Dear Honorable Members of the Board of Legislators:

Transmitted herewith for your review and approval please find the following:

Land Purchase and Conveyance. An Act (the “Land Acquisition Act”) to authorize the purchase and subsequent conveyance of approximately +/- 0.36 acres of real property located at 26 Garden Street (the “Property”) in the City of New Rochelle (the “City”) to MJ Garden V LLC, its successors or assigns, (the “Developer”) as part of the County’s program to support the construction of housing units that affirmatively further fair housing (the “Affordable AFFH Units”). The Land Acquisition Act also authorizes the County to grant and accept any property rights necessary in furtherance thereof.

Acquisition Financing. A New Homes Land Acquisition Bond Act (the “NHLA Bond Act”), prepared by the firm of Hawkins Delafield & Wood LLP, to authorize the issuance of bonds of the County in a total amount not to exceed \$5,000,000 as a part of Capital Project BPL30 New Homes Land Acquisition II. The Department of Planning (“Planning”) has advised that subject to the receipt of approval of your Honorable Board, the proposed NHLA Bond Act will authorize an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000 to purchase the Property from the current owner to create one hundred eighty-six (186) Affordable AFFH Units for rental. The Developer will construct forty-nine (49) parking spaces under the building and an additional forty-five (45) parking spaces will be located under the adjacent building for use by the residents.

Upon acquisition, the County will file a Declaration of Restrictive Covenants against the Property, to require that the proposed Affordable AFFH Units be marketed and leased in accordance with an approved affordable fair housing marketing plan to eligible households who earn at or below 50% and up to 60% of the Westchester County area median income. The units will remain affordable for a period of not less than 50 years (the “Period of Affordability”).

In accordance with the Land Acquisition Act, the County will subsequently convey the Property to the Developer, its successors or assigns, for One Dollar (\$1.00) to construct the Affordable AFFH Units with a total of one hundred eighty-six (186) rental units.

Planning has further advised that additional funds for the Development are anticipated to be provided from Tax Exempt Bonds issued by New York State Housing Finance Agency, Low Income Housing Tax Credits allocated by New York State Homes and Community Renewal (“HCR”) and HCR Subsidy for an estimated total development cost of approximately \$91.09 Million.

As your Honorable Board is aware, no action may be taken with regard to the proposed legislation until the requirements of the State Environmental Quality Review Act (“SEQRA”) have been met. Planning has advised that, based upon its review, the proposed Development constitutes an Unlisted action pursuant to 6 NYCRR 617, the implementing regulations of SEQRA. Planning has further advised that the City of New Rochelle Planning Board served as lead agency over the site-specific review and issued a Negative Declaration pursuant to SEQR for this project on February 25, 2020. However, the County was not included as an involved agency in the City Planning Board’s site-specific review. As such, a Full Environmental Assessment form, prepared by Planning, is attached to assist your Honorable Board in complying with the requirements of SEQRA. Should your Honorable Board conclude that the proposed action will not have any significant adverse impact on the environment, it must approve the attached Resolution adopting a Negative Declaration prior to enacting the proposed NHLA and Bond Acts. As you know, your Honorable Board may use such expert advice to reach its own conclusion.

On June 1, 2021, the Westchester County Planning Board (the “Planning Board”) adopted Resolution No. 21-31 that recommends funding for the purchase and conveyance of the Property. Planning has further advised that Section 167.131 of the County Charter mandates that a Capital Budget Amendment that introduces a new capital project or changes the location, size or character of an existing capital project be accompanied by a report of the Planning Board with respect to the physical planning aspects of the project. Accordingly, the necessary Planning Board report for BPL30 has been annexed. In addition, the report of the Commissioner of Planning is annexed pursuant to Section 191.41 of the Westchester County Charter.

Based on the importance of creating more affordable AFFH units in the County, your favorable action on the annexed Acts is respectfully requested.

**HONORABLE BOARD OF LEGISLATORS

Your Committee is in receipt of a communication from the County Executive recommending the enactment of the following:

Land Purchase and Conveyance. An Act (the “Land Acquisition Act”) to authorize the purchase and subsequent conveyance of approximately +/- 0.36 acres of real property located at 26 Garden Street (the “Property”) in the City of New Rochelle (the “City”) to MJ Garden V LLC, its successors or assigns, (the “Developer”) as part of the County’s program to support the creation of housing units that affirmatively further fair housing (the “Affordable AFFH Units”). The Land Acquisition Act also authorizes the County to grant and accept any property rights necessary in furtherance thereof.

Acquisition Financing. A New Homes Land Acquisition Bond Act (the “NHLA Bond Act”), prepared by the firm of Hawkins Delafield & Wood LLP, to authorize the issuance of bonds of the County in a total amount not to exceed \$5,000,000 as a part of Capital Project BPL30 New Homes Land Acquisition II. The Department of Planning (“Planning”) has advised that subject to the receipt of approval of your Honorable Board, the proposed NHLA Bond Act will authorize an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000 to purchase the Property from the current owner to create one hundred eighty-six (186) Affordable AFFH Units for rental.

Upon acquisition, the County will file a Declaration of Restrictive Covenants against the Property, to require that the proposed Affordable AFFH Units be marketed and leased in accordance with an approved affordable fair housing marketing plan to households who earn at or below 50% and up to 60% of the Westchester County area median income and will remain affordable for a period of not less than 50 years.

In accordance with the Land Acquisition Act, the County will subsequently convey the Property to MJ Garden V LLC (the “Developer”), its successors or assigns, for ONE DOLLAR (\$1.00) to construct the one hundred eighty-six (186) Affordable AFFH Units. The Developer will also

construct a new twenty-four story building with approximately forty-nine (49) parking spaces and an additional forty-five (45) parking spaces will be located under the adjacent building for use by the residents.

Your committee has been advised by Planning that, based on its review, the proposed Development is classified as an “Unlisted action” under the State Environmental Quality Review Act (“SEQRA”) and its implementing regulations 6 NYCRR Part 617, which requires an assessment of environmental impacts. Your Committee has further been advised by Planning that the City of New Rochelle Planning Board served as lead agency over the site-specific review and issued a Negative Declaration pursuant to SEQR for this Development on February 25, 2020. However, the County was not included as an involved agency in the City Planning Board’s site-specific review. Your Committee has carefully considered the proposed legislation. It has reviewed the attached Full Environmental Assessment Form (“EAF”) and the criteria contained in Section 617.7 of the SEQRA regulations to identify the relevant areas of environmental concern. For the reasons set forth in the attached Full EAF, your Committee believes that the proposed action will not have any significant adverse impact on the environment and urges your Honorable Board to adopt the annexed resolution by which this Board would issue a Negative Declaration for this Development.

Your Committee has been advised that on June 1, 2021, the Westchester County Planning Board (the “Planning Board”) adopted Resolution No. 21-13 that recommends funding for the purchase and conveyance of the Property. In addition, Section 167.131 of the County Charter mandates that a Capital Budget Amendment that introduces a new capital project or changes the location, size or character of an existing capital project be accompanied by a report of the Planning Board with respect to the physical planning aspects of the project. Accordingly, the necessary Planning Board report for BPL30 has been annexed. In addition, the report of the Commissioner of Planning is annexed pursuant to Section 191.41 of the Westchester County Charter.

Based on the importance of creating more affordable AFFH units in the County, your favorable action on the annexed Acts is respectfully requested, noting that the Land Acquisition Act and the

NHLA Bond Act require the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of your Honorable Board.



RESOLUTION 21- 13

WESTCHESTER COUNTY PLANNING BOARD

**New Homes Land Acquisition II
Capital Project Funding Request
26 Garden Street, City of New Rochelle**

WHEREAS, the County of Westchester (the "County") has established Capital Project BPL30 New Homes Land Acquisition II ("NHLA") to assist in the acquisition of property associated with the development and preservation of fair and affordable housing; and

WHEREAS, MJ Garden V LLC (the "Developer"), its successors or assigns, desires to develop the real property located at 26 Garden Street in the City of New Rochelle (the "City"), identified on the City tax maps as Section 3; Block 802; Lot 500 that will be divided per a condominium plan into separate condominiums for different uses with the County acquiring only the residential condominium (the "Property") to create 186 affordable residential units that will affirmatively further fair housing ("AFFH"; collectively the "Affordable AFFH Units") and 49 parking spaces (the "Development"); and

WHEREAS, the County proposes to purchase the Property from the owner of record, for a not to exceed amount of \$5,000,000 with funds from NHLA, and subsequently convey the Property to the Developer for One (\$1.00) Dollar to underwrite the cost of the land; and

WHEREAS, upon acquisition, the County will file a Declaration of Restrictive Covenants requiring that the Affordable AFFH Units constructed on the Property be leased to households who earn at or below 50% and up to 60% of the Westchester County Area Median Income ("AMI"); and

WHEREAS, the County will transfer ownership of the Property to the Developer to construct a mix of studio, one, and two-bedroom apartments to be leased to eligible households, pursuant to an approved Affirmative Fair Housing Marketing Plan, for a minimum of 50 years; and

WHEREAS, in furtherance of the above, the County Executive will be submitting legislation to the Board of Legislators to amend Capital Project BPL30 NHLA II to add the Property - 26 Garden Street, City of New Rochelle, and authorize bonding in a not to exceed amount of \$5,000,000 to purchase the Property; and

WHEREAS, the Development is subject to approvals by the City of New Rochelle; and


WHEREAS, the funding to support the development of the Affordable AFFH Units is consistent with and reinforces *Westchester 2025 – Policies to Guide County Planning*, the County Planning Board's adopted long-range land use and development policies, by contributing to the development of "a range of housing types" "affordable to all income levels"; and

WHEREAS, the staff of the County Department of Planning have reviewed the proposal and recommend the requested funding associated with acquisition of the Property; and

RESOLVED, that the Westchester County Planning Board after completing a review of the physical planning aspects of the Affordable AFFH Units, subject to an appraisal, recommends that the County provide financial assistance in a not-to-exceed amount of \$5,000,000 from BPL30 NHLA II for property acquisition; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Westchester County Planning Board amends its report on the 2021 Capital Project requests to include 26 Garden Street in the City of New Rochelle, as a new component project in Capital Project BPL30 under the heading of Buildings, Land and Miscellaneous.

Brief Description of Proposed Action (include purpose or need): MJ Garden LLC ("Applicant") requests consolidation of lots, application of the Development Overlay Zone to the project site, and site plan approval to build a mixed-use residential, Juvenile/Family Courthouse, with medical offices. The site received site plan approval on 12-18-2018 for a 14-story mixed-use development with 186 residential units and 35,310 sf of commercial/office space. Subsequent to receiving site plan approval the applicant entered into a development agreement with Westchester County to construct a two story Juvenile/Family Courthouse plus two stories of future offices as a buffer use per City of New Rochelle requirements. The proposed project would be constructed in 3- phases. Phase 1- is the two story 37,000 sf Juvenile/Family Courthouse, plus two story 37,000 sf buffer with a TBD office use. Phase 2 is a 21-story building abutting the Juvenile/Family Courthouse with 186 units (previously approved) with 34 studios (18%); 98 one-bedrooms (52%); 58 two-bedrooms (30%). Phase 3 would be 157,500 sf of medical/office in a 13-story tower to be processed separately. Required parking for Phases 1 & 2 is 261 parking spaces. Proposed parking will be 261 spaces; 192 spaces constructed; 44 parking spaces shared; and 25 parking spaces via 'buy-outs' per New Rochelle code.



The project involves the construction of a mixed-use complex (residential, courthouse, office space) with structured parking. Phase one of the project is already under construction, following approval from the City of New Rochelle. Phase two of the project will consist of a 24-story residential building with 186 affordable housing units. Phase three of the project will consist of the development of a medical office building, and will be subject to future environmental review by the City of New Rochelle. The project is in New Rochelle's Downtown Overlay Zone (DO-2), which was the subject of a Generic Environmental Impact Statement (GEIS). As required by the City's Findings Statement, site-specific review was conducted which included a Full EAF, a trip generation and distribution analysis, a shadow study, and a drainage report. The City Planning Board confirmed that the project falls within the development and impact thresholds of the GEIS and Findings Statement and will not result in any potentially significant adverse impacts to the environment. To support affordable housing, the County of Westchester will contribute funds toward site acquisition associated with this project.

The project location is a former brownfield site, Cottage-Garden Auto Repair Site (ID C360180). Contaminants of concern at the site included metals, PAH's and VOC's. A certificate of completed remediation was awarded in December 2020, identifying that the site has achieved a conditional Track 1 unrestricted use remedy with remaining contamination in groundwater and soil vapor. The site will be subject to an Environmental Easement and Site Management Plan until it is determined that groundwater and soil vapor requirements for unrestricted use have been met. The project will include the installation of a sub-slab depressurization system and will be subject to continued monitoring until standards are met for Track 1 cleanup. Per the Site Management Plan, it is anticipated to take less than 5 years for residual contamination to be reduced to levels meeting requirements for unrestricted use. As remediation of the site has been completed and institutional and engineering controls will be in place to monitor and mitigate potential exposure to residual contamination, the project will result in no significant impacts to human health and safety due to site contamination.

As the project is located within an area of extensive urban development and is proximate to highways, railroads, and intense residential, commercial, and industrial uses, the project will result in minimal impacts to land, plants, animals, and water and will not result in significant impacts to noise, light, air quality or odors. The project is located on land which was previously heavily disturbed and is not expected to have any archaeological impacts. The project will have no impact on historic resources as it is not located adjacent to any historic sites.

To mitigate new demand for water, heating, cooling, and electricity, the project will include high efficiency building systems, lighting and appliances, as well as water conserving fixtures in order to meet the building standards of NYSERDA Multifamily New Construction and Enterprise Green Communities. The project will also be assessed a Fair Share Mitigation Fee, which will offset the increase in usage of public services from the project. As such, the project will have no significant impact on local utilities and public services.



Pursuant to Section 191.41 of the Westchester County Charter, submitted herewith is the required report of the Commissioner of Planning on the proposed acquisition and subsequent conveyance of +/- 0.36 acres of real property located at 26 Garden Street in the City of New Rochelle, identified on the City tax maps as Section 3, Block 802, Lot 500 (the "Property") for the purpose of creating 186 affordable housing units that will affirmatively further fair housing (the "Affordable AFFH Units"). The development will also provide approximately forty-nine (49) parking spaces and an additional forty-five (45) parking spaces will be located under the adjacent building for use by the residents.

The County of Westchester ("the County") intends to finance the purchase of the Property from the current owner in an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000 as a part of Capital Project BPL30 New Homes Land Acquisition II. Upon acquisition of the Property, the County will file a Declaration of Restrictive Covenants to require that the Affordable AFFH Units are marketed and leased in accordance with an approved affirmative fair housing marketing plan and will remain available to eligible households for a period of not less than 50 years. The County will then convey ownership of the Property to MJ Garden V LLC (the "Developer"), its successors or assigns, for One Dollar (\$1.00).

The Developer proposes to construct a new twenty-four-story building on the Property that will include a mix of affordable studio, and one and two bedroom rental apartments that will be leased to households who earn at or below 50% and up to 60% of the area median income (collectively the "Development").

I recommend funding for acquisition and conveyance of the Property for the following reasons:

1. The acquisition of this Property will advance the County's efforts to provide fair and affordable housing;
2. The acquisition and subsequent conveyance of the Property to develop fair and affordable housing is consistent with development policies adopted by the County Planning Board as set forth in *Westchester 2025 - Context for County and Municipal Planning in Westchester County and Policies to Guide County Planning*, adopted May 6, 2008, and amended January 5, 2010, and the recommended strategies set forth in *Patterns for*

- Westchester: The Land and the People*, adopted December 5, 1995;
3. The Development is proposed to include green technology, such as energy efficient appliances, lighting, heating systems and water conserving fixtures. The Development is designed to meet the green building standards of both Energy Star Multifamily New Construction and Enterprise Green Communities;
 4. The Development is consistent with the land use policies and regulations of the City of New Rochelle; and
 5. On June 1, 2021, the County Planning Board adopted a resolution to recommend County financing towards the purchase the Property to support the Development.

WHEREAS, pursuant to SEQRA and its implementing regulations (6 NYCRR Part 617), this Development is classified as an “Unlisted action,” which requires this Honorable Board to make a determination as to whether the proposed action will have a significant impact on the environment; and

WHEREAS, the County of Westchester is conducting an uncoordinated review as permitted for Unlisted actions pursuant to Section 617.6(b)(4) of the implementing regulations; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with SEQRA and its implementing regulations, a Full Environmental Assessment Form has been prepared to assist this Honorable Board in its environmental assessment of this proposed action; and

WHEREAS, this Honorable Board has carefully considered the proposed action and has reviewed the attached Full Environmental Assessment Form and the criteria set forth in Section 617.7 of the implementing regulations and has identified the relevant areas of environmental concern, as described in the attached Full Environmental Assessment Form, to determine if this proposed action will have a significant impact on the environment.

BOND ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$5,000,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, OR SO MUCH THEREOF AS MAY BE NECESSARY, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE PURCHASE OF REAL PROPERTY LOCATED AT 26 GARDEN STREET, IN THE CITY OF NEW ROCHELLE, IN ORDER TO AFFIRMATIVELY FURTHER FAIR HOUSING (“AFFH”) PURSUANT TO THE COUNTY’S NEW HOMES LAND ACQUISITION II CAPITAL PROJECT (BPL30); STATING THE ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST THEREOF IS \$5,000,000; STATING THE PLAN OF FINANCING SAID COST INCLUDES THE ISSUANCE OF \$5,000,000 BONDS HEREIN AUTHORIZED; AND PROVIDING FOR A TAX TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS (Adopted , 20__)

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (the “Law”), the Westchester County Administrative Code, being Chapter 852 of the Laws of 1948, as amended, and other laws applicable thereto, bonds of the County in the aggregate amount of \$5,000,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby authorized to be issued to finance the cost of the purchase of approximately 1.12 acres of real property located at 26 Garden Street, in the City of New Rochelle (the “AFFH Property”) from the current owner(s) of record at a cost of \$5,000,000, including acquisition and settlement costs, in order to support the construction of affordable housing units that

will affirmatively further fair housing (“AFFH”); the County will file, or cause to be filed, a Declaration of Restrictive Covenants in the Westchester County Clerk’s office requiring that the AFFH Property remain affordable for a period of not less than 50 years. The funding requested herein is in support of the construction of 186 affordable AFFH rental units and 49 parking spaces for residents at the aggregate estimated maximum cost of \$5,000,000 for said land acquisition. Such property shall be acquired by the County, subjected to a declaration of restrictive covenants and subsequently conveyed to MJ Garden V LLC (the “Developer”), its successors or assigns. The Developer will construct 186 affordable AFFH rental units and 49 parking spaces for residents on the AFFH Property (the “Development”). The County’s acquisition of the AFFH Property is set forth in the County’s Current Year Capital Budget, as amended. To the extent that the details set forth in this act are inconsistent with any details set forth in the Current Year Capital Budget of the County and the Statement of Need, such Budget and Statement of Need shall be deemed and are hereby amended. The estimated maximum cost of said object or purpose, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof, is \$5,000,000. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$5,000,000 bonds herein authorized, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds, and the levy and collection of a tax on taxable real property in the County to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds and notes.

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness for which said \$5,000,000 bonds are authorized to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 21 of the Law, is thirty (30) years.

Section 3. The County intends to finance, on an interim basis, the costs or a portion of the costs of said object or purpose for which bonds are herein authorized, which costs are

reasonably expected to be reimbursed with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County, pursuant to this Bond Act, in the maximum amount of \$5,000,000. This Act is a declaration of official intent adopted pursuant to the requirements of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2.

Section 4. The estimate of \$5,000,000 as the estimated maximum cost of the aforesaid object or purpose is hereby approved, and as the amount of bonds herein authorized is not in excess of \$10,000,000, this Act is not subject to referendum.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of this Act and of the Law, and pursuant to the provisions of section 30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes and the renewals thereof, and of sections 50.00, 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of said Law, the powers and duties of the County Board of Legislators relative to authorizing the issuance of any notes in anticipation of the sale of the bonds herein authorized, and the renewals thereof, relative to providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, relative to prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the bonds herein authorized, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds and the renewals of said notes, and relative to executing agreements for credit enhancement, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance of the County, as the chief fiscal officer of the County.

Section 6. Each of the bonds authorized by this Act and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale thereof shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by section 52.00 of said Local Finance Law and said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the County of Westchester, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the County. The faith and credit of the

County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds and the renewals of said notes, and provision shall be made annually in the budgets of the County by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the notes and bonds to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 7. The validity of the bonds authorized by this Act and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

(a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or

(b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this Act or a summary hereof, are not substantially complied with,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED by the members of the Board of Legislators of the County of Westchester as follows:

SECTION 1. The County of Westchester (the "County") is hereby authorized to purchase from the current owner(s) of record approximately +/- 0.36 acres of real property located at 26 Garden Street in the City of New Rochelle, (the "Property") to construct 186 affordable rental housing units that will affirmatively further fair housing (the "Affordable AFFH Units") as set forth in 42 U.S.C. Section 5304(b)(2).

§2. The County is hereby authorized to contract to pay an amount not to exceed FIVE MILLION DOLLARS (\$5,000,000) to purchase the Property.

§3. The County is hereby authorized to convey the Property to MJ Garden V LLC, its successors or assigns, for ONE DOLLAR (\$1.00) to construct the 186 Affordable AFFH Units that will be marketed and leased to households earning at or below 50% and up to 60% of the Westchester County area median income, that will remain affordable for a period of not less than fifty (50) years, and will be marketed and leased in accordance with an approved affirmative fair housing marketing plan, noting that the income limits are subject to change based on the median income levels at the time of initial occupancy and subsequent occupancies, as established by the

U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

§4. The County is hereby authorized to grant and accept any and all property rights necessary in furtherance hereof.

§5. The transfers of the Property shall be by such deeds as approved by the County Attorney.

§6. The County Executive or his duly authorized designee is hereby authorized and empowered to execute all instruments and to take all action necessary and appropriate to effectuate the purposes hereof.

§7. This Act shall take effect immediately.



BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, NEW YORK (by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the voting strength of said Board), AS FOLLOWS:

The estimated maximum cost of said specific object or purpose, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof is \$3,650,000. The plan of financing includes the issuance of \$3,650,000 bonds herein authorized; and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds and the levy of a tax to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds and notes.

Section 2. The period of probable usefulness of the specific object or purpose for which said \$3,650,000 bonds authorized by this Act are to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 12(a)(3) of the Law, is ten (10) years;

Section 3. Current funds are not required to be provided as a down payment pursuant to Section 107.00 d. 9. of the Law prior to issuance of the bonds authorized herein, or any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds. The County intends to finance, on an interim basis, the costs or a portion of the costs of said improvements for which bonds are herein authorized, which costs are reasonably expected to be reimbursed with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the County, pursuant to this Act, in the maximum amount of \$3,650,000. This Act is a declaration of official intent adopted pursuant to the requirements of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2.

Section 4. The estimate of \$3,650,000 as the estimated maximum cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is hereby approved.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of this Act and of the Law, and pursuant to the provisions of §30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes or the renewals thereof, and of §§50.00, 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of said Law, the powers and duties of the County Board of Legislators relative to authorizing the issuance of any notes in anticipation of the sale of the bonds herein authorized, or the renewals thereof, relative to providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, relative to prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the respective amounts of bonds herein authorized, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and relative to executing agreements for credit enhancement, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance of the County, as the chief fiscal officer of the County.

Section 6. Each of the bonds authorized by this Act and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale thereof shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by §52.00 of said Local Finance Law and said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the County of Westchester, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the County. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and provision shall be made annually in the budgets of the County by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the notes and bonds to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 7. The validity of the bonds authorized by this Act and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

(a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or

(b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this Act or a summary hereof, are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

(c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 8. This Act shall take effect in accordance with Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter.

Section (B). The amendment of the bond act set forth in Section (A) of this act shall in no way affect the validity of the liabilities incurred, obligations issued, or action taken pursuant to said bond act, and all such liabilities incurred, obligations issued, or action taken shall be deemed to have been incurred, issued or taken pursuant to said bond act, as so amended.





The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds or the renewals of said notes, and provision shall be made annually in the budgets of the County by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the notes and bonds to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 7. The validity of the bonds authorized by this Act and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

(a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or

(b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this Act or a summary hereof, are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

(c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 8. This Act shall take effect in accordance with Section 107.71 of the Westchester County Charter.
