly adopted by this Board on September 30, 2024, entitled:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (the "Law"), the Westchester County Administrative Code, being Chapter 852 of the Laws of 1948, as amended, and to the

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provisions of other laws applicable thereto; \$6,400,000 bonds of the County, or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby authorized to be issued to finance the rehabilitation of the Park Avenue Viaduct over the Bronx River Parkway, in Yonkers, including the design, construction management and construction for the rehabilitation of the concrete arch and abutments; waterproofing of the concrete arch; installing new pavement and sidewalks, all as set forth in the County's Current Year Capital Budget, as amended. To the extent that the details set forth in this act are inconsistent with any details set forth in the Current Year Capital Budget of the County, such Budget shall be deemed and is hereby amended. The estimated maximum cost of said specific object or purpose, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof is \$6,400,000. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$6,400,000 bonds herein authorized; and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds and the levy of a tax to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds and notes.

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness of said specific object or purpose, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 10 of the Law, is forty (40) years;

Section 3. Current funds are not required to be provided as a down payment pursuant to Section 107.00 d. 9. of the Law prior to issuance of the bonds authorized herein, or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds. The County intends to finance, on an interim basis, the costs or a portion of the costs of said improvements for which bonds are herein authorized, which costs are reasonably expected to be reimbursed with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County, pursuant to this Act, in the maximum amount of \$6,400,000. This Act is a declaration of official intent adopted pursuant to the requirements of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2.

Section 4. The estimate of \$6,400,000 as the estimated maximum cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is hereby approved.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of this Act and of the Law, and pursuant to the provisions of §30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes or the renewals thereof, and of §\$50.00, 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of said Law, the powers and duties of the County Board of Legislators relative to authorizing the issuance of any notes in anticipation of the sale of the bonds herein authorized, or the renewals thereof, relative to providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, relative to prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the respective amounts of bonds herein authorized, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and relative to executing agreements for credit enhancement, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance of the County, as the chief fiscal officer of the County.

Section 6. Each of the bonds authorized by this Act and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale thereof shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by §52.00 of said Local Finance Law and said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the County of Westchester, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the County. HONORABLE BOARD OF LEGISLATORS THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK

Your Committee is in receipt of a transmittal from the County Executive recommending approval of an act, which, if adopted, will authorize the County of Westchester ("County") to amend the County's current-year capital budget ("Capital Budget Amendment"), as well as adopt a related amended bond act (the "Amended Bond Act") in the total amount of \$5,850,000, which includes \$4,400,000 in previously authorized bonds of the County, to finance capital project RB04J – Tuckahoe Road Bridge Over Bronx River Parkway, Yonkers (BIN 3348000) ("RB04J").

Your Committee is advised that the Capital Budget Amendment will amend the County's current-year capital budget to increase the County share for RB04J by \$1,450,000. The Department of Public Works and Transportation ("Department") has advised that the bids received for the construction contract exceeded the available funding for the project. There have been significant material cost increases across the construction industry due to current global and national economic conditions. The market volatility has resulted in unknown material costs day-to-day and thus, asphalt and steel suppliers are increasing prices to account for the ever-changing prices. On a regional level, there is a shortage of ready-mix concrete suppliers in Westchester County, which has led to less competitive bidding and increased material costs for concrete items. Therefore, \$1,450,000 in additional appropriations are needed to award the construction contract.

Your Committee is further advised that the Amended Bond Act, prepared by the law firm of Hawkins, Delafield & Wood LLP, would finance additional construction management and construction costs associated with the rehabilitation of the existing structure and will address the deterioration of the existing arch, asphalt approach resurfacing, waterproofing of the top of the concrete arch, roadway slab and sidewalks, and associated work.

The Department has advised that this bridge, which has an annual daily traffic count ("AADT") of 7,340, is in need of rehabilitation to maintain a safe roadway for the travelling public. In 2025 the New York State Department of Transportation gave the bridge a condition rating of 4.33 and the bridge has continued to deteriorate. This rating system, using a scale of 1 ("hazardous") through 7 ("new"), is a weighted average of the conditions of an evaluated bridge.

A rating below 5 indicates that a bridge requires work and delay of this work could result in the continued deterioration of the bridge.

Your Committee is advised that design has been completed for this project by an outside consultant. Construction is estimated to take eighteen (18) months and shall begin after award and execution of the construction contracts.

It should be noted that your Honorable Board has previously authorized the County to issue bonds for RB04J as follows: Bond Act No. 151-2023 in the amount of \$525,000 to finance the design portion of this project, as amended by Bond Act No. 223-2024 in the total amount of \$4,400,000, to finance the cost of design, construction and construction management associated with this project. No bonds have been issued under the previous bond acts. Accordingly, authority is now requested to amend Bond Act No. 223-2024 to increase the amount authorized thereunder by \$1,450,000, for a total authorized amount, as amended, of \$5,850,000.00, to include additional construction and construction management costs necessary to complete this project.

The Department of Planning has advised your Committee that based on its review, the authorization of the proposed referenced capital project may be classified as a Type "II" action pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617 ("SEQR"). Therefore, no environmental review is required. Your Committee has reviewed the annexed SEQR documentation and concurs with this recommendation.

The Planning Department has further advised your Committee that the Planning Board has previously reviewed this project and issued a report, and that since there is no change in the scope of the work but simply a change in the financing plan, no further action by the Planning Board is necessary at this time.

Your Committee has carefully considered the proposed Capital Budget Amendment, as well as the related Amended Bond Act, and recommends approval of both proposed Acts, noting that the Amended Bond Act may only be enacted following adoption of the Capital Budget Amendment. It should also be noted that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of your Honorable Board is required in order to amend the County's Capital Budget and to adopt the

Amended Bond Act.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (the "Law"), the Westchester County Administrative Code, being Chapter 852 of the Laws of 1948, as amended, and to the provisions of other laws applicable thereto; \$5,850,000 bonds of the County, or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby authorized to be issued to finance the planning, construction and construction management in connection with the rehabilitation of the Tuckahoe Road Bridge over the Bronx River Parkway in the City of Yonkers, including addressing the deterioration of the existing arch, asphalt approach resurfacing and waterproofing of the top of the concrete arch, roadway slab and sidewalks, and associated work, all as set forth in the County's Current Year Capital Budget, as amended. To the extent that the details set forth in this act are inconsistent with any details set forth in the Current Year Capital Budget of the County, such Budget shall be deemed and is hereby amended. The estimated maximum cost of said specific object or purpose, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof is \$5,850,000. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$5,850,000 bonds herein authorized; and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds and the levy of a tax to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds and notes.

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness of the specific object or purpose for which said \$5,850,000 bonds authorized by this Act are to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 10 of the Law, is forty (40) years;

Section 3. Current funds are not required to be provided as a down payment pursuant to Section 107.00 d. 9. of the Law prior to issuance of the bonds authorized herein, or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds. The County intends to finance, on an interim basis, the costs or a portion of the costs of said improvements for which bonds are herein authorized, which costs are reasonably expected to be reimbursed with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County, pursuant to this Act, in the maximum amount of \$5,850,000. This Act is a declaration of official intent adopted pursuant to the requirements of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2.

Section 4. The estimate of \$5,850,000 as the estimated maximum cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is hereby approved.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of this Act and of the Law, and pursuant to the provisions of §30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes or the renewals thereof, and of §\$50.00, 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of said Law, the powers and duties of the County Board of Legislators relative to authorizing the issuance of any notes in anticipation of the sale of the bonds herein authorized, or the renewals thereof, relative to providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, relative to prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the respective amounts of bonds herein authorized, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and relative to executing agreements for credit enhancement, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance of the County, as the chief fiscal officer of the County.

Section 6. Each of the bonds authorized by this Act and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale thereof shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by

§52.00 of said Local Finance Law and said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the County of Westchester, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the County. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and provision shall be made annually in the budgets of the County by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the notes and bonds to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

- Section 7. The validity of the bonds authorized by this Act and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:
 - (a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or
 - (b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this Act or a summary hereof, are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

- (c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.
- Section 8. This Act shall take effect in accordance with Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter.
- Section (B). The amendment of the bond act set forth in Section (A) of this act shall in no way affect the validity of the liabilities incurred, obligations issued, or action taken

pursuant to said bond act, and all such liabilities incurred, obligations issued, or action taken shall be deemed to have been incurred, issued or taken pursuant to said bond act, as so amended.

Your Committee is in receipt of a communication from the County Executive recommending adoption of "A LOCAL LAW amending the Laws of Westchester County with respect to fees and fines."

Your Committee recognizes that this proposed Local Law is being submitted with the 2026 Proposed Operating Budget, to adjust certain fees and fines in the laws of Westchester County

Specifically, this Local Law adjusts certain fees charged by the Office of Weights and Measures—Consumer Protection and fines issued by the Solid Waste Commission. For the Office of Weights and Measures, the annual fees for electrical licenses are being increased to come into line with what is being charged for plumbing licenses. Your Committee notes that these are the first increases for electrical licenses since 2016. Additionally, the biannual fees for home improvement contractors, together with ancillary fees related thereto, are being increased. These fee increases are to bring the costs closer to what it actually costs the Office of Weights and Measures to oversee the licensing process.

For the Solid Waste Commission, this local law increases the potential fines for second and subsequent adjudications. The Solid Waste Commission has informed the Committee that there is a long history of recidivism among licensed companies using unregistered vehicles and unlicensed haulers who continue to operate in the County despite receiving violations when they get caught. For larger companies, most of those being out-of-state companies, the Commission reports it is currently

more cost effective for these companies to chance receiving repeated \$5,000 fines than to comply

because getting licensed is less expensive than the fines which have not been raised in 26 years.

Increasing the fines for subsequent adjudications will increase the deterrent effect of the fines, increase

compliance, and allow the Commission's enforcement staff to more efficiently and effectively enforce

the Solid Waste Licensing Law.

Your Committee is advised that the proposed Local Law does not meet the definition of an

action under New York State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA") and its implementing

regulations 6 NYCRR Part 617. Please refer to the memorandum from the Department of Planning,

dated January 12, 2023, which is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Legislators. Your Committee

concurs in this conclusion.

Based on the foregoing, your Committee recommends the passage of this Local Law.

LOCAL LAW NO. -2025

A LOCAL LAW amending the Laws of Westchester with respect to fees and fines.

BE IT ENACTED by the County Board of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. Section 863.313 of the Laws of Westchester County is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 863.313. - License required.

- No person shall maintain, conduct, advertise, operate, or engage in the home improvement business within the County of Westchester, or hold himself or herself out as being able to do so, unless such person is licensed pursuant to this Article.
- 2. Upon issuance of a home improvement license under the provisions of this Chapter, the Director or sealer shall issue a vehicle decal for each vehicle identified by the licensee as a vehicle which will be used in connection with the licensed activities. Such vehicle decals shall be conspicuously displayed in or on the vehicle(s) used in connection with the licensed activities during the term of the license. The Director or sealer may impose a fee of \$10.00 for each such decal.

Section 2. Section 863.315 of the Laws of Westchester County is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 863.315. Fees

The non-refundable biannual fee for a license to conduct a home improvement business shall be \$500.00\$750.00, and for each renewal thereof the fee shall be \$500.00\$750.00. The license to conduct a home improvement business shall be for a period of two years and each renewal thereof shall be for two years. The Director or sealer may impose a penalty of \$25.00\$50.00 upon a renewal application received by the Director or sealer later than 15 days prior to the

expiration date of the license sought to be renewed. The fee for issuing a duplicate license for one lost, destroyed or mutilated shall be \$25.00\$50.00.

Section 3. Paragraph A of Subdivision 1 of Section 277.707 of the Laws of Westchester County is amended to read as follows:

A. The fee for a master electrician's license is \$500.00\$600.00.

Section 4. Paragraph J of Subdivision 1 of Section 277.707 of the Laws of Westchester County is amended to read as follows:

J. A master electrician's license may be: (1) renewed annually on or before the expiration of the license upon the payment of a fee of \$500.00\$600.00; or (2) shelved on or before the expiration of the license upon the payment of a fee of \$50.00.

Section 5. Paragraph L of Subdivision 1 of Section 277.707 of the Laws of Westchester County is amended to read as follows:

L. In the event that a master electrician's license issued pursuant to this article has expired, the licensee may renew his or her license for a fee of \$500.00\$600.00 only if: (a) he or she has been actively and continuously engaged in work as a master electrician under the supervision of a licensed master electrician since the issuance of his or her last valid master electrician's license; or (b) he or she has been actively and continuously engaged in work as an inspector of electrical work since the issuance of his or her last valid master electrician's license; or (c) he or she has not been actively or continuously engaged in work as a master electrician during the past two years, but can provide proof acceptable to the board, that he or she has recently participated in a continuing education course updating his or her knowledge of the work of a master electrician.

- **Section 6**. Paragraph A of Subdivision 2 of Section 277.707 of the Laws of Westchester County is amended to read as follows:
 - A. The fee for a special electrician's license is \$350.00\\$450.00.
- Section 7. Paragraph J of Subdivision 2 of Section 277.707 of the Laws of Westchester County is amended to read as follows:
 - J. A special electrician's license may be: (1) renewed annually on or before the expiration of the license upon the payment of a fee of \$350.00\$450.00; or (2) shelved on or before the expiration of the license upon the payment of a fee of \$50.00.
- **Section 8**. Paragraph A of Subdivision 4 of Section 277.707 of the Laws of Westchester County is amended to read as follows:
 - A. The fee for an electrical inspector's license is \$500.00\\$600.00.
- **Section 9.** Paragraph G of Subdivision 4 of Section 277.707 of the Laws of Westchester County is amended to read as follows:
 - G. An electrical inspector's license may be: (1) renewed annually on or before the expiration of the license upon the payment of a fee of (of) \$500.00\$600.00; or (2) shelved on or before the expiration of the license upon the payment of a fee of \$50.00.
- **Section 10**. Paragraph J of Subdivision 4 of Section 277.707 of the Laws of Westchester County is hereby repealed.
- Section 11. Subdivision 1 of Section 826-a.601 of the Laws of Westchester County is amended to read as follows:
 - 1.2. Any person found guilty by a court of competent jurisdiction of conducting Class A, Class B, Class C, Class D, Class E or Class L activities without a duly-issued license, or operating as a solid waste broker without a duly-issued registration, or any licensee or registrant found guilty by a court of violating any of the terms and conditions of its license or

registration, or violation of any provision of this chapter or any emergency suspension order of the commission, shall be guilty of an offense punishable by a fine of not less than \$10,000.00 per offense and/or by imprisonment not exceeding six months. In lieu of, or in addition to, such <u>potential</u> criminal penalties, each person found to be in violation of any provision of this chapter shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than a formal written warning and not more than:

a. \$5,000.00 per violation for a first adjudication;

b. \$10,000.00 per violation for a second adjudication; and

c. \$25,000.00 per violation for a third or subsequent adjudication.

These fines which may be imposed at the discretion of the commission, after hearing as provided in section 826-a.602 of this article. Each day of a continuing violation shall constitute a separate offense or violation and shall be subject to a separate fine and/or civil penalty. Notwithstanding the foregoing sentence, all offenses and violations adjudicated at a single hearing before the commission shall constitute a single adjudication for purposes of the escalating fines.

Section 12. This Local Law shall take effect January 1, 2026.
