I. ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION

1. <u>ACT-2021-204</u> <u>ACT-Agrmnt-Co. of Westchester & Local 456 Teamsters</u>

AN ACT approving certain financial terms and conditions of employment requiring legislative approval by law in a Collective Bargaining Agreement for those employees of Westchester County represented by the Local 456, International Brotherhood of Teamsters for the five (5) year period commencing January 1, 2021 and ending December 31, 2025. *Submitted by COMMITTEES ON BUDGET & APPROPRIATIONS AND LABOR & HOUSING*

Vincent Toomey appeared before the Committee to discuss item #2021-589-ACT-Agrmnt-Co. of Westchester & Local 456 Teamsters. He discussed that this agreement was negotiated and ratified by Teamsters Local 456, covering the term from January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2025. Tis is a fairly short agreement with only three substantive provisions: Wages, Holidays With Pay, and Health Insurance. The wage increase includes a 2% increase in 2021, another 2% increase in 2022, then it trickles up to 2.50% in 2023, then another 2.50% in 2024, and then it is another 2% in 2025. The average increase over the life if this agreement is 2.3%. The Holidays With Pay section is covering the addition of the nineteenth day of June, known as Juneteenth, which shall be considered a holiday with pay for all employees regularly scheduled to work on that date. All employees required to work on the nineteenth of June will receive their regular straight time pay for the day and will be granted an additional day off (hour for hour). The Health Insurance section covers the sixteen employees who were previously Teamsters Local 456 bargaining unit members and contributed 12.5% of the cost of the premium or premium equivalent for health insurance and were subsequently promoted to the non-bargaining unit position of senior assistant county attorney from 2018 to 2021, shall, in the event they return to a Teamsters Local 456 bargaining unit position on or after September 1, 2021, be required to contribute 15% of the premium or premium equivalent.

2. <u>ACT-2021-194</u> <u>ACT - Lawsuit Settlement of Rodriguez v. Liberty Lines</u>

AN ACT authorizing the settlement of the lawsuit Laura Rodriguez v. Liberty Lines, Inc., et al., in the amount of FOUR HUNDRED THOUSAND(\$400,000) DOLLARS. Submitted by COMMITTEES ON BUDGET & APPROPRIATIONS AND LAW & MAJOR CONTRACTS

Mr. Nonna said that the plaintiff claimed she was injured after being hit by the rear door while exiting a Liberty Lines bus. The County paid \$50,000 for no fault, and since this is an older case, the remainder of our self-insured retention of \$250,000 is just under \$200,000. RLI, the

County's excess carrier, determined that it would pay an additional \$200,000. Mr. Nonna said he is unsure if RLI made the right call, but is following their lead in agreeing to settle because if we turn down RLI's settlement and go to trial, and the verdict is in excess of our self-insured retention amount, we are responsible. He noted that the plaintiff had surgery, which ran up the cost of potential damages. There is a question whether the surgery had to do with a prior condition, but there was conflicting expert testimony on that.

Mr. Nonna said he had asked for documentation of what happened to the driver. He learned that the driver was brought up on a complaint of negligence, an internal hearing was held with the union and Liberty Lines, and the driver was found to not be at fault. Mr. Nonna does not think that anyone from the County was there, and is not sure if we were entitled to be there. He will follow up with risk management on how the hearing was conducted. No action was taken against driver except for additional training on how to open and close the rear doors.

Legislator Barr asked if there is any scenario where we could pay less. Mr. Nonna said the plaintiff's original demand was \$3 million, so she probably wouldn't settle for \$200,000. He reiterated the risk of a liability if a there is a judgment exceeding our self-retention amount, and since this is an older case, the County could also have to pay legal fees.

Legislator Maher asked if there was a video. Mr. Nonna said there was, and the union said it was viewed by all parties to the hearing, and the union determined after viewing it that it was unlikely the passenger was injured by the rear doors.

Mr. Nonna noted that the Law Department is enhancing its oversight of Liberty Lines cases, particularly the older cases, by making sure they get earlier reports and more frequent updates. Legislator Shimsky asked that we also get details of what remedial action is taken in these cases. Mr. Nonna noted that the union objected to us getting the hearing report in this case.

3. <u>ACT-2021-203</u> <u>ACT - Lawsuit Settlement - Phoenix Transportation Services, Inc.</u>

AN ACT authorizing the County Attorney to settle an action on behalf of the County of Westchester (the "County"), against Phoenix Transportation Services, Inc. ("Phoenix") and Platte River Insurance Company ("Platte River") for the total amount of THREE HUNDRED FORTY THOUSAND (\$340,000) DOLLARS, regarding breach of an obligation under a payment and performance bond relating to a breach of an agreement by, and termination of an agreement with, Phoenix, dated September 1, 2017 for which Platte River is the Surety. *Submitted by COMMITTEES ON BUDGET & APPROPRIATIONS AND LAW & MAJOR CONTRACTS*

Mr. Carey explained that the County had a five-year contract starting on September 1, 2017 with Phoenix to provide school bus services, and Platte River was the surety for the contract. In September 2019, due to financial difficulties. Phoenix's owner advised the County that unless it immediately paid Phoenix's outstanding August invoices. Phoenix would be unable to pick up the children it dropped off that morning. To avoid that, the County paid, and Phoenix performed for the remainder of September 2019. At the same time, the County located available vendors to provide county-wide bus service on almost no notice and set up emergency contracts. By October 1, 2019, those contracts were in place, the contract with Phoenix was terminated for cause, and the County reached out to Platte River to demand reimbursement for the additional expenses it would incur, including higher per-route expenses. In November 2020, Phoenix sued the County for improperly terminating the contract. The County impleaded Platte River and asserted counterclaims against Phoenix, including the full amount of damages it incurred during the 2019-20 school year: \$460,959.48. As asserted against Platte River, that amount was capped at the penal sum of the performance bond: \$441,017.83. As against Phoenix, that amount was limited by Phoenix's complete inability to pay. In a 10-hour mediation on October 18, 2021, Platte River agreed to pay the County \$340,000, representing approximately 77% of the penal sum of the bond, and the County agreed to release Platte River and Phoenix from all liability. While Platte River will retain the ability to pursue Phoenix and several individuals associated with Phoenix who personally guaranteed the bond, acceptance of the settlement will fully release the County from further litigation regarding this matter.

Legislator Barr asked if this would fully resolve all claims against Phoenix, and if we have any other bids from them. Mr. Carey said it would, and he thinks there are no outstanding bids. Legislator Barr suggested he confirm that.

4. <u>ACT-2021-195</u> <u>ACT - Retainer Amendment - Standard Amusement</u>

AN ACT authorizing the County to amend an agreement with the law firm of Paul, Weiss, Rifkind, Wharton & Garrison LLP, pursuant to which the firm was retained, at County expense, to serve in an "of counsel" capacity to the County Attorney, as needed, in connection with the bankruptcy filing by Standard Amusements LLC in the United States Bankruptcy Court for the Southern District of NY, by increasing the authorized not-to-exceed amount of the agreement by NINETY THOUSAND (\$90,000) DOLLARS.

Joint with LMC & PR Guest: County Attorney John Nonna *Mr.* Nonna said that from February through April 2021, Paul, Weiss partner Elizabeth Sacksteder participated with the County Attorney's office in multiple meetings before several Board of Legislators committees to explain and answer questions about the revised Playland Management Agreement. Ms. Sacksteder was also involved in negotiations with Standard Amusements and over revisions to the Management Agreement requested by the legislators. This work amounts, through June, to \$69,446.83 in currently-owed fees. Mr. Nonna noted that since then, all transition work has been handled by him and Tami Altschiller.

Legislator Barr asked Mr. Nonna to discuss the discount we received from Paul Weiss, and Mr. Nonna said it was originally 15% but it went up to 20%.

Legislator Tubiolo asked if we could decrease costs in the future by hiring more attorneys in a new bankruptcy division. Mr. Nonna noted that we don't have enough bankruptcy cases to make it worthwhile to hire lawyers who are experts in bankruptcy. Legislator Maher asked if the County attorneys take CLE classes in bankruptcy, and Mr. Nonna said even if they did, they would not have the expertise to go up against a major New York law firm that specializes in bankruptcy.

5. <u>ACT-2021-197</u> CBA-BLR10-Labs & Research Infrast. Improvements '17-'21

AN ACT amending the 2021 County Capital Budget Appropriations for Capital Project BLR10 -Labs & Research Infrastructure Improvements 2017-2021. Submitted by COMMITTEES ON BUDGET & APPROPRIATIONS, PUBLIC WORKS & TRANSPORTATION AND ENVIRONMENT & HEALTH

Dr. Aleksandar Milovanovic and Robert Abbamont appeared before the Committee to discuss item #2021-546-CBA-BLR10-Labs & Research Infrastructure Improvements (2017-2021) and item #2021-547-BOND ACT(Amended)-BLR10-Labs & Research Infrastructure Improvements (2017-2021). The act will amend the County's current-year capital budget, as well as adoption

if a related amended bond act in the total amount of \$1,000,000, to finance this capital project. The Capital Budget Amendment will amend the increase the County share for BLR10 by \$400,000. The increase is required because of the bids received. The original intent was to rehabilitate the existing equipment, however, during design and in consultation with the original equipment manufacturer, it was determined that it would be prudent to replace the existing equipment, which is over forty years old and is leaking conditioned air from its joints. The Department advises that this is necessary to ensure that the Microbiology Laboratory remains in compliance with instrument parameters and New York State Clinical Laboratory Evaluation Program requirements. The instrumentaton used in the lab may only operate within very strict humidity ranges. Testing performed outside of those ranges are subject to erroneous results. The new equipment will use a variable frequency drive, newer coil technology. The newer equipment will eliminate the hot water heating completely and use existing team at the facility, and thereby will be more energy-efficient. Design has been completed by in-house staff. It is estimated that construction will take four months to complete and will begin after award and execution of construction contracts.

10. ACT-2021-202 ACT-Amend Lease Agrmnt-Police Vehicles-Mount Vernon

AN ACT authorizing the County of Westchester to amend an agreement with the City of Mount Vernon in order to increase the number of police vehicles leased to the City of Mt. Vernon, and also to correct certain clerical errors contained in Schedule "A" of the Agreement. **Submitted by COMMITTEES ON BUDGET & APPROPRIATIONS AND PUBLIC SAFETY**

Guests: Commissioner Ann Marie Berg & Martin Connelly - Department of Finance Captain William McGuinness appeared before the Committee to discuss item #2021-587-ACT-Amend Lease Agreement-Police Vehicles-Mount Vernon. This Act will authorize the County to amend its lease agreement with the City of Mount Vernon, wherein the County leased certain police vehicles to Mt. Vernon for use by the Mt. Vernon Police Department in its daily patrol operations, in order to increase the number of police vehicles leased by the County to Mt. Vernon from four to seven and also correct certain clerical errors contained in Schedule "A" of the Agreement. Captain McGuinness advised that the Department of Public Safety has determined that there are three additional vehicles that are no longer necessary to meet the operational demands of the Department but are still in good working order. Mt. Vernon continues to be unable to purchase new vehicles at the present time due to budgetary constraints and has requested the additional vehicles for its daily patrol operations. He added that pursuant to the terms of the agreement, the County will lease the additional vehicles in its "AS IS" condition and Mt. Vernon will pay the County \$1.00. Mt. Vernon will operate, repair and maintain the additional vehicles as required. Mt. Vernon will be responsible to register the additional vehicles and maintain insurance naming the County as additional insured. Mt. Vernon will also indemnify, hold harmless and defend the County against any claims resulting from Mt. Vernon's use and/or maintenance of the additional vehicles. Title of the additional vehicles will remain with the County and at the expiration of the agreement, on April 14, 2026, all leased vehicles, including the additional vehicles, will be returned to the County.

Legislator Woodson-Samuels stated that the fleet being used in Mt. Vernon currently is dilapidated and somewhat out of date, so the four previously acquired and these additional three will go a long way in helping the police officers. He added that public safety is a prerequisite for prosperity and this can help us move in the right direction as a municipality. Legislator Tubiolo stated that he agrees with his colleague Legislator Woodson-Samuels and that this is a wonderful opportunity for the City of Mt. Vernon.
