Your Committee is in receipt of a communication from the County Executive recommending the approval of an Act which would authorize the County of Westchester ("County") acting by and through its Department of Public Safety Services ("Department"), to amend an intermunicipal agreement ("IMA") with the Hendrick Hudson School District ("District") whereby the County agreed to assign one (1) regularly employed uniformed police officer to act as the School Resource Officer ("SRO") at the District's Hendrick Hudson High School (hereinafter the "School") for a five (5) year term commencing upon the opening day of school in September, 2018 and continuing through the last day of school in June, 2023 (the "IMA Term"), by assigning one (1) additional SRO to the District's Blue Mountain Middle School and Furnace Woods Elementary School beginning in September, 2022 for the remainder of the IMA Term.

Your Committee is advised that by Act No. 2018-144, your Honorable Board authorized the County, through the Department, to enter into an IMA with the District pursuant to which the County would assign one (1) regularly employed uniformed police officer to act as the SRO for the District at the School for the IMA Term. Act No. 2018-144 further authorized the SRO assigned to the School to provide services eight (8) hours per day on the days that school is in session for the period commencing upon the opening of school in September through the last day of school in June (the "School Term") in accordance with the District's annual school calendar, for each year of the IMA Term. In consideration for services rendered, the District agreed to pay the County as follows:

- (i) For the 2018/2019 School Term, a total amount of One Hundred Forty-Five Thousand Four Hundred Twenty-Eight (\$145,428.00) Dollars, payable in two installments of \$72,714.00 each.
- (ii) For the 2019/2020 School Term, a total amount of One Hundred Forty-Nine Thousand Four Hundred Twenty-Seven (\$149,427.00) Dollars, payable in two installments of \$74,713.50 each.
- (iii) For the 2020/2021 School Term, a total amount of One Hundred Fifty-Three Thousand Five Hundred Thirty-Six (\$153,536.00) Dollars, payable in two installments of \$76,768.00 each.
- (iv) For the 2021/2022 School Term, a total amount of One Hundred Fifty-Seven Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty-Eight (\$157,758.00) Dollars, payable in two installments of \$78,879.00 each.
- (v) For the 2022/2023 School Term, a total amount of One Hundred Sixty-Two Thousand Ninety-Seven (\$162,097.00) Dollars, payable in two installments of \$81,048.50 each.

Your Committee is advised that due to rising public safety concerns, the District has requested and the Department has agreed to add one (1) additional SRO to be assigned to the District's Blue Mountain Middle School and Furnace Woods Elementary School during the School Term beginning in September, 2022 and for the remainder of the IMA Term. In consideration for services to be rendered by the original SRO as well as the one (1) new SRO for the remainder of the IMA Term, the District has agreed to pay the County as follows:

For the 2022/2023 School Term, an additional sum of \$162,096.50, thereby increasing the total amount payable by the District to the County from \$162,097.00 to \$324,193.50, payable in two equal installments of \$162,096.75 each.

Except as specifically amended hereby, all remaining terms and conditions of the IMA shall remain in full force and effect.

The Planning Department has advised that based on its review, the proposed amendment to the IMA does not meet the definition of an "action" under the State Environmental Quality Review Act, 6 NYCRR part 617. As such, no environmental review is required. Please refer to the memorandum from the Department of Planning dated January 14, 2022, which is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Legislators.

Your Committee has been advised that passage of the attached Act requires an affirmative vote of a majority of the members of your Honorable Board.

Your Committee has carefully considered the proposed Act and recommends your Honorable Board's favorable action on the annexed Act.

1. 34

An ACT authorizing the County of Westchester to amend an intermunicipal agreement with the Hendrick Hudson School District whereby the County agreed to assign one (1) regularly employed uniformed police officer to act as the School Resource Officer for the District for a five (5) year term commencing in September, 2018, by assigning one (1) additional School Resource Officer to the District beginning in September, 2022 and for the remainder of the IMA term.

BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Legislators of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. The County of Westchester ("County"), acting by and through its Department of Public Safety Services ("Department"), is hereby authorized to amend an intermunicipal agreement ("IMA") with the Hendrick Hudson School District ("District") whereby the County agreed to assign one (1) regularly employed uniformed police officer to act as the School Resource Officer ("SRO") for the District at the District's Hendrick Hudson High School for a term commencing on the first day of school in September, 2018 and continuing through the last day of school in June, 2023 (the "IMA Term") at agreed upon annual rates, by assigning one (1) additional SRO to the District beginning in September, 2022 and for balance of the IMA Term, thereby increasing the total number of SROs for this period from one (1) to two (2).

§2. Beginning in September, 2022 and for balance of the IMA Term, one (1) SRO shall continue to be assigned to the District's Hendrick Hudson High School and one (1) SRO shall be assigned to the District's Blue Mountain Middle School and Furnace Woods Elementary School.

§3. Both SROs shall provide services eight (8) hours per day on the days that school is in session for the period commencing upon the opening day of school in September through the last day of school in June (the "School Term") in accordance with the District's annual school calendar, for the remaining year of the IMA Term.

§4. In consideration for services to be rendered by the original SRO as well as the one (1) new SRO, the District has agreed to pay the County as follows:

For the 2022/2023 School Term, an additional sum of \$162,096.50, thereby increasing the total amount payable by the District to the County from \$162,097.00 to \$324,193.50, payable in two equal installments of \$162,096.75 each.

§5. Except as otherwise specifically amended hereby, all remaining terms and conditions set forth in the IMA shall remain in full force and effect upon the parties.

§6. The County Executive or his authorized designee is hereby authorized and empowered to execute all instruments and to take all action necessary and appropriate to effectuate the purposes hereof.

§7. This Act shall take effect immediately.

and

HENDRICK HUDSON SCHOOL DISTRICT, having an office and place of business at 61 Trolley Road, Montrose, New York 10548 (hereinafter referred to as the "District")

WHEREAS, pursuant to New York State Education Law Section 2801-a, a school district is required to develop a comprehensive school safety plan and as part of such a plan include prevention and intervention strategies such as entering into collaborative arrangements with state and local law enforcement officers designed to ensure school safety officers and other security personnel are trained to, among other things, de-escalate potentially violent situations; and

WHEREAS, on or about September 26, 2018, the County and the District entered into an intermunicipal agreement (the "IMA") pursuant to which the County, through the Department, agreed to provide the services of one (1) regularly employed uniformed County Police Officer to act as the School Resource Officer ("SRO") for the District at the District's Hendrick Hudson High School for a five (5) year term commencing upon the opening of school in September, 2018 and continuing through the last day of school in June, 2023 (the "IMA Term"); and

WHEREAS, the parties now desire to amend the IMA in order to add one (1) additional SRO to the District beginning in September, 2022 for the balance of the IMA Term.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms and conditions herein contained, the IMA is hereby amended as follows:

1. Beginning in September, 2022 and for the remainder of the IMA Term (the "Balance of the IMA Term"), the County agrees to assign one (1) additional SRO to the District, thereby increasing the total number of SROs during this period from one (1) to two (2) (the "Additional Services").

2. During the Balance of the IMA Term, one (1) SRO shall continue to be assigned to the District's Hendrick Hudson High School and one (1) SRO shall be assigned to both the District's Blue Mountain Middle School and Furnace Woods Elementary School.

3. The Additional Services shall be performed by the County beginning on the opening day of school in September through the last day of school in June (the "School Term") in accordance with the District's annual school calendar, for the Balance of the IMA Term.

4. In consideration for the Additional Services to be rendered by the County to the District during the Balance of the IMA Term, the District agrees to pay the County as follows:

For the 2022/2023 School Term, an additional sum of \$162,096.50, thereby increasing the total amount payable by the District to the County from \$162,097.00 to \$324,193.50, payable in two equal installments of \$162,096.75 each.

5. Except as otherwise specifically amended hereby, all remaining terms and conditions set forth in the IMA shall remain in full force and effect upon the parties.

6. This Amendment shall not be enforceable until signed by both parties and approved by the Office of the County Attorney.

PROJECT/ACTION: Amendment of an intermunicipal agreement between the County, acting by and through its Department of Information and Technology, and the Town of Bedford, which finances the preparation of a Wireless Telecommunications Master Plan for multiple municipalities in the northern half of the County. The "Study Area" currently includes the Town of Bedford, Town of Lewisboro, Town of North Salem, Village of Mount Kisco, Town of Pound Ridge, Town of Somers, Town of Yorktown and the Town of New Castle. Under this agreement, the County provides payment to the Town of Bedford to finance the consulting services of CityScape Consultants, Inc., which was retained by the Town of Bedford, acting on behalf of the Study Area communities, to prepare the plan. The plan will facilitate the creation of an optimized telecommunications network and promote efficient deployment practices. The amendment will extend the term of the agreement by six months to allow additional time needed to complete the master plan.

AN ACT to authorize the County of Westchester to amend an intermunicipal agreement with the Town of Bedford, for the preparation of a Wireless Telecommunications Infrastructure Master Plan, for the benefit of certain northern Westchester County communities comprised of the Town of Bedford, Town of Lewisboro, the Town of North Salem, Village of Mount Kisco, the Town of Pound Ridge, the Town of Somers, the Town of Yorktown and the Town of New Castle, in order to further extend the term of the agreement by six (6) months, through June 30, 2023.

BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Legislators of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. The County of Westchester (the "County") is hereby authorized to amend an intermunicipal agreement ("IMA") with the Town of Bedford ("Bedford"), as previously amended, for the preparation of a Wireless Telecommunications Infrastructure Master Plan ("Master Plan") by CityScape Consultants, Inc., for the benefit of certain northern Westchester County communities, comprised of Bedford, the Town of Lewisboro, the Town of North Salem, Village of Mount Kisco, the Town of Pound Ridge, the Town of Somers, the Town of Yorktown and the Town of New Castle ("Study Area"), in order to further extend the term of the IMA by six (6) months, commencing retroactively on January 1, 2023 and expiring on June 30, 2023.

§2. All other terms and conditions of IMA, as previously amended, shall remain unchanged and in full force and effect.

§3. The County Executive or his authorized designee is hereby authorized to execute and deliver all documents and take such actions as he deems necessary or desirable to accomplish the purposes hereof.

§4. This Act shall take effect immediately.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the County and the Town entered into a certain intermunicipal agreement ("Original Agreement") dated October 28, 2020 (the "Effective Date"), wherein the Town, on behalf of the County and all communities within the Study Area (as defined below), agreed to retain CityScape Consultants, Inc. ("CityScape") to develop and provide a Wireless Telecommunications Infrastructure Master Plan (the "Master Plan") benefiting certain Northerm Westchester County communities comprised of the Town of Bedford, Town of Lewisboro, Town of North Salem, Village of Mount Kisco, Town of Pound Ridge, Town of Somers and Town of Yorktown (the "Study Area"), for a term commencing on Effective Date and terminating on December 31, 2021, which pursuant to the Agreement was the earlier date of either December 31, 2021 or the date the Master Plan was to be completed, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$190,170.00; and

WHEREAS, the County and the Town amended Agreement pursuant to a certain First Amendment ("First Amendment"), dated May 12, 2022, in order to: (i) extend the term of the Agreement for one year, commencing retroactively on January 1, 2022 and expiring on December 31, 2022, (ii) expand the scope of services to include the Town of New Castle in the Study Area, and (iii) increase the amount due under the IMA by \$24,592.00, bringing the total

not-to-exceed amount due under the IMA from \$190,170.00 to \$214,762.00 (hereinafter the Original Agreement and the First Amendment shall collectively be referred to as the "Agreement"); and

Transmitted herewith for your review and approval is an Act which, if adopted, would authorize the County of Westchester (the "County"), acting by and through its Department of Emergency Services ("Department"), to enter into a Regional Partnership Agreement ("RPA") with Dutchess County and Putnam County (collectively "Regional Partners") in order to receive funding from the New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services ("DHSES") under the FY2020 Hazardous Materials ("HazMat") Grant Program. As your Honorable Board is aware, Section 119-0 of the New York State General Municipal Law requires your Honorable Board's approval whenever the County enters into intermunicipal agreements ("IMAs") with other municipalities which involve shared services or performing services one for the other.

DHSES is awarding One Hundred Twenty-Two Thousand, Five Hundred (\$122,500.00) Dollars to the County and its Regional Partners. A Resolution authorizing the County to enter into this grant agreement has been submitted to the Board of Acquisition and Contract. The HazMat grant funds will be used for consultant services for HazMat training, and to purchase equipment for the HazMat team, such as laptop computers, decontamination equipment (sprayers, shelters), mitigation equipment (water injection kits, hoses, pumps, saws), detection and identification equipment (detectors, meters) in the region. In addition, the RPA will promote the development of regional partnerships among the State HazMat community and enhance the standing of the State's HazMat teams within the Federal Emergency Management Agency typing system.

Funding for this initiative is provided by the federal Department of Homeland Security's State Homeland Security Program. The term of the RPA will commence upon execution and remain in effect for a period of five (5) years.

Pursuant to the HazMat Grant Program, DHSES will provide funding to the 18 designated Regional HazMat Teams that provide coverage across the State outside of New York City via a non-competitive process. The State has designated the counties of Westchester, Putnam and Dutchess as a Regional Team for the Lower Hudson Valley Region. The County will receive the funds and administer the grant. It should be noted that this grant opportunity builds on progress made by New York State through the FY2008-FY2019 iterations of the HazMat Grant Program. Through this program, DHSES is making \$2 million in federal State Homeland Security Program (SHSP) funding available to the 18 regional HazMat teams located outside of New York City. In total, \$15.5 million has been dedicated to this effort since 2008.

In FY2020, the State will continue to provide funds to all 18 regional HazMat Teams that provide coverage across the State outside of New York City via a non-competitive process. The FY2020 HazMat Grant will serve as a resource for regional HazMat Teams to maintain the existing equipment on their WMD Trailer and/or to build new capabilities.

The Department of Planning has advised that, based on its review, this is classified as a "Type II" action pursuant the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA"), 6 NYCRR Section 617.5(c)(31). Therefore, no further environmental review is required. As you know, your Honorable Board may use such expert advice to reach its own conclusion.

Approval of this legislation will enable the County to strengthen its CBRNE detection, response and decontamination capabilities. Accordingly, I urge passage of the annexed legislation.

Your Committee is in receipt of a communication from the County Executive recommending the approval of an Act which would authorize the County of Westchester (the "County"), acting by and through its Department of Emergency Services ("Department"), to enter into a Regional Partnership Agreement ("RPA") with Dutchess County and Putnam County (collectively "Regional Partners") in order to receive funding from the New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services ("DHSES") under the FY2020 Hazardous Materials ("HazMat") Grant Program. As this Honorable Board is aware, Section 119-0 of the New York State General Municipal Law requires this Honorable Board's approval whenever the County enters into intermunicipal agreements ("IMAs") with other municipalities which involve shared services or performing services one for the other.

Your Committee is advised that DHSES is awarding One Hundred Twenty-Two Thousand, Five Hundred (\$122,500.00) Dollars to the County and its Regional Partners will be used for consultant services for HazMat training, and to purchase equipment for the HazMat team, such as laptop computers, decontamination equipment (sprayers, shelters), mitigation equipment (water injection kits, hoses, pumps, saws), detection and identification equipment (detectors, meters). This program will build sustainable Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, and Explosives ("CBRNE") detection, response and decontamination capabilities in the region. In addition, the RPA will promote the development of regional partnerships among the State HazMat community and enhance the standing of the State's HazMat teams within the Federal Emergency Management Agency typing system.

Your Committee is advised that funding for this initiative is provided by the federal Department of Homeland Security's State Homeland Security Program. The RPA will commence upon execution and remain in effect for a period of five (5) years.

The Department has informed your Committee that pursuant to the HazMat Grant Program, DHSES will provide funding to the 18 designated Regional HazMat Teams that provide coverage across the State outside of New York City via a non-competitive process. The State has designated the counties of Westchester, Putnam and Dutchess as a Regional Team for the Lower Hudson Valley Region. The County will receive the funds and administer the grant.

Your Committee is advised that this grant opportunity builds on progress made by New York State through the FY2008-FY2019 iterations of the HazMat Grant Program. Through this program, DHSES is making \$2 million in federal State Homeland Security Program (SHSP) funding available to the 18 regional HazMat teams located outside of New York City. In total, \$15.5 million has been dedicated to this effort since 2008.

In FY2020, the State will continue to provide funds to all 18 regional HazMat Teams that provide coverage across the State outside of New York City via a non-competitive process. The FY2020 HazMat Grant will serve as a resource for regional HazMat Teams to maintain the existing equipment on their WMD Trailer and/or to build new capabilities.

The Department of Planning has advised that, based on its review, this is classified as a "Type II" action pursuant the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA"), 6 NYCRR Section 617.5(c)(31). Therefore, no further environmental review is required. Your Committee has reviewed the annexed SEQRA documentation and concurs with this conclusion.

Your Committee has been advised that a majority of the voting strength of the Board of Legislators is required to adopt the annexed Act. After review and careful consideration, your Committee recommends favorable action upon the proposed legislation.

AN ACT authorizing the County of Westchester to enter into a Regional Partnership Agreement with Dutchess County and Putnam County in order to receive funding from the New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services under the FY2020 Hazardous Materials Grant Program.

BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Legislators of the County of Westchester

as follows:

Section 1. The County of Westchester ("County"), acting by and through its Department of Emergency Services ("Department"), is hereby authorized to enter into a Regional Partnership Agreement ("RPA") with Dutchess County and Putnam County (collectively "Regional Partners") in order to receive funding from the New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services ("DHSES") under the FY2020 Hazardous Materials ("HazMat") Grant Program. DHSES is awarding One Hundred Twenty-Two Thousand, Five Hundred (\$122,500.00) Dollars to the County and its Regional Partners will be used for consultant services for HazMat training, and to purchase equipment for the HazMat team, such as laptop computers, decontamination equipment (sprayers, shelters), mitigation equipment (water injection kits, hoses, pumps, saws), detection and identification equipment (detectors, meters).

§2. The RPA will commence upon execution and remain in effect for a period of five (5) years.

§3. The County Executive or his authorized designee be and hereby is authorized and empowered to execute any and all instruments and to take all action necessary and appropriate to effectuate the purposes hereof.

§4. This Act shall take effect immediately.

Regional Partnership Agreement Between

Westchester County, Putnam County and Dutchess County For the 2020 HazMat Grant Program

Parties

The parties to the Regional Partnership Agreement (RPA) are the Counties of Westchester, Putnam and Dutchess.

Purpose

This RPA is intended to build regional WMD Hazardous Material Response and Decontamination Capabilities by:

- Setting forth the responsibilities of the HazMat Grant Program recipients: and
- Ensuring that HazMat Grant Program recipients work together to implement the projects, goals and objectives identified in their jointly-submitted HazMat Grant Program application under the NYS Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services (DHSES) 2020 HazMat Grant Program Request for Application (RFA).

Definitions

The term **Submitting Partner** refers to the direct recipient of the FY2020 HazMat Grant Program award, who shall serve as fiduciary agent for the award. (See below for the specific responsibilities of the Submitting Partner.)

The term **Participating Partner** refers to the other entity or entities that joined with the submitting partner in applying for funding through the FY2020 HazMat Grant Program.

General Responsibilities of the Submitting Partner (SP)

The SP is to act as the principal point of contact with DHSES for application, management, and administration of the FY2020 HazMat Grant Program.

The SP is responsible for submitting all required fiscal reporting documents to DHSES and for maintaining all appropriate records pertaining to this grant program. Specific details related to fiscal reporting and records maintenance are outlined in DHSES's contract with the SP for the FY2020 HazMat Grant Program.

The SP is required to use the funds received through the FY2020 HazMat Grant Program in coordination with the Participating Partners, and in a manner that is consistent with their application.

General Responsibilities of the Participating Partner(s) (PP)

The PP(s) are responsible for coordinating with the SP to implement all projects funded under the FY2020 HazMat Grant Program.

Project-Specific Responsibilities

The responsibilities of the SP and each PP for each of the projects funded under the FY2020 HazMat Grant Program are outlined below:

Project

- 1. Equipment specifications and purchase
- 2. Equipment inventory survey.
- 3. Training and Exercise Support

Responsibilities of Submitting Partner

1. Draft specifications and purchase HazMat equipment (1) for Westchester County Department of Emergency Services HazMat Response Team, (2) Putnam County Emergency Services HazMat Team and (3) Dutchess County Emergency Response HazMat Division. Know all terms of equipment warranty and maintenance contract.

2. Westchester County Department of Emergency Services to take delivery of equipment, perform repair/maintenance as required under the warranty and maintenance contract and distribute to regional partners having obtained an equipment receipt from partners and established an equipment inventory process to be used by regional partners

3. Continue to train with regional partners; establish a training & exercise schedule; document meetings, training and exercises/drills.

4. The County of Westchester will maintain all right, title and interest to the HazMat equipment.

Responsibilities of each Participating Partner

1. Putnam County Emergency Services HazMat Team and Dutchess County Emergency Response HazMat Division to have input in equipment selection.

2. Putnam County Emergency Services HazMat Team and Dutchess County Emergency Response HazMat Division to take delivery of HazMat equipment and sign a receipt form to document that equipment was received and in good working order. Any malfunction or damage to the equipment will be reported to the Westchester County Department of Emergency Services HazMat Team leader immediately.

3. Putnam County Emergency Services HazMat Team and Dutchess County Emergency Response HazMat Division will assist in the design of training courses and exercises.

4. While Westchester County will properly maintain the field detection units, the individual counties will sustain the Chemical Protective Clothing (CPC) that will be distributed among the three teams.

Insurance and Indemnification

Each Participating Partner agrees to procure and maintain insurance naming the County of Westchester as additional insured, as provided and described in Schedule "A", entitled "Standard Insurance Provisions", which is attached hereto and made a part hereof. In addition to, and not in limitation of the insurance provisions contained in Schedule "A", each Participating Partner agrees:

(a) that except for the amount, if any, of damage contributed to, caused by, or resulting from the sole negligence of the County of Westchester, the Participating Partners shall indemnify and hold harmless the County of Westchester, its officers, elected officials, employees and agents from and against any and all liability, damage, claims, demands, costs, judgments, fees, attorney's fees or loss arising directly or indirectly out of the possession and/or use, performance or failure to perform hereunder by the Participating Partners or third parties under the direction or control of the Participating Partners; and

(b) to provide defense for and defend, at their sole expense, any and all claims, demands or causes of action directly or indirectly arising out of this Agreement and to bear all other costs and expenses related thereto.

(c) In the event the Participating Partners do not provide the above defense and indemnification to the County, and such refusal or denial to provide the above defense and indemnification is found to be in breach of this provision, then the Participating Partners shall reimburse the County's reasonable attorney's fees incurred in connection with the defense of any action, and in connection with enforcing this provision of the Agreement.

SCHEDULE "A "

STANDARD INSURANCE PROVISIONS (MUNICIPALITY)

1. Prior to commencing work, and throughout the term of the Agreement, the Municipality shall obtain at its own cost and expense the required insurance as delineated below from insurance companies licensed in the State of New York, carrying a Best's financial rating of A or better. Municipality shall provide evidence of such insurance to the County of Westchester ("County"), either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County ("Director"). The policies or certificates thereof shall provide that ten (10) days prior to cancellation or material change in the policy, notices of same shall be given to the Director either by overnight mail or personal delivery for all of the following stated insurance policies. All notices shall name the Municipality and identify the Agreement.

If at any time any of the policies required herein shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing any such policy shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, the Municipality shall upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and submit the policy or the certificate as requested by the Director to the Office of Risk Management of the County for approval by the Director. Upon failure of the Municipality to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance, the Agreement, at the election of the County, may be declared suspended, discontinued or terminated.

Failure of the Municipality to take out, maintain, or the taking out or maintenance of any required insurance, shall not relieve the Municipality from any liability under the Agreement, nor shall the insurance requirements be construed to conflict with or otherwise limit the contractual obligations of the Municipality concerning indemnification.

All property losses shall be made payable to the "County of Westchester" and adjusted with the appropriate County personnel.

In the event that claims, for which the County may be liable, in excess of the insured amounts provided herein are filed by reason of Municipality's negligent acts or omissions under the Agreement or by virtue of the provisions of the labor law or other statute or any other reason, the amount of excess of such claims or any portion thereof, may be withheld from payment due or to become due the Municipality until such time as the Municipality shall furnish such additional security covering such claims in form satisfactory to the Director.

In the event of any loss, if the Municipality maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums identified herein, the County shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Municipality. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

2 The Municipality shall provide proof of the following coverage (if additional coverage is required for a specific agreement, those requirements will be described in the Agreement):

a) Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability. Certificate form C-105.2 or State Fund Insurance Company form U-26.3 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Workers' Compensation Law. State Workers' Compensation Board form DB-120.1 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Disability Benefits Law. Location of operation shall be "All locations in Westchester County, New York."

Where an applicant claims to not be required to carry either a Workers' Compensation Policy or Disability Benefits Policy, or both, the employer must complete NYS form CE-200, available to download at: http://www.wcb.ny.gov.

If the employer is self-insured for Workers' Compensation, he/she should present a certificate from the New York State Worker's Compensation Board evidencing that fact (Either SI-12, Certificate of Workers' Compensation Self-Insurance, or GSI-105.2, Certificate of Participation in Workers' Compensation Group Self-Insurance).

- b) Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 (c.s.1) per occurrence and a \$2,000,000 aggregate limit naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis. This insurance shall include the following coverages:
 - i. Premises Operations.
 - ii. Broad Form Contractual.
 - iii. Independent Contractor and Sub-Contractor.
 - iv. Products and Completed Operations.
- c) Commercial Umbrella/Excess Insurance: \$2,000,000 each Occurrence and Aggregate naming the "County of Westchester" as additional insured, written on a "follow the form" basis.

NOTE: Additional insured status shall be provided by standard or other endorsement that extends coverage to the County of Westchester for both on-going and completed operations.

d) Automobile Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$1,000,000 for bodily injury and a minimum limit of \$100,000 per occurrence for property damage or a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 unless otherwise indicated in the contract specifications. This insurance shall include for bodily injury and property damage the following coverages and name the "County of Westchester" as additional insured: (i) Owned automobiles.

(ii) Hired automobiles.

(iii) Non-owned automobiles.

3. All policies of the Municipality shall be endorsed to contain the following clauses:

(a) Insurers shall have no right to recovery or subrogation against the County (including its employees and other agents and agencies), it being the intention of the parties that the insurance policies so effected shall protect both parties and be primary coverage for any and all losses covered by the above-described insurance.

(b) The clause "other insurance provisions" in a policy in which the County is named as an insured, shall not apply to the County.

(c) The insurance companies issuing the policy or policies shall have no recourse against the County (including its agents and agencies as aforesaid) for payment of any premiums or for assessments under any form of policy.

(d) Any and all deductibles in the above described insurance policies shall be assumed by and be for the account of, and at the sole risk of, the Municipality.

Dear Honorable Members of the Board of Legislators:

Transmitted herewith for your review and approval is an act (the "Act") which, if adopted, would authorize the County of Westchester (the "County"), acting by and through its Department of Senior Programs and Services (the "Department"), to enter into inter-municipal agreements ("IMAs") with the City of Yonkers and the City of New Rochelle, acting by and through their respective Offices for the Aging (the "Municipalities"), pursuant to which the Municipalities will provide outreach and other services to seniors to be funded with County tax dollars. The term of the IMAs will commence retroactive to January 1, 2023 and continue through December 31, 2023. In no event will the total aggregate amount payable for both IMAs exceed the sum of \$30,000, payable pursuant to approved budgets.

The programs and services to be provided under the IMAs include the Livable Communities Regional Host services program which provides outreach to residents to participate in and access programs and services provided by the Department; and public information/education that is provided through meetings, educational forums and events at which residents are educated and informed about the Department's myriad programs and services that are designed to enhance the quality of life for Westchester seniors to allow them to remain in their homes and community.

Your Honorable Board has previously approved similar legislation pursuant to Act No. 35 - 2022. However, the existing authorization expired on December 31, 2022 and a new authorization will be needed to enter into new agreements.

It should be noted that the IMAs are exempt from the Westchester County Procurement Policy pursuant to section 3(a)iii thereof which exempts contracts with "... any State and any political subdivision, agency or instrumentality thereof." They are also exempt pursuant to section 3(a)xix of the Policy which exempts "any procurement for the purpose of entering into a contract with persons to provide direct services to senior citizens."

The Planning Department has advised that based on its review, the proposed IMAs described above do not meet the definition of an "action" under the State Environmental Quality Review Act, 6 NYCRR part 617. As such, no environmental review is required. Please refer to the memorandum from the Department of Planning dated January 12, 2023, which is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Legislators.

The proposed IMAs are intended to benefit the County by assisting in the provision of taxfunded services to its residents. Accordingly, I believe the proposed IMAs are in the best interest of the County and, therefore, recommend your favorable action on the annexed proposed Act.

The term of the proposed IMAs will commence retroactive to January 1, 2023 and continue through December 31, 2023. In no event will the total aggregate not-to-exceed amount payable for both IMAs exceed the sum of \$30,000, payable pursuant to approved budgets.

Your Committee is advised that the programs and services to be provided under the IMAs include the Livable Communities Regional Hosts services program which provides outreach to residents to participate in and access programs and services provided by the Department; and public information/education that is provided through meetings, educational forums and events at which residents are educated and informed about the Department's myriad programs and services that are designed to enhance the quality of life for Westchester seniors to allow them to remain in their homes and community.

Your Committee notes that this Honorable Board passed similar authorizing legislation pursuant to Act No. 35 - 2022. However, the existing authorization expired on December 31, 2022 and a new authorization will be needed to enter into new agreements.

Your Committee is informed that the IMAs are exempt from the Westchester County Procurement Policy pursuant to section 3(a)iii thereof which exempts contracts with "... any State and any political subdivision, agency or instrumentality thereof." They are also exempt pursuant to section 3(a)xix of the Policy which exempts "any procurement for the purpose of entering into a contract with persons to provide direct services to senior citizens." The Planning Department has advised that based on its review, the proposed IMAs do not meet the definition of an "action" under the State Environmental Quality Review Act, 6 NYCRR part 617. As such, no environmental review is required. Please refer to the memorandum from the Department of Planning dated January 12, 2023, which is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Legislators.

Your Committee has been advised that the passage of the attached Act requires an affirmative vote of a majority of the members of your Honorable Board.

Your Committee has been advised that adoption of the proposed Act is necessary to effectively carry out this worthwhile program. Accordingly, after due consideration, your Committee recommends adoption of the annexed Act.

AN ACT authorizing the County of Westchester to enter into inter-municipal agreements with the City of Yonkers and the City of New Rochelle for the provision of outreach and other services to seniors to be funded with County tax dollars

BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Legislators of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. The County of Westchester be and hereby is authorized to enter into intermunicipal agreements ("IMAs") with the City of Yonkers and the City of New Rochelle, acting by and through their respective Offices for the Aging (the "Municipalities"), pursuant to which the Municipalities will provide outreach and other services to seniors to be funded with County tax dollars, for a term commencing on January 1, 2023 and continuing through December 31, 2023, in a total aggregate amount not-to-exceed \$30,000 for both IMAs, payable pursuant to approved budgets.

§2. The programs and services to be provided under the IMAs will include the Livable Communities Regional Host services program which provides outreach to residents to participate in and access programs and services provided by the Department; and public information/education that is provided through meetings, educational forums and events at which residents are educated and informed about the Department's myriad programs and services that are designed to enhance the quality of life for Westchester seniors to allow them to remain in their homes and community.

§3. The contract amounts allocated for each IMA shall be determined at the discretion of the Commissioner of the Department of Senior Services and Programs.

§4. The County Executive or his authorized designee is hereby empowered to execute all instruments and take all actions reasonable and necessary to effectuate the purposes hereof.

§5. This Act shall take effect immediately.

THIS INTER-MUNICIPAL AGREEMENT ("Agreement" or "IMA" made this _____ day of _____, 2023 by and between:

THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, a municipal corporation of the State of New York, having an office and place of business in the Michaelian Office Building, 148 Martine Avenue, White Plains, New York, 10601 (hereinafter referred to as the "County")

and

CITY OF _____, a municipal corporation organized under the laws of the State of New York, having an office and principal place of at

(hereinafter referred to as the "Municipality" and together with the County hereinafter referred to as the "Parties")

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the County desires to provide Livable Community Regional Host Services to elderly residents of the County (hereinafter the "Services" or "Work"); and

WHEREAS, the Municipality desires to perform said Services upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth.

WHEREAS, the Municipality is an agency duly licensed to provide such Services and the County desires to retain the Municipality to provide such Services.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms, conditions, covenants,

and agreements contained herein, the Parties agree as follows:

1. The Municipality shall provide the Services as described in Schedule "C", which is attached hereto and made a part hereof.

2. For the Services rendered pursuant to Paragraph 1, the Municipality shall be paid an amount not to exceed ______ DOLLARS (\$_____), subject to appropriations and payable pursuant to an approved budget amount indicated in Schedule "B" that is attached hereto, and made a part hereof, after the County has

received any and all supporting documentation the County may require and the same has been approved by the Commissioner of the Department of Senior Programs and Services or her duly authorized designee (the "Commissioner"). Payment shall be made only for expenses actually incurred and paid by the Municipality, which shall be subject to downward adjustment by the County based upon actual Services rendered by the Municipality during the term of the Agreement. The foregoing obligation of the County is conditioned upon compliance by the Municipality with all the terms and conditions contained in this Agreement.

The Parties understand and acknowledge that the Municipality may, during the term of this Agreement, wish to seek a modification to the Budget. The Parties agree that the Municipality may seek a Budget modification by submitting a request either, a.) in writing, if the Budget is attached to this Agreement, or b.) through the Vendor Portal's Budget Module, if the Budget is a Repository Document. The Municipality understands, acknowledges, and agrees that no Budget modification shall take effect unless and until the Commissioner has consented to that Budget modification request; that the Commissioner shall not be required to consent to any Budget modification request; and that all decisions by the Commissioner regarding Budget modification requests are final.

Any and all requests for payment to be made, including any requests for partial payment made in proportion to the Services rendered, shall be submitted by the Municipality on properly executed payment vouchers of the County and paid only after approval by the Commissioner. In no event shall final payment be made to the Municipality prior to the completion of all Services, the submission of reports and the approval of same by the Commissioner.

All payment vouchers must be accompanied by a numbered invoice and must contain the invoice number where indicated. All invoices submitted during each calendar year shall utilize consecutive numbering and be non-repeating.

Except as otherwise expressly stated in this Agreement, no payment shall be made by the County to the Municipality for out-of-pocket expenses or disbursements

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made in connection with the Services rendered or the Services to be rendered hereunder.

3. The term of this Agreement shall commence retroactive to January 1, 2023 and expire on or about December 31, 2023, unless terminated sooner pursuant to the provisions hereof.

Payment shall be made on a monthly basis, upon submission by the Municipality of claims or vouchers and such supporting documentation as the County may require, and approval of the same by the Commissioner.

The Parties recognize and acknowledge that the obligations of the County under this Agreement are subject to annual appropriations by its Board of Legislators pursuant to the Laws of Westchester County. Therefore, this Agreement shall be deemed executory only to the extent of the monies appropriated and available. The County shall have no liability under this Agreement beyond funds appropriated and available for payment pursuant to this Agreement. The Parties understand and intend that the obligation of the County hereunder shall constitute a current expense of the County and shall not in any way be construed to be a debt of the County in contravention of any applicable constitutional or statutory limitations or requirements concerning the creation of indebtedness by the County, nor shall anything contained in this Agreement constitute a pledge of the general tax revenues, funds or monies of the County. The County shall pay amounts due under this Agreement exclusively from legally available funds appropriated for this purpose. The County shall retain the right, upon the occurrence of the adoption of any County Budget by its Board of Legislators during the term of this Agreement or any amendments thereto, and for a reasonable period of time after such adoption(s), to conduct an analysis of the impacts of any such County Budget on County finances. After such analysis, the County shall retain the right to either terminate this Agreement or to renegotiate the amounts and rates set forth herein. If the County subsequently offers to pay a reduced amount to the Municipality, then the Municipality shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon reasonable prior written notice.

This Agreement is also subject to further financial analysis of the impact of any New York State Budget (the "State Budget") proposed and adopted during the term of this Agreement. The County shall retain the right, upon the occurrence of any release by the Governor of a proposed State Budget and/or the adoption of a State Budget or any amendments thereto, and for a reasonable period of time after such release(s) or adoption(s), to conduct an analysis of the impacts of any such State Budget on County finances. After such analysis, the County shall retain the right to either terminate this Agreement or to renegotiate the amounts and rates approved herein. If the County subsequently offers to pay a reduced amount to the Municipality, then the Municipality shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon reasonable prior written notice.

4. The Municipality shall comply with all applicable Federal, State and local laws, rules, regulations and ordinances and any amendments thereto.

In addition, the Municipality shall cause to be prominently posted, on the site where Services hereunder are to be provided, a statement regarding nondiscrimination, which statement shall be similar in form to the following:

> "In compliance with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1975 and Title VI of the 1964 Civil Rights Act and New York State Executive Law and orders, no persons will be denied service or access to service based upon race, creed, color, national origin, religion, marital status, sexual orientation, genetic predisposition, carrier status, or handicapping condition."

5. The Municipality expressly agrees neither it nor any contractor, subcontractor, employee or any other person acting on its behalf shall discriminate against or intimidate any employee or other individual on the basis of race, creed, religion, color, gender, age, national origin, ethnicity, alienage or citizenship status, disability, marital status, sexual orientation, familial status, genetic predisposition or carrier status during the term of or in connection with this Agreement, as those terms may be defined in Chapter 700 of the Laws of Westchester County. The Municipality acknowledges and understands that the County maintains a zero tolerance policy prohibiting all forms of harassment or discrimination against its employees by co-workers, supervisors, vendors, contractors, or others.

6. (a) There shall be no partisan political activity in connection with this Agreement, including (i) candidate endorsements (ii) registration activities which are partisan in nature (iii) scheduled meetings of services recipients with public officials or candidates unless event is open on an equal basis to all candidates and officials regardless of policy views or partisan affiliation. This does not preclude the legitimate right of elected officials and other community leaders to visit programs in their areas.

(b) The Municipality shall ensure that any services to be provided under this Agreement shall be secular in nature and scope and in no event shall there be any sectarian or religious services, counseling, proselytizing, instruction or other sectarian, religious influence undertaken in connection with the provision of such services. The Municipality shall refrain from using funds to advance any sectarian effort.

7. The Municipality shall not delegate any duties or assign any of its rights under this Agreement without the prior express written consent of the County. The Municipality shall not subcontract any part of the Services without the written consent of the County, subject to any necessary legal approvals. Any purported delegation of duties, assignment of rights or subcontracting of Services under this Agreement without the prior express written consent of the County is void. All subcontracts that have received such prior written consent shall provide that subcontractors are subject to all terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. It is recognized and understood by the Municipality that for the purposes of this Agreement, all Services performed by a County-approved subcontractor shall be deemed Services performed by the Municipality and the Municipality shall insure that such subcontracted work are subject to the material terms and conditions of this Agreement. All subcontracts for the Services shall expressly reference the subcontractor's duty to comply with the material terms and conditions of this Agreement and shall attach a copy of the County's contract with the Municipality. The Municipality shall obtain a written acknowledgement from the owner and/or chief executive of subcontractor or his/her duly authorized representative that the

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subcontractor has received a copy of the County's Agreement, read it and is familiar with the material terms and conditions thereof. The Municipality shall include provisions in its subcontracts designed to ensure that the Municipality and/or its auditor has the right to examine all relevant books, records, documents or electronic data of the subcontractor necessary to review the subcontractor's compliance with the material terms and conditions of this Agreement.

If the Municipality enters into subcontracts for the performance of Services pursuant to this Agreement, the Municipality shall take full responsibility for the acts and omissions of its subcontractors. Nothing in the subcontract shall impair the rights of the County under this Agreement or the Area Agency Plan as approved by NYSOFA. It shall be the responsibility of the Municipality to monitor and assess the activities performed under such subcontracts, and to ensure that these activities are provided in accordance with all applicable requirements contained in this Agreement and federal and state law.

The Municipality agrees that, to the extent it or its subcontractors, if any, maintains personal information relating to applicants or recipients of Services pursuant to this Agreement, such information will be kept confidential and shared with the County; or with other entities upon the consent of applicant, recipient or an authorized representative of the applicant or recipient; or as required by federal or state laws.

8. The Municipality must attempt to provide Services to low-income minority older individuals in at least the same proportion as the population of low income minority older individuals bears to the population of older individuals in the area served by such Municipality.

9. Statistical information and supporting documentation concerning the Services rendered hereunder shall be provided to the County by the Municipality on request of the County.

Documentation of reports and expenses shall include, without limiting the right to require additional documentation: invoices for all purchases, payroll time records,

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payroll records for local support contribution, municipal payment vouchers for governmental agencies, and canceled checks for private agencies as applicable.

The Programmatic monthly reporting system for Service Delivery Information and Service Recipient Information must be submitted using our electronic based system. Until further notice, the Municipality is required to mail in the PEERPLACE ELECTRONIC PAPER REPORT and or other approved reporting measure, signed by the staff member responsible for the report. The reports should be received by the County no later than the tenth (10th) day of the following month and/or entered on the website at the same time. The Municipality understands and agrees that submission of the monthly report by the deadline set forth above constitutes a material element of this Agreement. The County reserves the right to withhold payment to Municipality for its failure to submit the monthly report by the deadline, until such time as the monthly report is received by the County. Repeated failures by Municipality to submit the monthly report by the stated deadline will constitute a material breach of this Agreement justifying termination for cause as provided in Paragraph "14" hereof.

The Municipality shall furnish the County with copies of all insurance agreements relating to the Services provided by the Municipality hereunder.

10. The Municipality shall comply with the insurance requirements set forth in Schedule "A". In addition to, and not in limitation of, the insurance provisions of this Agreement, the Municipality agrees:

(a) that except for the amount, if any, of damage contributed to, caused by or resulting from the sole negligence of the County, the Municipality shall indemnify and hold harmless the County, its officers, employees and agents from and against any and all liability, damage, claims, demands, costs, judgments, fees, attorneys' fees or loss arising directly or indirectly out of the performance or failure to perform hereunder by the Municipality or third parties under the direction or control of the Municipality; and (b) to provide defense for and defend, at its sole expense, any and all claims, demands or causes of action directly or indirectly arising out of this Agreement and to bear all other costs and expenses related thereto; and

(c) In the event the Municipality does not provide the above defense and indemnification to the County, and such refusal or denial to provide the above defense and indemnification is found to be in breach of this provision, then the Municipality shall reimburse the County's reasonable attorney's fees incurred in connection with the defense of any action, and in connection with enforcing this provision of the Agreement.

(d) the Municipality may provide proof of self-insurance in lieu of insurance policies.

11. The Municipality agrees that any program, public information materials, or other printed or published materials on the Services which is supported with County funds will give due recognition to the Department.

12. The Municipality shall be solely responsible for any over expenditure of funds and the County shall not be responsible or liable for any such over expenditure.

13. The Municipality shall provide adequate qualified and trained personnel for supervision and fiscal management of the Work.

14. (a) The County, upon ten (10) days' notice to the Municipality, may terminate this Agreement in whole or in part when the County deems it to be in its best interest. In such event, the Municipality shall be compensated and the County shall be liable only for payment for Services already rendered under this Agreement prior to the effective date of termination in accordance with the Budget set forth in Schedule "B". Upon receipt of notice that the County is terminating this Agreement in its best interests, the Municipality shall stop Services immediately and incur no further costs in furtherance of this Agreement without the express approval of the Commissioner, and the Municipality shall direct any approved subcontractors to do the same.

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In the event of a dispute as to the value of the Services rendered by the Municipality prior to the date of termination, it is understood and agreed that the Commissioner shall determine the value of such Work rendered by the Municipality. The Municipality shall accept such reasonable and good faith determination as final.

(b) In the event the County determines that there has been a material breach by the Municipality of any of the terms of the Agreement and such breach remains uncured for forty-eight (48) hours after service on the Municipality of written notice thereof, the County, in addition to any other right or remedy it might have, may terminate this Agreement and the County shall have the right, power and authority to complete the Work provided for in this Agreement, or contract for its completion, and any additional expense or cost of such completion shall be charged to and paid by the Municipality. Without limiting the foregoing, upon written notice to the Municipality, repeated breaches by the Municipality of duties or obligations under this Agreement shall be deemed a material breach of this Agreement justifying termination for cause hereunder without requirement for further opportunity to cure.

15. The failure of the County to insist, in any one or more instances, upon a strict performance of any of the terms, covenants, agreements and conditions of this Agreement, shall not be considered as a waiver or relinquishment for the future of such covenant, but the same shall continue and remain in full force and effect.

16. All notices of any nature referred to in this Agreement shall be in writing and either sent by registered or certified mail postage pre-paid, or sent by hand or overnight courier, or sent by facsimile (with acknowledgment received and a copy of the notice sent by overnight courier), to the respective addresses set forth below or to such other addresses as the respective Parties hereto may designate in writing. Notice shall be effective on the date of receipt.

17. The Municipality represents and warrants that it has not employed or retained any person, other than a bona fide full time salaried employee working solely for the Municipality, to solicit or secure this agreement, and that it has not paid or agreed to pay any person (other than payments of fixed salary to a bona fide full time salaried employee working solely for the Municipality), any fee, commission, percentage, gift or other consideration, contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this agreement. For the breach or violation of this provision, without limiting any other rights or remedies to which the County may be entitled or any civil or criminal penalty to which any violator may be liable, the County shall have the right, in its discretion, to terminate this agreement without liability, and to deduct from the contract price, or otherwise to recover, the full amount of such fee, commission, percentage, gift or consideration.

18. Attached hereto and forming part hereof is the schedule listed below. Simultaneous with its execution of this Agreement, the Municipality shall provide the County with a completed copy of each schedule. The Municipality agrees that the terms of each of these schedules has been accepted and agreed-to by the Municipality by virtue of its execution of this Agreement, and the Municipality represents and warrants that it has completed each of these schedules accurately and completely.

Schedule "D" — "Vendor Direct Program - Electronic Funds Transfer"

All payments made by the County to the Municipality will be made by electronic funds transfer ("EFT") pursuant to the County's Vendor Direct Program. If the Municipality acknowledges is already enrolled in the submit

an EFT Authorization Form as part of this Agreement. (In rare cases, a hardship waiver may be granted. For a Hardship Waiver Request Form, the Municipality understands that it must contact the County's Finance Department.)

If the Municipality is already enrolled in the Vendor Direct Program, the Municipality hereby agrees to immediately notify the County's Finance Department in writing if the EFT Authorization Form on file must be changed, and provide an updated version of the document.

19. This base agreement and its attachments constitute the entire Agreement between the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede all previous negotiations, commitments and writings. It shall not be released, discharged, changed or modified except by an instrument in writing, signed by a duly authorized representative of each of the Parties. If there is a conflict between the terms of this base agreement and the terms of any attachment, the terms of this base agreement will prevail.

20. The Municipality hereby represents that, if operating under an assumed name, it has filed the necessary certificate pursuant to New York State General Business Law Section 130.

21. This Agreement may be executed simultaneously in several counterparts, each of which shall be an original and all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument. This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of New York State. In addition, the Parties hereby agree that any cause of action arising out of this Agreement shall be brought in the County.

If any term or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or void or unenforceable, the remainder of the terms and provisions of this Agreement shall in no way be affected, impaired, or invalidated, and to the extent permitted by applicable law, any such term, or provision shall be restricted in applicability or reformed to the minimum extent required for such to be enforceable. This provision shall be interpreted and enforced to give effect to the original written intent of the Parties prior to the determination of such invalidity or unenforceability

SCHEDULE "A"

INSURANCE PROVISIONS (Municipality)

1. Prior to commencing Work, and throughout the term of the Agreement, the Municipality shall obtain at its own cost and expense the required insurance as delineated below from insurance companies licensed in the State of New York, carrying a Best's financial rating of A or better. Municipality shall provide evidence of such insurance to the County of Westchester ("County"), either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County ("Director"). The policies or certificates thereof shall provide that ten (10) days prior to cancellation or material change in the policy, notices of same shall be given to the Director either by overnight mail or personal delivery for all of the following stated insurance policies. All notices shall name the Municipality and identify the Agreement.

If at any time any of the policies required herein shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing any such policy shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, the Municipality shall upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and submit the policy or the certificate as requested by the Director to the Office of Risk Management of the County for approval by the Director. Upon failure of the Municipality to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance, the Agreement, at the election of the County, may be declared suspended, discontinued or terminated.

Failure of the Municipality to take out, maintain, or the taking out or maintenance of any required insurance, shall not relieve the Municipality from any liability under the Agreement, nor shall the insurance requirements be construed to conflict with or otherwise limit the contractual obligations of the Municipality concerning indemnification.

All property losses shall be made payable to the "County of Westchester" and adjusted with the appropriate County personnel.

In the event that claims, for which the County may be liable, in excess of the insured amounts provided herein are filed by reason of Municipality's negligent acts or omissions under the Agreement or by virtue of the provisions of the labor law or other statute or any other reason, the amount of excess of such claims or any portion thereof, may be withheld from payment due or to become due the Municipality until such time as the Municipality shall furnish such additional security covering such claims in form satisfactory to the Director.

In the event of any loss, if the Municipality maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums identified herein, the County shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Municipality. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

2 The Municipality shall provide proof of the following coverage (if additional coverage is required for a specific agreement, those requirements will be described in the Agreement):

a) Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability. Certificate form C-105.2 or State Fund Insurance Company form U-26.3 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Workers' Compensation Law. State Workers' Compensation Board form DB-120.1 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Disability Benefits Law. Location of operation shall be "All locations in Westchester County, New York." Where an applicant claims to not be required to carry either a Workers' Compensation Policy or Disability Benefits Policy, or both, the employer must complete NYS form CE-200, available to download at: <u>http://www.wcb.ny.gov</u>.

If the employer is self-insured for Workers' Compensation, he/she should present a certificate from the New York State Worker's Compensation Board evidencing that fact (Either SI-12, Certificate of Workers' Compensation Self-Insurance, or GSI-105.2, Certificate of Participation in Workers' Compensation Group Self-Insurance).

b) Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 (c.s.1) per occurrence and a \$2,000,000 aggregate limit naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis. This insurance shall include the following coverages:

i.Premises - Operations. ii.Broad Form Contractual. iii.Independent Contractor and Sub-Contractor. iv.Products and Completed Operations.

c) Commercial Umbrella/Excess Insurance: \$2,000,000 each Occurrence and Aggregate naming the "County of Westchester" as additional insured, written on a "follow the form" basis.

NOTE: Additional insured status shall be provided by standard or other endorsement that extends coverage to the County of Westchester for both on-going and completed operations.

All Contracts involving the use of explosives, demolition and/or underground work shall provide proof that XCU is covered.

- d) Automobile Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$1,000,000 for bodily injury and a minimum limit of \$100,000 per occurrence for property damage or a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 unless otherwise indicated in the contract specifications. This insurance shall include for bodily injury and property damage the following coverages and name the "County of Westchester" as additional insured:
 - (i) Owned automobiles.
 - (ii) Hired automobiles.
 - (iii) Non-owned automobiles.
 - 3. All policies of the Municipality shall be endorsed to contain the following clauses:

(a) Insurers shall have no right to recovery or subrogation against the County (including its employees and other agents and agencies), it being the intention of the Parties that the insurance policies so effected shall protect both Parties and be primary coverage for any and all losses covered by the above-described insurance.

(b) The clause "other insurance provisions" in a policy in which the County is named as an insured, shall not apply to the County.

(c) The insurance companies issuing the policy or policies shall have no recourse against the County (including its agents and agencies as aforesaid) for payment of any premiums or for assessments under any form of policy.

(d) Any and all deductibles in the above described insurance policies shall be assumed by and be for the account of, and at the sole risk of, the Municipality.

There are several advantages to having your payments automatically deposited into your designated bank account via EFT:

Payments are secure – Paper checks can be lost in the mail or stolen, but money deposited directly into your bank account is more secure.

You save time – Money deposited into your bank account is automatic. You save the time of preparing and delivering the deposit to the bank. Additionally, the funds are immediately available to you.

2. ARE MY PAYMENTS GOING TO BE PROCESSED ON THE SAME SCHEDULE AS THEY WERE BEFORE VENDOR DIRECT? Yes.

The Grant Agreement will be for a term commencing retroactive to January 1, 2023 and continuing through December 31, 2023. Additionally, authority is requested for the County to exercise the second of its four (4) one-year renewal options, under inter-municipal agreements ("IMAs") with the City of New Rochelle and the City of Yonkers for services to be funded under the Grant Agreement, in the total aggregate not-to-exceed amount of \$60,465, for a term commencing retroactive to January 1, 2023 and continuing through December 31, 2023 (the "Second Extension Term"). It should be noted that the amount allocated under each IMA for the Second Extension Term will be determined at the discretion of the Commissioner of the Department of Senior Programs and Services.

The services to be provided under the IMAs with the funds received under the Grant Agreement are information and assistance services to help seniors remain in their homes and community (the "Services").

Your Honorable Board is advised that the Department has complied with the Westchester County Procurement Policy and Procedures (the "Policy"), noting that the Grant Agreement with NYSOFA does not constitute a procurement, and that the IMAs are exempt from the Policy pursuant to section 3(a) iii thereof which exempts contracts with "... any State and any political subdivision, agency or instrumentality thereof." The IMAs are also exempt pursuant to section 3(a) xix of the Policy, which exempts "any procurement for the purpose of entering into a contract with persons to provide direct services to senior citizens."

Although procurement for these Services is exempt from the Policy, these Services are funded with Federal grant monies, and, as such, are subject to Federal procurement requirements (the "Federal Regulations"), pursuant to Section 13 of the Policy. The Federal Regulations (2 CFR§ 200.320), require that contracts in amounts greater than \$10,000 and up to \$250,000, be procured by obtaining price or rate quotations from an adequate number of qualified sources, unless such contracts are deemed to be "non-competitive" procurements. In furtherance of this requirement, on November 12, 2020, the Department issued a request for proposal ("RFP") seeking qualified

entities to provide the Services. Two (2) proposals were received in response to the RFP, one from the City of New Rochelle and the other from the City of Yonkers. After reviewing the proposals with reference to the evaluation criteria set forth in the RFP, your Honorable Board, by Act No. 82-2021, awarded IMAs to both municipalities for an initial term commencing on January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021, with four (4) one-year renewal options, exercisable at the County's option. The IMAs were subsequently executed.

Thereafter, your Honorable Board, by Act No. 36-2022, authorized the County to exercise the first of its four (4) one-year renewal options under the IMAs to extend the term of each IMA for an additional year commencing retroactive to January 1, 2022 and continuing through December 31, 2022 (the "First Extension Term"). The IMAs for the First Extension Term were subsequently executed with each municipality.

The County has determined that it will require the Services to continue for an additional year, from January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023. However, the Federal Regulations (2 CFR§ 200.324 (a)), further require grantees to perform a price or cost analysis in order to test the market before exercising a renewal option. Accordingly, the County, through the Department, obtained price quotes for the Services from other potential service providers. Following this process, the Department is satisfied that the prices to be paid by the County to the City of New Rochelle and the City of Yonkers are reasonable. Accordingly, authority from your Honorable Board is requested to exercise the second of its four (4) one-year renewal options to renew the IMAs with the City of New Rochelle and the City of Yonkers for the provision of the Services for a term commencing retroactive to January 1, 2023 and continuing through December 31, 2023.

The Planning Department has advised that based on its review, the proposed agreements with NYSOFA and the proposed IMAs described above do not meet the definition of an "action" under the State Environmental Quality Review Act, 6 NYCRR part 617. As such, no environmental review is required. Please refer to the memorandum from the Department of Planning dated January 12, 2023, which is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Legislators.

The proposed Grant Agreement with NYSOFA and the IMAs are intended to benefit the County by assisting in the provision of grant-funded services to County residents. Accordingly, I believe the proposed Grant Agreement with NYSOFA and the proposed IMA extensions are in the best interest of the County and, therefore, recommend your favorable action on the annexed proposed Act.

AN ACT authorizing the County of Westchester to enter into a grant agreement with the New York State Office for the Aging to accept grant funds under Title III-B of the Older Americans Act and also to exercise the second of its four (4) one-year renewal options under inter-municipal agreements with the City of New Rochelle and the City of Yonkers for information and assistance services

BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Legislators of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. The County of Westchester (the "County") be and hereby is authorized to enter into a grant agreement (the "Grant Agreement") with the New York State Office for the Aging ("NYSOFA") to accept grant funds made available to the County under Title III-B of the Older Americans Act ("OAA") to provide information and assistance services to seniors (the "Services"), in the total aggregate not-to-exceed amount of \$60,465. The Grant Agreement will be for a term commencing retroactive to January 1, 2023 and continuing through December 31, 2023.

§2. The County is further authorized to exercise the second of its four (4) one-year renewal options under inter-municipal agreements ("IMAs") with the City of New Rochelle and the City of Yonkers, for the Services to be funded under the Grant Agreement, in the total aggregate not-to-exceed amount of \$60,465, for a term commencing retroactive to January 1, 2023 and continuing through December 31, 2023 (the "Second Extension Term").

§3. The amount of funding allocated for each IMA under the Second Extension Term shall be determined at the discretion of the Commissioner of the Department of Senior Services and Programs.

§4. The County Executive or his authorized designee is hereby empowered to execute all instruments and take all actions reasonable and necessary to effectuate the purposes hereof.

§5. This Act shall take effect immediately.

THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, a municipal corporation of the State of New York, having an office and place of business in the Michaelian Office Building, 148 Martine Avenue, White Plains, New York, 10601 (hereinafter referred to as the "County")

and

THE CITY OF ______, a municipal corporation organized under the laws of the State of New York, having an office and principal place of business at ________(hereinafter referred to as the "Municipality" and the Municipality and the County shall be collectively referred to as the "Parties")

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the County and the Municipality entered into that certain agreement ("Agreement"), dated on or about July 19, 2021, whereby the Municipality agreed to provide Information and Assistance services in accordance with Title I, Section 102(28) and Title III, Part B, Section 321 (a)(3) of the Older Americans Act, as amended, and its implementing regulations, 45 CFR Part 1321 et seq. ("OAA"), and New York State Office for the Aging ("NYSOFA") Program Instruction No. 14-PI-02 (the "Program"), for the period from January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021 (the "Initial Term"), for an amount not to exceed <u>\$</u> in federal funds, with the County having the option to renew the Agreement for up to four (4) additional extension terms of one (1) year each (each an "Extension Term"); and

WHEREAS, the Parties entered into a first amendment to the Agreement ("First Amendment") pursuant to which the County, among other things, exercised the first of its four (4) options to extend the term of the Agreement for the period from January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022 for an amount not-to-exceed \$_____ (the "First Extension Term"); and

WHEREAS, the Parties now desire to enter into this second amendment ("Second Amendment") to the Agreement so that the County may, among other things, exercise the second of its four (4) options to extend the term of the Agreement for the period from January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023 for an amount not-to-exceed \$_____ (the "Second Extension Term"); and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms, conditions, covenants, and agreements contained herein, the Parties agree as follows:

1. The term of the Agreement is hereby extended for an additional one (1) year period, commencing on January 1, 2023 and terminating on December 31, 2023 (the "Second Extension Term").

2. During the Second Extension Term, the Municipality shall continue to provide the Program services referenced in Paragraph "1" of the Agreement.

3. In consideration for the Program services to be rendered during the Second Extension Term, the Municipality shall be paid an amount not exceed <u>\$</u>, for actual services provided and data entered in NYSOFA's PeerPlace System in accordance with the agreed-upon unit costs set forth in Schedule "B-2", attached hereto and made a part hereof.

4. The Contractor is required to contribute \$_____ in matching funds to the Program.

5. The Municipality agrees to sign the attestation attached hereto as Schedule "C-2" and made a part hereof, to comply with the Targeting and updated Poverty Guidelines as set forth therein, and furnish the County with the Westchester County Grant Funding for 2023 as specified therein.

6. The Agreement is hereby further amended by incorporating the updated Standard Assurances, as mandated by the NYSOFA, including but not limited to, a revised list of federal and state statutes, regulations, policies and contract provisions applicable to the Program, which are attached hereto and made a part hereof as Schedule "E-2". Municipality agrees to fully comply with these updated Standard Assurances.

7. The Municipality shall furnish to the County updated insurance certificates evidencing coverage for the Second Extension Term as required under the Agreement.

8. The Municipality agrees to furnish the County with a copy of the organization-wide audit and to comply with the Plan for Audit as required under the Agreement.

9. Except as otherwise expressly provided herein, all other terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect upon the Parties.

10. This Second Amendment shall not be effective until signed by both Parties and approved by the Office of the County Attorney.

Your Honorable Board is advised that the Department has complied with the Westchester County Procurement Policy and Procedures (the "Policy"), noting that the Grant Agreements with NYSOFA do not constitute a procurement, and that the IMAs are exempt from the Policy pursuant to section 3(a) iii thereof, which exempts contracts with "... any State and any political subdivision, agency or instrumentality thereof." The IMAs are also exempt pursuant to section 3(a) xix of the Policy, which exempts "any procurement for the purpose of entering into a contract with persons to provide direct services to senior citizens."

Although these Services are exempt from the Policy, they are funded with Federal grant monies and, as such are, pursuant to Section 13 of the Policy, subject to Federal procurement requirements. The Federal procurement regulations (2 CFR§ 200.320), require that contracts in amounts greater than \$10,000 and up to \$250,000, be procured by obtaining price or rate quotations from an adequate number of qualified sources, unless such contracts are deemed to be "non-competitive" procurements. Because the Services are being provided directly by the respective Municipalities using their own resources (i.e., senior centers, buses, food service providers, equipment, etc.), it has been determined that these Services constitute non-competitive procurements in accordance with 2 CFR§ 200.320 (c)(2), in that due to the nature and extent of the services being provided, the Services are only available from those single sources.

It should be noted that your Honorable Board has previously approved similar legislation pursuant to Act No. 37 - 2022. However, the existing authorization expired on December 31, 2022 and a new authorization will be needed to enter into new Grant Agreements and IMAs.

The Planning Department has advised that based on its review, the proposed IMAs described above do not meet the definition of an "action" under the State Environmental Quality Review Act, 6 NYCRR part 617. As such, no environmental review is required. Please refer to the memorandum from the Department of Planning dated January 12, 2023, which is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Legislators.

The proposed Grant Agreements with NYSOFA and the proposed IMAs are intended to benefit the County by assisting in the provision of grant-funded services to County residents. Accordingly, I believe the proposed Grant Agreements with NYSOFA and the proposed IMAs are in the best interest of the County and, therefore, recommend your favorable action on the annexed proposed Act.

THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, a corporation of the State of New York, having an office and place of business in the Michaelian Office Building, 148 Martine Avenue, White Plains, New York, 10601 (hereinafter referred to as the "County")

and

a municipal corporation organized under the laws of the State of New York, having an office and place of business at

(hereinafter referred to as the "Municipality" and together with the County hereinafter referred to as the "Parties")

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the County, acting by and through its Department of Senior Programs and Services ("Department" or "DSPS"), has been awarded a grant by the New York State Office for the Aging ("NYSOFA"), pursuant to Titles III-C-1, III-C-2 and the Nutrition Services Incentive Program ("NSIP") of the Older Americans Act (the "Programs"), to provide various social and nutrition services to elderly residents of the County (the "Services" or "Work"); and

WHEREAS, the Municipality desires to provide the Services and the County desires the Municipality to provide the Services pursuant to the terms and conditions set forth herein; and

WHEREAS, the County has been authorized by the Westchester County Board of Legislators to enter into the Agreement for the Services.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms, conditions, covenants, and agreements contained herein, the Parties agree as follows:

1. The Municipality shall provide the Services, as more particularly described in Schedule "C". All Services must be performed in accordance with the terms of the Standard Assurances in Schedule "C" and the Standard Assurances in the approved Four Year Plan and/or Annual Update to the Four Year Plan (collectively the "Plan) attached hereto and made a part hereof in the form of Schedule "I." It is expressly understood and agreed by the Parties hereto that all schedules to this Agreement applicable to the NYSOFA and all schedules applicable to the County are subject to the approval of and modification of each, as necessary.

The County may, in its discretion, if it shall deem such payment to be required in furtherance of the Programs, pay the Municipality prior to receipt of payment or approval therefore by NYSOFA, provided that, in the event NYSOFA subsequently fails or refuses to pay the County, or if such expense is not a proper expenditure under the Programs, the Municipality shall reimburse the County for such payment made to the Municipality, or, the County, in its discretion, may deduct such amount from future payments due and owing the Municipality under this Agreement.

The Municipality shall contribute an aggregate amount of \$______to the Services, as a match for the III-C-1 and/or III-C-2 Programs.

Any and all requests for payment to be made, including any requests for partial payment made in proportion to the Services completed, shall be submitted by the Municipality on properly executed payment vouchers of the County and paid only after approval by the Commissioner. All payment vouchers must be accompanied by a numbered invoice and/or the appropriate required back-up documentation approved by the Department. All invoices submitted during each calendar year shall utilize consecutive numbering and be non-repeating. In no event shall final payment be made to the Municipality prior to the completion of all Services, the submission of reports and the approval of same by the Commissioner.

The Municipality shall, at no additional charge, furnish all labor, services, materials, goods, equipment and any other things necessary to complete the Services, unless specific additional

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charges are expressly permitted under this Agreement. It is recognized and understood that even if specific additional charges are expressly permitted under this Agreement; in no event shall total payment to the Municipality exceed the not-to-exceed amount set forth above.

Except as otherwise expressly stated in this Agreement, no payment shall be made by the County to the Municipality for out-of-pocket expenses or disbursements made in connection with the Services rendered or the Services to be performed hereunder.

3. Prior to the making of any payments hereunder, the County may, at its option, audit such books and records of the Municipality as are reasonably pertinent to this Agreement to substantiate the basis for payment. The County will not withhold payment pursuant to this paragraph for more than thirty (30) days after payment would otherwise be due pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement, unless the County shall find cause to withhold payment in the course of such audit or the Municipality fails to cooperate with such audit. The County shall, in addition, have the right to audit such books and records subsequent to payment, if such audit is commenced within one year following termination of this Agreement.

In addition to any general audit rights to which the County may be entitled hereunder, the County also reserves the right to audit the Municipality's performance under this Agreement. Such audit may include requests for documentation or other information which the Commissioner may, in her discretion, deem necessary and appropriate to verify the information provided by the Municipality as required by Paragraph "4." The County may also make site visits to the location(s) where the Services to be provided under this Agreement are performed in order to review Municipality's records, observe the performance of Services and/or to conduct interviews of staff and patrons, where appropriate and not otherwise prohibited by law.

The Municipality agrees to maintain appropriate records and to retain them for at least six years after final payment is made. The Municipality agrees to provide access to all books, documents and all pertinent materials related to this Agreement for examination to authorized representatives of the Administration on Aging/Administration for Community Living (AoA/ACL) of the United States Department of Health and Human Services ("HHS"), the New York State Comptroller or his representatives, staff of NYSOFA, and/or the County.

4. Under this Agreement, the term of the Title III-C Programs shall commence retroactive to January 1, 2023 and continue through on December 31, 2023, and the term for the NSIP Program shall commence retroactive to October 1, 2022 and continue through September 30,

2023, unless terminated sooner pursuant to the provisions hereof.

The Municipality shall report to the County on its progress toward completing the Services, as the Commissioner may request, and shall immediately inform the Commissioner in writing of any cause for delay in the performance of its obligations under this Agreement.

5. The Parties recognize and acknowledge that the obligations of the County under this Agreement are subject to the County's receipt of funds from NYSOFA to operate the Program, and that no liability shall be incurred by the County beyond the monies made available from NYSOFA for this Agreement. The Municipality agrees that the County shall not be liable for any of the payments hereunder unless and until the County Commissioner of the Department of Finance has received said funds or said funds have been made available to said commissioner.

If, for any reason, the full amount of said funds is not paid over or made available to the County by NYSOFA, the County may terminate this Agreement immediately or reduce the amount payable to the Municipality, in the discretion of the County. The County shall give prompt notice of any such termination or reduction to the Municipality. If the County subsequently offers to pay a reduced amount to the Municipality, then the Municipality shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon reasonable prior written notice.

In addition, the Parties recognize and acknowledge that the obligations of the County under this Agreement are subject to annual appropriations by its Board of Legislators pursuant to the Laws of Westchester County. Therefore, this Agreement shall be deemed executory only to the extent of the monies appropriated and available. The County shall have no liability under this Agreement beyond funds appropriated and available for payment pursuant to this Agreement. The Parties understand and intend that the obligation of the County hereunder shall constitute a current expense of the County and shall not in any way be construed to be a debt of the County in contravention of any applicable constitutional or statutory limitations or requirements concerning the creation of indebtedness by the County, nor shall anything contained in this Agreement constitute a pledge of the general tax revenues, funds or moneys of the County. The County shall pay amounts due under this Agreement exclusively from legally available funds appropriated for this purpose. The County shall retain the right, upon the occurrence of the adoption of any County Budget by its Board of Legislators during the term of this Agreement or any amendments thereto, and for a reasonable period of time after such adoption(s), to conduct an analysis of the impacts of any such County Budget on County finances. After such analysis, the County shall retain the right to either terminate this Agreement or to renegotiate the amounts and rates set forth herein. If the County subsequently offers to pay a reduced amount to the Municipality, then the Municipality shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon reasonable prior written notice.

6. The Municipality shall comply, at its own expense, with the provisions of all applicable Federal, State and local laws, rules, regulations executive orders, policies, orders, notices and related guidance, as specified in the Plan, as such provisions may be amended from time to time, (such Federal provisions being "Federal Requirements").

In addition, the Municipality shall cause to be prominently posted, on the site where Services hereunder are to be provided, a statement regarding non-discrimination, which statement shall be similar in form to the following:

> "In compliance with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1975 and Title VI of the 1964 Civil Rights Act and New York State Executive Law and orders, no persons will be denied service or access to service based upon race, creed, color, national origin, religion, marital status, sexual orientation, genetic predisposition, carrier status, or handicapping condition."

Without limiting any of the foregoing, the Municipality specifically agrees to the following:

- (a) Regarding access to records and access to sites where the Services are performed:
 - i.) In compliance with 45 C.F.R. 75.364(a), the Municipality agrees to provide the County, HHS and its awarding agency, the Comptroller General of the United States, any inspectors general, or any of the duly authorized representatives of any of these listed parties, access to any documents, papers, or other records which are pertinent to this Agreement in order to make audits, examinations, excerpts, and transcripts, as well as provide timely and reasonable access to the Municipality's personnel for the purpose of interview and discussion related to such documents. The Municipality agrees to allow the above-listed parties to reproduce, excerpt, and/or transcribe such documents, papers, and other records by any means whatsoever. The Municipality also agrees to allow the above-listed parties such other access to records as may be necessary for compliance with applicable Federal Requirements.
 - ii.) In accordance with 45 C.F.R. 75.364(c), all of the above-described rights of access to records shall last for as long as the records are retained by the Municipality. The Municipality shall retain all such records for at least as long as is required under 45 C.F.R. 75.361.
 - iii.) In compliance with 45 C.F.R. § 75.342(e), the Municipality agrees to

permit HHS to make site visits as needed.

- (b) Regarding recovered materials:
 - i.) The Municipality agrees to comply with all applicable requirements of 45 C.F.R. 75.331; Section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act and as further amended (42 U.S.C. § 6962); 40 C.F.R. Part 247, the United States Environmental Protection Agency's "Comprehensive Procurement Guideline for Products Containing Recovered Materials"; and Executive Order 12873.
- (c) Regarding the procurement of subcontracts financed in whole or in part with the Funds:
 - i.) The Municipality agrees to comply with 45 C.F.R. 75.330 in procuring any subcontract financed in whole or in part with the Funds.
- (d) The Municipality agrees to comply with and/or assist the County in complying with any and all applicable requirements of HHS.

The Municipality hereby represents and warrants that it has all information it needs regarding the Federal Requirements concerning reporting, patent rights, copyrights, and rights in data, and the Municipality understands and acknowledges that all such requirements and regulations are hereby incorporated into this Agreement by reference, and shall prevail over any conflicting term(s) of this Agreement.

The Municipality understands that the County has relied upon all materials and representations it has provided to the County concerning the Services and this Agreement in, a.) considering, among other things, whether the Municipality is capable of successfully performing under the terms and conditions of this Agreement; the Municipality's integrity and ethics; whether executing this Agreement with the Municipality is in compliance with public policy; the Municipality's record of past performance; and the Municipality's financial, administrative, and technical resources and capacity, b.) consequently determining that the Municipality is a responsible contractor, and c.) awarding this Agreement to the Municipality.

It is the intent and understanding of the Parties that each and every provision required by law, contract, or other proper authority to be included in this Agreement shall, for all intents and purposes, be considered and deemed included herein. The Municipality understands and acknowledges that for each and every such provision that has, through mistake or otherwise, either not been inserted in writing or been inserted in writing in an incorrect form, the Municipality hereby consents to amending this Agreement in writing, upon receipt of notice from the County, for the purpose of inserting or correcting the provision in question.

7. The Municipality expressly agrees neither it nor any contractor, subcontractor, employee or any other person acting on its behalf shall discriminate against or intimidate any employee or other individual on the basis of race, creed, religion, color, gender, age, national origin, ethnicity, alienage or citizenship status, disability, marital status, sexual orientation, familial status, genetic predisposition or carrier status during the term of or in connection with this Agreement, as those terms may be defined in Chapter 700 of the Laws of Westchester County or Section 291 of the New York State Human Rights Law. The Municipality acknowledges and understands that the County maintains a zero tolerance policy prohibiting all forms of harassment or discrimination against its employees by co-workers, supervisors, vendors, contractors, or others.

8. (a) There shall be no partisan political activity in connection with this Agreement, including (i) candidate endorsements (ii) registration activities which are partisan in nature (iii) scheduled meetings of services recipients with public officials or candidates unless event is open on an equal basis to all candidates and officials regardless of policy views or partisan affiliation. This does not preclude the legitimate right of elected officials and other community leaders to visit programs in their areas.

(b) The Municipality shall refrain and prevent the use by others under its control of official authority, influence or coercion to interfere with or affect elections or nominations for political office.

(c) The Municipality shall refrain from and prohibit any others receiving funds under this Agreement from attempting to coerce or advise other persons to contribute anything of value to a party, committee, organization, agency or person for political purposes, nor engage in any other partisan activities under its auspices. The Municipality shall refrain from using funds to advance any partisan effort.

(d) The Municipality shall ensure that any Services to be provided under this Agreement shall be secular in nature and scope and in no event shall there be any sectarian or religious services, counseling, proselytizing, instruction or other sectarian, religious influence undertaken in connection with the provision of such Services. The Municipality shall refrain from using funds to advance any sectarian effort.

9. (a) The Municipality acknowledges (i) that this Agreement may be funded in whole or in part with funds to be provided to the County under State or Federal program grants, (ii) that the County cannot insure that all of such funds as are presently earmarked by the County for use in connection with this Agreement will ultimately be delivered to the County by the relevant grantor, and (iii) that the County's obligation to pay the Municipality for expenditures which are to be reimbursed with such funds extends only to the extent that such funds are actually received by the County.

(b) The County shall have the right to terminate or modify this Agreement based on changes in the availability of State and/or Federal Funds.

10. (a) As a material element of this Agreement, the Municipality agrees to fully comply with the provisions required by NYSOFA concerning equal access to services, non-discrimination and concentration of services on target populations, as more fully set forth in the Plan.

(b) Attached hereto and forming a part of Schedule "M" is the "Participant Contribution Standards." The Municipality shall provide participants an opportunity to voluntarily contribute to the cost of the service received, as appropriate. The Municipality shall use all collected contributions to expand the Service/s for which the contributions were given to supplement the funds received under the Older Americans Act (OAA).

(c) The Municipality shall assist participants in taking advantage of benefits under other Services and assure that the Services provided are coordinated and do not unnecessarily duplicate services provided by other sources.

11. Statistical information and supporting documentation concerning the Services conducted hereunder shall be provided to the County by the Municipality on request of the County. The Municipality shall provide the County with timely information needed to satisfy reporting requirements as specified by NYSOFA. Documentation of reports and expenses shall include, without limiting the right to require additional documentation: invoices for all purchases, payroll time records, payroll records for local support contribution, municipal payment vouchers for governmental agencies and canceled checks for private agencies, as required.

The Programmatic monthly reporting system for Service Delivery Information and Service Recipient Information must be submitted electronically in PeerPlace or other NYSOFA approved electronic reporting system. Until further notice, the Municipality is required to mail in the

PeerPlace MONTHLY ELECTRONIC PAPER REPORT and/or other approved reporting measure, signed by the staff member responsible for the report. The reports should be received by the County no later than the tenth (10th) day of the following month and/or entered on the website at the same time. The Municipality understands and agrees that submission of the monthly report by the deadline set forth above constitutes a material element of this Agreement. The County reserves the right to withhold payment to Municipality for its failure to submit the monthly report by the deadline, until such time as the monthly report is received by the County. Repeated failures by Municipality to submit the monthly report by the stated deadline will constitute a material breach of this Agreement justifying termination for cause as provided in Paragraph "17" hereof.

The Municipality shall furnish the County with copies of all insurance certificates, food contracts, rental agreements, and transportation agreements relating to the Services provided by the Municipality hereunder, as applicable.

12. The Municipality agrees to procure and maintain insurance naming the County as additional insured, as provided and described in Schedule "A," entitled "Standard Insurance Provisions," which is attached hereto and made a part hereof. In addition to, and not in limitation of, the insurance provisions contained in Schedule "A," the Municipality agrees:

(a) that except for the amount, if any, of damage contributed to, caused by, or resulting from the sole negligence of the County, the Municipality shall indemnify and hold harmless the County, its officers, employees, agents, and elected officials from and against any and all liability, damage, claims, demands, costs, judgments, fees, attorney's fees or loss arising directly or indirectly out of the performance or failure to perform hereunder by the Municipality or third parties under the direction or control of the Municipality; and

(b) to provide defense for and defend, at its sole expense, any and all claims, demands or causes of action directly or indirectly arising out of this Agreement and to bear all other costs and expenses related thereto; and

c) in the event the Municipality does not provide the above defense and indemnification to the County, and such refusal or denial to provide the above defense and indemnification is found to be in breach of this provision, then the Municipality shall reimburse the County's reasonable attorney's fees incurred in connection with the defense of any action, and in connection with enforcing this provision of the Agreement.

d) the Municipality may provide proof of self-insurance in lieu of insurance policies.

13. The Municipality agrees that any program, public information materials, or other printed or published materials on the Services of the Programs which are supported with Title III-C funds will give due recognition to NYSOFA, the Department, and HHS.

14. The Municipality shall provide adequate qualified and trained personnel for supervision and fiscal management of the Programs.

15. The Parties agree that the Municipality and its officers, employees, agents, contractors, consultants and/or subcontractors are independent contractors and not employees of the County or any department, agency or unit thereof. In accordance with their status as independent contractors, the Municipality covenants and agrees that neither the Municipality nor any of its officers, employees, agents, contractors, consultants, and/or subcontractors will hold themselves out as, or claim to be, officers or employees of the County or any department, agency or unit thereof.

16. (a) The County, upon ten (10) days' notice to the Municipality, may terminate this Agreement in whole or in part when the County deems it to be in its best interest. In such event, the Municipality shall be compensated and the County shall be liable only for payment for Services already rendered under this Agreement prior to the effective date of termination at the rates specified in Schedule "B." Upon receipt of notice that the County is terminating this Agreement in its best interests, the Municipality shall stop Services immediately and incur no further costs in furtherance of this Agreement without the express approval of the Commissioner, and the Municipality shall direct any approved subcontractors to do the same.

In the event of a dispute as to the value of the Services rendered by the Municipality prior to the date of termination, it is understood and agreed that the Commissioner shall determine the value of such Services rendered by the Municipality. The Municipality shall accept such reasonable and good faith determination as final.

(b) In the event the County determines that there has been a material breach by the Municipality of any of the terms of the Agreement and such breach remains uncured for fortyeight (48) hours after service on the Municipality of written notice thereof, the County, in addition to any other right or remedy it might have, may terminate this Agreement and the County shall have the right, power and authority to complete the Services provided for in this Agreement, or

contract for its completion, and any additional expense or cost of such completion shall be charged to and paid by the Municipality. Without limiting the foregoing, upon written notice to the Municipality, repeated breaches by the Municipality of duties or obligations under this Agreement shall be deemed a material breach of this Agreement justifying termination for cause hereunder without requirement for further opportunity to cure.

17. Failure of the County to insist, in any one or more instances, upon strict performance of any term or condition herein contained shall not be deemed a waiver or relinquishment of such term or condition, but the same shall remain in full force and effect. Acceptance by the County of any of the Services or the payment of any fee or reimbursement due hereunder with knowledge of a breach of any term or condition hereof, shall not be deemed a waiver of any such breach and no waiver by the County of any provision hereof shall be implied.

18. If equipment costing \$1,000.00 or more is purchased with any Federal or State funds under this Plan, and the equipment is no longer needed for activities supported by such Programs, NYSOFA /County reserve the right to select a recipient for and approve the transfer to such recipient of such equipment, which must be used for services to older adults. The Municipality understands, acknowledges, and agrees that it shall have no ownership interest in such equipment.

19. All notices of any nature referred to in this Agreement shall be in writing and either sent by registered or certified mail postage pre-paid, or sent by hand or overnight courier, or sent by facsimile (with acknowledgment received and a copy of the notice sent by overnight courier), to the respective addresses set forth below or to such other addresses as the respective Parties hereto may designate in writing. Notice shall be effective on the date of receipt.

To the Municipality:

20. Attached hereto and forming part hereof is the schedule listed below. Simultaneous with its execution of this Agreement, the Municipality shall provide the County with a completed copy of each schedule. The Municipality agrees that the terms of the schedule has been accepted and agreed-to by the Municipality by virtue of its execution of this Agreement, and the Municipality represents and warrants that it has completed the schedule accurately and completely.

6.) Schedule "D" — "Vendor Direct Program - Electronic Funds Transfer"

All payments made by the County to the Municipality will be made by electronic funds transfer ("EFT") pursuant to the County's Vendor Direct Program. If the Contractor is not already enrolled in the Vendor Direct Program, the Contractor shall fill out and submit an EFT Authorization Form as part of this Agreement. (In rare cases, a hardship waiver may be granted. For a Hardship Waiver Request Form, the Municipality understands that it must contact the County's Finance Department.)

If the Municipality is already enrolled in the Vendor Direct Program, the Municipality hereby agrees to immediately notify the County's Finance Department in writing if the EFT Authorization Form on file must be changed, and provide an updated version of the document.

21. (a) The Municipality represents and warrants that it, its principals, and affiliates (as defined in 2 C.F.R. Part 180) are not currently debarred or suspended and the Municipality agrees to complete the "Certification Regarding Debarment and Suspension," which is attached hereto and forming a part of Schedule "J." The Municipality agrees that it shall immediately notify the County if it, its principals, and/or affiliates is/are debarred or suspended, or its, its principals', and/or affiliates' debarment or suspension appears likely. The Municipality further agrees to comply, and to require its subcontractors to comply, with the debarment and suspension regulations in 2 C.F.R. Part 376, as well as the applicable requirements of 2 C.F.R. Part 180.

The Municipality represents and warrants that it is not currently excluded from receiving Federal contracts, certain subcontracts, and certain types of Federal financial and non-financial assistance and benefits, by virtue of being on the United States General Service Administration's the Excluded Parties List System (EPLS), available at http://www.sam.gov as

part of the System for Awards Management (SAM). The Municipality agrees that it shall immediately notify the County if it is so-excluded, or its exclusion appears likely.

The Municipality represents and warrants that it is not currently on any debarment, suspension, or exclusion list of New York State or any political subdivision thereof, and has not been found non-responsible by New York State or any political subdivision thereof. The Municipality agrees that it shall immediately notify the County if it is added to any debarment, suspension, or exclusion list of New York State or any political subdivision thereof, or its addition to such lists appears likely. The Municipality agrees that it shall immediately notify the County if it is found non-responsible by New York State or any political subdivision thereof, or its addition to such lists appears likely. The Municipality agrees that it shall immediately notify the County if it is found non-responsible by New York State or any political subdivision thereof, or such a finding of non-responsibility appears likely.

The Municipality understands and acknowledges that the County is relying upon the Municipality's above-described representations and warranties.

Without limiting any of the foregoing, the Municipality certifies that, to the best of its knowledge and belief, it is and will be in compliance with 2 C.F.R. Part 376, regarding nonprocurement, debarment and suspension concerning public (Federal, State or local) transactions. If necessary, the Municipality will submit an explanation of why it cannot provide this certification.

(b) (Required for Agreements over \$100,000): The Municipality agrees to complete the "Certification Regarding Drug-Free Workplace Requirements," which is attached hereto and forming a part of Schedule "K," in order to help ensure compliance with 41 U.S.C. § 8101 et seq. and 2 C.F.R. Part 382.

(c) (Required for Agreements over \$100,000): The Municipality agrees to complete the "Certification of Restrictions on Lobbying," which is attached hereto and forming a part of Schedule "L," in compliance with 45 C.F.R. Part 93, and to otherwise comply with 45 C.F.R. Part 93 and 31 U.S.C. § 1352.

22. This Agreement and its attachments constitute the entire Agreement between the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede all previous negotiations, commitments and writings. It shall not be released, discharged, changed or modified except by an instrument in writing, signed by a duly authorized representative of each of the Parties.

In the event of any conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the terms of any schedule or attachment hereto, it is understood that the terms of this Agreement shall be controlling with respect to any interpretation of the meaning and intent of the Parties.

23. The Municipality shall ensure that where the State or local public jurisdiction requires licensure or certification for the provision of social services, the Municipality and its approved subcontractors providing such services under the approved the Plan shall be so licensed or certified. Workers delivering services must be appropriately qualified, selected trained and supervised.

24. All records or recorded data of any kind compiled by the Municipality in completing the Services described in this Agreement, including but not limited to written reports, studies, drawings, blueprints, computer printouts, graphs, charts, plans, specifications and all other similar recorded data, shall become and remain the property of the County. The Municipality may retain copies of such records for its own use and shall not disclose any such information without the express written consent of the Commissioner. The County shall have the right to reproduce and publish such records, if it so desires, at no additional cost to the County.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, all deliverables created under this Agreement by the Municipality are to be considered "works made for hire." If any of the deliverables do not qualify as "Services made for hire," the Municipality hereby assigns to the County all right, title and interest (including ownership of copyright) in such deliverables and such assignment allows the County to obtain in its name copyrights, registrations and similar protections which may be available. The Municipality agrees to assist the County, if required, in perfecting these rights. The Municipality shall provide the County with at least one copy of each deliverable.

The Municipality agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the County for all damages, liabilities, losses and expenses arising out of any claim that a deliverable infringes upon an intellectual property right of a third party. If such a claim is made, or appears likely to be made, the Municipality agrees to enable the County's continued use of the deliverable, or to modify or replace it. If the County determines that none of these alternatives is reasonably available, the deliverable may be returned.

25. The Municipality shall not delegate any duties or assign any of its rights under this Agreement without the prior express written consent of the County. The Municipality shall not subcontract any part of the Services without the written consent of the County, subject to any

necessary legal approvals. Any purported delegation of duties, assignment of rights or subcontracting of Services under this Agreement without the prior express written consent of the County is void. All subcontracts that have received such prior written consent shall provide that subcontractors are subject to all terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. It is recognized and understood by the Municipality that for the purposes of this Agreement, all Services performed by a County-approved subcontractor shall be deemed Services performed by the Municipality and the Municipality shall insure that such subcontracted Services is subject to the material terms and conditions of this Agreement. All subcontracts for the Services shall expressly reference the subcontractor's duty to comply with the material terms and conditions of this Agreement and shall attach a copy of the County's contract with the Municipality. The Municipality shall obtain a written acknowledgement from the owner and/or chief executive of subcontractor or his/her duly authorized representative that the subcontractor has received a copy of the County's Agreement, read it and is familiar with the material terms and conditions thereof. The Municipality shall include provisions in its subcontracts designed to ensure that the Municipality and/or its auditor has the right to examine all relevant books, records, documents or electronic data of the subcontractor necessary to review the subcontractor's compliance with the material terms and conditions of this Agreement.

If the Municipality enters into subcontracts for the performance of Services pursuant to this Agreement, the Municipality shall take full responsibility for the acts and omissions of its subcontractors. Nothing in the subcontract shall impair the rights of the County under this Agreement or the Area Agency Plan as approved by NYSOFA. It shall be the responsibility of the Municipality to monitor and assess the activities performed under such subcontracts, and to ensure that these activities are provided in accordance with all applicable requirements contained in this Agreement and federal and state law.

The Municipality agrees that, to the extent it or its subcontractors, if any, maintains personal information relating to applicants or recipients of Services pursuant to this Agreement, such information will be kept confidential and shared with the County; or with other entities upon the consent of applicant, recipient or an authorized representative of the applicant or recipient; or as required by federal or state laws.

26. Nothing herein is intended or shall be construed to confer upon or give to any third party or its successors and assigns any rights, remedies or basis for reliance upon, under or by reason of this Agreement, except in the event that specific third party rights are expressly granted

herein.

27. The Municipality recognizes that this Agreement does not grant the Municipality the exclusive right to perform the Services for the County and that the County may enter into similar agreements with other contractors on an "as needed" basis.

28. The Municipality hereby represents that, if operating under an assumed name, it has filed the necessary certificate pursuant to New York State General Business Law Section 130.

29. This Agreement may be executed simultaneously in several counterparts, each of which shall be an original and all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument. This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of New York. In addition, the Parties hereby agree that any cause of action arising out of this Agreement shall be brought in the County.

If any term or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or void or unenforceable, the remainder of the terms and provisions of this Agreement shall in no way be affected, impaired, or invalidated, and to the extent permitted by applicable law, any such term, or provision shall be restricted in applicability or reformed to the minimum extent required for such to be enforceable. This provision shall be interpreted and enforced to give effect to the original written intent of the Parties prior to the determination of such invalidity or unenforceability.

30. This Agreement shall not be enforceable until it is signed by both Parties and approved by the Office of the County Attorney.

SCHEDULE "A"

STANDARD INSURANCE PROVISIONS (Municipality)

1. Prior to commencing Services, and throughout the term of the Agreement, the Municipality shall obtain at its own cost and expense the required insurance as delineated below from insurance companies licensed in the State of New York, carrying a Best's financial rating of A or better. Municipality shall provide evidence of such insurance to the County of Westchester ("County"), either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County ("Director"). The policies or certificates thereof shall provide that ten (10) days prior to cancellation or material change in the policy, notices of same shall be given to the Director either by overnight mail or personal delivery for all of the following stated insurance policies. All notices shall name the Municipality and identify the Agreement.

If at any time any of the policies required herein shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing any such policy shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, the Municipality shall upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and submit the policy or the certificate as requested by the Director to the Office of Risk Management of the County for approval by the Director. Upon failure of the Municipality to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance, the Agreement, at the election of the County, may be declared suspended, discontinued or terminated.

Failure of the Municipality to take out, maintain, or the taking out or maintenance of any required insurance, shall not relieve the Municipality from any liability under the Agreement, nor shall the insurance requirements be construed to conflict with or otherwise limit the contractual obligations of the Municipality concerning indemnification.

All property losses shall be made payable to the "County of Westchester" and adjusted with the appropriate County personnel.

In the event that claims, for which the County may be liable, in excess of the insured amounts provided herein are filed by reason of Municipality's negligent acts or omissions under the Agreement or by virtue of the provisions of the labor law or other statute or any other reason, the amount of excess of such claims or any portion thereof, may be withheld from payment due or to become due the Municipality until such time as the Municipality shall furnish such additional security covering such claims in form satisfactory to the Director.

In the event of any loss, if the Municipality maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums identified herein, the County shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Municipality. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

2 The Municipality shall provide proof of the following coverage (if additional coverage is required for a specific agreement, those requirements will be described in the Agreement):

a) Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability. Certificate form C-105.2 or State Fund Insurance Company form U-26.3 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Workers' Compensation Law. State Workers' Compensation Board form DB-120.1 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Disability Benefits Law. Location of operation shall be "All locations in Westchester County, New York." Where an applicant claims to not be required to carry either a Workers' Compensation Policy or Disability Benefits Policy, or both, the employer must complete NYS form CE-200, available to download at: <u>http://www.wcb.ny.gov</u>.

If the employer is self-insured for Workers' Compensation, he/she should present a certificate from the New York State Worker's Compensation Board evidencing that fact (Either SI-12, Certificate of Workers' Compensation Self-Insurance, or GSI-105.2, Certificate of Participation in Workers' Compensation Group Self-Insurance).

b) Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 (c.s.1) per occurrence and a \$2,000,000 aggregate limit naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis. This insurance shall include the following coverages:

i.Premises - Operations. ii.Broad Form Contractual. iii.Independent Contractor and Sub-Contractor. iv.Products and Completed Operations.

c) Commercial Umbrella/Excess Insurance: \$2,000,000 each Occurrence and Aggregate naming the "County of Westchester" as additional insured, written on a "follow the form" basis.

NOTE: Additional insured status shall be provided by standard or other endorsement that extends coverage to the County of Westchester for both on-going and completed operations.

All Contracts involving the use of explosives, demolition and/or underground Services shall provide proof that XCU is covered.

- d) Automobile Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$1,000,000 for bodily injury and a minimum limit of \$100,000 per occurrence for property damage or a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 unless otherwise indicated in the contract specifications. This insurance shall include for bodily injury and property damage the following coverages and name the "County of Westchester" as additional insured:
 - (i) Owned automobiles.
 - (ii) Hired automobiles.
 - (iii) Non-owned automobiles.
 - 3. All policies of the Municipality shall be endorsed to contain the following clauses:

(a) Insurers shall have no right to recovery or subrogation against the County (including its employees and other agents and agencies), it being the intention of the parties that the insurance policies so effected shall protect both parties and be primary coverage for any and all losses covered by the above-described insurance.

(b) The clause "other insurance provisions" in a policy in which the County is named as an insured, shall not apply to the County.

(c) The insurance companies issuing the policy or policies shall have no recourse against the County (including its agents and agencies as aforesaid) for payment of any premiums or for assessments under any form of policy.

(d) Any and all deductibles in the above described insurance policies shall be assumed by and be for the account of, and at the sole risk of, the Municipality.

Westchester County Vendor Direct Program Frequently Asked Questions

1. WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF THE ELECTRONIC FUNDS TRANSFER (EFT) ASSOCIATED WITH THE VENDOR DIRECT PROGRAM?

There are several advantages to having your payments automatically deposited into your designated bank account via EFT:

Payments are secure – Paper checks can be lost in the mail or stolen, but money deposited directly into your bank account is more secure.

You save time – Money deposited into your bank account is automatic. You save the time of preparing and delivering the deposit to the bank. Additionally, the funds are immediately available to you.

2. ARE MY PAYMENTS GOING TO BE PROCESSED ON THE SAME SCHEDULE AS THEY WERE BEFORE VENDOR DIRECT? Yes.

3. HOW QUICKLY WILL A PAYMENT BE DEPOSITED INTO MY ACCOUNT?

Payments are deposited two business days after the voucher/invoice is processed. Saturdays, Sundays, and legal holidays are not considered business days.

INDEPENDENT OFFICE OF ASSIGNED COUNSEL

Annual Report for 2022

Overview of the Office

The Independent Office of Assigned Counsel is Westchester County's largest provider of mandated representation as defined by County Law Article 722, offering high quality legal representation by approximately 280 independent lawyers in private practice to low income people with cases in the Criminal and Family Courts of the county as well as criminal and family law appeals and matters related to parole violations, revocations and appeals.

The office was created and operates pursuant to Westchester County Law Chapter 186, passed unanimously by the County Board of Legislators and signed into law by County Executive George Latimer in 2021. It is governed by a Board of Directors comprised of members selected in accordance with the law. Oversight of this office is also provided by the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services (ILS).

Board of Directors Summary

Following establishment of the Board of Directors, its members studied issues relating to the administration of an assigned counsel panel. There were meetings with officials from ILS, the Legal Aid Society of Westchester County (LASW)—the long-time panel administrator replaced by this office, administrators from other counties in the state and heads of county departments that interface with the administration of the panel.

In June, 2022, the Board elected Wendy Marie Weathers, Esq. as its Chair. The Board also created a Hiring Subcommittee, worked with County Human Resources (HR) to create a job description to attract candidates with the skills and experience necessary for the Administrator and HR then determined a broad range of places to post the job description. The Hiring Subcommittee conducted numerous interviews and upon their conclusion, made a recommendation to the Board and to the County Executive. After the candidate was approved by both, the Board of Legislators unanimously approved the appointment of the Administrator.

The Board of Directors holds monthly public meetings during which time the Administrator reports to the Board and takes direction from directors.

Administrator's Summary

Below is a summary of the anticipated and unanticipated issues and hurdles as well as the definitive progress made since the OAC assumed responsibility for the administration of the assigned counsel panel on September 30, 2022.

Assumption of Responsibility on September 30, 2022

Prior to the OAC's assumption of responsibility for the administration of the assigned counsel panel, the County gave notice of termination to the Legal Aid Society (LAS) at least 30 days in advance. During this transition phase, Chair Weathers and the Administrator met with officials from the Legal Aid Society to obtain relevant data and other information, as well as officials from Indigent Legal Services and other county's Assigned Counsel Administrators.

Office Space

A lease was signed for approximately 2000 square feet of office space at 235 Main Street in White Plains. Renovations to the space, including upgrades for technology, are to be completed prior to the move in date, projected to be in early 2023.

Hiring

A search for the Deputy Administrator was conducted and, with the assistance of and consultation by the Hiring Subcommittee, a Deputy Administrator was hired.

After exhausting all search options to attract candidates for the two administrative support positions, two full-time staff members were hired, primarily to review vouchers submitted by attorneys and other service providers for payment by the Finance Department.

Administrator's Assessment of Program Status

During the transition phase, the Board Chair and the Administrator met with officials from LAS, ILS and the County. Information, particularly budget information, was sought from LAS; however, receipt was delayed, resulting in delays in assessing the budgetary needs and capacity of the OAC in the 4th Quarter of 2022 and into 2023.

On September 30, 2022, LAS transferred approximately 200 signed vouchers for payment and approximately the same number of assignment notices requiring creation of a blank voucher (a condition precedent to billing) to the OAC. The OAC also purchased the license to a case management system (CMS) to create vouchers, obtain and store data and have the capacity to generate reports based on the data.

As the Quarter progressed, several operational issues, including previous service gaps, emerged. They included the need to manually set up the vast majority of the approximately 280 attorneys in the (CMS) as they had no prior access to it, the lack of information recorded in the system, the failure to track the status of signed vouchers, the high volume of old, often closed cases for which no voucher had been generated, preventing the attorney or other service provider from submitting a bill, and the high number of pre-OAC vouchers rejected by the Finance Department due to provider error into the end of the Quarter.

Notwithstanding these complications, during the Quarter, the OAC has been planning a transition to a partial digital voucher system in 2023 that will facilitate payment to providers and provide greater insight into billing practices and quality of representation. As well, the OAC applied for and was awarded a grant from ILS that will provide resources to individuals facing actual or potential Family Court Act Abuse, Neglect and Termination of Parental Rights cases and their attorneys, has forged a partnership with the Osborne Association for the preparation of mitigation reports in criminal cases, and has applied for stipends to panel attorneys to support weekend arraignments, parole recognizance hearings and Raise the Age arraignments.

OAC Priorities

The following priorities guide the office's development into 2023 and beyond:

- 1. Service to providers
 - a. Responding to inquiries immediately
 - b. Transparency
 - c. Regular communication with panel members
 - d. Customer service oriented approach
 - e. Assisting attorneys to correct ministerial errors and miscalculations to facilitate prompt payment
- 2. Development of a paperless payment system
 - a. Reduces billing errors
 - b. Tracks billing practices
 - c. Tracks quality of representation metrics
 - d. Provides transparency and accountability allowing service providers to be updated on the status of their bills
- 3. Client access to counsel
 - a. Providing immediate access to interpreters with plans to expand services in 2023
 - b. Obtaining attorney access to Securus Jail video conferencing at no cost to attorneys
 - c. Grant funding to provide pre-petition representation to parents in Family Court Article 10 Abuse, Neglect and Termination of Parental Rights cases
- 4. Quality Enhancement Through Resources and Support for Attorneys
 - a. Investigators
 - b. Access to online legal research search engine for all panel attorneys
 - c. Access to Westchester Records through County Clerk's Office at no cost to attorney
 - d. Stipends for attorneys on special duty
 - i. representation at weekend arraignments
 - ii. representation at Raise the Age arraignments when needed
 - iii. representation at parolee Recognizance Hearings

Case Volume and Attorney Caseload

Due to the absence of data from the prior provider, the OAC cannot provide reliable data regarding case volume and attorney caseload. Moreover, due to service gaps by the prior provider, the OAC has been opening cases, focusing on providing vouchers for cases that were not opened by the prior provider from as far back as 2018, thereby calling into question the accuracy of past case numbers and delaying the opening of cases from Quarter 4. The impact of this prior service gap is projected to continue into 2023. OAC staff is looking at ways to streamline processes to address this issue.

Budget

The OAC submitted a budget proposal to Westchester County that was approved as part of the Westchester County 2023 Operating Budget, that shows a minimal impact to tax levy. Given limitations in forecasting the needs of a new office, it may be necessary to request amendments to the 2023 budget during the year. The office also submitted funding requests under ILS's

Distribution 13 three-year funding period to support the work of both criminal and family court practitioners and clients and a one-year budget under the Hurrell-Haring Quality Enhancement Grant for funding exclusively for criminal defense. Both budgets contain a mixture of staffing requests and funding for resources, including such things as investigators, interpreters and experts as well as funding for training, a mentor program and a Second Chair program.

Additionally, as noted above, the OAC was awarded a grant to enhance the quality of Parental Representation and provide funding for early access to parental representation in pre-petition Abuse, Neglect and Termination of Parental Rights cases. Some of those services are to benefit clients represented by Legal Services of the Hudson Valley. Also during the Quarter, the office applied for a grant to support attorney representation at weekend criminal arraignments.

Conclusion

In its first Quarter of operation, with oversight from the Board of Directors and ILS and tremendous assistance from numerous county departments, OAC staff has worked hard to identify needed resources to enhance representation and provide training, funding and support for attorneys to do their finest work. The office is also focusing on ensuring early access to counsel by those in need of representation without the financial means to retain counsel.

While staff has been hampered by the pressing need to address widespread service gaps preceding OAC's assumption of responsibility that affected attorneys and caused payment delays, plans are nearing completion to transition to a partial digital payment system by the end of the Second Quarter of 2023 that will significantly reduce billing errors and track billing practices and quality of representation while allowing providers to see the status of their bills.

Plans for 2023 include implementation of the funding initiatives outlined above as well as the implementation of a digital payment system, setting performance standards, recruitment planning and the development of a robust training program.

In compliance with County Law §406, I hereby submit the Annual Report of the Westchester County Clerk for the fiscal year 2022. The duties of the County Clerk are mandated by the New York State Constitution and by federal, state and local law. These duties are carried out by dedicated staff who work diligently to serve the public.

Each service provided by the County Clerk's office impacts the lives of residents and businesses throughout the county and the nation. Each deed, mortgage, court record, judgment, business certification or incorporation and pistol license is filed and recorded in the Office of the Westchester County Clerk.

The Office of the Westchester County Clerk collected \$276,776,087.35 in 2022, of which \$35,432,914.03 was turned over to the county. The expenditures for the County Clerk's office in 2022, totaling \$6,288,068.90 are offset by the \$9,212,155.87 in revenue collected.

Our office collects fees on behalf of numerous federal and state agencies, and paid out the following 2022 revenue:

- \$108,504,967.67 to the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance for transfer tax
- \$56,076,643.94 to the Metropolitan Transit Authority for mortgage tax
- \$4,797,234.00 to the Unified Court System for court filing fees
- \$6,230,337.52 to the State of New York Mortgage Agency for mortgage tax
- \$2,173,966.00 to the New York State Office of Real Property Tax Services
- \$1,317,569.25 to the New York State Cultural Education Fund
- \$439,213.50 to the New York State Records Management Improvement Fund
- \$233,800.00 to the New York Department of State for Notary Public renewals

In 2022, over eighty-four percent of land records such as deeds and mortgages were being submitted to the office electronically as part of a voluntary e-Recording initiative and over eighty-five percent of civil cases were commenced electronically pursuant to state mandate or voluntarily. As we enter the new year, my goals for the Office of the Westchester County Clerk continue to include service through technology, increasing productivity through professional management and a customer friendly environment for those who need to visit our office, and facilitating commerce throughout the county through cooperation and effectiveness. We remain committed to improving our services while reducing costs to our residents.

I want to thank the County Executive and the County Legislature for continuing to provide the resources to allow the Office of the County Clerk to meet its mandates and fulfill its fiduciary responsibilities on behalf of the residents of Westchester County and beyond.






2022 REVENUE \$9,212,156



2022 Revenue

Fees paid in connection with the recording of land records such as deeds and mortgages make up the majority (67%) of our revenue. Court and legal fees provide an additional 10% of the revenue collected by our office. New York State reimburses us for expenses in connection with the processing of mortgage tax and this accounts for 11% of our revenue. Passports and pistol licenses make up 4%. The remaining 8% is comprised of equalization and assessment fees, interest income, table rentals, online access to records, transfer tax revenue, public copier and overpayment of fees.

2022 EXPENSES \$6,288,069



Our largest expenses, by far, are our personnel costs which represent 68% of our proposed expenses for 2022 and include salaries and overtime. Interdepartmental charges represent the next largest portion of our expense budget, with 28% of our budget funding items such as our DoIT support team, the Archives, Department of Public Works and Transportation, and the Law Department. Our general expenses, which make up 2% of our expense budget, include items such as scanning and equipment rental. Our materials and supplies budget continues to remain modest as our e-initiatives expand, coming in at 1.5% of our budget. Additional and replacement equipment continue to make up .5% of our budgeted expenses.

HIGHLIGHTS

Facilitating E-filing in New York State: As co-chair of the New York State Association of County Clerks' Court Committee, member of its Legislative Committee, and first ever Chair of the Supreme Court Steering Committee for Supreme Court E-filing, the County Clerk remains committed to advancing e-filing throughout the State. The committees coordinate responses from the county clerks and legal community leaders and make recommendations to the State Chief Administrative Judge on the creation or expansion of mandatory electronic filing programs. The committees' initiatives have resulted in 61 of the 62 counties in the State now providing e-filing. Working with dedicated and diverse legal community leaders has enhanced the ability of the Clerk's Office to serve pro se litigants and attorneys.

E-Filing and E-recording: Approximately 85% of civil actions are commenced electronically through the NYS electronic filing system and approximately 84% of the land record documents are currently e-recorded. Electronic recording has significantly increased the efficiency of the filing and recording and reducing manual labor. Further reduction in paper filings is anticipated with the recent authorization of e-filing of election law cases, special proceedings under the Mental Hygiene Law, and name change applications. Once developed in coordination with the DA's Office and the courts, e-filing of criminal cases could lead to a further estimated 5% reduction.

Renovation in Office Space: Plans are being implemented under the leadership of the County Executive and Department of Public Works and Transportation for the complete renovation of the 32,000 square feet of office space currently occupied by the Clerk's office. With the automation of department functions and the resultant reduction in staffing needs, space has been opened up for adaptive reuse by the County Public Safety department and the Westchester County District Attorney. The renovation will generate a savings in rental costs incurred by other County departments and enhance the efficiency and the environment for an improved staff and visitor experience. Changes made to the Office physical layout in response to the COVID-19 pandemic to ensure distancing between staffers and the public have been carried over into the renovation plans to ensure continued office preparedness.

Westchester County Personal Identification Card Expansion: The Licensing Division experienced a significant increase in the number of County Identification cards issued, with 30 issued in 2014 to 807 in 2022. These ID cards have opened doors to benefits by providing an option to Westchester residents who, due to citizenship status, poverty, or other circumstances, cannot obtain state-issued photo IDs.


Foreclosure Data Captured and Shared to Assist Homeowners in Need: The Clerk's Office continues to capture information from foreclosure cases to provide Westchester County residents with the data needed to secure funds to assist persons impacted by the foreclosure crisis. There has been a significant reduction in the number of new foreclosure filings from 1041 in 2019 to 502 in 2022. Foreclosure judgments also fell from 715 in 2019 to 268 in 2022.

Mobile Community Outreach Vehicle: The County Clerk's Community Outreach program featuring a custom built truck stops in every town and city in the County. The mobile office staff is authorized to accept passport applications and answer questions about passport applications and renewals. In addition, the mobile office staff is available to take passport photos. In 2021 the program expanded to include notary, veterans, and business licensing services. There has been a significant increase in the number of passport applications submitted through the mobile as well as the physical office.

Pistol Licensing: Pursuant to a 1997 amendment to the NYS Penal Law, Westchester County licenses were required to be certified by April 1, 2000, and recertified every 5 years thereafter. On 6/23/2022, the US Supreme Court struck down that portion of the NYS firearm licensing law requiring the showing of a special need to carry a concealed handgun outside of the home. NYS enacted revisions to the firearm licensing laws, effective 9/1/2022 expanding background checks and shortening the recertification period to 3 years. As a result of the decision and revisions to the licensing laws, there is a significant increase in applications to amend and delete restrictions on licenses and timely recertify current licenses.






Deeds and Mortgages Recorded


Statistics of Interest Indicators from our Legal Division **Foreclosure Filings and Judgments**















For the period of January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022, **3,486,392** searches were conducted in WRO. Free access to local municipalities has been expanded to include access to WRO reports of foreclosure filings and judgments as a "shared service" to assist in preventing zombie homes.

HONORABLE BOARD OF LEGISLATORS THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK

Your Committee is in receipt of a transmittal from the County Executive recommending approval by the County of Westchester ("County") of a bond act ("Bond Act") in the amount of \$6,750,000 to finance capital project BPS33 – Replacement of Police Helicopter ("BPS33") for 2023. The Bond Act, which was prepared by the law firm of Hawkins Delafield & Wood, LLP, will finance the purchase of a new helicopter to replace the existing 2006 Bell 407 Helicopter. The new helicopter will be equipped with a Forward Looking Infra-Red camera (FLIR), navigation equipment and all other necessary components to safely operate the aircraft.

The Department of Public Safety ("Department") has advised that in 2017, the 2006 Bell 407 was involved in an in-flight fire incident. The fire, and subsequent emergency landing, caused structural damage that required extensive repairs.

It should be noted that the County Budget Department is submitting this Bond Act to your Honorable Board simultaneously with the proposed 2023 Capital Budget. It is the County's goal to submit this Bond Acts now so that the referenced projects will be ready to proceed without delay in early 2023.

The Planning Department has advised your Committee that based on its review, BPS33 has been classified as a Type "II" action pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQR") and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617. Therefore, no further environmental review is required. Your Committee has reviewed the annexed SEQR documentation and concurs with this conclusion.

It should be noted that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of your Honorable Board is required in order to adopt the Bond Act. Your Committee recommends the adoption of the proposed Bond Act.

BOND ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$6,750,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, OR SO MUCH THEREOF AS MAY BE NECESSARY, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE ACQUISITION OF A HELICOPTER FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY; STATING THE ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST THEREOF IS \$6,750,000; STATING THE PLAN OF FINANCING SAID COST INCLUDES THE ISSUANCE OF \$6,750,000 BONDS HEREIN AUTHORIZED; AND PROVIDING FOR A TAX TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS. (Adopted , 20___)

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (the "Law"), the Westchester County Administrative Code, being Chapter 852 of the Laws of 1948, as amended, and to the provisions of other laws applicable thereto, \$6,750,000 bonds of the County, or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby authorized to be issued to finance the cost of the acquisition of a helicopter for the Department of Public Safety, including Forward Looking Infra Red camera (FLIR), navigation equipment and all other necessary components to safely operate the aircraft, all as set forth in the County's Current Year Capital Budget, as amended. To the extent that the details set forth in this act are inconsistent with any details set forth in the Current Year Capital Budget of the County, such Budget shall be deemed and is hereby amended. The estimated maximum cost of said specific object or purpose, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof is \$6,750,000. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$6,750,000 bonds herein authorized, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds, and the levy of a tax to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds.

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness of the specific object or purpose for which the \$6,750,000 bonds authorized by section 1 of this Act are to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a.35 of the Law, is five (5) years.

Section 3. Current funds are not required to be provided as a down payment pursuant to Section 107.00 d. 9. of the Law prior to issuance of the bonds authorized herein, or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds. The County intends to finance, on an interim basis, the costs or a portion of the costs of said improvements for which bonds are herein authorized, which costs are reasonably expected to be reimbursed with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County, pursuant to this Act, in the maximum amount of \$6,750,000. This Act is a declaration of official intent adopted pursuant to the requirements of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2.

Section 4. The estimate of \$6,750,000 as the estimated total cost of the aforesaid objects or purposes is hereby approved.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of this Act and of the Law, and pursuant to the provisions of §30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes or the renewals thereof, and of §§50.00, 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of said Law, the powers and duties of the County Board of Legislators relative to authorizing the issuance of any notes in anticipation of the sale of the bonds herein authorized, or the renewals thereof, relative to providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, relative to prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the respective amounts of bonds herein authorized, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and relative to executing agreements for credit enhancement, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance of the County, as the chief fiscal officer of the County.

Section 6. Each of the bonds authorized by this Act and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale thereof shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by §52.00 of said Local Finance Law and said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the County of Westchester, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the County. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and provision shall be made annually in the budgets of the County by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the notes and bonds to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 7. The validity of the bonds authorized by this Act and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

(a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or

(b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this Act or a summary hereof, are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

(c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 8. This Act shall take effect in accordance with Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter.

Section 7. The validity of the bonds authorized by this Act and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

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(a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or

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(b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this Act or a summary hereof, are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

(c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 8. This Act shall take effect not earlier than January 1, 2023 and in accordance with Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter.

Your Committee is in receipt of a transmittal from the County Executive recommending approval of bonding legislation (the "Bond Act") which, if adopted, would authorize the County of Westchester (the "County") to issue up to \$1,339,000 in bonds of the County to finance capital project BLR2E - Labs and Research Equipment Acquisition (2021-2025) ("BLR2E") for 2023.

Your Committee is advised that this project funds the acquisition of new and replacement equipment for the Department of Labs and Research's (the "Department") public health, forensic science, toxicology, environmental and medical examiner labs. As this Honorable Board knows, the Department must use complex, high-tech new and replacement instrumentation in order to carry out its required activities and maintain a state of the art laboratory facility. This instrumentation is necessary for the continued health and safety of Westchester County residents.

The Department has advised that the Bond Act, prepared by the law firm of Hawkins Delafield & Wood, LLP, will finance the cost of the acquisition of various lab equipment, including, but not limited to: a Solid Phase Extractor, a DNA Real-time PCR, a Matrix Assisted Laser Desorption/Ionization Time-Of-Flight (MALDI-TOF) Identification system, a Quadruple Time-Of-Flight Liquid Chromatography/Mass Spectrometer (Q_TOF LC/MS/MS), a Gas Chromatographic-Electron Capture Detection Solid Phase Extractor (GC/ECD/ SPE-DEX), and a REESE Temperature Monitoring System Expansion. It is expected that the Department will purchase the equipment within eighteen (18) to twenty-four (24) months after bonding authorization.

It should be noted that this Honorable Board has previously authorized bonding in connection with prior components of BLR2E as indicated in the annexed fact sheet.

Your Committee is advised that that the County Budget Department is submitting this Bond Act to your Honorable Board simultaneously with the proposed 2023 Capital Budget. It is the County's goal to submit this Bond Act now so that the referenced project will be ready to proceed without delay in early 2023. The Planning Department has advised that, based on its review, the above capital project is a "Type II" action under the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQR"), and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617, which is an action determined not to have a significant effect on the environment and therefore does not require further environmental review. Your Committee has reviewed the annexed SEQR documentation prepared by the Planning Department and concurs with this conclusion.

It should be noted that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of your Honorable Board is required in order to adopt the Bond Act. Your Committee recommends the adoption of the proposed Bond Act.

The amount appropriated for this phase is \$196,000, of which 50% (\$98,000) will be funded by the State of New York and 50% by the County. This project is for both design and construction and will replace the roof on the Knollwood Center on the WCC Campus. The roof on the Knollwood Center is approaching the end of its useful life and is in need of replacement.

The College has advised that this phase is necessary to preserve the College's critical infrastructure and reduce the risk of roof leaks that have the potential to cause severe damage to the buildings strength, foundation and overall structure due to rotting. Roofs that remain in place after their useful life will have an increased risk of damage.

Following receipt by the College of New York State funds and County bonding authorization, design will be scheduled and is anticipated to take twelve (12) months to complete. It is anticipated that the design work will be completed by consultants. It is estimated that construction will take twelve (12) months to complete and will begin after award and execution of the construction contracts.

It should be noted that your Honorable Board has previously authorized bonding in connection with WCC79 as indicated in the annexed fact sheet.

The Planning Department has advised that based on its review, the above-referenced capital project has been classified as a "Type II" action pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQR") and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617. BOND ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$98,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, OR SO MUCH THEREOF AS MAY BE NECESSARY, TO FINANCE A PHASE OF THE WESTCHESTER COMMUNITY COLLEGE ROOF REPLACEMENT PROGRAM, STATING THE ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST THEREOF IS \$196,000; STATING THE PLAN OF FINANCING SAID COST INCLUDES THE ISSUANCE OF \$98,000 BONDS HEREIN AUTHORIZED; PROVIDING FOR A TAX TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS; AND THE APPLICATION OF \$98,000 EXPECTED TO BE RECEIVED FROM THE STATE OF NEW YORK TO BE EXPENDED TOWARDS THE COST OF SAID CLASS OF OBJECTS OR PURPOSES OR REDEMPTION OF THE COUNTY'S OBLIGATIONS ISSUED THEREFOR, OR TO BE BUDGETED AS AN OFFSET TO THE TAXES FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS. (Adopted , 20__)

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. To the extent that the details set forth in this act are inconsistent with any details set forth in the Current Year Capital Budget of the County, such Budget shall be deemed and is hereby amended. The estimated maximum cost of said objects or purposes, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof is \$196,000. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$98,000 bonds herein authorized and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds, the levy of a tax to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds and notes, and the application of \$98,000 expected to be received from the State of New York to be expended towards the cost of said objects or purposes or redemption of the county's obligations issued therefor, or to be budgeted as an offset to the taxes for the payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds.

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness of the class of objects or purposes for which said \$98,000 bonds authorized by this Act are to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 12(a)(2) of the Law, is fifteen (15) years.

Section 3. Current funds are not required to be provided as a down payment pursuant to Section 107.00 d. 9. of the Law prior to issuance of the bonds authorized herein, or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds. The County intends to finance, on an interim basis, the costs or a portion of the costs of said improvements for which bonds are herein authorized, which costs are reasonably expected to be reimbursed with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County, pursuant to this Act, in the maximum amount of \$98,000. This Act is a declaration of official intent adopted pursuant to the requirements of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2. Section 4. The estimate of \$196,000 as the estimated total cost of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is hereby approved.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of this Act and of the Law, and pursuant to the provisions of §30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes or the renewals thereof, and of §§50.00, 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of said Law, the powers and duties of the County Board of Legislators relative to authorizing the issuance of any notes in anticipation of the sale of the bonds herein authorized, or the renewals thereof, relative to providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, relative to prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the respective amounts of bonds herein authorized, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and relative to executing agreements for credit enhancement, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance of the County, as the chief fiscal officer of the County.

Your Committee is in receipt of a transmittal from the County Executive recommending approval by the County of Westchester ("County") of a bond act ("Bond Act") in the amount of \$98,000 to finance a component of capital project WCC79 – Roof Replacement Various Buildings ("WCC79"). The Bond Act, which was prepared by the law firm of Hawkins, Delafield & Wood, LLP, will finance the County's 50% share of the next phase of Westchester Community College's Roof Replacement - Various Buildings project. The amount appropriated for this phase is \$196,000, of which 50% (\$98,000) will be funded by the State of New York and 50% by the County. This project is for both design and construction and will replace the roof on the Knollwood Center on the WCC Campus. The roof on the Knollwood Center is approaching the end of its useful life and is in need of replacement.

The College has advised that this phase is necessary to preserve the College's critical infrastructure and reduce the risk of roof leaks that have the potential to cause severe damage to the buildings strength, foundation and overall structure due to rotting. Roofs that remain in place after their useful life will have an increased risk of damage.

Following receipt by the College of New York State funds and County bonding authorization, design will be scheduled and is anticipated to take twelve (12) months to complete. It is anticipated that the design work will be completed by consultants. It is estimated that construction will take twelve (12) months to complete and will begin after award and execution of the construction contracts.

It should be noted that your Honorable Board has previously authorized bonding in connection with WCC79 as indicated in the annexed fact sheet.

The Planning Department has advised your Committee that based on its review, the above-referenced capital project has been classified as a Type "II" action pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQR") and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617. Therefore, no further environmental review is required. Your Committee has reviewed the annexed SEQR documentation and concurs with this conclusion.

It should be noted that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of your Honorable Board is required in order to adopt the Bond Act. Your Committee recommends the adoption of the proposed Bond Act.

The estimated maximum cost of said objects or purposes, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof is \$196,000. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$98,000 bonds herein authorized and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds, the levy of a tax to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds and notes, and the application of \$98,000 expected to be received from the State of New York to be expended towards the cost of said objects or purposes or redemption of the county's obligations issued therefor, or to be budgeted as an offset to the taxes for the payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds.

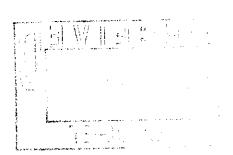

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Your Committee is in receipt of a transmittal from the County Executive recommending approval by the County of Westchester ("County") of a bond act ("Bond Act") in the amount of \$503,000, to finance a component of capital project WCC83 – Infrastructure Upgrade – Various Buildings ("WCC83").

The Bond Act, prepared by the law firm of Hawkins Delafield and Wood, LLP, would finance the County's 50% share of design and construction for Phase IV of the Infrastructure Upgrade - Various Buildings project at Westchester Community College (the "College"). The College has advised that the total cost of Phase IV is \$1,006,000, of which 50% will be funded by New York State (\$503,000) and 50% by the County. This phase will address the infrastructure at Hartford Hall, the Student Center and the Bookstore. The work to be performed at Hartford Hall will include the building site and envelope; interior components, as well as mechanical, plumbing and electrical systems. The work to be performed at the Student Center and Bookstore will include complete upgrades to the mechanical and electrical systems. These upgrades are critical to maintaining the infrastructure and operational efficiency of these buildings.

Following bonding authorization, design will be scheduled and is anticipated to take twelve (12) months to complete and will be performed by outside consultants. It is estimated that construction will take eighteen (18) months to complete and will begin after award and execution of the construction contracts.

Your Committee notes that your Honorable Board has previously authorized bonding in connection with Phase I, Phase II and Phase III of this project which financed infrastructure upgrades at the College's Physical Education Building, Library Building, the Knollwood Center and the Children's Center.

The Planning Department has advised your Committee that based on its review, the above-referenced capital project has been classified as a Type "II" action pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQR") and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR

Part 617. Therefore, no further environmental review is required. Your Committee has reviewed the annexed SEQR documentation and concurs with this conclusion.

It should be noted that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of your Honorable Board is required in order to adopt the Bond Act. Your Committee recommends the adoption of the proposed Bond Act.

Your Committee is in receipt of a transmittal from the County Executive recommending approval by the County of Westchester ("County") of a bond act ("Bond Act") in the amount of \$50,000, prepared by the law firm of Hawkins Delafield and Wood, LLP, to finance a component of capital project WCC90 – Technology Upgrade Off Campus 2017/18 – 2021/22 ("WCC90").

The Bond Act, in the amount of \$50,000, would finance the County's 50% share of Phase III of WCC90, including the replacement of digital signage, media equipment, laptop, PC, printer, wireless and replacement/enhancements which are all on a five-year replacement cycle.

Westchester Community College (the "College") has advised that the total cost of Phase III is \$100,000, of which 50% will be funded by New York State and 50% by the County.

Following bonding authorization, the project is anticipated to be completed within approximately 24 months and will be performed in-house and not require outside consultants.

Your Committee is advised that your Honorable Board has previously authorized bonding in connection with prior phases of WCC90 as indicated on the annexed fact sheet.

The Planning Department has advised your Committee that based on its review, the above-referenced capital project has been classified as a Type "II" action pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQR") and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617. Therefore, no further environmental review is required. Your Committee has reviewed the annexed SEQR documentation and concurs with this conclusion.

It should be noted that an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of your Honorable Board is required in order to adopt the Bond Act. Your Committee recommends the adoption of the proposed Bond Act.

To the extent that the details set forth in this act are inconsistent with any details set forth in the Current Year Capital Budget of the County, such Budget shall be deemed and is hereby amended. The estimated maximum cost of said objects or purposes, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof is \$100,000. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$50,000 bonds herein authorized and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds, the levy of a tax to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds and notes, and the application of \$50,000 expected to be received from the State of New York to be expended towards the cost of said objects or purposes or redemption of the County's obligations issued therefor, or to be budgeted as an offset to the taxes for the payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds.

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness of the class of objects or purposes for which said \$50,000 bonds authorized by this Act are to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 35 of the Law, is five (5) years.

Section 3. Current funds are not required to be provided as a down payment pursuant to Section 107.00 d. 9. of the Law prior to issuance of the bonds authorized herein, or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds. The County intends to finance, on an interim basis, the costs or a portion of the costs of said improvements for which bonds are herein authorized, which costs are reasonably expected to be reimbursed with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County, pursuant to this Act, in the maximum amount of \$50,000. BOND ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$600,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, OR SO MUCH THEREOF AS MAY BE NECESSARY, TO FINANCE PHASE III OF THE WESTCHESTER COMMUNITY COLLEGE TECHNOLOGY UPGRADE-ON CAMPUS PROGRAM, STATING THE ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST THEREOF IS \$1,200,000; STATING THE PLAN OF FINANCING SAID COST INCLUDES THE ISSUANCE OF \$600,000 BONDS HEREIN AUTHORIZED; PROVIDING FOR A TAX TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS; AND THE APPLICATION OF \$600,000 EXPECTED TO BE RECEIVED FROM THE STATE OF NEW YORK TO BE EXPENDED TOWARDS THE COST OF SAID CLASS OF OBJECTS OR PURPOSES OR REDEMPTION OF THE COUNTY'S OBLIGATIONS ISSUED THEREFOR, OR TO BE BUDGETED AS AN OFFSET TO THE TAXES FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS. (Adopted , 20_)

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (the "Law"), the Westchester County Administrative Code, being Chapter 852 of the Laws of 1948, as amended, and to the provisions of other laws applicable thereto, \$600,000 bonds of the County, or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby authorized to be issued to finance Phase III of the Westchester Community College technology upgrade-on campus program, including Academic Technology Initiatives, Desktop Virtual Growth; Fiber Cable Enhancements and digital signage replacement laptops, pc, phone, printer, scanner, server, switch, tape drive, ups, wireless which are mostly on a 5 year replacement cycle, all as set forth in the County's Current Year Capital Budget, as amended. To the extent that the details set forth in this act are inconsistent with any details set forth in the Current Year Capital Budget of the County, such Budget shall be deemed and is hereby amended. The estimated maximum cost of said objects or purposes, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof is \$1,200,000. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$600,000 bonds herein authorized and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds, the levy of a tax to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds and notes, and the application of \$600,000 expected to be received from the State of New York to be expended towards the cost of said objects or purposes or redemption of the County's obligations issued therefor, or to be budgeted as an offset to the taxes for the payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds.

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness of the class of objects or purposes for which said \$600,000 bonds authorized by this Act are to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 35 of the Law, is five (5) years.

Section 3. Current funds are not required to be provided as a down payment pursuant to Section 107.00 d. 9. of the Law prior to issuance of the bonds authorized herein, or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds. The County intends to finance, on an interim basis, the costs or a portion of the costs of said improvements for which bonds are herein authorized, which costs are reasonably expected to be reimbursed with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County, pursuant to this Act, in the maximum amount of \$600,000. This Act is a declaration of official intent adopted pursuant to the requirements of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2.

Section 4. The estimate of \$1,200,000 as the estimated total cost of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is hereby approved.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of this Act and of the Law, and pursuant to the provisions of §30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes or the renewals thereof, and of §§50.00, 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of said Law, the powers and duties of the County Board of Legislators relative to authorizing the issuance of any notes in anticipation of the sale of the bonds herein authorized, or the renewals thereof, relative to providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, relative to prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the respective amounts of bonds herein authorized, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and relative to executing agreements for credit enhancement, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance of the County, as the chief fiscal officer of the County.

Section 6. Each of the bonds authorized by this Act and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale thereof shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by §52.00 of said Local Finance Law and said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the County of Westchester, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the County. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and provision shall be made annually in the budgets of the County by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the notes and bonds to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

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Section 7. The validity of the bonds authorized by this Act and of any notes issued

in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

(a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or

(b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this Act or a summary hereof, are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

(c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 8. This Act shall take effect in accordance with Section 107.71 of the

Westchester County Charter.



In 2020 alone, Westchester shared \$113 million with local municipalities and \$44 million with local school districts. This permanency would guarantee continued relief to property taxpayers in Westchester and provide school districts and municipalities with more certainty in their budgetary processes. As such, Westchester requests that its sales tax be reauthorized and that the need for continued state renewal of sales tax be eliminated.

N/A	The fees charged by Westchester County for new pistol licenses and amendments are capped by New York State Penal Law section 400.00(14). Westchester's pistol license applications are capped at \$10, while the cost to perform the necessary work has been generally estimated at roughly \$300. These fees have not increased in decades and we currently operate this program at a significant annual loss of over \$300,000. This means that Westchester's taxpayers are essentially subsidizing the bureaucratic costs incurred by those seeking firearms licenses. Westchester is obligated to follow the New York State cap, while surrounding localities do not have this restriction. These localities have higher licensing fees, allowing them to cover a larger share of this cost, placing a lighter burden on their taxpayers. For example, Nassau County charges \$200 for pistol permit applications and New York City charges \$340. If granted similar authority, Westchester County will fully analyze and publicize the actual costs, and establish a rate commensurate to cover these costs. Westchester County requests that it be provided with this same authorization through the budget process in order to reduce costs for taxpayers and to expedite the process by which these fees are amended in the future. In 2019, seven agencies in New York City received authorization to utilize Design-Build project delivery (as opposed to Design-Build) through the Public Works Investment Act (PWIA). Design-Build consolidates projects into one point of responsibility on the basis of which design and construction team can deliver the best project at the best value. Westchester believes this novel strategy would allow it to save
3	Budgetary	Provide Westchester County with authorization to utilize Design-Build project delivery.	N/A	money and deliver an enhanced level of quality on forthcoming projects. Under the current Design-Bid-Build model, the 'Design' and 'Build' components of a project are barred from collaboration, slowing project schedules, increasing cost, and resulting in lower quality in final completed projects. New York City is required to provide annual reports on design-build projects, including short lists and proposers, cost savings, time savings and MWBE utilization within the project. Westchester county would be willing to provide this information as well. We intend to work closely with organized labor representatives in implementing this program. In order to save costs for taxpayers and implement a more logistically robust project delivery system, Westchester requests authorization from New York State to utilize Design-Build.
				As of January 5, 2023 residents of Westchester County have submitted 9,879 applications to the Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP). 4,601 of these applications were paid, through October 31st, 2022, totaling \$66 million in back rent and prospective rent. Funding for this program is now depleted – the application portal remained open until January 15, 2023, but due to a lack of funding, no applications submitted after October 31st will be reviewed at this time. Legal Services of the Hudson Valley (LSHV) were receiving funding from New York State to manage these cases, but this funding was originally authorized for only two years.

Legislation was proposed in the 21-22 legislative cycle which would have established and funded a statewide office of civil representation to provide access to legal services in eviction proceedings. Your Committee recommends adoption of "A LOCAL LAW amending the Laws of Westchester County by adding Chapter 542 regarding single-use foodware, beverage stirrers, and splash sticks."

Your Committee understands that plastic utensils, stirrers, splash sticks, and condiment packets—among other single-use foodware items—are prevalent in Westchester County and around the world. According to a 2018 *Nature Magazine* article, globally, more than 320 million tons of plastic are consumed every year, and the use of plastics has continued to expand. In 2019, *National Geographic* reported that plastic production has increased exponentially, from 2.3 million tons in 1950, to 448 million tons in 2015; production will likely double by the year 2050. The manufacture of these plastics, which are made of petroleum and other fossil fuels, contributes to climate change and pollution.

Your Committee acknowledges that with the ubiquitous use of plastics and other disposable single-use items, comes staggering waste. People in the United States produce more plastic waste than in any other nation—an average of 231 pounds of plastic per year, according to a 2020 *Forbes* article. As for plastic utensils, specifically, a 2020 *Forbes* piece explained, "[s]ome estimates put the number of individual plastic utensils wasted at 40 billion per year in the United States alone. After just one single use, most of them are thrown out and end up in landfills and in our waterways." Your committee is aware that single-use foodware items, made both from plastics and from other types of materials, are commonly littered and thrown-away. Contaminated plastic utensils in particular generally cannot be recycled, and *National Geographic* reported in 2019 that billions of plastic forks, knives, and spoons are discarded every year. These plastic utensils can take centuries to break down, while they work their way into the environment. This is true of all plastics: according to a 2022 *New York Times* article, only about 9 percent of all plastics ever manufactured have been recycled, while nearly 80 percent have ended up in landfills, dumps, or the environment; the remainder are and have been burned, emitting pollutants that contribute to global warming. When plastic breaks down into smaller and smaller pieces, it harms sea life, wildlife, and threatens human health.

Your Committee recognizes that this Local Law, in making single-use foodware items and condiment packets available upon request, and in banning certain plastic items (splash sticks and stirrers) altogether, will eliminate some of the plastic consumption and pollution in the County. The law may also raise awareness about the simple decisions County residents can make to reduce their waste. Moreover, as *Westchester Magazine* explained in 2019, many businesses in Westchester County have already begun to take steps towards reducing this type of rubbish—for instance, some have stopped automatically providing single-use utensils with to-go orders, while others no longer offer plastic straws unless they are specifically requested. Notably, takeout and delivery from restaurants increased dramatically during the pandemic, and those orders often arrived with single-use foodware items that were not necessarily needed or desired by people eating at home. This trend coincided with single use-foodware items becoming more expensive for businesses. In addition to reducing waste, this proposed Local Law will also spare food

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providers the financial burdens associated with providing unnecessary utensils, napkins, and condiment packets for every order they receive.

Your Committee notes that the intent of this Local Law is to maintain a healthful environment, and to benefit the health, safety, and welfare of County residents. The Local Law prohibits food service establishments and retail food stores from providing single-use foodware items, as defined—including, but not limited to, forks, knives, spoons, chopsticks, cup sleeves, beverage lids—or condiment packets to any dine-in or take-away customers, either directly or through a food delivery service, unless the items are specifically requested. The law would also prohibit food service establishments and retail food store cafes from providing any plastic beverage stirrers or plastic splash sticks. Finally, the law would ban, under most circumstances, foodware or condiment packets that are packaged together in a way that precludes a customer from selecting only the type of single-use foodware item or condiment packet that the customer wants—for instance, forks, knives, spoons, napkins, and salt and pepper packets that are bundled together in plastic wrap.

To further compliance, the Local Law provides for ordering option requirements, such that a customer must be allowed to request any applicable single-use foodware items or condiment packets when ordering food. Moreover, food service establishments and retail food stores will be responsible for coordinating with any third-party food delivery service as necessary in order to prompt the customer to affirmatively request the single-use foodware items or condiment packets that they want. Food service establishments and retail food stores, as applicable, must also post at least one sign advising clientele that single-use foodware items and condiment packets are available upon request. This Local Law will be enforced by the County Department of Health and the County Department of Environmental Facilities.

Your Committee is informed that the proposed project does not meet the definition of an action under New York State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA") and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617. Please refer to the memorandum from the Department of Planning, dated January 12, 2023, which is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Legislators. Your Committee concurs in this conclusion.

In light of all of the foregoing, your Committee recommends passage of this Local Law.

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LOCAL LAW INTRO. NO. - 2023

A LOCAL LAW amending the Laws of Westchester County by adding Chapter 542 regarding single-use foodware, beverage stirrers, and splash sticks.

BE IT ENACTED by the County Board of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. A new Chapter 542 is hereby added to the Laws of Westchester to read as follows:

CHAPTER 542

Single-use Foodware Law

Sec. 542.01. Short title.

This title shall be known as and may be cited as the "Single-use Foodware Law."

Sec. 542.11. Definitions.

- <u>"Beverage splash stick" shall mean a device primarily intended to be used to keep heat and</u> liquid from escaping a lidded cup.
- 2. "Beverage stirrer" shall mean a device primarily intended to be used by a person for the

purpose of stirring beverages.

- 3. <u>"Condiment packet" shall mean an individual single-use container, sealed by the manufacturer or a food service establishment or retail food store, containing a sauce or other substance used to enhance the flavor of food, which may include, but need not be limited to, mustard, ketchup, mayonnaise, soy sauce, hot sauce, salt, pepper, and salad dressing.</u>
- <u>"Dine-in" shall mean food or beverage provided by a food service establishment or retail</u> <u>food store to be consumed on the premises of such food service establishment or retail food</u> <u>store.</u>
- 5. <u>"Electronic orders" shall mean food or beverage orders made through the website, mobile</u> phone application, or other digital platform of a food service establishment, retail food store, or third-party food delivery service.
- 6. "Food service establishment" shall mean an establishment permitted by the Westchester County Department of Health, unless otherwise noted, including: any fixed or mobile restaurant; drive-in; coffee shop; cafeteria; short-order cafe; delicatessen (permitted by the County Department of Health or the New York State Department of Agriculture or Markets): luncheonette; grill; tearoom; sandwich shop; soda fountain; bar; tavern; cocktail lounge; night club: roadside stand; take-out prepared food place; retail bakery; industrial feeding establishment; private, public or nonprofit organization or institution, including; schools; nursing homes; day care centers; hospitals (permitted by the New York State Department of Health); religious and fraternal organizations routinely serving food; catering kitchens; commissary or similar places in which food is prepared for sale or for service on the premises or elsewhere; and any other establishment or operation where food is served or provided for the public, with or without charge.

- <u>"Plastic" shall mean a synthetic material made from organic polymers, including, but not</u> <u>limited to, polypropylene and polystyrene, that can be molded into shape while soft, and</u> <u>then set into a rigid or slightly elastic form.</u>
- 8. <u>"Retail food store" shall mean a business, permitted by the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets, that sells food or food products for off-site consumption, such as a grocery store, and which may serve prepared foods or beverages to customers for on- or off-site consumption, for instance, through counter service or through an in-store café or eatery.</u>
- <u>"Self-service station" shall mean a designated area or mechanical dispenser in a food</u> service establishment or retail food store where customers may help themselves to singleuse foodware or condiment packets.
- 10. <u>"Single-use foodware" shall mean any eating utensil or other item used as part of food or beverage service that is designed and intended by the manufacturer for only one use before being discarded, including, but not limited to, forks, spoons, sporks, knives, chopsticks, beverage straws, cocktail sticks, toothpicks, napkins, wet-wipes, cup sleeves, beverage trays, beverage lids, empty plates, empty bowls, and empty cups. For the purposes of this Chapter, "single-use foodware" exempts, and shall not include: (a) a beverage stirrer or beverage splash stick, as defined in this Section; or (b) containers actively holding food or beverages for dine-in or take-away customers, such as plates, bowls, and cups.</u>
- 11. "Take-away" shall mean food or beverage provided by a food service establishment or retail food store to be consumed off the premises of such food service establishment or retail food store, including same-day delivery or same-day pickup of food and beverages from food service establishments or retail food stores.

12. <u>"Third-party food delivery service" shall mean any website, mobile application, or other internet service that offers or arranges for the sale of food and beverages prepared by, and the same-day delivery or same-day pickup of food and beverages from food service establishments or retail food stores located in the County that are owned and operated by different persons.</u>

Sec. 542.21. Restrictions.

- No food service establishment or retail food store shall provide single-use foodware or condiment packets to any dine-in or take-away customer, whether directly to such customer or through a third-party food delivery service, unless the customer requests such single-use foodware or condiment packets.
- 2. <u>No food service establishment or retail food store café shall provide any single-use plastic</u> <u>beverage stirrer or single-use plastic beverage splash stick to any dine-in or take-away</u> <u>customer, whether directly to such customer or through a third-party food delivery service.</u>
- 3. No food service establishment or retail food store on-premises eatery or counter service shall provide, in a self-service station or otherwise, single-use foodware or condiment packets that are bundled or packaged in a manner that prohibits a customer from taking only the type of single-use foodware item or condiment packet desired.

Sec. 542.31. Ordering Option Requirements.

1. Food service establishments that supply single-use foodware or condiment packets to customers shall provide options to allow a customer to affirmatively request applicable single-use foodware or condiment packets when ordering dine-in or take-out food and beverages across all ordering or point of sale platforms, including through in-person, telephone, and electronic orders.

 The food service establishment shall coordinate with any third-party food delivery service, as necessary, to prompt the customer to affirmatively request single-use foodware or condiment packets as applicable. The default selected option for electronic orders shall be that no single-use foodware or condiment packets are requested.

Sec. 542.41. Posting of Signs.

- 1. Each food service establishment that provides single-use foodware and/or condiment packets shall post at least one sign on its premises meeting the requirements of this Section.
- 2. Such sign shall be posted in a conspicuous area on the premises in a manner that is clearly visible to customers approaching a point of service.
- 3. <u>The sign shall state as follows (except that items listed in the following that are not offered</u> by the food service establishment shall not be included in the sign): "SINGLE-USE <u>FOODWARE ITEMS SUCH AS PLASTIC STRAWS, UTENSILS, AND CONDIMENT</u> PACKETS ARE AVAILABLE UPON REQUEST."
- The sign shall be at least two inches by seven inches, and text on the sign shall be no smaller than 21-point font size and in a contrasting color to the background.
- 5. <u>The sign shall be available for inspection at all times by the County Department of Health</u> and the County Department of Environmental Facilities.
- 6. <u>The Commissioner of the County Department of Health, in consultation with the</u> <u>Commissioner of the County Department of Environmental Facilities, is authorized to</u>

design, create, and make available, through a website download or otherwise, signs that conform to the requirements of this Section.

Sec. 542.51. Exemptions.

The following situations are permitted under this Chapter and shall not constitute a violation of the Sec. 542.21 restrictions, or the Sec. 542.31 or Sec. 542.41 requirements:

- 1. Food service establishments with counter service may allow customers to access a selfservice station for single-use foodware and/or condiment packets, provided that such single-use foodware and/or condiment packets are not bundled or packaged in a manner that prohibits a customer from taking only the type of single-use foodware item or condiment packet desired.
- 2. For take-away orders, food service establishments and/or third-party food delivery services may choose to include specific single-use foodware, such as beverage lids and beverage trays, in order to prevent spills and ensure safety.
- 3. Food service establishments may provide single-use foodware or condiment packets that are prepackaged with or attached to any food or beverage products by the manufacturer prior to receipt by the food service establishment (for example, plastic straws attached to juice boxes, or a separate plastic container of dressing included within a larger salad container).
- 4. Food service establishments may provide single-use foodware or condiment packets with free or reduced-price meals as part of a charitable program or donation, including, without limitation, free or reduced-price meals provided by school systems, homeless shelters, and programs that deliver meals to the elderly.

- 5. Food service establishments may provide single-use foodware items or condiment packets pursuant to an order of the Commissioner of the County Department of Health, or pursuant to a public health emergency declared by the New York State Governor, New York State Commissioner of Health, County Executive, County Board of Health, or any other authorized federal, state, or local official.
- 6. <u>Hospitals, health-care facilities, and congregate care facilities (including, for the purposes of this Section, nursing homes, assisted living facilities, adult day cares, hospice facilities, rehabilitation facilities, correctional facilities, jails, juvenile justice facilities, and residential treatment centers) may provide single-use foodware or condiment packets, including those that are bundled or packaged together, to their patients and/or residents.</u>

Sec. 542.61. Enforcement and Penalties.

- For food service establishments that are permitted by the County Department of Health under the County Sanitary Code or the New York State Sanitary Code, the County Board of Health is authorized to enforce the provisions of this Chapter 542 in the same manner that it enforces the provisions of Chapter 873 of the Laws of Westchester County (i.e., the Westchester County Sanitary Code).
- 2. For retail food stores (permitted by the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets) and food service establishments that are not permitted by the County Department of Health, including, but not limited to, food service establishments within hospitals (permitted by the New York State Department of Health) and delicatessens with food service that accounts for less than 50% of sales (permitted by the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets), the Department of Environmental Facilities is authorized to enforce the provisions of this Chapter 542 in the same manner that it enforces

the provisions of Chapter 825 of the Laws of Westchester County (i.e., the Source Separation Law).

- 3. Any food service establishment that violates any provision of Section 542.21, 542.31, or 542.41 of this Chapter may be subject to a civil penalty. Such penalty shall be in the amount of one hundred dollars (\$100) for the first violation, two hundred dollars (\$200) for the second violation committed on a different day within a period of twelve (12) months, and four hundred dollars (\$400) for the third and each subsequent violation committed on different days within a period of twelve (12) months. except that neither the Westchester County Board of Health, nor the Department of Environmental Facilities shall issue a notice of violation, but shall issue a warning and provide a copy of this Local Law, for any violation that occurs within the first six months of the effective date of this Local Law. Notwithstanding the foregoing, no single incident of non-compliance shall be subject to violation from more than one Department of the County of Westchester; however, violations issued by one Department of the County of Westchester shall be considered in the determination of the number of total violations received by a food service establishment or retail food store.
- 4. <u>No civil penalty shall be imposed as provided for herein unless the alleged violator has</u> received notice of the violation and has had an opportunity to be heard.

Sec. 542.71. Construction.

No provision of this Chapter shall be construed or interpreted to limit or frustrate a food service establishment's or retail food store's lawful compliance with the New York State Sanitary Code, including 10 N.Y.C.R.R. § 14-1.97, or the Westchester County Sanitary Code, Chapter 873 of the Laws of Westchester County.

Sec. 542.81. Severability.

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, or part of this Local Law shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, section, or part thereof directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered.

Section 2.

This Local Law shall take effect one-hundred-eighty (180) days after adoption.

Your Committee is in receipt of a communication from the County Executive requesting that your Honorable Board authorize the County of Westchester (the "County") to enter into a subaward agreement (the "Agreement") with the Westchester County Health Care Corporation ("WCHCC"), pursuant to which the County would subaward to WCHCC a portion of the \$1,000,000.00 in certain grant funds (the "Grant Funds") being received by the County from the United States Department of Justice, acting by and through its Office on Violence Against Women, ("DOJ").

Your Committee has been advised that the Grant Funds are being provided to the County by DOJ, through its Improving Criminal Justice Responses to Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, and Stalking Grant Program, under DOJ Grant Award Number 15JOVW-21-GG-02029-ICJR. Your Committee has been advised that the Grant Funds are to be used by the County for the work to implement the Westchester County Domestic Violence High Risk Team (the "DVHRT"), for the period from October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2025.

Your Committee has been advised that, under the proposed Agreement, the County would subaward to WCHCC \$64,582.00 in Grant Funds for the performance of the portion of the work that is to provide certain services of a 24/7 'High Risk Hotline Operator' (also known as a 'LAPline Advocate'), who will provide immediate assistance to victims of domestic violence who are screening in as high risk at the scene of a domestic incident, which assistance may

include, but not necessarily be limited to, immediate crisis intervention, safety planning, and referrals for shelter or emergency housing, if needed, all as part of the work of the DVHRT.

Your Committee has been advised that Section 3307(4) of the New York Public Authorities Law requires the approval of your Honorable Board and the Board of Acquisition and Contract for the proposed Agreement. Pursuant to that section, said approval of your Honorable Board must be by an affirmative vote of not less than a majority of the voting strength of the Board.

Your Committee concurs with the conclusion that the proposed Agreement does not meet the definition of an action under New York State Environmental Quality Review Act and its implementing regulations, 6 NYCRR Part 617. Accordingly, no environmental review is required. Please refer to the memorandum from the Department of Planning dated January 14, 2022, which is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Legislators. After due consideration, your Committee recommends the adoption of the proposed Act.

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An Act authorizing the County of Westchester to enter into a subaward agreement with the Westchester County Health Care Corporation for a term from October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2025, pursuant to which it will be subawarded a portion of the grant funds received by the County of Westchester to implement the Westchester County Domestic Violence High Risk Team.

BE IT ENACTED by the County Board of the County of Westchester, as follows:

Section 1. The County of Westchester (the "County") is hereby authorized to enter into a subaward agreement with the Westchester County Health Care Corporation ("WCHCC"), pursuant to which the County will subaward to WCHCC \$64,582.00 in grant funds being received by the County from the United States Department of Justice, acting by and through its Office on Violence Against Women, ("DOJ") through its Improving Criminal Justice Responses to Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, and Stalking Grant Program, under DOJ Grant Award Number 15JOVW-21-GG-02029-ICJR, for the work to implement the Westchester County Domestic Violence High Risk Team (the "DVHRT"), for the period from October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2025 (the "Grant Funds").

Under the Agreement, WCHCC shall be provided the \$64,582.00 in Grant Funds for the performance of the portion of the work that is to provide certain services of a 24/7 'High Risk Hotline Operator' (also known as a 'LAPline Advocate'), who will provide immediate assistance to victims of domestic violence who are screening in as high risk at the scene of a domestic incident, which assistance may include, but not necessarily be limited to, immediate crisis intervention, safety planning, and referrals for shelter or emergency housing, if needed, all as part of the work of the DVHRT.

§2. The County Executive or his authorized designee is hereby authorized to execute all instruments and take all actions reasonably necessary to carry out the purposes of this Act.

§3. This Act shall take effect immediately.

> **THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER**, a municipal corporation of the State of New York, having an office and place of business in the Michaelian Office Building, 148 Martine Avenue, White Plains, New York 10601 (hereinafter the "County")

and

WESTCHESTER COUNTY HEALTH CARE CORPORATION, a public benefit corporation of the State of New York, having an office and place of business at Executive Offices at Taylor Care Center, C-2, 100 Woods Road, Valhalla, New York 10595 (hereinafter the "Subrecipient")

<u>WITNESSÈTH:</u>

WHEREAS, the County and the United States Department of Justice, acting by and through its Office on Violence Against Women, ("DOJ") are parties to an agreement, pursuant to which the County accepted from DOJ a grant in the amount of \$1,000,000.00 under DOJ's Improving Criminal Justice Responses to Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, and Stalking Grant Program (the "Grant Funds"), in order to implement the Westchester County Domestic Violence High Risk Team (the "Grant Agreement"; DOJ Grant Award Number 15JOVW-21-GG-02029-ICJR), for the period from October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2025; and

WHEREAS, the County desires to make a subaward, of a portion of the Grant Funds, to the Subrecipient for the performance of the portion of the work that is to provide certain services of a 24/7 'High Risk Hotline Operator' (also known as a 'LAPline Advocate'), who will provide immediate assistance to victims of domestic violence who are screening in as high risk at the scene of a domestic incident, which assistance may include, but not necessarily be limited to, immediate crisis intervention, safety planning, and referrals for shelter or emergency housing, if needed, all as part of the work of the Domestic Violence High Risk Team ("DVHRT").

WHEREAS, the Subrecipient desires to receive such a subaward of a portion of the Grant Funds, in order to provide the above-described work, and desires to thereby become a subrecipient under the Grant Agreement, on the terms and conditions provided herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms and conditions herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

FIRST: The County shall, to the extent permitted under the Grant Agreement, make a subaward, of the Grant Funds, under the Grant Agreement, to the Subrecipient in the amount of SIXTY-FOUR THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED EIGHTY-TWO DOLLARS (\$64,582.00) (the "Subaward"). The term of this Agreement, and the making of the Subaward, shall commence on October 1, 2021 and shall continue through September 30, 2025, unless terminated earlier pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement or the Grant Agreement.

SECOND: The Subrecipient shall use the Subaward to provide certain services of a 24/7 'High Risk Hotline Operator' (also known as a 'LAPline Advocate'), who will provide immediate assistance to victims of domestic violence who are screening in as high risk at the scene of a domestic incident, which assistance may include, but not necessarily be limited to, immediate crisis intervention, safety/planning, and referrals for shelter or emergency housing, if needed, all as part of the work of the DVHRT, as more fully described in the Grant Agreement and/or grant-related-materials that are not necessarily explicitly made part of the Grant Agreement but are nevertheless performent to the services to be provided, including, without limitation, any and all applicable notices of funding availability and any and all applicable County grant application materials, (the "Work") all of which materials are hereby incorporated into this Agreement by reference and all of which the Subrecipient hereby acknowledges that it is aware of and/or possesses, such that it is fully aware of, and can fulfill, its obligations hereunder. The Work shall be carried out by the Subrecipient in accordance with the terms of the Grant Agreement and the above-described related materials (collectively, the "Grant Materials") otherwise in accordance with current industry standards and trade practices.

THIRD: The County shall not pay to the Subrecipient any portion of the Subaward unless and until the Subrecipient has given the County the Subrecipient's federal "unique entity identifier" number, in compliance with 2 C.F.R. 25.300, unless the Grant Materials and/or DOJ allows such payment(s) to proceed without having such number. Except as may be otherwise required by the Grant Materials, the Subaward shall be paid to the Subrecipient quarterly, on a reimbursement basis. Any and all requests for payment submitted by the Subrecipient shall only be made, and only be fulfilled by the County, in accordance with all applicable terms imposed by the Grant Materials, the County, and/or DOJ. Such terms include, but are not necessarily limited to, the following:

- 1.) Any and all requests for payment shall be submitted by the Subrecipient on properly executed payment vouchers of the County, or on such other, forms as may be required by the County or DOJ;
- 2.) Payment shall be made only after approval by the County Executive;
- 3.) All requests for payment must be accompanied by a numbered invoice and must contain the invoice number where indicated. All invoices submitted during each calendar year shall utilize consecutive numbering and be non-repeating.

The Subrecipient agrees to keep records necessary to disclose fully the receipt and disposition of Grant Funds provided under this Agreement as the amount of the Subaward. Unless another provision of this Agreement requires retention for a longer period, and unless the County shall, in writing, advise the Subrecipient to the contrary, the Subrecipient shall retain all financial records related to this Agreement for a period of six (6) years after the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

The Subrecipient agrees that it shall be solely responsible for any over expenditure or improper expenditure relating to the Work and that the County shall have no responsibility or liability whatsoever for any over expenditure or improper expenditure. Accordingly, the Subrecipient agrees that it shall reimburse the County for any use of the Subaward that is disallowed by DOJ.

In addition to any other remedies it may have, the County shall have the right to deduct from future contract payments under any contracts the County may have with Subrecipient any funds the County may determine are owed to the County under this Agreement.

FOURTH: The Subrecipient shall, immediately upon request, provide to the County such financial documents regarding the Work, as well as reports on its progress toward completing the Work, as the County Executive or his duly authorized designee (the "County Executive") may request, and shall immediately inform the County Executive in writing of any cause for delay in the performance of its obligations under this Agreement.

Without limiting any other provision of this Agreement, the Subrecipient shall provide the County with financial reports and progress reports at such intervals as the County may, in its discretion, specify, unless more frequent reports are required by DOJ under the Grant Materials or as otherwise provided for in the Federal Requirements (as defined below).

<u>FIFTH</u> In addition to a general audit rights, which the County reserves for itself hereunder, the County also reserves the right to audit the Subrecipient's performance under this Agreement. Such audit inay include requests for documentation or other information which the County Executive may, in his discretion, deem necessary and appropriate to verify the information provided by the Subrecipient as required by Paragraph "FOURTH".

The County may also make site visits to the location(s) where the services to be provided under this Agreement are performed in order to review the Subrecipient's books, accounts, financial audits, and records, observe the performance of services and/or to conduct interviews of staff, where appropriate and not otherwise prohibited by law.

Without limiting any of the foregoing, the Subrecipient shall fully comply with any and all organization-wide or program-specific audits conducted by the County and/or DOJ, whether conducted by the County and/or DOJ, or by a contractor or agent thereof, and whether conducted based upon compliance with the terms of the Grant Materials or another aspect of the Federal Requirements (as defined below), or on the County's and/or DOJ's own initiative.

SIXTH: The Subrecipient recognizes and acknowledges that the obligations of the County under this Agreement are subject to the County's receipt of the Grant Funds from DOJ pursuant to the Grant Agreement, and that no liability shall be incurred by the County beyond the monies made available to the County from DOJ pursuant to the Grant Agreement. The Subrecipient agrees that the County shall not be liable for any of the payments hereunder unless and until the County Commissioner of Finance has received said funds or said funds have been made available to the County. If, for any reason, the full amount of said funds is not paid over or made available to the County, the County may terminate this Agreement immediately or reduce the amount payable to the Subrecipient, in the discretion of the County. The County shall give prompt notice of any such termination or reduction to the Subrecipient. If the County shall give the right to terminate this Agreement upon reasonable prior written notice.

SEVENTH: (a) The County, upon ten (10) days notice to the Subrecipient, may terminate this Agreement in whole or in part when the County deems it to be in its best interest. In such event, the Subrecipient shall only be entitled to such amount of the Subaward as is attributable to the portion of the Work performed prior to the effective date of termination. The Subrecipient shall accept as final a reasonable and good faith determination by the County Executive regarding such amount. Upon receipt of notice that the County is terminating this Agreement in its best interests, the Subrecipient shall stop work immediately and incur no further costs in furtherance of this Agreement without the express approval of the County Executive, and the Subrecipient shall direct any contractors, consultants, subrecipients, and the like to do the same.

(b) If the Subrecipient fails to perform the Work in the manner called for in this Agreement, or if the Subrecipient otherwise fails to comply with any other provision(s) of this Agreement, the County may terminate this Agreement for cause, either with or without allowing a period of time for the Subrecipient to cure such breach(es) or default(s) to the County's satisfaction, as the County may determine in its sole discretion. If the County will allow a period of time for the Subrecipient to cure its beach(es) or default(s), the County shall send a notice to

the Subrecipient identifying the breach(es) or default(s) and specifying the time period being allowed for said cure. Termination shall be effected by sending a notice of termination on the Subrecipient setting forth the manner(s) in which the Subrecipient is in breach or default. The Subrecipient will only be entitled to retain such amount of the Subaward as is attributable to the portion of the Work performed prior to the effective date of termination that the County Executive has determined that the Subrecipient performed in accordance with the manner of performance set forth in this Agreement. The Subrecipient shall accept as final a reasonable and good faith determination by the County Executive regarding such amount.

Any termination for default under this section "b" shall not in any way operate to preclude the County from also pursuing all available remedies against the Subrecipient or other appropriate parties for said breach(es) or default(s). In addition to any other right or remedy it might have, the County shall have the right, power and authority to complete the Work provided for in this Agreement, or contract for its completion, and any additional expense or cost of such completion shall be charged to and paid by the Subrecipient.

(c) The Subrecipient understands and acknowledges that the federal government may suspend, suspend then terminate, and/or terminate all or any part of the Grant Funds to be used to fund the Work. The Subrecipient agrees that, in such event, the County shall have the right to immediately terminate all or part of the Work provided under this Agreement, upon notice to the Subrecipient.

EIGHTH: The Subrecipient agrees to procure and maintain in continuous effect for the term of this Agreement policies of insurance naming the County as additional insured, as provided and described in Schedule "A", entitled "Standard Insurance Provisions", which is attached hereto and made a part hereof. In addition to, and not in limitation of, the insurance provisions contained in Schedule "A", the Subrecipient agrees:

(a) that except for the amount, if any, of damage contributed to by, caused by, or resulting from the negligence or willful misconduct of the County, the Subrecipient shall indemnify and hold harmless the County, its officers, employees, agents, and elected officials

from and against any and all liability, damage, third party claims, demands, costs, judgments, fees, reasonable attorney's fees or loss arising directly or indirectly out of the performance or failure to perform hereunder by the Subrecipient or third parties under the direction or control of the Subrecipient;

(b) to provide defense for and defend, at its sole expense, any and all third party claims, demands or causes of action directly or indirectly arising out of this Agreement and to bear all other reasonable costs and expenses related thereto; and

(c) in the event the Subrecipient does not provide the above defense and indemnification to the County, and such refusal or denial to provide the above defense and indemnification is found to be in breach of this provision, then the Subrecipient shall reimburse the County's reasonable attorney's fees incurred in connection with the defense of any action, and in connection with enforcing this provision of the Agreement.

NINTH: The Subrecipient expressly agrees that neither it nor any contractor, consultant, subrecipient, employee, or any other person acting on its behalf shall discriminate against or intimidate any employee or other individual on the basis of race, creed, religion, color, gender, age, national origin, ethnicity, alienage or citizenship status, disability, marital status, sexual orientation, familial status, genetic predisposition or carrier status during the term of or in connection with this Agreement, as those terms may be defined in Chapter 700 of the Laws of Westchester County. The Subrecipient acknowledges and understands that the County maintains a zero tolerance policy prohibiting all forms of harassment or discrimination against its employees by co-workers, supervisors, vendors, subrecipients, contractors; consultants, or others.

TENTH: The County shall have a non-exclusive, worldwide, royalty-free perpetual license to use, in any manner it sees fit, for any purpose whatsoever, all records or recorded data of any kind created or compiled by the Subrecipient in completing the Work described in this Agreement, including but not limited to written reports, studies, drawings, blueprints, computer printouts, graphs, charts, plans, specifications and all other similar recorded data.

ELEVENTH: The Subrecipient and the County agree that the Subrecipient and its officers, employees, agents, contractors, consultants and/or subcontractors are not employees of the County or any department, agency or unit thereof. Accordingly, the Subrecipient covenants and agrees that neither the Subrecipient nor any of its officers, employees, agents, contractors, consultants, and/or subcontractors will hold themselves out as, or claim to be, officers or employees of the County or any department, agency or unit thereof.

TWELFTH: Failure of the County to insist, in any one or more instances, upon strict performance of any term or condition herein contained shall not be deemed a waiver or relinquishment of such term or condition, but the same shall remain in full force and effect. Acceptance by the County of any of the Work or the payment of any amount hereunder with knowledge of a breach of any term or condition hereof, shall not be deemed a waiver of any such breach and no waiver by the County of any provision hereof shall be implied.

THIRTEENTH: All notices of any nature referred to in this Agreement shall be in writing and either sent by registered or certified mail-postage pre-paid, or delivered by hand or overnight courier, or sent by facsimile (with acknowledgment received and a copy of the notice sent by registered or certified mail postage pre-paid), to the addresses as set forth below or to such other addresses as the respective parties hereto may designate in writing. Notice shall be effective on the date of receipt. Notices shall be sent to the following:

FOURTEENTH: This Agreement and its attachments constitute the entire Agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede all previous negotiations, commitments and writings. It shall not be released, discharged, changed or modified except by an instrument in writing signed by a duly authorized representative of each of the parties.

In the event of any conflict within this Agreement, among any of the documents that form a part of this Agreement, it is understood and agreed that the following order of precedence shall prevail in determining the document that controls with respect to any interpretation of the meaning and intent of the parties:

1.) The Grant Materials

2.) This Agreement

FIFTEENTH: Nothing herein is intended or shall be construed to confer upon or give to any third party or its successors and assigns any rights, remedies or basis for reliance upon, under or by reason of this Agreement, except in the event that specific third party rights are expressly granted herein.

SIXTEENTH: The Subrecipient hereby represents that, if operating under an assumed name, it has filed the necessary certificate pursuant to New York State General Business Law Section 130.

SEVENTEENTH: The Subrecipient shall use all reasonable means to avoid any conflict of interest with the County and shall immediately notify the County in the event of a

conflict of interest. The Subrecipient shall also use all reasonable means to avoid any appearance of impropriety.

EIGHTEENTH: All payments made by the County to the Subrecipient will be made by electronic funds transfer ("EFT") pursuant to the County's Vendor Direct Program. If the Subrecipient is not already enrolled in the Vendor Direct Program, the Subrecipient shall fill out and submit an EFT Authorization Form as part of this Agreement. (In rare cases, a hardship waiver may be granted. For a Hardship Waiver Request Form, the Subrecipient understands that it must contact the County's Finance Department.) The EFT Authorization Form and related information are annexed hereto as Schedule "B". The Subrecipient shall provide the County with a completed copy of the EFT Authorization Form that is attached hereto and made a part hereof. If the Subrecipient is already enrolled in the Vendor Direct Program, the Subrecipient hereby agrees to immediately notify the County's Finance Department in writing if the EFT Authorization Form on file must be changed, and provide an updated paper version of the document.

NINETEENTH: The Subrecipient understands that the County has relied upon all materials and representations it has provided to the County concerning the Work and this Agreement in, a.) considering, among other things, whether the Subrecipient is capable of successfully performing under the terms and conditions of this Agreement; the Subrecipient's integrity and ethics; whether executing this Agreement with the Subrecipient is in compliance with public policy; the Subrecipient's record of past performance; and the Subrecipient's financial, administrative, and technical resources and capacity, b.) consequently determining that the Subrecipient is a responsible Subrecipient, and c.) making the Subaward to the Subrecipient.

TWENTIETH: The Subrecipient shall comply, at its own expense, with the provisions of all applicable local, state and federal laws, rules and regulations, including, but not limited to, those applicable to the Subrecipient as an employer of labor.

The Subrecipient understands and acknowledges that its use of the Grant Funds provided under this Agreement will make the Work funded by the Grant Funds subject to the

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various terms in the Grant Materials and various applicable federal requirements that are specified in various materials concerning, or otherwise applicable to, the Grant Funds (collectively, the "Fund Materials"). All of the Fund Materials that are not attached to this Agreement are or will be either on file with the County or publicly available from DOJ, and are hereby incorporated by reference into this Agreement. The Subrecipient represents and warrants that it is aware of and/or possesses all of the Fund Materials that it needs in order to be fully aware of, and fulfill, its obligations, including, but not necessarily limited to, the compliance obligations described in this Paragraph "TWENTIETH".

The Subrecipient agrees that, in its performance of the Work, it will comply, at its own expense, with, a.) all terms contained in the Fund Materials, as such materials may be amended from time to time, and, without limiting the foregoing, b.) the provisions of all applicable Federal laws, regulations, rules, executive orders, policies, orders, notices, and related guidance, as such provisions may be amended from time to time, ('a' and 'b', collectively, the "Federal Requirements"). The Federal Requirements are hereby incorporated into this Agreement by reference. The Subrecipient's failure to comply with the Federal Requirements shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement.

Without limiting any of the foregoing, the Subrecipient shall, specifically:

(a) Regarding access to records, access to sites where the Work is performed, and retention of records:

i.) In compliance with 2 C.F.R. 200.337(a), the Subrecipient agrees to provide the County, DOJ, the Comptroller General of the United States, any inspectors general, or any of the duly authorized representatives of any of these listed parties, access to any books, documents, papers, or other records which are pertinent to this Agreement in order to make audits, examinations, excerpts, and transcripts, as well as provide timely and reasonable access to the Subrecipient's personnel for the purpose of interview and discussion related to such documents. The Subrecipient agrees to allow the above-listed parties to reproduce,

excerpt, and/or transcribe such books, documents, papers, and other records by any means whatsoever. The Subrecipient also agrees to allow the above-listed parties such other access to records as may be necessary for compliance by such parties and/or the Subrecipient with applicable Federal Requirements.

- ii.) In accordance with 2 C.F.R. 200.337(c), all of the above-described rights of access to records shall last for as long as the records are retained by the Subrecipient. In compliance with 2 C.F.R. 200.334, the Subrecipient agrees to maintain all of the records described in item 'i', above, for the applicable period of time specified in those regulations or such other regulations as may be applicable.
- iii.) In compliance with 2 C.F.R. 200.329(f), the Subrecipient agrees to permit DOJ to make site visits as needed.
- (b) Regarding recovered materials;
 - i.) The Subrecipient agrees to comply with all applicable requirements of 2 C.F.R. 200.323; Section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act and as further amended (42 U.S.C. § 6962); 40 C.F.R. Part 247, the United States Environmental Protection Subrecipient's "Comprehensive Procurement Guideline for Products Containing Recovered Materials"; and Executive Order 12873.

(c) Regarding clean air and clean water, in compliance with Appendix II to 2 C.F.R. Part 200, the Subrecipient shall require any contractor paid any portion of the Subaward to :

- i.) Comply with all applicable requirements of, and standards, orders, or regulations issued pursuant to, the following:
 - The Clean Air Act, as amended (42 U.S.C. § 7401 7671q); and

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- The Federal Water Pollution Control Act (also known as the Clean Water Act), as amended (33 U.S.C. § 1251 – 1387).
- ii.) Report each violation of the provisions specified in item 'i', above, to the County and understands and acknowledges that the County will, in turn, report each violation as required to assure notification to DOJ and the appropriate Environmental Protection Subrecipient Regional Office.
- (d) Regarding contracting with small and minority businesses, women's business enterprises, and labor surplus area firms:
 - i.) The Subrecipient agrees to comply with all applicable requirements of 2 C.F.R. 200.321.
- (e) Regarding domestic preferences for procurements:
 - i.) The Subrecipient agrees to comply with all applicable requirements of 2 C.F.R. 200.322.
- (f) Regarding the procurement of any contract that will be funded by any portion of the Subaward;

i.) The Subrecipient agrees to conduct all such procurement transactions in compliance with 2 C.F.R. Part 200 and otherwise in a manner to provide, to the maximum extent practical, open and free competition.

The Subrecipient hereby represents and warrants that it has all of the information it needs regarding the Federal Requirements concerning reporting, patent rights, copyrights, and rights in data, and the Subrecipient understands and acknowledges that all such requirements and regulations are hereby incorporated into this Agreement by reference, and shall prevail over any conflicting term(s) of this Agreement.

TWENTY-FIRST: (a) The Subrecipient represents and warrants that it, its principals, and affiliates (as defined in 2 C.F.R. Part 180) are not currently debarred or suspended and the Subrecipient agrees to complete the "Certification Regarding Debarment and

Suspension", which is attached hereto and made a part hereof as Schedule "C".

The Subrecipient agrees that it shall immediately notify the County if it, its principals, and/or affiliates is/are debarred or suspended, or its, its principals', and/or affiliates' debarment or suspension appears likely. The Subrecipient further agrees to comply with the applicable provisions regarding debarment and suspension regulations in 2 C.F.R. Part 2867, Federal Executive Order 12549, Federal Executive Order 12689, 48 C.F.R. Subpart 9.4, and 2 C.F.R. Part 180, and to require any contractors of the Subrecipient that are being paid funds from the Subaward to comply with the same.

The Subrecipient represents and warrants that it is not currently excluded from receiving Federal contracts, certain subcontracts, and certain types of Federal financial and non-financial assistance and benefits, by virtue of being on the United States General Service Administration's the Excluded Parties List System (EPLS), available at https://sam.gov (or any successor website) as part of the System for Awards Management (SAM). The Subrecipient agrees that it shall immediately notify the County if it is so-excluded, or its exclusion appears likely.

The Subrecipient represents and warrants that it is not currently on any debarment, suspension, or exclusion list of New York State or any political subdivision thereof, and has not been found non-responsible by New York State or any political subdivision thereof. The Subrecipient agrees that it shall immediately notify the County if it is added to any debarment, suspension, or exclusion list of New York State or any political subdivision thereof, or its addition to such lists appears likely. The Subrecipient agrees that it shall immediately notify the County if it is found non-responsible by New York State or any political subdivision thereof, or its addition to such lists appears likely. The Subrecipient agrees that it shall immediately notify the County if it is found non-responsible by New York State or any political subdivision thereof, or such a finding of non-responsibility appears likely.

The Subrecipient understands and acknowledges that the County is relying upon all of the Subrecipient's above-described representations and warranties in entering into this Agreement.

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(b) The Subrecipient agrees to complete the "Certification Regarding Drug-Free Workplace Requirements", which is attached hereto and forms part hereof as Schedule "D", in order to help ensure compliance with 41 U.S.C. § 8101 et seq., 48 C.F.R. Subpart 23.5, and 28 C.F.R. Part 83. The Subrecipient agrees to require each contractor of the Subrecipient that is being paid funds from the Subaward to complete its own copy of Schedule "D".

(c) The Subrecipient agrees to complete the "Certification Regarding Lobbying", which is attached hereto and forms part hereof as Schedule "E", in compliance with 28 C.F.R. Part 69, and to otherwise comply with 28 C.F.R. Part 69 and \$1 U.S.C. § 1352. The Subrecipient agrees to require each contractor of the Subrecipient that is being paid funds from the Subaward to complete its own copy of Schedule "E".

TWENTY-SECOND: It is the intent and understanding of the County and Subrecipient that each and every provision required by law, contract, or other proper authority to be included in this Agreement shall, for all intents and purposes, be considered and deemed included herein. The Subrecipient understands and acknowledges that for each and every such provision that has, through mistake or otherwise, either not been inserted in writing or been inserted in writing in an incorrect form, the Subrecipient hereby consents to amending this Agreement in writing, upon receipt of notice from the County, for the purpose of inserting or correcting the provision in question.

TWENTY-THIRD: This Agreement may be executed simultaneously in several counterparts, each of which shall be an original and all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument. This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of New York. In addition, the parties hereby agree that any cause of action arising out of this Agreement shall be brought in the County of Westchester.

If any term or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or void or unenforceable, the remainder of the terms and provisions of this Agreement shall in no way be affected, impaired, or invalidated, and to the extent permitted by applicable law, any such term, or provision shall be restricted in applicability or reformed to

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

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SCHEDULE "A" STANDARD INSURANCE PROVISIONS (Subrecipient)

1. Prior to commencing work, and throughout the term of the Agreement, the Subrecipient shall obtain at its own cost and expense the required insurance as delineated below from insurance companies licensed in the State of New York, carrying a Best's financial rating of A or better. The Subrecipient shall provide evidence of such insurance to the County of Westchester ("County"), either by providing a copy of policies and/or certificates as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County ("Director"). The policies or certificates thereof shall provide that ten (10) days prior to cancellation or material change in the policy, notices of same shall be given to the Director either by overnight mail or personal delivery for all of the following stated insurance policies. All notices shall name the Subrecipient and identify the Agreement.

If at any time any of the policies required herein shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing any such policy shall be or become unsatisfactory to the Director, the Subrecipient shall upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and submit the policy or the certificate as requested by the Director to the Office of Risk Management of the County for approval by the Director. Upon failure of the Subrecipient to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance, the Agreement, at the election of the County, may be declared suspended, discontinued or terminated.

Failure of the Subrecipient to take out, maintain, or the taking out or maintenance of any required insurance, shall not relieve the Subrecipient from any liability under the Agreement, nor shall the insurance requirements be construed to conflict with or otherwise limit the contractual obligations of the Subrecipient concerning indemnification.

All property losses shall be made payable to the "County of Westchester" and adjusted with the appropriate County personnel.

In the event that claims, for which the County may be liable, in excess of the insured amounts provided herein are filed by reason of Subrecipient's negligent acts or omissions under the Agreement or by virtue of the provisions of the labor law or other statute or any other reason, the amount of excess of such claims or any portion thereof, may be withheld from payment due or to become due the Subrecipient until such time as the Subrecipient shall furnish such additional security covering such claims in form satisfactory to the Director.

In the event of any loss, if the Subrecipient maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums identified herein, the County shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Subrecipient. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

2. The Subrecipient shall provide proof of the following coverage (if additional coverage is required for a specific agreement, those requirements will be described in the Agreement):

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a) Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability. Certificate form C-105.2 or State Fund Insurance Company form U-26.3 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Workers' Compensation Law. State Workers' Compensation Board form DB-120.1 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Disability Benefits Law. Location of operation shall be "All locations in Westchester County, New York."

Where an applicant claims to not be required to carry either a Workers' Compensation Policy or Disability Benefits Policy, or both, the employer must complete NYS form CE-200, available to download at: <u>http://www.wcb.ny.gov</u>.

If the employer is self-insured for Workers' Compensation, he/she should present a certificate from the New York State Worker's Compensation Board evidencing that fact (Either SI-12, Certificate of Workers' Compensation Self-Insurance, or GSI-105.2, Certificate of Participation in Workers' Compensation Group Self-Insurance).

b) Commercial General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 (c.s.1) per occurrence and a \$2,000,000 aggregate limit naming the "County of Westchester" as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis. This insurance shall include the following coverages:

i.Premises - Operations.

ii.Broad Form Contractual,iii. Independent Contractor and Sub-Contractor.iv Products and Completed Operations.

c) Commercial Umbrella/Excess Insurance: \$2,000,000 each Occurrence and Aggregate naming the "County of Westchester" as additional insured, written on a "follow the form" basis.

NOTE: Additional insured status shall be provided by standard or other endorsement that extends coverage to the County of Westchester for both on-going and completed operations.

d) Automobile Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$1,000,000 for bodily injury and a minimum limit of \$100,000 per occurrence for property damage or a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 unless otherwise indicated in the contract specifications. This insurance shall include for bodily injury and property damage the following coverages and name the "County of Westchester" as additional insured:

- i. Owned automobiles.
- ii. Hired automobiles.
- iii. Non-owned automobiles.

e) Professional Liability. The Subrecipient shall provide proof of such insurance. (Limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence/\$3,000,000 aggregate).

f) Abuse and Molestation Liability, either by separate policy of insurance or through endorsement to the General Liability Policy or Professional Liability Policy. (Limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence/2,000,000 aggregate). This insurance shall include coverage for the following, including coverage for client on client, counselor client, and third parties:

- i. Misconduct
- ii. Abuse (including both physical and sexual)
- iii. Molestation

3. All policies of the Subrecipient shall be endorsed to contain the following clauses:

a) Insurers shall have no right to recovery or subrogation against the County (including its employees and other agents and agencies), it being the intention of the parties that the insurance policies so effected shall protect both parties and be primary coverage for any and all losses covered by the above-described insurance.

b) The clause "other insurance provisions" in a policy in which the County is named as an insured, shall not apply to the County.

c) The insurance companies issuing the policy or policies shall have no recourse against the County (including its agents and agencies as aforesaid) for payment of any premiums or for assessments under any form of policy.

d) Any and all deductibles in the above described insurance policies shall be assumed by and be for the account of, and at the sole risk of, the Subrecipient.

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SCHEDULE "B"

Westchester County Vendor Direct Program Frequently Asked Questions

1. WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF THE ELECTRONIC FUNDS TRANSFER (EFT) ASSOCIATED WITH THE VENDOR DIRECT PROGRAM?

There are several advantages to having your payments automatically deposited into your designated bank account via EFT:

Payments are secure – Paper checks can be lost in the mail or stolen, but money deposited directly into your bank account is more secure.

You save time – Money deposited into your bank account is automatic. You save the time of preparing and delivering the deposit to the bank. Additionally, the funds are immediately available to you.

2. ARE MY PAYMENTS GOING TO BE PROCESSED ON THE SAME SCHEDULE AS THEY WERE BEFORE VENDOR DIRECT?

Yes.

3. HOW QUICKLY WILL A PAYMENT BE DEPOSITED INTO MY ACCOUNT?

Payments are deposited two business days after the voucher/invoice is processed. Saturdays, Sundays, and legal holidays are not considered business days.

4. HOW WILL I KNOW WHEN THE PAYMENT IS IN MY BANK ACCOUNT AND WHAT IT IS FOR?

Under the Vendor Direct program you will receive an e-mail notification two days prior to the day the payment will be credited to your designated account. The e-mail notification will come in the form of a remittance advice with the same information that currently appears on your check stub, and will contain the date that the funds will be credited to your account.

5. WHAT IF THERE IS A DISCREPANCY IN THE AMOUNT RECEIVED?

Please contact your Westchester County representative as you would have in the past if there were a discrepancy on a check received.

6. WHAT IF I DO NOT RECEIVE THE MONEY IN MY DESIGNATED BANK ACCOUNT ON THE DATE INDICATED IN THE E-MAIL?

In the unlikely event that this occurs, please contact the Westchester County Accounts Payable Department at 914-995-4708.

7. WHAT MUST LOO IF I CHANGE MY BANK OR MY ACCOUNT NUMBER?

Whenever you change any information or close your account a new Vendor Direct Payment Authorization Form must be submitted. Please contact the Westchester County Accounts Payable Department at 914-995-4708 and we will e-mail you a new form.

8. WHEN COMPLETING THE PAYMENT AUTHORIZATION FORM, WHY MUST I HAVE IT SIGNED BY A BANK OFFICIAL IF I DON'T INCLUDE A VOIDED CHECK?



Your Committee is in receipt of a proposed Act, which if enacted by your Board, would authorize the settlement of the lawsuit of <u>Kim Golodetz v County of Westchester et al.</u>, in the amount of \$405,000.00 inclusive of attorney's fees.

This matter is pending in the Westchester County Supreme Court before the Honorable Nancy Quinn Koba. The lawsuit tentatively settled after a verdict on liability, pending this Board's approval of a settlement in the amount of \$405,000.00, inclusive of attorney's fees.

Glenn A. Herman, Esq. of Herman & Herman, P.C., 589 8th Avenue, 21st Floor, New York New York 10018, is representing the plaintiff, Kim Golodetz.

This lawsuit arises out of a bicycle accident on the North County Trailway on April 7, 2019 at approximately 12:40 pm. The plaintiff was travelling north on the trailway when she rode over what she claimed was an unexpected bump and was thrown from her bicycle. At trial plaintiff claimed that the County was negligent for failing to repair the bump despite having notice that another cyclist claimed to have fallen over the identical bump 10 months prior to the plaintiff's accident. The County argued that the bump was not dangerous and that the plaintiff assumed the risk of injury when she voluntarily engaged in cycling on the North County Trailway despite warning signs that there were uneven surfaces. At the conclusion of the liability phase of a bifurcated trial, the jury returned a verdict finding both parties negligent and responsible for the accident. The County was found to be 56% percent responsible and the plaintiff was found to be 44% responsible. The matter settled before the damages phase of the trial where the plaintiff would have presented evidence that, as a result of the accident, she suffered a fractured shoulder requiring surgery. She claims she engaged in physical therapy for

over a year and still suffers from pain and limited range of motion. She alleges that she will require a second surgery to remove the hardware that was put in place during the first surgery because the hardware is causing her to suffer pain.

The settlement takes into consideration the liability findings of the jury, the uncertainty of litigation and the potential costs of trial, subsequent proceedings and potential appeal. The accompanying Act will authorize settlement of the lawsuit entitled of <u>Kim Golodetz v County of Westchester et al</u>, in the amount of \$405,000.00, Westchester County Supreme Court Index No. 61047/2019, inclusive of attorney's fees.

Your Committee has carefully considered the subject matter, the settlement proposal, the attached Act and recommends authorizing the County Attorney or his designee to settle the lawsuit entitled <u>Kim Golodetz v County of Westchester et al.</u>, in the amount of \$405,000.00, Westchester County Supreme Court Index No. 61047/2019, inclusive of attorney's fees. An affirmative vote of a majority of the Board is required to pass this legislation.

SUBJECT: ACTIVITIES NOT SUBJECT TO STATE ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY REVIEW

As required by the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act and its implementing regulations 6 NYCRR Part 617 ("SEQR"), the Board of Legislators ("BOL") is the body that must assess the environmental significance of all actions that the BOL has discretion to approve, fund or directly undertake. The Planning Department has historically conducted the necessary environmental review for the BOL to undertake its responsibility under SEQR. Additionally, contracts going before the Board of Acquisition and Contracts ("BAC") must be reviewed for conformance with SEQR.

Pursuant to Section 617.2(b) of SEQR, "Actions" are defined as:

- (1) projects or physical activities, such as construction or other activities that may affect the environment by changing the use, appearance or condition of any natural resource or structure, that:
 - (i) are directly undertaken by an agency; or
 - (ii) involve funding by an agency; or
 - (iii) require one or more new or modified approvals from an agency or agencies;
- (2) agency planning and policy making activities that may affect the environment and commit the agency to a definite course of future decisions;
- (3) adoption of agency rules, regulations and procedures, including local laws, codes, ordinances, executive orders and resolutions that may affect the environment; and
- (4) any combinations of the above.

As part of the Planning Department's ongoing review of its processes, we are streamlining the process for SEQR review and related document preparation for the BOL and BAC. The most effective method to achieve a more timely SEQR review is to create a list of categories of activities **that do not meet the definition of an "action"** as defined in SEQR. This list (attached) references activities that are routine and which do not change the use, appearance or condition of any natural resource or structure, nor do they involve policies or regulations that may affect the environment. The creation of this list in no way eliminates the BOL's or BAC's

responsibilities under SEQR. Rather, it establishes a workflow for items that are routine and do not, under the law, require environmental review.

Accordingly, the Planning Department advises that no environmental review is required and no SEQR documentation is necessary for submission with BOL legislation or with resolutions or contracts requiring BAC approval regarding activities on the attached list.

County departments and agencies may reference this memorandum in the legislation in order to document compliance with SEQR for actions listed herein. As such, this memorandum should be kept on file with the Clerk of the Board of Legislators. Legislation should include a statement similar to the following: "The proposed project does not meet the definition of an action under New York State Environmental Quality Review Act and its implementing regulations 6 NYCRR Part 617. Please refer to the memorandum from the Department of Planning dated January 12, 2022, which is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Legislators."

This memorandum will be distributed to all Commissioners as part of County operations.

ACTIVITIES THAT DO NOT MEET THE DEFINITION OF AN "ACTION" PURSUANT TO SEQR AND ARE, CONSEQUENTLY, NOT SUBJECT TO SEQR

1. BUDGETS AND AMENDMENTS

- Municipal budgets and amendments to them The budgeting process merely sets aside funds without a commitment to their expenditure. Operating expenditures are typically for government-related activities that would also not meet the definition of an action. Even the establishment of the Capital Budget is not subject to SEQR because many of the capital projects are usually not definitive enough with respect to potential impacts to be reviewable at the time the budget is adopted. However, any subsequent authorization, such as bonding, to undertake a particular capital project is an action that requires SEQR compliance before it may be approved.
- The transfer of funds within the County operating and capital budgets for the purpose of balancing accounts It is understood that these actions are purely budgetary, where accounts with excess funds are moved to accounts with existing or anticipated deficits. It is further understood that the activities covered by these accounts have either already occurred or been reviewed in accordance with SEQR, are Type II actions or actions that are not subject to SEQR, or are actions that will require future approval prior to being undertaken, at which time further SEQR review may be appropriate.
- Rescissions or reduction of bond acts to cancel unspent funds.

2. <u>SERVICES</u>

- Consultant services Contracts or agreements that provide for administrative services, training, reports for Boards and Commissions, but not including studies or design of physical improvements, which has been listed under SEQR as Type II.
- Social Services Actions or agreements that provide services to persons in need, such as employment assistance, family/domestic intervention and respite care.
- Youth services Actions or agreements that provide for youth services, such as a Resource Allocation Plan, Invest-in-Kids Program, after-school programs, camp programs and head-start programs.

WHEREAS, the same percentages are applicable to the Special Districts in the County;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED by the County Board of Legislators of the County of Westchester, as follows:

Section 1. That the share to be paid by each town and city of the County is hereby fixed and determined as set forth in the aforesaid tables annexed hereto and made part hereof.

§2. That the amount of tax to be collected from each such town and city in said tables set forth, is hereby levied against each such town and city.

ACT NO. 161 of 2022 (As Amended) (Corrected)

HONORABLE BOARD OF LEGISLATORS THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK

Your Committee on Budget and Appropriations is in receipt of a transmittal from the County Executive of his proposed 2023 County Budget and Budget Act making appropriations and levying real property taxes for the support of County Government for the year Two Thousand Twenty-Three.

The Department of Budget has advised that this legislation is necessary for the conduct of County Government for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2023.

Therefore, the Committee recommends the adoption of the attached Budget Act making appropriations and levying real property taxes for the support of County Government for the year Two Thousand Twenty-Three.

ACT NO. 161 of 2022 (As Amended) (Corrected)

AN ACT adopting the County Budget and making appropriations and levying real property taxes for the conduct of the County Government for the year Two Thousand Twenty-Three.

Be it enacted by the Board of Legislators of the County of Westchester as follows:

Section 1. The accompanying County Budget including the current plan and the capital program for the County of Westchester and the several districts therein, as listed below, is hereby adopted for the fiscal year Two Thousand and Twenty-Three:

Section 2. During the Calendar Year 2023, the Commissioner of Finance shall verify and provide the Board of Legislators quarterly with a statement of the County's cash flow for the General Fund.

Section 3. The several amounts specified in the above mentioned budget under the column heading "Allowed 2023" or so much of such amount as shall be sufficient to accomplish the purposes designated are hereby appropriated for such purposes under the following general classifications:

Personal Service (Code 100 and 101) Purchase of Equipment (Code 200) Materials and Supplies (Code 300) Expenses (Code 400 and 599) Relief (Code 501) County Debt Service (Agency 51)

Miscellaneous (Agency 52) Capital Projects

Section 4. Within 30 days after the close of the Second Quarter and the Fourth Quarter for the Calendar Year 2023, the Commissioner of Finance shall verify and provide the Board of Legislators with:

- (i) A combined statement of the County's cash balances for all accounts
- (ii) A statement of the County's cash balances for all enterprise funds

Section 5. With respect to the Executive Branch of County government, the positions shown in the budget are hereby authorized, created and/or continued and the number appearing on the line items of the positions shall be the number of positions under such title.

Section 6. All elective officers, appointive officers and other positions are to be paid at salaries set in accordance with the provisions of the personnel rules and amendments thereto adopted by this Board and with respect to the Executive Branch of County government, may be filled only in accordance with procedures approved by the County Executive.

Section 7. Where personal service is required to accomplish the intended purpose of an appropriation, such personal service may be employed in accordance with the provision of the personnel rules and amendments thereto adopted by the Board, when approved and allocated by the Budget Director as appropriate.

Section 8. Where personnel are employed under a trust or grant, such employment shall terminate at the expiration of the funds provided by the trust or grant.

Section 9. The Commissioner of Finance is hereby authorized to advance from funds on hand to Year 2023 Budget accounts such amounts as may be required, pending receipt of taxes and/or other revenues.

Section 10. Transfer of appropriations between departments and transfer of appropriations between a department and the Miscellaneous Budget are made upon the prior recommendation of the County Executive with the prior authorization of the County Board of Legislators.

Section 11. Transfer of appropriations between general classifications of expenditures within the same department and transfers of appropriations between account lines in the Miscellaneous Budget are made with the prior authorization of the County Executive on the recommendation of the Budget Director and with the prior approval of the Committee of the County Board designated by resolution of such Board.

Section 12. The "Trusts" section presented after the operating budget of a department is provided for informational purposes only. Adoption of this budget act shall not be considered to be acceptance of any grant requiring the expenditure of County funds.

Section 13. The invalidity of any provisions, paragraphs, or portions of this Act shall have no effect upon the validity of any other part or portion hereof. Should any provision(s) of this Act be held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or for any reason unenforceable, the remainder shall nonetheless be of full force and effect.

Section 14. The amounts of the County and Special District Taxes for 2023 resulting from the County Budget are hereby fixed and determined as indicated below:

Honorable Colleagues:

On October 14, 2022, County Executive George Latimer forwarded his proposed 2023 County Capital Budget and on November 10, 2022 forwarded his proposed 2023 County Operating and Special Districts Budgets to the Committee on Budget & Appropriations. The Budget & Appropriations Committee of this Honorable Board has devoted full attention to analyze and discuss them.

Meetings of the Board of Legislators and its committees are held at the Michaelian Office Building, 148 Martine Avenue, White Plains, New York, 10601, and remotely via the WebEx video conferencing system allowing both in-person and remote participation via Webex. The Budget & Appropriations Committee has held two in-person Public Input Sessions, the first on November 16, 2022, at 7pm, at the New Rochelle Public Library, and the second on November 30, 2022, at 7pm, at the Chappaqua Performing Arts Center. The Committee also held a public hearing, as required by the County's Charter, on Wednesday, December 7, 2022, at 7pm. The hearing was attended by concerned residents who were able to comment both in-person, and via the County Board's Webex video conference system. In addition, the Budget & Appropriations Committee has benefited from the testimony of Commissioners and heads of major departments, as well as from analysis of the proposed budgets by the Citizens' Budget Advisory Committee and by our auditors.

On Monday, December 5, 2022, pursuant to Section 167.81 of the Westchester County Charter as amended by Local Law 8-1994, the Committee on Budget & Appropriations filed a memorandum of proposed additions to the proposed 2023 Budgets.

The Board of Legislators will continue to debate the legally required balanced budgets for 2023. We are committed to continuing to find the balance between investment in our residents, services and infrastructure while stabilizing the tax levy. Your Committee finds that amounts appropriated in the 2023 County Budgets pursuant to the policies of this Board are for the purposes of performing the operations of the County and providing essential services to County residents. Therefore, the Budget & Appropriations Committee offers the attached amendments at this time.

Honorable Colleagues:

On October 14, 2022 County Executive George Latimer forwarded his proposed 2023 County Capital Budget and on November 10, 2022 he forwarded his proposed 2023 County Operating and Special Districts Budget to the Committee on Budget and Appropriations. The Budget & Appropriations Committee of this Honorable Board immediately began to analyze and discuss them.

Pursuant to Section 167.81 of the Laws of Westchester County as amended by Local Law 8-1994, your Committee on Budget & Appropriations, within a specified time period, has the authority to file with the Board a memorandum of any proposed additions to the Proposed Budget. In keeping with Board policy, your Committee on Budget & Appropriations notes that any additions contained in this Memorandum, as well as any other item, <u>may still subsequently be reduced or entirely deleted</u> from the Proposed 2023 County Operating, Capital, and Special Districts Budget prior to their adoption.

As is its practice during the process of considering additions, your Committee on Budget & Appropriations has called on various County departments and agencies to testify.

It has also relied on the expertise of its auditors and has taken into account the views of all Legislators, the Citizens Budget Advisory Committee, numerous groups and organizations, individual citizens, and has held two in-person Public Input Sessions. Additionally, meetings of the Board of Legislators and its committees are held at the Michaelian Office Building, 148 Martine Avenue, White Plains, New York, 10601, and remotely via the WebEx video conferencing system allowing both in-person and remote participation via Webex. All of these perspectives have been factored into this Memorandum, ensuring that it is the product of government decision-making truly shared by all those affected.

In addition to the attached document of additions to the 2023 County Operating Budget, your Committee on Budget & Appropriations has identified existing funding in the 2023 budget to be allocated to reduce the Child Care Parent Share Subsidy program to 5% through child care block grants; and an additional \$500,000 for Neighborhood Health Centers through ARPA funding.

Through its issuance of this Memorandum, your Committee on Budget & Appropriations hereby complies with the Westchester County Charter. While obviously it believes the actions contained within this Memorandum are prudent, that evaluation must ultimately be made by this Honorable Board. Likewise, the County tax rate can only be changed by a majority of this Honorable Board when it passes a budget and/or acts on a County Executive's veto (or vetoes) on specific, Charter-allowed items.

With these understandings, your Committee on Budget & Appropriations hereby recommends the following additions to this Honorable Board for its full deliberation and ultimate decision (see attached schedule):
