Dear Honorable Members of the Board:

I respectfully request that your Honorable Board enact the attached "AN ACT authorizing the County of Westchester to request party status in New York State Electric & Gas Corporation's electric and gas rate cases currently pending before the New York State Public Service Commission."

The New York State Electric & Gas Corporation ("NYSEG") a regulated utility providing electric and gas services in Westchester County, is currently in the last year of a three-year authorization, to increase rates annually for gas and electric services in the Upstate New York and Westchester region. This increase was authorized by the New York State Public Service Commission ("the Commission") in 2023, leading NYSEG to post significant annual revenue and income gains, while County residents have struggled with necessities.

NYSEG recently submitted a petition to the Commission requesting authorization to increase gas and electric rates starting May l, 2026. The proposed increase would cause electricity and gas rates to rise by 23.7% and 33.5%, respectively. The Commission will decide on the final rates after a monthslong administrative process.

As a part of this administrative process, the Commission allows interested municipalities, like the County, to become parties in a utility company's rate case. Unlike members of the public, parties in a rate case can contribute to the development of a complete record in a proceeding by conducting discovery, submitting testimony and other formal written comments, and participating in evidentiary hearings and conferences. Accordingly, to best advocate on behalf of County residents, it is necessary for Westchester County to request party status in NYSEG's electric and gas rate cases currently pending before the Commission (25-E-0375 and 25-G-0378).

In light of the aforementioned, I respectfully urge that your Honorable Board adopt the attached Act.

TO: HONORABLE BOARD OF LEGISLATORS COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER

Your Committee is in receipt of a proposed Act, which if enacted by your Board, would authorize the County of Westchester (the "County") to request party status in New York State Electric & Gas Corporation's ("NYSEG") electric and gas rate cases pending before the New York State Public Service Commission ("the Commission") (25-E-0375 and 25-G-0378).

Your Committee is aware that NYSEG, a regulated utility providing electric and gas services in Westchester County, is currently in the last year of a three-year authorization, to increase rates annually for gas and electric services in the Upstate New York and Westchester region. This increase was authorized by the Commission in 2023 and came shortly after the Commission authorized three years of increases in 2019. Over this six-year period, NYSEG has posted significant annual revenue and income gains, while County residents have struggled with necessities.

Your Committee is informed that NYSEG recently submitted a petition to the Commission requesting authorization to increase gas and electric rates starting May I, 2026. The proposed increase would cause electricity and gas rates to rise by 23.7% and 33.5%, respectively. The Commission will decide on the final rates after a months-long administrative process.

Your Committee is advised that the Commission allows interested municipalities, like the County, to become parties in a utility company's rate case. Unlike members of the public, parties in a rate case can contribute to the development of a complete record in a proceeding by conducting discovery, submitting testimony and other formal written comments, and participating in evidentiary hearings and conferences.

Your committee has determined that to best advocate on behalf of County residents, it is

necessary for Westchester County to request party status in NYSEG's electric and gas rate cases (25-

E-0375 and 25-G-0378).

Your Committee, after careful consideration of the subject matter, recommends adoption of

this Act and recommends authorizing the County to submit the necessary forms and documentation

to request party status in NYSEG's electric and gas rate cases pending before the Commission (25-E-

0375 and 25-G-0378).

An affirmative vote of the majority of the Board is required to pass this legislation.

§ 2. The County of Westchester, through a duly designated representative, is hereby authorized to submit the necessary forms and documentation to request party status in in New York State Electric & Gas Corporation's electric and gas rate cases currently pending before the New York State Public Service Commission (25-E-0375 and 25-G-0378).

§ 3. Effective date. This Act shall take effect immediately.

Dear Honorable Members of the Board:

I respectfully request that your Honorable Board adopt the attached "A LOCAL LAW amending the Laws of Westchester County by adding a new Chapter 643 to provide a civil penalty for the theft of services in relation to Westchester County's Bee-Line Bus System" ("Bee-Line").

Bee-Line's mission is to facilitate the efficient and economical movement of people through a balanced and environmentally sensitive transportation system. According to a 2025 report by the Westchester County Department of Public Works and Transportation, the Bee-Line has an average daily ridership of 85,000, and serves well over 3,000 bus stops, touching the lives of many of Westchester's residents.

For some time now, the Bee-Line has experienced a large number of fare violations (non-payment). This has been caused by both confusions over the free bus program over the summer, and also malfeasance. Regardless of the cause, fare evasion weakens the financial health of Westchester County and encourages unlawful behavior on the Bee-Line buses.

Under New York State law, individuals who do not pay the fare can be charged with Theft of Services, in violation of Section 165.15 of the New York State Penal Law ("Penal Law"), which is a Class "A" Misdemeanor. However, the County is seeking to invoke its power under the Laws of Westchester County to create a civil penalty, as opposed to using criminal proceedings, especially where the majority of the violations are being committed by students and passengers who may be financially unable to pay the fare. Westchester County is taking this course of action because it strongly opposes the criminalization of poverty, and is working hard to reduce youth interactions with the criminal justice system.

This proposed legislation will encourage fare compliance and enhance overall safety aboard Bee-Line buses; we do not seek use the Penal Law to criminalize non-compliance. Accordingly, the proposed amendment adds a new Chapter to the Laws of Westchester County, which establishes a civil penalty of \$50 for the non-payment of a fare, that will increase to \$100 for every subsequent violation. The proposed amendment also authorizes County and local law enforcement to issue appearance tickets to violators, who could simply pay a fine or appear in a local court to answer the ticket.

Your Committee has reviewed the attached, "A LOCAL LAW amending the Laws of Westchester County by adding a new Chapter 643 to provide a civil penalty for the theft of services in relation to Westchester County's Bee-Line Bus System."

Your Committee recognizes that Bee-Line's mission is to facilitate the efficient and economic movement of people through a transportation system that supports the environment and meets the diverse needs of Westchester's residents. According to a 2025 report by the Westchester County Department of Public Works and Transportation, the Bee-Line has an average daily ridership of 85,000 people. The Bee line features more than 3,000 bus stops, directly and indirectly impacting all of Westchester's residents by connecting us to New York City and expanding available economic opportunities in corners of the County which are otherwise difficult to reach.

Your Committee is advised that, under New York State law, individuals who do not pay the fare can be charged with Theft of Services, in violation of Section 165.15 of the New York State Penal Law ("Penal Law"), which is a Class "A" Misdemeanor. The goal of this proposed legislation is to create a civil penalty, as opposed to utilizing existing criminal proceedings; we find this course of action advisable as the majority of fare violations are being committed by students and passengers who may be financially unable to pay the fare.

Your Committee is advised that enforcing a criminal penalty for evading \$2.75 fares through the criminal justice system is likely to have serious consequences for the County. Only 26% of juveniles arrested ended up graduating from high school; worse, those convicted of a Misdemeanor will struggle to get into college, struggle to secure reliable employment, and struggle to secure housing they can

afford. Failing out of high school, or uniform rejection from colleges, jobs and housing will virtually

ensure a young person will reoffend - meaning that even one Misdemeanor can uproot a life.

Your Committee is further advised that the purpose of this legislation is to encourage fare

compliance and enhance overall safety aboard Bee-Line buses; we do not seek to use the Penal Law

to criminalize non-compliance. Accordingly, the proposed amendment adds a new Chapter to the

Laws of Westchester County, which establishes a civil penalty of \$50 for the non-payment of a fare,

that will increase to \$100 for every subsequent violation. This proposed amendment also authorizes

County and local law enforcement to issue appearance tickets to violators, who could simply pay a

fine or appear in a local court to answer the ticket.

As you know, this Honorable Board must comply with the requirements of the State

Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA"). The proposed act does not meet the definition of an

action under New York State Environmental Quality Review Act and its implementing regulations 6

NYCRR Part 617. Please refer to the memorandum from the Department of Planning dated January

14, 2025, which is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Legislators."

The Clerk of the Board shall cause notice of the time and date of such hearing to be published at least once in one or more newspapers published in the County of Westchester and selected by the Clerk of the Board for that purpose in the manner and time required by law.

A LOCAL LAW amending the Laws of Westchester County by adding a new Chapter 643 to provide a civil penalty for the theft of services in relation to Westchester County's Bee-Line Bus System.

BE IT ENACTED by the County Board of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. A new Chapter 643 is hereby added to the Laws of Westchester County as follows:

Chapter 643

THEFT OF SERVICES ON COUNTY'S BEE-LINE BUS SYSTEM

Sec. 643.01. Purpose.

Sec. 643.21 Definitions.

Sec. 643.31. Entry; Payment of fare.

Sec. 643.41. Enforcement and penalty

Sec. 643.51. Severability.

Sec. 643.01. - Purpose

The purpose of this Chapter is to deter the non-payment of fares in relation to the Bee-Line

Bus System which is owned and operated by Westchester County. The County seeks to achieve that

deterrence through the implementation of a civil penalty as an alternative to using the New York State

Penal Law to criminalize non-compliance.

Sec. 643.21. – Definitions.

- a. County shall mean Westchester County.
- b. Bee-Line shall mean the bus transportation system, known as the Bee-Line System, Bee-Line

 Bus System, or Bee-Line Transit Service, which is owned and operated by the County.
- c. Fare means the lawful charges established by the County for use of the Bee-Line.

d. Fare media means the various instruments issued by or on behalf of the Bee-Line to use for the payment of fare, including, but not limited to, United States coins and currency, OMNY, MetroCards, farecards, passes, transfers, tickets, and vouchers.

Sec. 643.31. – Entry; payment of fare

It shall be unlawful for any person to: (1) attempt to or obtain Bee-Line service without payment of the fare therefor; (2) avoid payment of the fare for such transportation service which has been rendered to them; (3) obtain or attempt to obtain such service or avoid or attempt to avoid payment therefor by force, intimidation, stealth, deception or mechanical tampering of fare media or faire collection device; or (4) unjustifiably fail or refuse to pay a fare.

Sec. 643.41. - Enforcement and penalty.

- 1. Violators of this Chapter may be issued appearance tickets by police officers of the Westchester County Department of Public Safety and municipal police departments within the County. Such appearance tickets shall be returnable in the local court of the jurisdiction where the violation occurred.
- 2. Any person who violates this Chapter shall be guilty of an offense and shall, upon conviction, be subject to a civil penalty not exceeding \$50 for the first offense and not exceeding \$100 for the second offense and all subsequent offenses.

Sec. 643.41. - Severability.

If any word, phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, section, or part of this Chapter shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part thereof directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered.

Section 2. Effective Date. This Local Law shall take effect immediately.
